## Will Open Bids On Gymnasium

Bids will be opened next Tuesday at 4:00 p. m. in the school cafeteria for the new Tahoka school gymnasium, for which bonds were voted last year in the school improvement program.

Contract was supposed to have been let on the project last fall, but building conditions were not conducive to fit the funds available and date for receiving of bids was postponed.

From the \$200,000 bond issue, a modern new school for Negroes has been built at a cost of \$12,000, making classroom facilities at Dunbar equal to other schools.

Near completion is the \$47,000 addition to South Elementary School which will house the four divisions of the first grade.

This addition, an extension to the present building on the east, has several unique features which make this division of the school one of the most modern in the area.

The addition completely separates first grade children from the rest of the school, and each room is a complete unit with its own rest rooms. A large room in the center, where there would be a hallway, is designed for use of the small children during inclement weather for a play area, and it can also be used as a dark room for showing movies to large groups. The unit also has its own entrance.

Another Dale Carnegie Leadership course will be started here next Thursday to run 14 weeks. In fact, the introductory demonstration meeting was being held Thursday of this week.

Wednesday, the class was nearing the full enrollment of 44, but there is room for a few more if they enroll before next Thursday, stated Ellis Posey of the Carnegie school. Ronald Bailey, teacher of the first course, will be the second course instructor.

Graduation exercises for the first such school in Tahoka were held Tuesday night, when James E. (Red) Norman presented certificates and awards to nearly forty adults at the City-Legion building.

Special recognition was given Mitchell Williams, winner of the impromptu championship award, and Mrs. Iva Elliott, winner of the award for greatest achievement.

Basic objectives of the adult training course are to develop confidence and poise, improve human relations, improve memory, and overcome fear and worry.

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## New Church of Christ Opening On Sunday

Tahoka Church of Christ will formally open its beautiful new \$80,000 semi-modernistic church building in a special service here Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, and all people of the area are invited.

Actually first service will be the Bible School service that morning at 9:45, followed by the first preaching service.

An eight-day Gospel meeting is opening that morning in observance of completion of the new building for the church.

W. T. Hamilton, minister of La-mesa Church of Christ, will do the preaching, and Horace Coffman, song leader and assistant minister of the Broadway Church of Christ in Lubbock, will direct the song services during the meeting. Leroy Cowan is minister of the church.

Services week days during the meeting will be held daily at 10:00 a. m. and 7:30 p. m.

Sunday afternoon's program will feature a session of singing and short talks by Ernest West of Odessa, a former minister of the local church; Ted Chancy, representing the Elders of the church; and James Phillips, chairman of the building committee. Following this service, everyone will have an opportunity to go through the entire building.

Furniture was being installed this week, and only a few details will remain when the membership moves from the old church building a block east of the square.

The church will have some furniture yet to install, as well as a sign on the front. Plans have been made to pave a large parking area in front of the building and to landscape the grounds at some later date.

Built all on one floor at ground level, the building has many features that are outstanding, including a nursery and "cry room", hearing aids for those hard of hearing, ante-rooms that open up into the main auditorium when the latter is filled to capacity, indirect lighting, and all-weather airconditioning.

## Lynn County 11th In Nation In Cotton Production For 1958

### Raise \$3,141 For March of Dimes

With O'Donnell setting the pace, Lynn county has again done well in this annual March of Dimes drive, announces C. W. Conway, county and local drive chairman.

Up until Wednesday, a total of \$3,141.90 had been reported, Conway states. He states that the drive will close on Friday, February 13, and asks that checks be mailed in as quickly as possible by those using the march of Dimes envelopes.

O'Donnell, under the direction of John Ellis, raised a total of \$1,730.00, or more than half of the total. Much of this came from the MOD show held there last Thursday night.

Tahoka has contributed a total of \$1,194.19 to the total, and Wilson added another \$217.71.

The Mothers March Friday night of last week brought in \$665.17, the Teenagers' "road block" last Saturday morning netted \$204.22, the schools added \$120.20 to the total, but citizens voluntarily mailed in only \$162.00, and the churches turned in only \$42.60.

The latter two are a little disappointing to drive workers, who ask that citizens now voluntarily send in their contributions. No canvass of business houses was made locally this year.

### Little Moisture From Mist, Snow

Freezing mist and snow Saturday night through Monday brought only .12 inch of precipitation in Tahoka.

After a warming trend Tuesday and Wednesday, there was some prospect for moisture Thursday morning as skies were overcast accompanying a new cold front.

Icy pavement slowed traffic, one death resulted from a car-truck crash south of town, and at least two people received broken bones from falls in Tahoka.

Fears are held by many another drought is impending, as only .26 inch of moisture has fallen since December 1 and less than five inches in the last six months.

Tahoka recorded 17.78 inches of rain during 1958 and 29.88 during 1957.

### Icy Roads Cause Wreck Fatality

J. Wesley Rushing, 39, of Lubbock and Plains but reared near O'Donnell, was killed instantly at about 12:15 p. m. Monday when he lost control of his car and the vehicle skidded into a truck on the icy US 87 two miles south of Tahoka opposite the John Slover home.

Driver of the truck was Owen Lee, 40, of 315 N. Olive street Lubbock. Lee received a laceration above the eye and was treated and released from Tahoka Hospital. He travels the territory for Logan Candy Co. of Lubbock.

Lynn county ranked fifth in South Plains production, sixth in Texas, and 11th in the entire nation.

Lubbock county led the state with 246,010 bales. Hale, Hockley, and Lamb ranked next in order. Off the Plains, only county in Texas to gin more cotton than Lynn was Hidalgo county, which ginned 178,796.

In the nation, only other counties to gin more than Lynn were two counties in Arizona and four in California.

## Texans Pay Too Much For Auto Insurance

If you think your automobile insurance costs too much, you will be interested in a proposal that has been introduced in the Texas Legislature.

It is a bill that would probably cut the cost of your car insurance about \$15 to \$50 a year — the exact amount depending mainly on how careful a driver you are.

What this bill would do is this: Establish a "flexible rate" system in Texas like those used in other states to replace the present uniform rate system that prevents safe drivers from being rewarded with lower insurance costs.

Under the uniform system, a fixed rate is set by the State. You pay the same price for your insurance as does a reckless driver who perhaps has been in four or five recent accidents. What this amounts to is that you are actually footing the bill for the accidents of the reckless driver.

A flexible system would change this unjust situation. This system would allow insurance companies to compete for the business of good risks by offering lower rates — something they cannot do under the present uniform law.

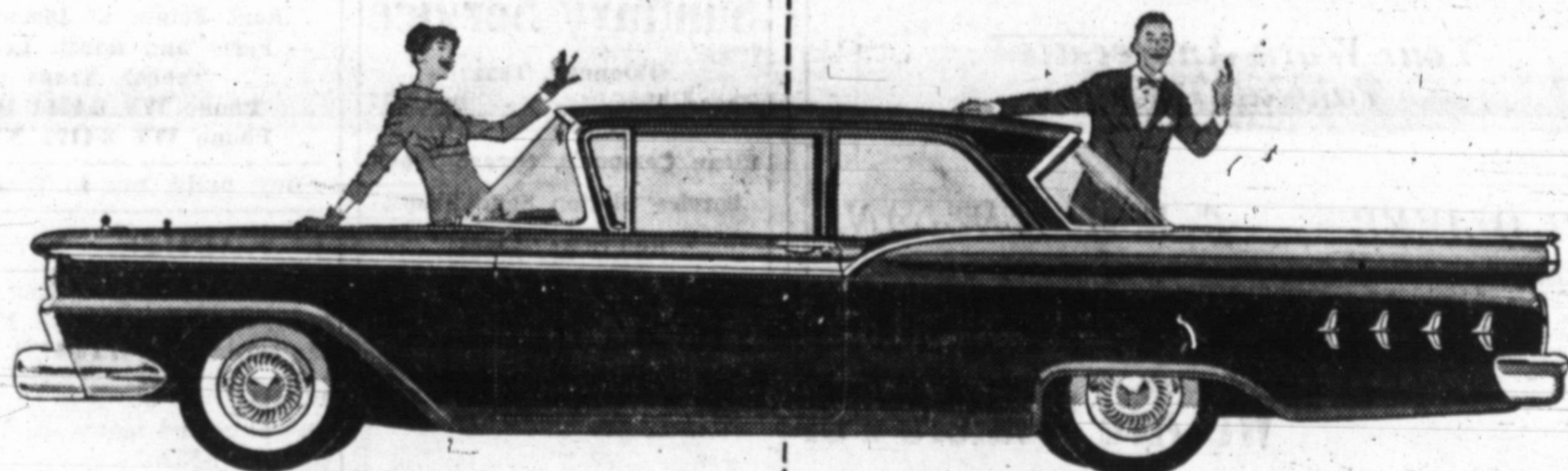
The uniform rating system is nothing more than a type of "fair trade," the only difference being the State tells you what you must pay for your insurance (instead of the manufacturer as in the case of fair trade). A flexible system permits an open market where you can shop around and get the best bargain.

The proposed legislation has plenty of safeguards against trick or confusing policies and would require all policies to have basic protection provisions.

The flexible rate system has been used successfully in most of the other states. If you know of a person who recently moved to Texas from out-of-state, ask him if his automobile insurance costs aren't much higher than he had been accustomed to paying.

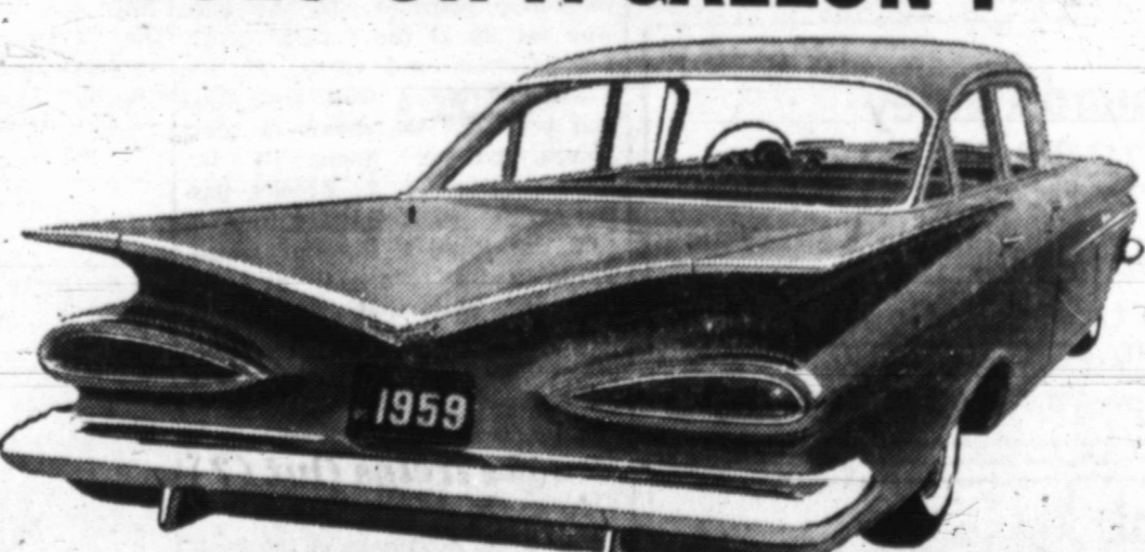

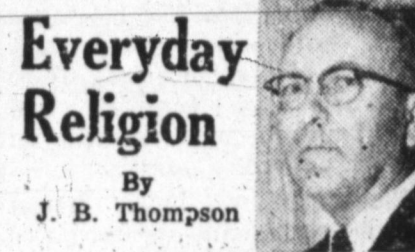
Are Texans due for a general sales tax?

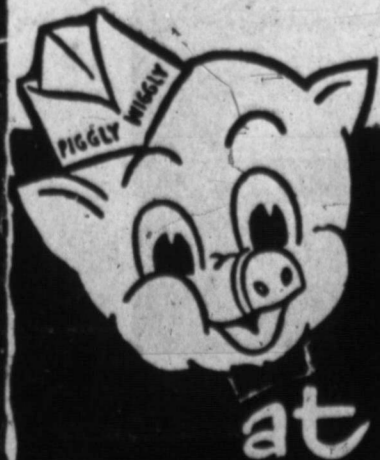

### Lynn County Soil Conservation District News

Fertilization should be guided by accurate soil tests. According to soil chemist, William Bennett, fertilization without a soil test is without first having seen a doctor. Medicine may or may not be needed and a different kind or amount would probably be prescribed.

Care should be taken when soil samples are gathered. An inaccurate sample can be very misleading when fertilizer is recommended. At least one sample should be

taken from each type soil and from each area receiving different treatment. Badly eroded spots, low spots or other such areas should be avoided unless a special fertilization program is planned for that area.

A small, uniform "care" or "profit" should be taken from each area. These should be mixed well and sent in for analysis. They may be sent either to the State Soil Testing Laboratory, Agricultural Extension Service, College Station, or to the Southwest Soils Laboratories, Inc. 2115 4th St. in Lubbock.

For additional information and assistance contact Bill Griffin, your local county agent.

**Farmstead Windbreaks**  
Arizona Cypress seedlings for farmstead windbreaks are available again this year. Supervisors of the Lynn and Lubbock county Soil Conservation Districts, in cooperation with the Nurseryman's Association, will supply the trees. They will be available for delivery May 1st and each consecutive Friday through May 30th.

Applications are now being taken by the Soil Conservation Service, in the courthouse. The cost will be twenty-five cents each for the six to eight inch seedlings. One year old trees are \$1.35 each. There will be a minimum of twenty five trees per cooperators.

Supervisors and Soil Conservation technicians recognize that protection from wind is necessary on

(Cont'd. From Front Page) The car coming, Lee said as he attempted to pull to the apron of the paving his truck skidded sideways and he went into the narrow ditch. At about the same instant, Rushing, coming down the slight hill, possibly applied his brakes, and his car began to spin around and around. The side of the Rushing car crashed into the right front-side of the truck.

He said the accident was "just one of those things" and that neither of them were driving fast because of the icy-slick paving.

Rushing was born Jan. 14, 1920, at Athens. He was reared in the OK community, southwest of O'Donnell, on one of the Dr. Campbell farms. He was married to Mrs. Dorothy Montgomery at Anton on Dec. 15, 1951, was a member of the Primitive Baptist Church and was a veteran of World War II.

He had been farming at Plains, but moved to Lubbock a week of two ago to attend a barber college.

Funeral services for Rushing were held Wednesday at 2:00 p. m. in the First Baptist Church of Lamesa, and burial was in Lamesa Cemetery.

He is survived by his wife; four daughters, Mrs. Bobby Littlefield, Julia and Lala Rushing of the home, and Linda Faye Rushing of Lamesa; a sister, Mrs. W. T. Parker of Carlsbad, N. M.; one brother, Carl Rushing of Anton; and several half-sisters and half-brothers.
