City Will Tie-In New Water Wells

City of Tahoka expects to receive the pipe this week necessary for tieing-in the four new water wells with the City chlorination plant, located near the old city water tower, according to Mayor H. B. McCord Sr.

In a search for more water last summer, the City brought in four new wells on lots just north of North Seventh Street, along the northern city limits. At the time, these wells tested on pump from four to six inches. Three lots on hich the wells are located were bought from Higginbotham-Bartlett and one was bought from Jim Adams. About \$6,000. worth of eight-inch . pipe will be required to tie-in the wells.

Man has produced more changes in the world than he has in himself.

The talk about sending men to the moon and beyond sets me to wondering if we need to explore the other planets when we are still having so much trouble with this one. The modes and machinery life are vastly different, even in my life span, but life remains pretty much the same. We need to work on ourselves more and learn to live in this great world we have developed.


