



# Tahoka Is An Indian Word, Means Clear, Fresh Water

An old subscriber to The News who wishes to remain anonymous calls attention to the apparent fact that Lynn county people, especially newcomers, do not know the location of Tahoka Lake and how it got its name.

Tahoka Lake is located northeast of Tahoka and south, south-east of Wilson, just to the east of the Tahoka-Wilson highway, and is about two and a half miles long.

Goshrie Lake is southwest of Tahoka, and Dewdrop lake is the little lake just off the Tahoka-O'Donnell highway to the west. Double Lakes, or Twin Lakes, are northwest of Tahoka, in the T-Bar ranch pasture, just south of the old headquarters and north of the Tahoka-Brownfield highway. Three Lakes are south of the same highway and west of the Tahoka-Wells road. Mound Lake, or Laguna Ombigo, is northwest of West Point in the Oscar Roberts Ranch. Gooch Lake is west of O'Donnell, south of Newmoore.

No one knows for sure how Tahoka Lake got its name, but this has been the name of the lake for at least 100 years.

The word Tahoka is, more than likely, a corruption of two Comanche words meaning clear water, deep water, or fresh water. It is believed the Indians named the lake Tahoka sometime back in the dim past because there has always been springs of clear, fresh

water at the northwest and further south on the west side of the lake. Maps in the Library of the University of Texas and also in the museum at Santa Fe, made by early Spanish explorers, show the lake.

The News editor interviewed an aged Spanish American at Santa Rosa, N. M., back in the early 1930's, one Jesus Perera by name, who said he herded sheep at Tahoka Lake and on the Casas Amarillas (Yellowhouse) in the 1850's.

Perera claimed there were 50,000 head of sheep in the herd. He also claimed he helped build a rock corral just south of the north spring, ruins of which were still visible a few years ago.

Also, The News editor once interviewed, through an interpreter, a son of Geronimo, the Apache Indian chief, and an older Apache who was out on these Plains in the 1870's, who knew all about Tahoka Lake. The Apaches used to bring blankets, pots, guns and ammunition out to Tahoka Lake, where they traded these articles to the Comanches for horses the latter had stolen from the white settlements further down in the State of Texas.

Many are the stories and legends that have been told about Tahoka Lake. It was even in the route of the Spanish explorers from their bases in New Mexico seeking to set up missions down in Texas 250 years ago, believe it or not. It was a favorite camping place of the Comanches, as evidenced by the artifacts and campsites and graves found in its neighborhood. It was a base for the buffalo hunters, and for General Randal S. Mackenzie and the U. S. Cavalry when the Government was seeking to put

### Cotton Allotments Concern of All

College Station—Cotton is a commodity which creates a good multiplier effect in the economy. Bob Cherry, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, because most of the cotton farmer's dollar is usually dropped into the money stream of the community. Though the dollar's identity may be quickly lost, it tends to circulate through all the avenues of trade and commerce.

The loss of cotton income, on the other hand, can adversely affect a commodity's whole economy, points out Cherry. For that reason, adds the economist, communities can look upon unused cotton allotments as a matter of community concern. Last year, for example, about one out of each 20 allotted acres was neither planted nor put in the Soil Bank.

The law under which cotton farmers are now operating contains provisions for the voluntary release and reallocation of 1950 cotton allotments. Where the release is made, the released acreage is retained on the releasing farm as history and is used in figuring future allotments as though it were planted. But Cherry points out, it will not qualify a farm for an old farm allotment as having planted cotton in one of the three previous years.

It is very important that released allotments be reapportioned and planted on other farms in order to hold county and state planting history. The released and reapportioned allotments must be planted if they are to remain a part of the acreage history for the county and state, emphasized Cherry.

Released allotments may be reallocated to any new cotton farm on which additional acreage is needed and will be planted. Any excess of released allotments in a county may be surrendered to the State Agricultural Conservation and Stabilization Committee for reapportionment to other counties only after each cotton farmer in the releasing county has received all of the allotment he can plant.

Cherry suggests that farmers contact their local ASC office or county agent for details on this important-part of the 1950 cotton allotment program.

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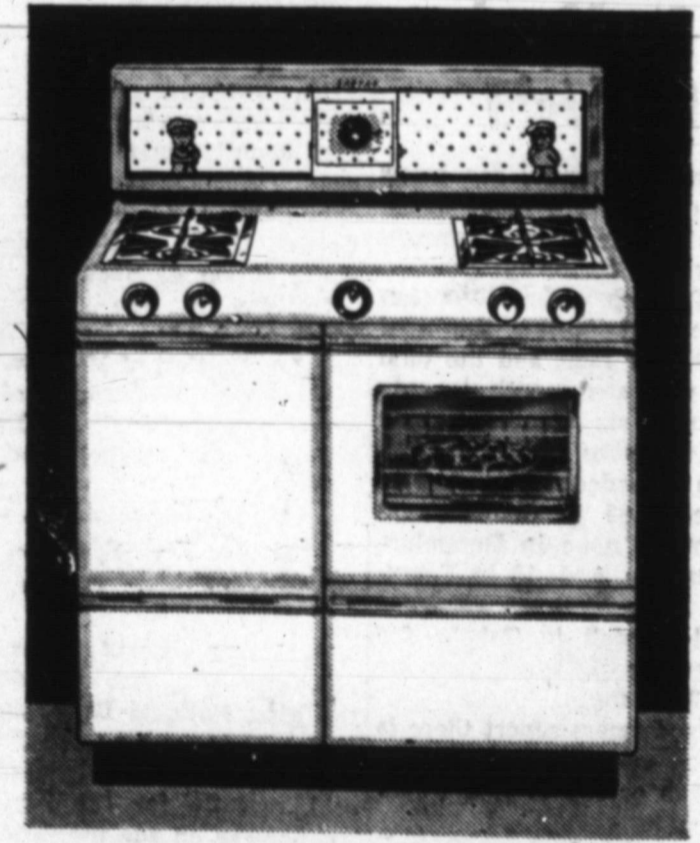
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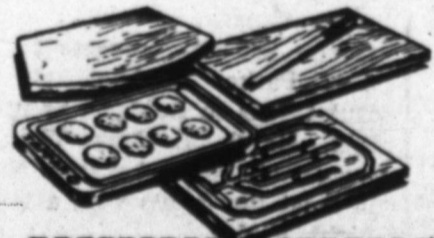

The pageant climaxes TWU Self-Development Week, March 16-21, which is devoted to special campus programs on self-improvement, personality and grooming analysis.

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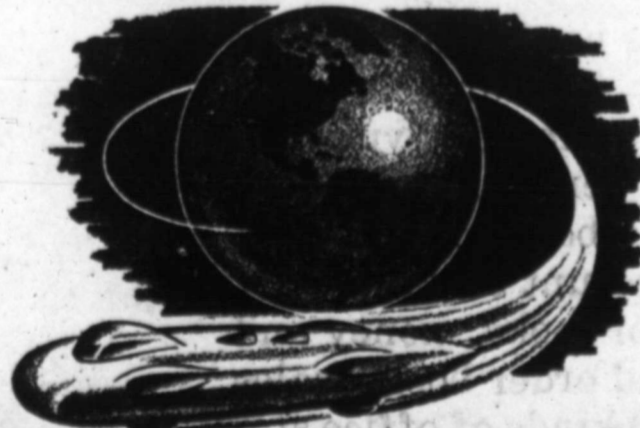

## Missionary To West Africa Will Speak Here On March 12th



Walter J. Kornelsen, missionary formerly to Liberia and more recently to Nigeria, West Africa, will be the featured speaker at the Tahoka Assembly of God on March 12th according to an announcement made today by Rev. H. C. Louis, pastor of the Church. Mr. Kornelsen will relate some of his experiences and will tell of the progress of missions in Nigeria. He is under appointment of the Foreign Missions Department of the Assemblies of God with headquarters in Springfield, Missouri.

In 1950 Mr. Kornelsen, with his family, went to Liberia, West Africa under special appointment as a vocational volunteer to fly and service missionary planes. He completed over 4,000 flights carrying mail, food, medicine, as well as transporting missionaries. He and his wife also established fifteen churches, trained national ministers and supervised a day school.

In 1954 Mr. Kornelsen went to an unevangelized section of Ogoja Province, Nigeria. This disease-infected area near the Cameroon Mountains had never been reached by the gospel. Mr. Kornelsen secured ten acres of land, built a mission station and helped build a Bible school. Fourteen self-supporting churches were established in the vicinity.

Mr. Kornelsen tells of many conversions among them the highest counselor for the Akajuk Tribe in the Agoja District. He is now pastor of one of the national churches.

After his furlough Mr. Kornelsen plans to return to Nigeria to continue his work in Nigeria with the hope that 100 churches will be established in the next four years. He is now visiting various churches of the Assemblies of God presenting the needs of the work in Ogoja.

Prior to going to Africa Mr. Kornelsen did evangelistic work in the Ozarks. He attended Tabor College in Hillsboro, Kansas, Kansas State College and Central Bible Institute in Springfield, Missouri.

Mr. Kornelsen will show colored slides and movies depicting the life of a missionary and his work. The public is cordially invited to attend the services which will begin at 10:30 a. m. and 2:00 and 7:30 p. m.

By J. B. Thompson



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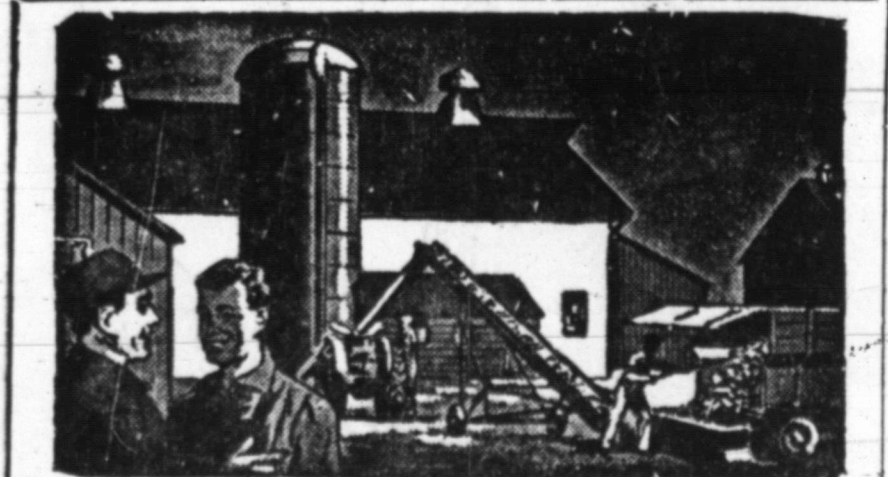

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### Support Price Drop Shocking

Washington, March 5—Rep. Geo. Mahon reports that the recently announced drop in support loans for feed grains has been a shock to the Members of Congress from grain sorghum producing areas.

The House Committee on Agriculture is making a study of the situation in preparation for a Committee hearing which will be held March 13. The support loan level announced for milo for the 1959 crop is 31 cents per hundred below the level for last year. The national average support for milo last year was \$1.83 per hundred. The announced national average support for this year is \$1.52 per hundred.

On Feb. 18, 1959, the Secretary of Agriculture announced support loan levels for corn, milo, and other feed grains. In view of the language of the law, it was anticipated that the support price for milo in 1959 would be approximately the same as corn, inasmuch as both have approximately the same feed value. This is not the case, and an explanation is being demanded and ways are being sought to remedy the situation.

Mahon stated, "Since the drastic drop in support levels for milo

was announced, I have appealed to the Secretary of Agriculture and others in the Department to reconsider the action taken. I have received complaints in regard to the situation from Mr. Frank Moore of Plainview, President of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, and many others. If the drastic cut in supports remains in effect, grain producers will sustain losses totaling many millions of dollars. A more effective program for all feed grains is needed, but action is made most difficult by reason of the well known attitude of the Secretary of Agriculture."

#### Report on Sorghum Alum

Spot checks were made last week by the Soil Conservation Service to determine the percent survival of sorghum alum plantings in Lynn County. On medium and fine textured soils it is estimated that there has been a 30 percent winter kill due to freezing. Plantings on fine textured soils have a slightly lower percent winter kill than planting on medium and coarse textured soils. There was very little difference in plantings on medium and coarse textured soils. The individual percentages are as follows:

1. Fine textured soils, 77 percent survival.
2. Medium textured soils, 72 percent survival.
3. Coarse textured soils, 75 percent survival.

Checks were made on the Charles Beard Estate, the E. E. Fagg farm and the Virgil White farm. These places were chosen because of their location within the county.

The same type checks have been made on Perennial Sweet Sudan and it showed to have about the same winter kill as did sorghum

alum. These studies are state-wide and will be compiled as soon as all results are available.

Applications have been turned in for Great Plains assistance by Clyde Haire and Fern Wicker. Plans are being developed on these places at the present time.

Several cooperators have been inquiring about district landplans. If you wish, you may contact W. L. "Cap" Rowe northwest of Redwine, Benny Pryor at New Home, or Bobby Lee at Wilson, concerning these landplans.

Your Soil Conservation District is making windbreak plantings available again this year. Applications are being taken by the Soil Conservation Service. This year there will be a wide selection of trees and year old trees are available for those who prefer them.

### Senator Preston Smith

This session thus far has been distinguished by very few controversial issues.

Normally by this time, many issues of legislation have been actively debated by House and Senate members. Some observers here at the Capital say that one reason for the sluggishness in the debating department to date is the absence of major pressure issues, and the atmosphere of excitement.

It has been pointed out that the 54th and 55th Legislatures had their side attractions of veterans land scandals, US Trust and Guaranty collapse and the naturopath bribery case. All of these and the resulting "clean-up" movements offered ample opportunity for Legislators to sound off in both chambers.

The nature of the most serious problems facing the 56th Legislature has been financial—headed by the question of gathering additional revenue to balance the spending requirements of the two-year appropriation period ahead. However, the mechanics of weeks of hearings on the biennium budget have not yet figured into the early stages of Legislative activity. In these hearings the budget will be tacked down to accurate requirements.

Because of the lack of debate thus far, it is difficult to appraise the temperament of the Legislature. Not many of the new members have had a chance for some practice on the floor at what veteran observers call "the snorting pole."

Still smoldering in the background are the after-effects of the speakership race between Representatives Waggoner Carr and Joe Burkett. The announcement by Rep. Burkett that he would not campaign for speaker of the next Legislature will enable him to "shoot from the shoulder" in the pending showdown on appropriations and revenue.
