## Rainfall During '59 Total 24.44 Inches

Rainfall during 1959 in Tahoka was nearly six inches above the normal of about 18.75 inches, according to records kept by The News for the U. S. Weather Bureau.

The gauge stationed at Tahoka recorded a total rainfall during the year of 24.44 inches.

Following is the amounts recorded by months, together with the normal rainfall figure on the basis of records from 1913 through 1956 inclusive:

Rainfall for 1956 was 10.08 inches, for 1957 it was 29.88, and for 1958 it was 17.78 inches. Record rainfall was in 1941 when an even 40 inches was recorded. Lowest amount recorded was in 1917 when only 8.73 inches fell, followed by 12.15 in 1918. Next lowest was the 9.07 inches recorded in 1948.

The News man has not had time to figure the normals including 1957 through 1959.

Rains in September and October, followed by showers in November and the 1.68 in December have put the soil in fine shape for the year 1960.

On January 8 and 9, Tahoka boys will play in the annual Seagraves tournament, and the girls, coached by J. D. Atwell, will play in the Ropesville tournament.

Tahoka boys and girls will open the District 3-AA conference season at Floydada on January 15.

## Cotton Ginnings At 130,000 Bales

Lynn county has ginned very close to 130,000 bales of cotton from the 1959 crop, The News estimates.

Tahoka gins had turned out a total of 21,117 bales up to noon Wednesday.

Ginners report only a very little scattering cotton yet to be ginned. A few farmers still have some bolls in the field, but these will not run up the total materially.

## McCracken Asks For Tax Office

He came to Lynn county from Haskell county in 1923 with his parents, Mrs. Kitty McCracken, and her late husband, C. M. McCracken, who passed away in 1936 at O'Donnell. The family first lived on the Jack White farm at Petty, ran the Petty store a couple of years, and moved to O'Donnell in 1933. He and his mother moved to Tahoka in 1941, and he has resided here ever since, except for a little over four years he spent in the Army during World War II, most of the time overseas in the Pacific Theatre.

George attended school at Petty and later attended O'Donnell schools, from which he is a graduate.

After the war, he worked about a year for Gibson Motor Freight, more than 12 years for Lynn County Tractor Co., and the past year has been with Forrester Insurance Agency.

He says he has received much encouragement from friends over the county to make the race for this office, off of which he appreciates very much. If elected he says he will give his entire time to the duties of the office.

## Lynn Is Leader In Bond Sales

A. C. Verner, chairman of the Lynn County Savings Bond committee, announces that Savings Bonds sales for November totaled \$18,965.90.

"Sales for the first eleven months of 1959 were \$301,621.00, or 116.5 percent of the yearly goal," Verner said. The quota for the year was \$259,000.00.

E and H Bond sales in Texas amounted to \$11,666,299.00 during November. This represents an increase of 1.3 percent over November, 1958.

"Series E and H Savings Bonds now earn 3 3/4 percent when held to maturity and your old Savings Bonds now earn 1/2 percent more," Chairman Verner concluded.

## City To Extend Water And Sewer

Contract for material for water and sewer pipe and installation was let Tuesday by the Tahoka City Council for proposed extensions in the new Roberts Addition in West Tahoka.

Moore Supply of Lubbock was awarded the low bid order for pipe and other materials at \$12,242.12, and Clowe & Cowan, also of Lubbock, was awarded the contract for fittings at \$1,050.07.

A sewer lift pump station is to be built along with the sewer and water lines in the area taken into the city limits a few months ago. Several new homes have already been built in the area.

## 44 New Homes Erected Here In 1959 Sets Building Record

### Housing Project Papers Complete

Paper work on the 14-unit low-rent housing project for which a budget of \$178,821.00 has been set up by the Public Housing Authority is just about complete, and the Housing Authority of the City of Tahoka hopes that the contract may be let in the next few weeks.

Plans for the units are complete, and Wyatt C. Hendrick of Fort Worth, architect and engineer for the construction, is now making the final drawings, according to J. M. Uzle, secretary of the local authority. All deeds for property on which to build the houses are in, and abstracts have been examined.

There will be seven duplexes of permanent construction designed to last at least 40 years. Each living unit will be 2- or 3-bedroom size, a total of 14 living units. One group is for white people, another for Mexicans, and a third for Negroes.

The units for whites will be built on a block in south Tahoka, with two 3-bedroom duplexes facing north on South Seventh and one 2-bedroom duplex facing east on Sanders, a total of six units.

Those for Mexicans will be on South Third and McDaniel and will consist of two 2-bedroom units and two 3-bedroom units.

Those for Negroes will be on North Seventh and Standifer and will also consist of two 2-bedroom units and two 3-bedroom units.

First eligible families who may rent the units will be those with incomes of \$150.00 per month or less. Lowest possible price for renting a unit will be \$26.90 per month, depending on the renter's income. Rent will include all utilities.

The houses will be complete in every respect, even with trees and grass planted.

The Housing Authority of the City of Tahoka will operate the project. The board is composed of A. M. Bray, chairman, A. C. Verner, H. B. McCord Jr., Dean Taylor, and Harold Green. J. M. Uzle is secretary.

### Work Is Proposed On Highway 84

Texas Highway Department has announced a new seal coat will be applied during 1960 to 3.8 miles of US 84 in the extreme northeast section of Lynn county near Southland.

The work will include surface and base strengthening and shoulder improvement, and total cost is estimated at \$4,400, according to announcement of D. C. Greer State Highway Engineer.

### Evon Wilson Is Award Winner

State health authorities have awarded Evon Wilson, City of Tahoka employee, a Grade C "certificate of competency" in recognition of his skill and knowledge of water plant operation.

The certificate was awarded under Texas' general sanitation law that water plants furnishing the public must be under the supervision of an operator who has proved his talent for the job in a written examination and been certified by the Texas State Department of Health. Wilson's newly won certificate will be valid for three years. After meeting certain requirements of experience and training, he will be eligible to try for higher certification.

The examination for Grade C certification covers fundamental knowledge in quality requirements for a public water supply, interpretation of bacteriological analysis, selection of pumps, well or surface supply sanitation, distribution system sanitation and procedures involved in pipe laying maintenance.

Grade C certification requires a minimum of one year of experience plus 40 "credits" earned by attendance at annual district and state water works short schools sponsored by the Texas State Department of Health, the engineering extension, service of Texas A and M College, and the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association.

### WHAT STEEL WANTS

Frank Chodorov writes in National Review: "What the (steel) companies want is permission to run their plants efficiently. Under the contract in force previous to the strike, any change in operational practice which management wanted to introduce was subject, upon a grievance being filed by the union with the industry's board of arbitration, to review and adjudication. Management was obliged to justify its action; the union had an equal and sometimes dominant hand in the running of the plant. That a proposed change was economically justified was of secondary importance; it was objected to the union because it upset the going order. . . . Thus, the 'work rules' became a deterrent to efficient management. They made for rigidity and high costs."

### THE WORKERS' RIGHT

Writing on labor problems, David Lawrence says: "The basic point is collusion and conspiracy. Workers have the right to join a union in their own plant and to strike if they cannot agree with the employer through collective bargaining, but have they a right to monopolize an entire industry and, by collusion throughout the country, conspire to bring on an industry-wide strike? This is the real issue that congress will have to face at its next session, and it may also be one of the most important controversies in the 1960 congressional campaign."

A Great Plains Conservation plan has been written for Wynne Collier on his farm near Draw. 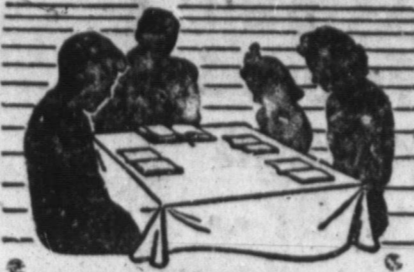

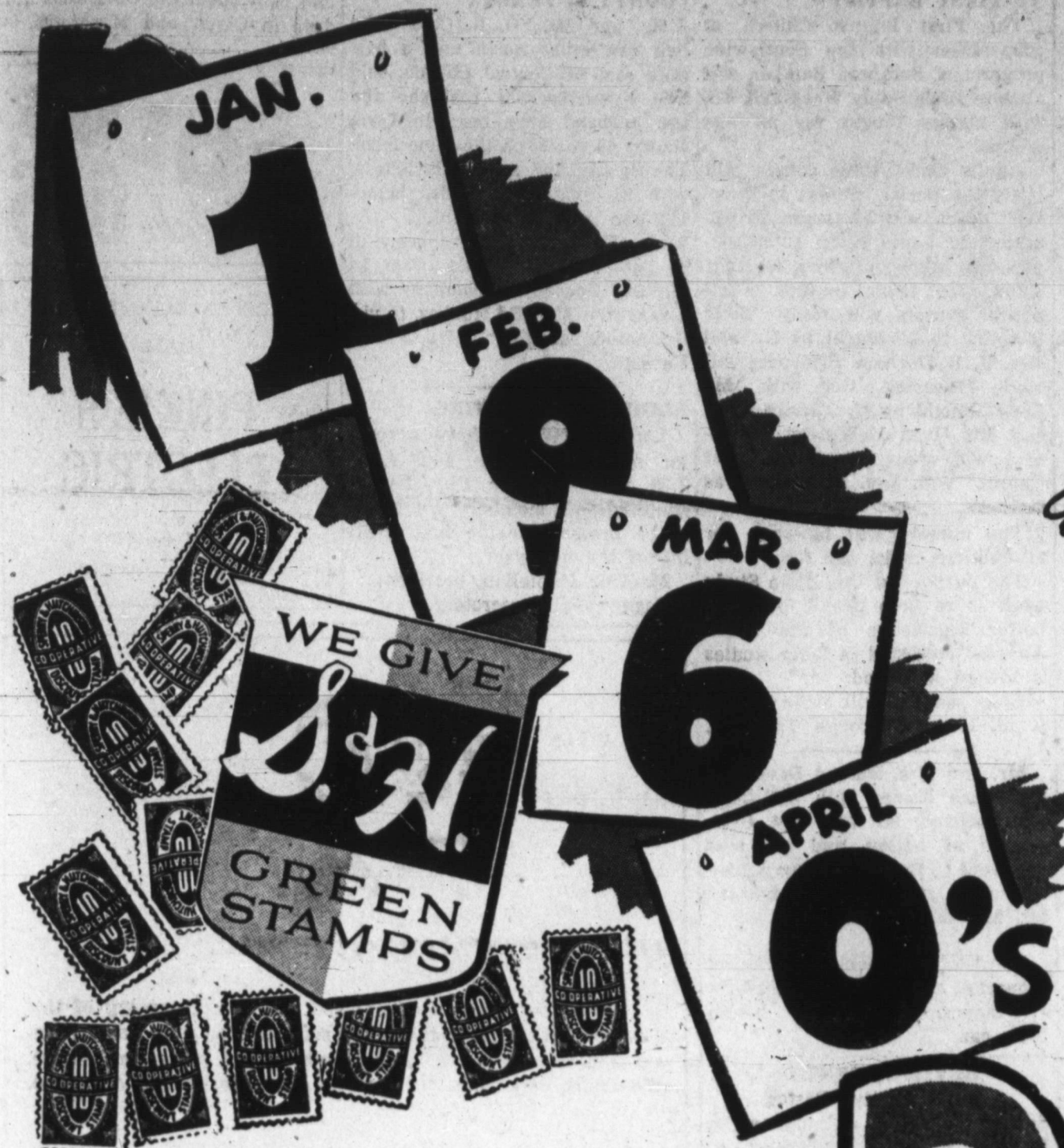

**NEW MEMBER NAMED TO STATE ASC COMMITTEE**

The other farmer-members of the Texas State ASC Committee are Carlton E. Wertz, Jr., of Raymondville, Millard Allan Webb of Dimmitt, and Frank L. Ramsey of El Campo. J. E. Hutchison, director of the State Agricultural Extension Service at College Station, is an ex-officio member of the committee.
