Following showers last week end, the weather has been favorable for working crops the past few days, and Lynn county farmers have used the time profitably to clean up their crops.

Many have finished hoeing their cotton, which has been exceptionbe lost to weeds, reports several observers. Weeds in some maize fields, however, have gotten out of control and in many of them there s little the farmer can do. Crops are in all stages of development in the county this year.

Early cotton doing the best, some of it waist high and beginning to form bolls, is west of Tahoka to the West Point com-Lakes, Wells, T-Bar, and Newmoore; the south part, including the O'Donnell area, most of the Midway, Joe Bailey, and Draw areas; parts of the Draw, Redwine, and Grassland communities; and from Central north through the Gordon, Morgan areas, and part of the New Lynn area.

Crop are excellent, although a little later in most cases, in the northwest section, including Dixie, Petty, Lakeview, New Home and Joe over most of the Wilson area.

East of Wilson, and a small area northwest of Wilson, received hail damage recently, but the territory is limited and much of this cotton will come out and do all right, The News is informed.

An area immediately north of Tahoka, extending nearly to New Lynn on the northeast and nearly to Central and Grassland on the east, was hailed out late in June and many crops completely destroyed. Some of this area replanted to cotton the last of June and early in July has a good chance to make, but big production is not likely.

Tahoka received .29 inch of rain Friday and .13 Sunday to bring the total for July to 3.76 inches and for the year to 15.74 inches.
