For 1959 the array is impressive, as plant breeders seem to have outdone themselves to provide more beautiful, heavier bearing, and hardier plants for the home gard-

New Vegetables

Every home gardener likes snapbeans, and the new Garden Green snapbean is said to produce many straight stringless pods which are smooth, tender and full. Gold Cup, a new variety of sweet corn also seems to hold much promise, as does Gold Crest, a new 67 day variety for early

roasting ears. Other vegetable introductions to look for are the Caro-Red tomato, Oregon Centennial vining tomato, Lakeland lettuce, and Jade Green Brussel sprout.

New Shrubs

Among the new trees and decorative shrubs are: Blue Bird althea, Coolshade elm, Friesia locust, Sweetheart camellia, pink frolic lantana, Theve poplar, and the much talked about Starkrimson

apple tree. New Flower Introductions

Leading the list of new flowers are the petunias, with Cherry Tart, Satellite, Lavender Lace, and Sabre Dance, only a few of the new named varieties to be found in seed stores and at nurseries this spring.

Other new flowers which sound interesting, are Gold Orb marigold, curlilocks aster, and Crego's giant, the Cinderella begonia, and new Pomponette daisies.

"caveat emptor". Your tulips, hyacinth and jonquils should be breaking through the ground about now. If the dry weather has crusted the top of the soil, you might help things along by giving the area around your bulbs a good soaking
