165,034 Bales Was Lynn 1958 Ginnings

Lynn county was sixth in Texas Most Farmers and twelfth in the nation in 1958 cotton production, according to the March 20 report just released Favor "A" Plan by the Bureau of Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

Lynn county ginnings were 165,-034 bales, the report shows. Lubbock county led the state and was sixth in the nation with 245,895 bales. Only county off the Plains in Texas to exceed Lynn county's ginnings was Hidalgo county, which ginned 178,796 bales.

Top cotton producing county in the nation was Kern county, Calif., with 438,703 bales; next was Fresno with 419,216; Then Maricopa, Arizona, with 304,201; Tulare, Calif., with 263,522; Pinal, Ariz., with 259,630; then Lubbock and Hale and Kings, Calif., with 197,-422.

Hale county ginned 200,581, Hockley 188,142, Lamb 178,358, and then Lynn.



In a poll conducted by the National Federation of Independent Business of the nation's independent businessmen, 76% favored the bill introduced by Sen. John Sparkman to permit tax allowances for inventory increases.

Perhaps this bill, more than any one single measure. would reduce distressed selling, cut down bankruptcies among independent retailers and whole-

salers.

It is a sad commentary C. W. Hard on the times, but the fact remains that in the high level of bankruptcies of the past few years, many business firms have gone to the wall which were in a fairly healthy condition except for one thing.

That was lack of liquid cash. There is an easily understand-

able explanation for this. For most businesses, there is no practical way of keeping books on a cash basis. Instead, an accrual system is used. The business is not taxed on the amount of cash it has at the end of the tax year, but rather on the increased assets in the busi-

which inventory is a large part. As an example, it is well to consider a car dealer, although the same principle applies to an appliance dealer, a dry goods merchant, or others.

ness at the end of the year, of

So, to carry out this illustration, at the start of his tax year an auto dealer has in stock \$10,000 worth of cars. In his area, due to strikes, unemploymen

other factors, his business is depressed, so that sales are low.

Yet, due to new models coming in during the year, or to meet terms of a franchise agreement, or even due to having to take back substantial repossessions, or for other reasons, at the end of the year his inventory has jumped from \$10,000 to \$30,000.

Under the tax formula, his assets have increased \$20,000, thus this is a taxable amount.

But in the meantime, all of his cash has gone into this inventory. Now this may be all sound merchandise, and given the chance to work out this inventory at the proper times, he can recover.

However, tax bills demand immediate cash. So he is forced to cut prices to the bone to raise cash, but sometimes this strategem will not raise sufficient cash.

Thus, this business becomes bankrupt for the lack of cash, although as far as accountants are concerned, including tax accountants, the assets of the business showed a healthy gain dur-

ing the year.

It is also possible in a year of big government spending for foreign give aways for inflation during the year to boost the inventory values for tax purposes.

The bill introduced by Sen. Sparkman proposes to permit businessmen who end up a year with increased inventories to deduct up to \$10,000 from taxable income to offset what is often tantamount to disaster.

In the long run, by preventing, or at least mitigating, ruinous price cutting to raise cash, or bankruptcy, the government would gain in tax collections, because once a business goes under, it is no longer a taxpayer.
