Long-Range Plan Being Developed For Mrs. Pearl Callaway Farms

Mrs. Pearl Callaway of Abilene, widow of the late Dr. E. E. Callaway, formerly of Tahoka, has started a long-range improvement program on her 13 Lynn county farms, about 3,200 acres of both irrigated and dry land.

Most tenants have been on her farms for years, and Mrs. Callaway takes pride in the fact that relations have been good and that the people who till her soil are trying to do a good job.

With the help of a nephew, Quilla T. Brian of Abilene, she has started the program with improvement of farm houses, although this must be done gradually. The plan is to help improve the standard of living of those working the land, to encourage good farming practices, and to raise the standard of production.

To do this, such agencies are being called in to help as County Agent Bill Griffin, Allyn Cox and the Soil Conservation District, Texas Tech Department of Agriculture, and Paymaster Farms.

These agencies will help appraise the land and potentialities, and advise on the program.

Cox says the SCS is working out a complete coordinated soil and water conservation plan, and grass and shrubbery will probably be put out to improve the homesteads. County Agent Bill Griffin is advising on soils analysis, Johnson grass and other foul weeds eradication, and production programs.

Surveys will be made by test wells to find all available irrigation water possible.

A study is being made of farm record systems.


The plan will require several years, probably, to even approach a goal, but the inventory of resources will give the owner and farmers both a better idea of the direction to move in improving the farms.

Eleven farmers on the 13 places are: James Walker, New Home; R. W. Haley, Dixie; T. A. Stone, New Lynn; Olan Blair, east of Tahoka; Fred Pierce, Edith; Raymond Crane, Wayman, Lloyd, and Lewis Pierce, Ardell Proctor, and J. C. Durham, all of the Draw area.

Dr. Callaway, who died about 15 years ago after retiring and moving to Abilene, was a strong advocate of scientific farming, rotation of crops, contouring, extensive tilling of the soil, use of good seed conservation of manpower and machinery, and encouraged his farmers to live-at-home and take pride in their home and farming.

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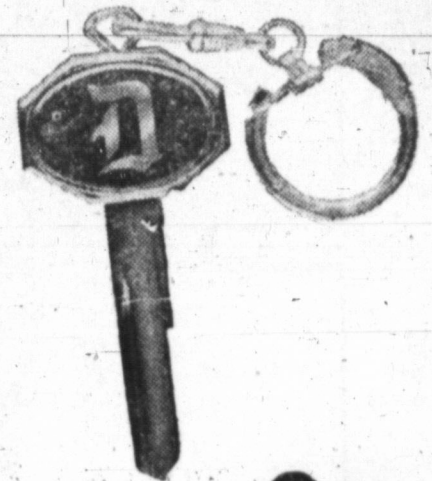

Church Adopts Annual Budget

The First Baptist Church of Tahoka, in a special business session on Sunday evening adopted a budget amounting to \$54,632.00. This includes an operating budget of \$44,670.00, and a building fund and debt retirement item of \$9,962.00. The total gifts of the church last year amounted to \$62,432.18. In the budget for 1960, the church proposes to give a total of \$14,773.92 for world missions. This includes the Southern Baptist Cooperative program, association missions, Wayland College, and local Mexican Mission, which is sponsored by the church. The church will give 17 percent of its regular contributions through the Cooperative Program to undesignated world missions, to Grand Canyon College, and to help support the First Baptist Church of Oregon, Ohio.

The church also accepted a recommendation from the budget committee to install a purchase order system, whereby purchase orders will be required for all purchases made and charged to the church.

The budget planning committee for this year included Chairman Truett Smith, George McCracken, Earl Terry, Derwood Howard, Sunday school superintendent, Training Union director, W. M. U. president, Brotherhood president, chairman of Deacons, and the pastor of the church, Rev. T. James Efrid.
