Farmers Busy Planting Crops

Farmers are busy this week planting crops following the general rains of last week which furnished enough moisture for just about everybody.

Rain last week in Tahoka totaled 2.25 inches by official measurement in the U. S. Weather Bureau gauge. Of this amount, .46 fell on Monday, .49 Thursday and 1.15 that night, with .15 and hail falling early Sunday.

Some cotton that was up was damaged by hail and heavy rain.

The rain over the county was general, but the east and south-east received heavier fall than did Tahoka. Grassland and parts of the Gordon, Redwine and Draw communities received up to three and a half inches or more.

The rains came at a very opportune time, for there had been little moisture since October. Possibly 10 to 15 percent of the cotton had been planted on the April rain, and some of it was up or coming up. Some farmers are replanting this early cotton.

Mrs. A. F. (Janie) Pitts, 71, of Ackerly but formerly of Dixie community, died Saturday in Malcom-Hogan Hospital in Big Spring following an illness of about two months.

State Honor For Mrs. G. M. Stewart

Mrs. G. M. Stewart of Tahoka was presented the first place award in the state for "most outstanding program in the Division of Government Studies and Agencies in the Department of Americanism" at the Wednesday session of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs in its annual state convention at Lubbock.

The honor came as the outgrowth of a talk made by Mrs. Stewart on "Woman's Part in National Affairs" as her part on the program of the Phebe K. Warner Club of Tahoka and later presented at Tahoka Rotary Club.

Early in April, she was honored by the Seventh District, Federated Clubs, and the paper was presented to the state committee for judging.

Mrs. Stewart is a charter member of the Phebe K. Warner Club, organized and federated in 1922, and named in honor of a pioneer club woman, Mrs. Phebe K. Warner of Claude, Texas.

For the past 21 years, the Lynn County Library has been the leading project of the local study club, and all during this time Mrs. Stewart has been serving as chairman of the club's library committee and also of the library board. She is a graduate of SMU, a former teacher, and has long been active in her church, the First Methodist Church.

Childress has nearly 400 high school students and competes in District 5-AA with Perryton, Shamrock, Wellington, and Quanah.

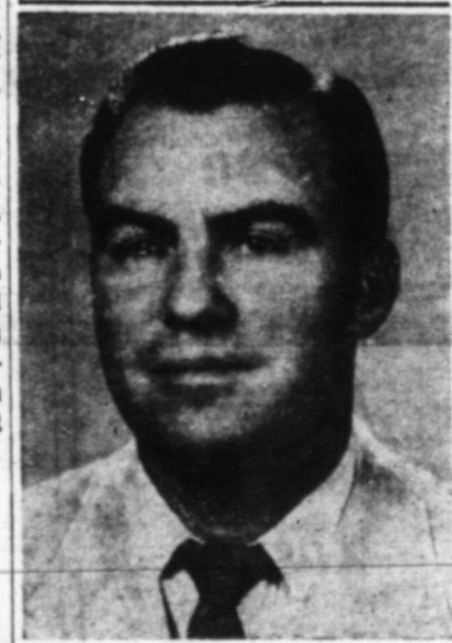
Haralson was told by the board they wanted him to reorganize the physical education program of the school. He will succeed Cliff Mertens, who has resigned to accept a position at Granger.

During his stay in Tahoka, Coach Haralson has had some good years and some bad, but there has never been pressure on him from fans or school authorities. His strongest point has been his influence over the boys he coached, as he has emphasized development of character as well as physically development and winning teams.

Under Haralson the Bulldogs were district champions in 1951, 1952, and represented the district in 1954 after tying with Abernathy. Short on ability this last year, the Bulldogs won only over Post and Seagraves. He also coached track, helped with basketball, and other phases of physical education, as well as serving as a classroom teacher.

He is highly regarded in coaching circles as evidenced by the fact that he is currently one of the two directors from Northwest Texas in the Texas High School Coachers Association. Buz Warren of Plainview being the other.

Tahoka Boys, Who Had Never Heard A Debate, Win State Championship

Lonnie Wheeler and David Bray, Tahoka High Seniors, are the Class AA debating champions of Texas.

Last week end, in the Texas Interscholastic League state final at the University of Texas in Austin, the two Tahoka boys won over Rockdale and Olney to take the state title, the first ever won in this event by a Tahoka team.

The debating championship for Tahoka came just five weeks from the time the two boys decided to enter the competition.

Neither boy had ever heard a debate, as such. But, each had been receiving a little kidding from friends because of the penchant for arguing—and seldom accepting defeat until shown conclusively they were wrong.

Both had a little experience in public speaking, gained as leaders in school activities and in youth activities at the Methodist Church.

One day a little over a week before the Interscholastic League district literary meet, the two decided to enter the debating event.

They immediately started study of the subject. "Resolved, that the United States should adopt the essential features of the British educational system."

Wheeler and Bray approached one of their teachers, Mrs. Clint (Lottie Jo) Walker, and she immediately proposed to help them. Mrs. Bray also joined in coaching the boys.

As a result, the next week they won the district contest over Post.

Next came some hurried study of the question, some practice events, and the Region I meeting at Texas Tech, where they defeated, in succession, Canyon, Quanah, and Alpine.

More study, and the boys, accompanied by Mrs. Walker, took off for Austin prepared to give no quarter.

Friday they met and defeated Rockdale, following which they stayed up past midnight studying for the finals, won the next morning over Olney by a judges' vote of four to one.

Incidentally, in the audience were Dr. Emil Prohl, Karl Prohl, and Jerry Cain, the latter two being students in the University.

This was the first time a Tahoka debating team had been to the state finals since 1922, when Mary Walker, now Mrs. Fleenor of Houston, and Conrad Lam, now of Detroit and one of the nation's most famous heart surgeons, won second. These Tahoka representatives lost in the finals when Mary developed laryngitis and lost her voice just before the final event.

Taylor Knight and Giles Canady were also present from Troop 21.

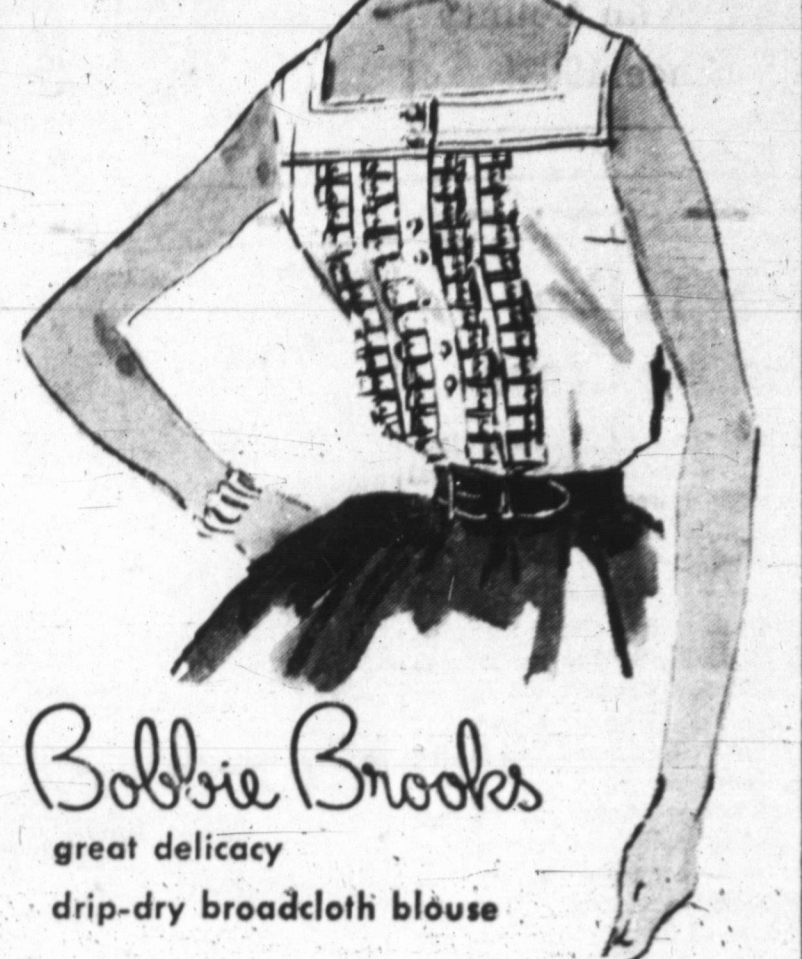

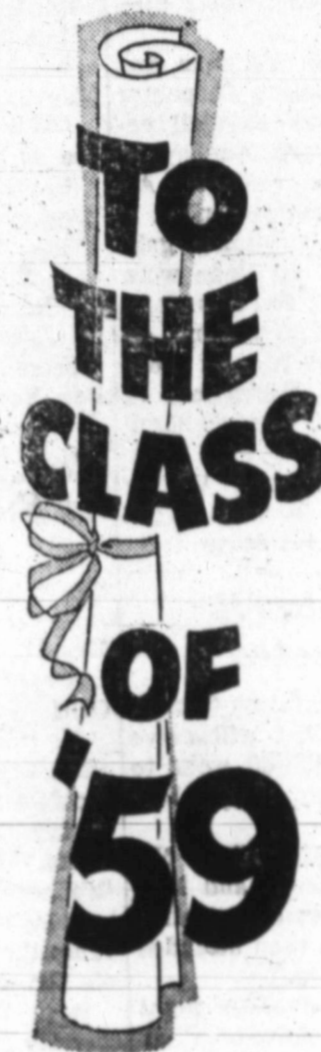

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"

By C. WILSON HARDER



It would appear, barring apathy on the part of the nation's small businessmen, that before this session of Congress is finished, some concrete measures will be passed strengthening the laws that permit opportunity to independent enterprise.

Of course, it is too early to tell as yet what the impact will be of opposing forces, or what effect it might be formed by the socialistic dreamers monopoly minded interests to head off the drive.

But a lot of effort is being put forth to protect free enterprise.

Attorney General William Rogers has asked both Senate and the House to pass legislation giving Justice Department authority to compel production of documents during investigative stages of civil and trust proceedings.

As it stands now, the only way necessary documents can be forced out into the open is to file criminal charges with the respective Grand Juries making the demand. However, this is not always feasible, nor proper.

At present, civil enforcement of the anti-trust laws is handicapped by the inability of Justice Department to force production of documents which have a bearing on the situation.

And from another quarter, Rep. Alvin Bentley of Michigan has introduced a bill amending the Federal Trade Commission Act which would prohibit certain practices now being carried out by manufacturers who attempt to carry water on both shoulders.

Rep. Bentley states that there are instances where the manufacturer is selling his products to the consumer through his own stores at a price level that the independent retailer must pay for the same products. In other cases, he said, the manufacturer is selling direct to the consumer at one price, to the manufacturer owned stores at another price, and to the independent retailer at still another price.

At the same time, the Michigan Congressman is quite critical of the Federal Trade Commission. In his opinion, the major reason that the Robinson-Patman Act has not brought the expected relief to independent business at the local level is directly due to FTC failure to enforce the laws.

This has long been a complaint of the nationwide membership of the National Federation of Independent Business.

Rep. Bentley seems to feel that the major fault of the FTC has been a failure of the FTC to vigorously enforce and police the cease and desist orders issued when a major violation has been perpetrated.

In other words, there have been occasions where the FTC has moved in on violators and issued a cease and desist order against unfair practices. The guilty parties have replied that they won't cease and desist, and the FTC has gone along its merry way, on the assumption that there would be no reversion to the forbidden practices.

Thus, in this respect the FTC apparently has failed to recognize what men of the cloth have always known to be true.

There are always backsliders. Rep. Bentley wants the FTC to recognize this fact and act.

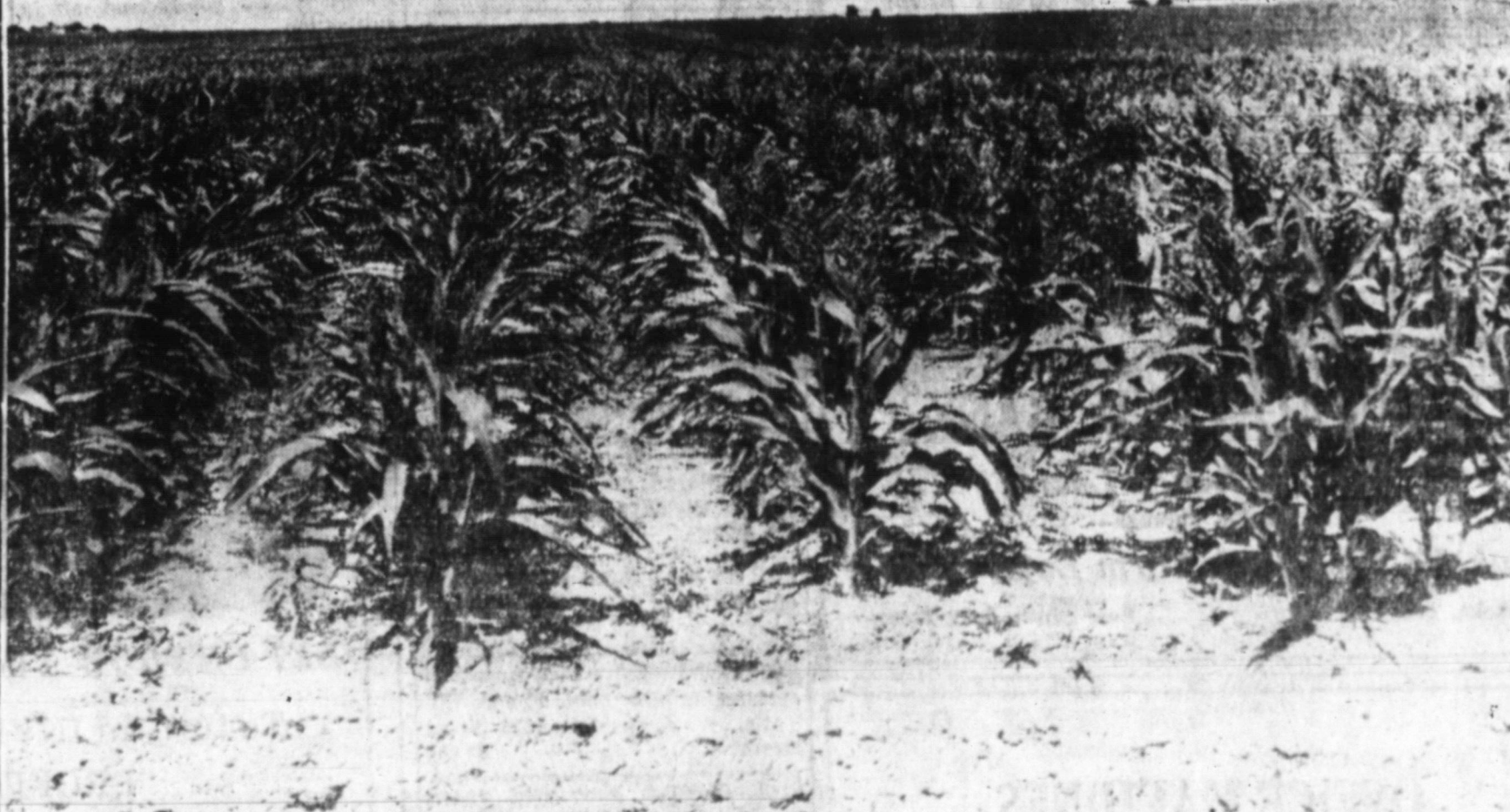

Many of these questions about the 50th Legislature have been answered by research recently completed by Rep. Ed Cloud of Rule, Haskell County.

Cloud's records show that 20 members of the Senate are lawyers, 3 are farmers, one says he is a "full time Senator," a college executive, an auto dealer, a theatre operator and a bi-lingual publications executive.

In the House, lawyers also outnumber all others. There are 66 lawyers in the House, 12 farmers, 14 ranchers, stockmen and dairymen, seven teachers. Other occupations represented include insurance, 4; students, 8; salesmen, 9; a chamber of commerce manager, one professional football player, two public relations men, three advertising men, one tax specialist, two real estate men, two radio men, two printers, one locomotive engineer, one electrician, one savings and loan man, one restaurant operator. One House member classifies his occupation as "executive" and another as an

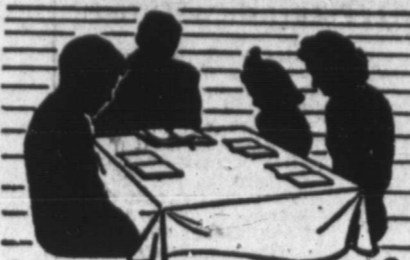
Highlights of the day will be displays of aircraft and other military equipment, and aircraft flyovers.

The first flyover will begin at 9:45 a. m. and will occur at scheduled intervals until 2:15 p. m. They include the B-52 heavy bomber, the F-86 jet fighter, the B-57 medium bomber, the KC-135 aerial tanker, the B-47 medium bomber and the KC-97 aerial tanker. In addition, helicopters from Reese will be demonstrated and the T-33 jet trainers will make flyovers throughout the day.

Aircraft on display will consist of the E-47, T-29 trainer, F-86, T-33, T-28 trainer and the H-21 helicopter. Army equipment to be displayed includes the Honest John and Winset rockets, an 8" howitzer, a 5-ton Wrecker, a 155 mm howitzer, a 105 mm howitzer, a 60" searchlight, a 4.2 inch mortar and a H-37 cargo helicopter.

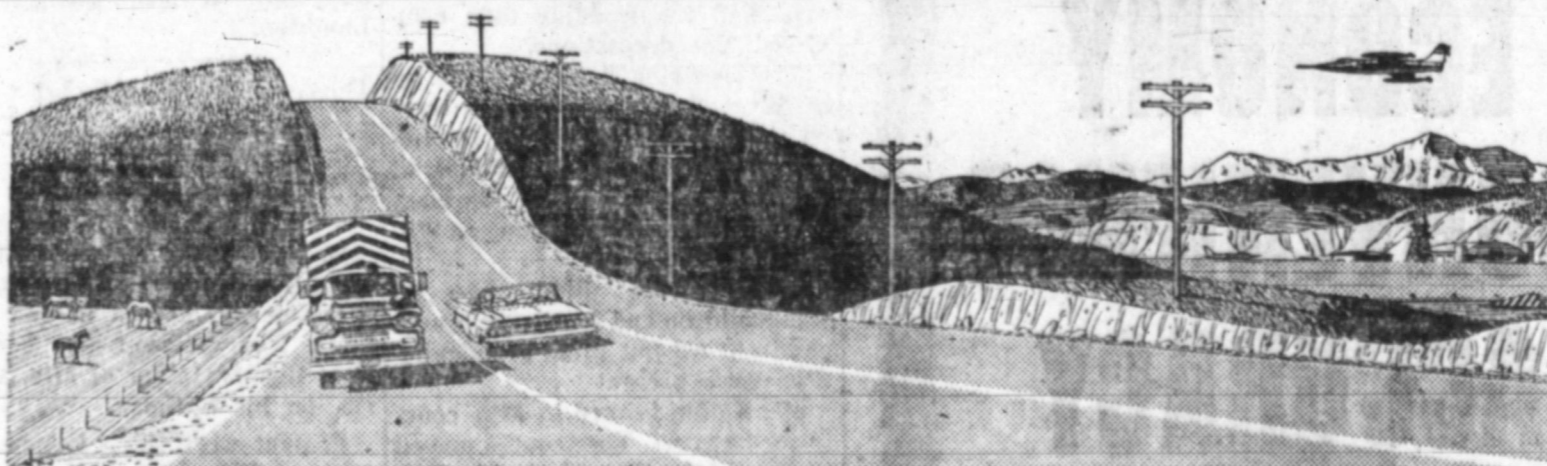
