The Highway Patrol investigated a total of eight accidents of which six were property damage, two personal injury, and none fatal accidents. These accidents saused a total property damage of \$2,575 with no persons killed and three injured.

"Traffic accidents take no vacation," the Sergeant said, "and with the Texas and national toll on the climb, to stay safe we must step up our vigilance on the road." "During the vacation months, thousands of motorists are on the highways, and too many of them are intent on cramming as much activity as they can into one brief vacation," Sergeant Stroud said "The result is often tragedy."

He cautioned vacationers to be on their guard against speeders, drinking drivers, and drivers who disregard traffic laws. Above all, he warned them to make sure they are never guilty of such offenses themselves.

He recalls that on his arrival here, or soon after, he saw Sumner M. Clayton and Miss Julia Crie going to the church to get married. The couple has lived at O'Donnell for many years.

Mr. Brewer went back to Haskel county, from which place he and his parents had moved to Lynn and there he was married to Miss Emma Lamb on March 29, 1914. Mrs. Brewer's parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Lamb, lived with them on the farm southeast of Tahoka. Mr. Lamb, now 85, has been bedfast the last 42 months, and Mrs. Lamb, who is 83, is barely able to get around the house.
