The practice of using a minimum number of plowing op-

should be used, which pro vides frequent high residue crops to be grown to provide organic matter to the soil. In heavier lands it is often necessary for the land to be deep plowed as one of the plowing operations. The use of the above practices should crease the water efficiency considerably and provide higher crop yields.







A new type watermelon, known as the "bust" watermelon, has been develored, and is said to be able to produce twice as many melons per acre as the vine type.
