Poka-Lambro To Extend Service

Contract was let Tuesday by Poka-Lambro Rural Telephone Cooperative for construction of 100 miles of new line and a new automatic exchange at Loop, Gaines county, to serve 130 new customers.

Successful bidder for the work was C-B Construction Co. of Mineral Wells at \$64,760.86. The contract now has to be approved by REA in Washington.

W. D. Harmon, manager, states that the proposed new lines are mostly in Gaines county and will serve the communities of Loop, Sawyer Flat, and Ashmore from an exchange in Loop, where the cooperative has acquired an exchange formerly operated by General Telephone.

Mr. Harmon says a goal of 2,000 customers in Lynn, Garza, Dawson, Borden, Terry, and Gaines counties has been set by next January 1. There are now nearly 1800 telephone connections.

Tahoka Postoffice Going First Class

Tahoka postoffice will advance from second to first class effective June 27, which is the beginning of the new fiscal year for all U. S. postoffices.

As a first class office, Tahoka joins 18 other towns in the Panhandle-Plains section with this top rating.

The classification of postoffices is being based on gross annual receipts during any calendar year. To become a first class office, any postoffice must have gross annual receipts of \$40,000 during the year.

During the calendar year of 1958, January 1 through December 31, gross receipts of the Tahoka postoffice were \$47,789.80. After deductions were made to offset the increase in postage rates which became effective August 1, 1958, the adjusted receipts of the local postoffice amounted to \$43,219.72.

This advance in classification will have no effect on the transaction of business with the patrons of the local postoffice, except that a decrease will be made in the size limitations of parcel post mailed from the local postoffice to another first class postoffice, or from another first class postoffice to the local postoffice.

Other towns in the Panhandle-Plains region rated as first class are: Lubbock, Lamesa, Seminole, Brownfield, Andrews, Muleshoe, Levelland, Tulia, Canyon, Amarillo, Dalhart, Borger, Pampa, Perryton, and Dumas.

Such towns as Slaton, Post and Floydada are not listed among the first class offices.

Tahoka postoffice became a second class office in 1926.

Two New Oil Tests Scheduled

Two new oil tests for Lynn county have been announced during the past week.

W. B. Thorn of Midland et al have announced a 4,950 Glorieta test on the C. A. Haire farm in Gordon community about five miles northeast of New Lynn and about nine miles southeast of Wilson. It is two and a quarter miles south of the No. 1-A Davis producer and two and a half miles west of the PHD San Andres-Glorieta field 330 feet from north and 2,310 feet from the east lines of Section 1414, Block 18, J. H. Gibson survey.

In south Lynn county, one and a half miles northeast of O'Donnell, Burk Royalty Co. of Wichita Falls will drill a 5,000 foot wildcat known as its No. 1 Tomlinson, 1,980 feet from the south and west lines of Section 46, Block 8, EL&RR survey.

The week before, Wheeler Oil Co. of Fort Worth had announced a wildcat at the eastern outskirts of Wilson on the Mrs. Lonnie Lumsden land.

Brit Robinson Is Winner In State Trap Shoot Meet

Brit Robinson, 11 years old Sunday, won three second place prizes at the annual Texas State Trap shooter, meet in Amarillo Saturday and Sunday.

He is reputed to be the youngest shooter in Texas and one of the youngest in the nation in top-flight competition.

Sunday at Amarillo, he first entered the sub-junior division, but when he pulled so far ahead of his competitors in early shooting, he withdrew from this competition and entered the Junior Men's divisions.

In Class D men's singles shooting, he took second place, shooting down 190 out of 200 clay pigeons, while the man who defeated him scored 191. For the effort, his prize was a silver loving cup and \$119.60 in cash.

In the Junior division, a Houston youth hit 191 targets, while Brit hit 190 to tie with another youth. In shooting off the tie, Brit hit all 25 targets to place second. The prize was a handsome clock.

Brit also took second in the handicap division, hitting 193 targets, while the winner hit 198.

Jack A. Robinson, his father, who accompanied him to the meet, said there were 165 shooters in competition not only from all over Texas, but many of the best shooters from over the nation were entered. The youthful Tahoka boy attracted a lot of attention, and is being invited to similar shoots in Oklahoma City and Denver.

Brit uses a 12 gauge shotgun the same as used by the men.

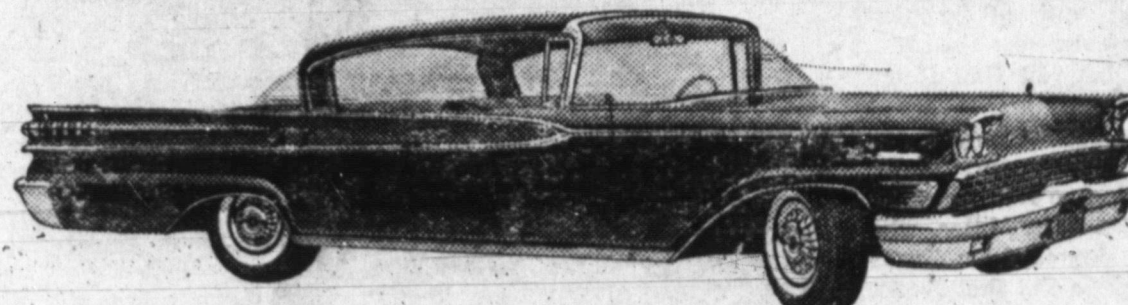

Shipley Gets 'Hub Cap' Award

A public service award has been received by The Shipley Motor Company of Tahoka, Texas from the Texas Automotive Dealers Association for the dealer's participation in a state-wide program to halt the theft of hub caps on automobiles. 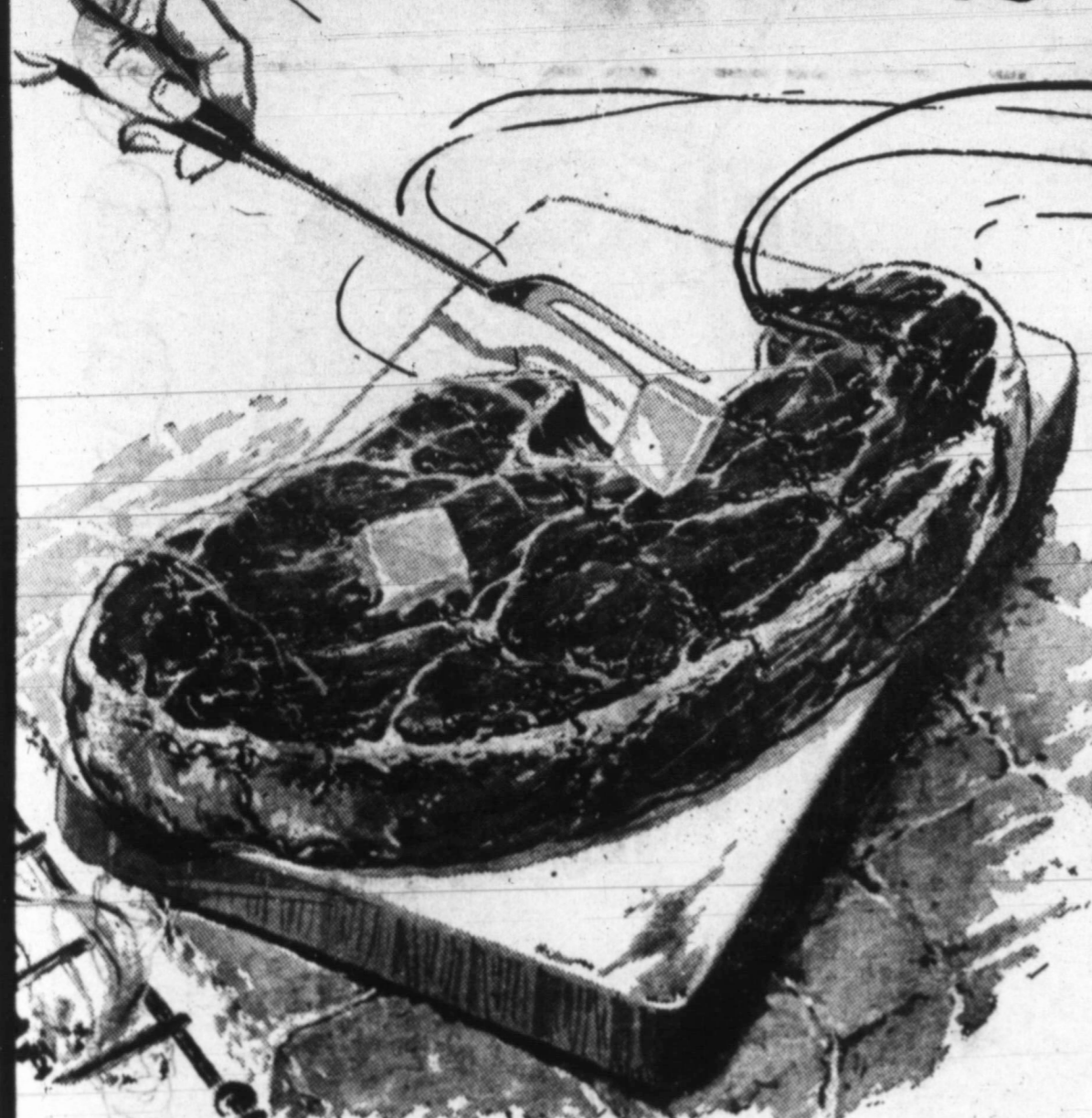

B. R. Brewer In County 50 Years

B. R. (Buck) Brewer of Midway told The News Monday, while in to pay his subscription, that this is his 50th year in Lynn County.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. E. (Ed) Brewer had come out to Lynn county in August, 1908, and B. R. followed them to the Plains in January of 1909.

He was just a young "buck" of 19 at the time, and he went to work for Joe and Ed Bairdridge driving a freight wagon to Lubbock and return. He drove a team of six mules to the wagon, for which he was paid the handsome salary of \$25.00 per month, and "thought he was getting rich."

The railroad was built into Tahoka at the time, and the team freighting days ended the next year, 1910, when trains began running over the railroad.

Brewer recalls that The Lynn County News was then located in a little frame building at the northeast corner of the square, operated by the late Mr. and Mrs. Harry C. Crie.

He recalls that on his arrival here, or soon after, he saw Sumner M. Clayton and Miss Julia Crie going to the church to get married. The couple has lived at O'Donnell for many years.

Mr. Brewer went back to Haskell county, from which place he and his parents had moved to Lynn and there he was married to Miss Emma Lamb on March 29, 1914.

Mrs. Brewer's parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Lamb, lived with them on the farm southeast of Tahoka. Mr. Lamb, now 85, has been bed-fast the last 42 months, and Mrs. Lamb, who is 83, is barely able to get around the house.

Hospital Growth Told Rotarians

"More Roads to Recovery" was the topic of a talk before Tahoka Rotary Club Thursday noon of last week by Dick Musgrove, director of public relations at Methodist Hospital, Lubbock. Dr. K. R. Durham arranged the program, and Dr. Bryce Campbell introduced the speaker.

The speaker told of the expanded services of hospitals in recent years, including better diagnosis, better treatment, increased number of patients, and the increase in span of life. Since 1910, he said, 20 years has been added to the span of life.

During a recent year, there were 23 million admissions to hospitals in the nation, or one in eight.

As a result of people living longer and demanding more treatment for hospitals, services have been

increased greatly. More expensive equipment is required, and more skilled specialists are necessary for the new treatments and new development in medicine.

Some of the causes for the increased hospital service are: The increased life span resulting in more developing heart trouble, cancer, and other ailments of old age; more traffic accidents; and maternity cases. In 1935, 33 percent of the birth were in hospitals, while in 1956 95 percent of the births took place in hospitals.

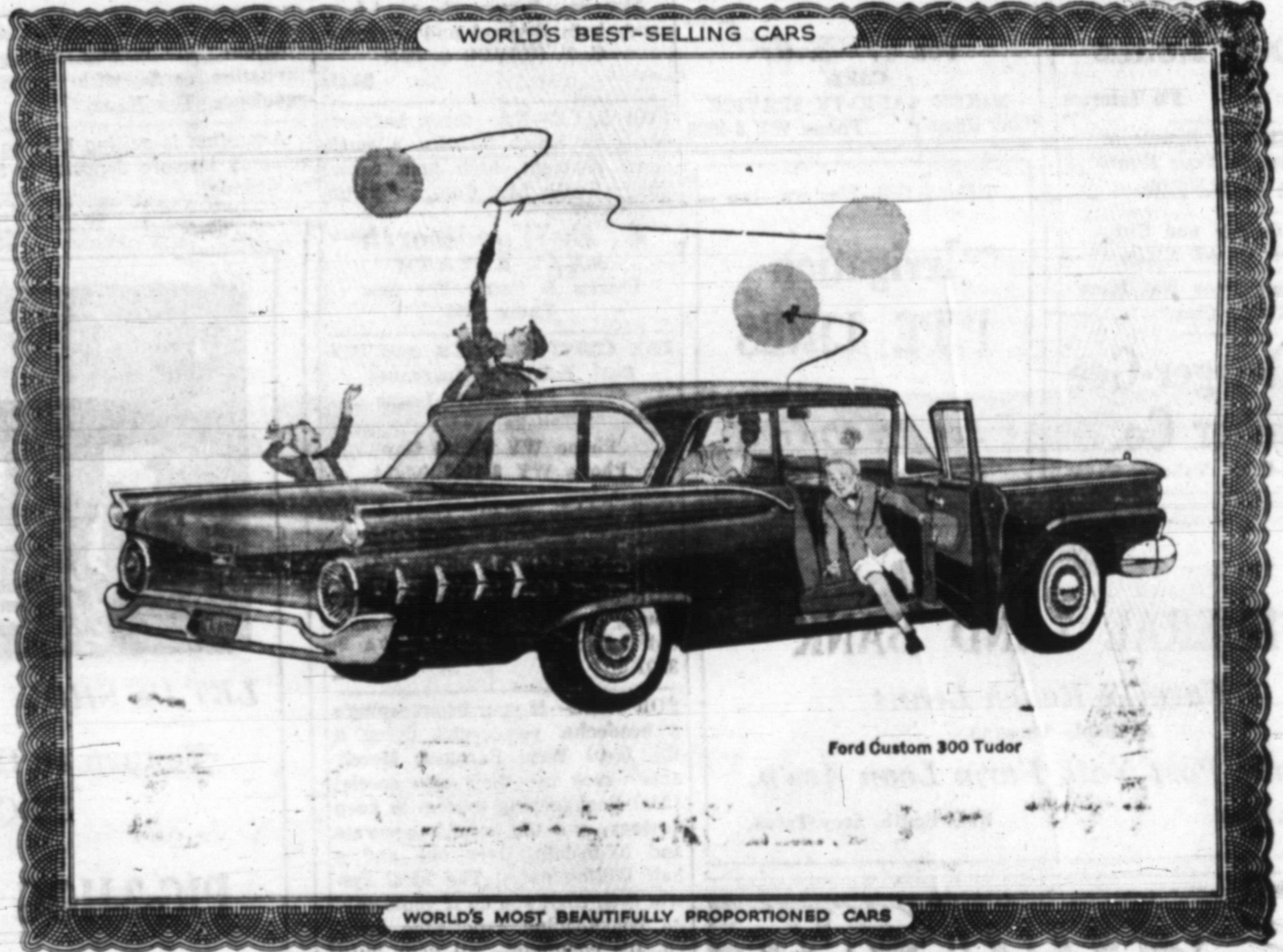

A district conservation plan is being developed for H. E. Smith, who farms the Hall Robinson place. The plan includes a 60 acre planting of black eye peas for green peas and for soil improvement. Other management practices such as contour farming are planned.

Fertilizer Use Shows Increase

College Station.—The total tonnage of fertilizer sold during the last half of 1958 in Texas was 4.2 percent over the same period in 1957 but 20 percent above the tonnage sold during the same period in 1953.

State Chemist J. F. Fudge also revealed in his bi-annual report on distribution of sales of fertilizer that the trend toward the use of higher analysis fertilizers continued at a rapid rate.

The average composition of mixed goods was higher than ever before with the average for the state near 9-18-9 level. The average nitrogen in materials was significantly higher—over three times above the 1953 average. On the other hand, Fudge pointed out that the percentage of available phosphoric acid continued to decrease. Sales of 10-20-10 were 30 percent higher than in 1957 and accounted for 71 percent of the total for 1-2-1 ratio and 55 percent of all mixed fertilizers sold.

Sales of materials were up 3.6 percent from a year ago due almost entirely to the great increase in anhydrous ammonia, especially in West Texas. Tonnage of this material used was seven times more for 1959 than for the same period in 1953, and accounted for a third of all materials sold during the past fall season.

Sales in East Texas accounted for 48 percent of the total tonnage of mixed goods and 56 percent of

To further emphasize the influence of anhydrous ammonia, he pointed out that nitrogen in materials averaged 38.1 percent last fall compared with 19.39 percent in 1953. Total nutrients in all fertilizers increased from 28.69 percent to 43.38 percent during the same period.

Without faith it is impossible to please him (God). Hebrews 11:6.)

Some years ago, two friends and I hired a sailboat for a day of sailing on the Gulf of Mexico. Later, when we were not far from land, we were struck by a squall.

I was somewhat afraid that the wind would capsize the boat, but I learned that under the boat was a center board reaching down into the water. The waves beating against the board stabilized the boat against the wind. I was interested in watching the captain of the boat make use of the winds that blew against us to draw us toward shore.

Knowing these things, I took courage, trusting that the captain of the boat knew how to take care of the situation. We reached land safely.

In life we can make the very winds of adversity serve to draw us toward our goal. By the center board on our faith, we can use the waves that beat upon us to hold us against the winds.
