"CONSERVATION AND CITIZENSHIP" (By Marcheta Wood) We as citizens of this great nation of ours know that everything we have or ever will have we owe from decaying plants. It is a circle, to the good earth which God, our Creator, placed here for us in the beginning. One of the most important problems of any civilized country is the conservation of natural resources, soil, water supplies, forests, birds and wild animals, and minerals of all kinds. Conservation, saving from waste or injury, is simply good housekeeping on a large scale. Just as a house that is neglected and abused will eventually become ruined and uninhabitable, so a country will become impoverished and unlivable

not prevent the water from car ring the soil downhill. The farmer has another taskto preserve the fertility of the soil. Plants, as we have seen, require certain chemicals from the soil in order to grow, and the soil gets many of these compounds

or cycle. When the plants are harvested year after year and none are returned to the soil, the supply of needed chemicals gradually gets used up. We say the soil is exhausted, or poor. To prevent this the farmer fertilizes the soil; that is, he adds such organic matter as nitrogen, ammonia, phosphorus and potassium. He can also help to maintain the soil fertility by rotation of his crops, that is, by growing dif-

ferent crops, alternately on the same land. This avoids exhausting completely any one plant if its forests are destroyed, its food in the soil. Rotation brings streams polluted, its soil washed or blown away, and its minerals greater returns from the land. while aiding its use.



> With numerous tax bills piled up in the legislature, there are predictions by many capitol observers that any decision on tax proposals may take place in a special session

Most of the tax bills under study fall into one of two major categories: those that advocate gross receipts taxes, and the bills that aim to spread the tax load on a selective sales tax system, a method of taxation already well established in Texas.

Leading proponent of the gross receipts taxes is Rep. W. T. Oliver of Port Neches. He has introduced a series of bills which would levy gross receipts taxes on hotels, motels and rooming houses; on newspaper, radio and TV and outdoor advertising; on air transportation of passengers. He has, in addition, offered a series of occupation levies on oil well servicing; on phonograph records; and on soft drink syrups.

Principal items under consideration by selective sales tax bills fall in the fields of tobacco products, liquor, beer, automobiles. A number of bills have been introduced on these subjects, including tobacco, liquor and automobile levies, proposed by the governor.

Time is running out on taxation plans. Friday, March 13, was the halfway mark of the 120-day legis lative session, and bills introduced after that date must have approval of four-fifths of the House.

A solution to the tax problem is not in sight yet. There are indications, say legislators, that the ultimate tax proposal, adopted might likely be a combination of the Seeligson general sales tax program and Governor Daniel's proposed program.







Frank Norfleet **Is Visitor Here**

J. Frank Norfleet, 99, pioneer nationally known back in the 1920s for tracking down a gang of bunco artists who had swindled him, was a business visitor in Ta-

hoka Monday and Tuesday. In spite of his age, Mr. Norfleet is remarkably active and his memory is sharp for his age. He came down on the bus by himself and was attending the business with local county officials.

He asked The News about several of the pioneers of this area that he knew 50 to 75 years ago. including Cass Edwards, Jack Alley, Ance Lockwood, Bill Petty, and Elton George, all now dead.
