## City Signs Contract For New Home Development Program

Mayor H. B. McCord has announced final signing of a contract for development of the new Lockwood Addition in Northwest Tahoka. West Texas Builders, Lubbock, Texas has been awarded the contract and will feature aluminum homes by National Homes.

Complete plans and specifications are being prepared for submission to F. H. A. on the entire subdivision, which will be located on 20 acres of land recently purchased by the City of Tahoka from Fred B. Hegi. By obtaining F. H. A. suggestions and approval on the subdivision, home buyers are assured of higher loan qualifications, and greater resale values. Construction on the first three models will begin as soon as approved by F. H. A., according to Pat Surratt, sales manager for the company.

The purchaser of these homes may select any plan or size, ranging from three to five-bedrooms and one or two baths. Prices of the homes will be from \$10,500.00 to \$18,000.00, Surratt states. In addition to the maintenance-free all new Viking aluminum, purchasers have the option of selecting brick exteriors, both having the added advantage of carrying a low insurance rate.

The Lockwood addition is well located with respect to schools and affords access to the proposed four-lane highway to Lubbock.

Sales will be handled by a local representative for West Texas Builders and announcements on this will be forthcoming at a later date. In the interim period anyone wishing early occupancy of a new home may contact Pat Surratt at the company's general offices at 2310 Erskine, Lubbock. Model homes in Lubbock will be shown to all interested parties.

## Farmers Choose A or B Plan

Now that marketing quotas have been approved for 1960 crop of upland cotton, the next step for the farm operator will be to choose between the (A) and (B) allotment and price support programs for his farm, Charles G. Bragg of the Lynn County office said today.

Charles emphasized, however, that no election of such a choice can be filed until after the farm operator receives a notice of the price support levels applicable for 1960 under the (A) and (B) allotments.

Choice (A) will include the "regular" farm allotments and price support to cooperators who comply with their farm allotments at not less than 75 per cent of parity. Choice (B) will include allotments which are 40 per cent larger and price support to cooperators at 15 per cent of parity less than under Choice (A).

He said that the level of price support for the 1960 cotton crop will be announced by the Secretary of Agriculture not later than January 31, 1960. Each farm operator will then be informed of the support levels available on his crop under both program choices, and he will also be reminded of the deadline—March 16, 1960—by which he must register his election of Choice (B) at the County ASC office.

If the operator decides to grow his crop in compliance with (A), no action is required. Failure to elect Choice (B) will automatically make Choice (A) effective on the farm for 1960.

## Damage Is Heavy In O'Donnell Fire

Two O'Donnell business firms, the Rumbo Clinic and the adjoining Lott Pharmacy, burned much of Monday night from about 9:30 p. m. until 3:30 a. m. Tuesday, causing an estimated damage from \$50,000 to \$60,000. The businesses were owned by Hugh Lott and Dr. Noble Rumbo, the latter formerly of Tahoka.

A passerby first noticed the blaze and notified the O'Donnell fire officials. The 20-men O'Donnell unit was aided by two trucks and 15 firemen from Tahoka. For a while it looked as though the fire fighters might confine the blaze to the clinic at one time, but a water hose burst and gave the fire the jump it needed to cause the heavy damage.

Roofs of both the clinic and pharmacy caved in at the height of the blaze and stock and equipment were believed almost a total loss. It is believed that the fire started in the Rumbo Clinic, which is located on the northeast corner of the square and formed an "L" around the pharmacy. One side of the clinic did not receive heavy damage, although smoke and water entered that portion of the building.

Definite cause of the Monday night fire is not known.

Lynn county bank deposit on the last day of 1959 totaled \$13,566,474.19, according to reports made by the Tahoka, Wilson and O'Donnell banks on belated calls from the U. S. Comptroller of Currency and the Texas Banking Commission.

However, as the new year opened, bankers report there was a rush to make added deposits by farmers and others holding over income from 1959 for 1960 deposit. As a result total deposit took a two or three million dollar jump the first week of 1960, bankers estimate.

Although this is not a new record for this county, the large total does reflect the sound financial condition of the county.

The First National Bank in Tahoka had on deposit Dec. 31, 1959 a total of - 7,971,188.92; Wilson State Bank, \$3,233,985.94; and First National Bank, O'Donnell, \$2,363,299.33.

## Rains Give Good Winter Season

Rain this week in Tahoka totaled .24 of an inch although heavier rainfall was reported in some sections of the county, bringing the total for the month, so far, to .73.

With the above normal moisture received during December the county has the best winter season at this time of the year that it has had in many years.

Monday Tahoka received .07 of an inch and an additional .02 on Tuesday, bringing the total for the week to .24. However, J. H. Huddleston of the Grassland-Gordon area reported that he received .75 of an inch on Wednesday, and other points over the county very likely received more rain than did Tahoka.

Heavy winds accompanied the rain Wednesday night, as did some hail and sleet in a freak storm for this time of year. Minor wind damage was reported over the town, and some farmers said they were unable to get a measurement of the rainfall because of the high winds.

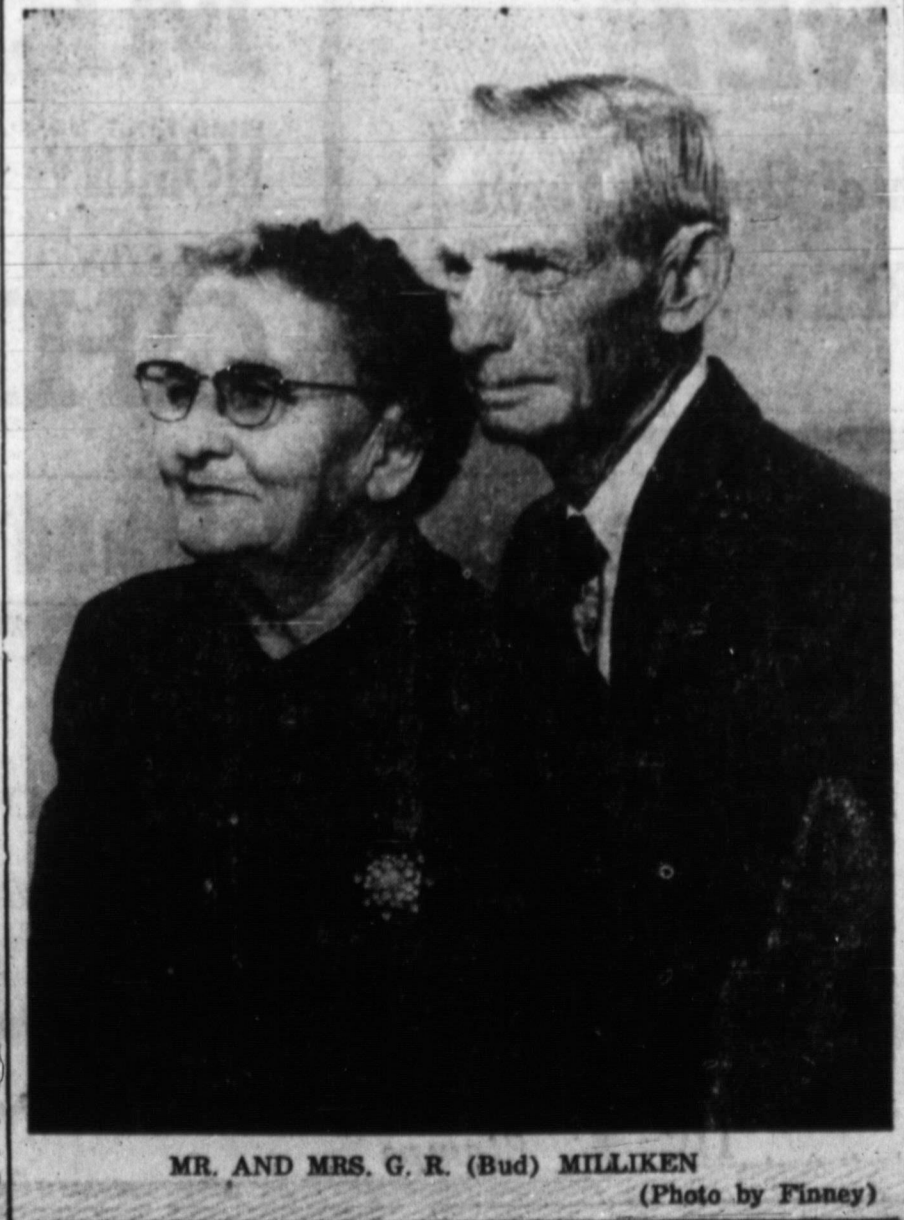
## Seagraves Is Host To Scout Banquet

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### SWPS Planning New Extensions

Southwestern Public Service Company will invest \$18,325,000 in construction and new equipment throughout the company's 45,000 square mile service area in 1960, it has been announced by A. R. Watson, Executive Vice President and General Manager.

At the same time that he announced the 1960 construction investment, Watson revealed that the company's long-range forecast anticipates a \$96,000,000 investment in new facilities in the next five years.

"Our responsibility as a public utility is to stay ahead of the growth of our service area. Every economic index indicates that our service area will continue the phenomenal growth it has shown in recent years. We must plan now to keep ahead of that growth," Watson said.

Southwestern Public Service Company's 12th major generating station will go into service in June. Located north of Amarillo, the new plant will have a generating capability of 112,500 kilowatts when it goes on the line. The second unit, which will double the size of the plant, has already been ordered, and is scheduled to be in service in 1962.

When the second unit at the station north of Amarillo does go into service, Southwestern Public Service Company's generating capability will pass the million mark for the first time. The capability of the 12 major generating stations will be 1,037,000 kilowatts in 1962. The growth of the area, and the company, is dramatically portrayed by a comparison with the system generating capability in 1952, which was 404,500 kilowatts.

"Electric service continues as the biggest bargain in your family budget," Watson pointed out. "The average residential kilowatt-hour cost our customers 3.05 cents in 1959, compared with 3.11c in 1958, and since 1950, the average cost of a residential kilowatt hour has decreased by 23 percent," he added.

23.9 cents of every dollar of gross revenue received by Southwestern Public Service Company went to pay federal, state and local taxes, Watson said.

"We have no quarrel with carrying our fair share of the tax load, but it seems manifestly unfair that some of our taxes, and those of our customers, should be used to finance government power projects which have tax-free profits, and destroy private industry which would add to the tax revenues," Watson concluded.

(Cont'd. From Front Page) which he soon sold to the Shattucks, and in 1907 built the house in southwest Tahoka later known as the J. B. Walker place, then bought the Salt Wells place, and finally the Ellis Payne place, which was one of the old Col. C. C. Slaughter ranch headquarters, which the family still owns and is farmed by Ward Eakin.

Mrs. Milliken attended school at various times at Tahoka, Edith, and Lynn. Professor Norton had been the first Tahoka teacher, but she went to school under J. B. Walker and Miss Minnie Chambers, later known as Mrs. J. W. Elliott. She recalls that the Tahoka school was then just one big room, in a frame building, and Mr. Walker now of Lubbock, taught his class on one side of the room and Miss Minnie, now deceased, taught her kids on the other side of the room. Once she did some special work out at Lynn and boarded with Mrs. Walter May while attending school there.

Bud's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert A. Milliken, originally from Gainesville, Cooke county moved to Rannels county in 1881, and on out to Lynn county in 1907. Mr. Milliken died the following

### Ford Places In Sandhills Show

Lester Ford, Lynn county 4-H club boy showed two fat steers at the Sandhills Show last week in Odessa, one of the outstanding steer shows in the state, according to County Agent Bill Griffin.

In a field of 38, Lester's middle-weight steer, weight 921 pounds, placed eighth and sold for 53 cents per pound.

His lightweight steer, weight 834 pounds, placed 11th in a field of 40 and brought 59 cents per pound.

August, and Mrs. Milliken died Jan. 26, 1913, at Beeville, having gone to South Texas for her health.

The Millikens bought the Kershner place, east of Tahoka Lake, and Bud, who had trained in leather work at Ballinger, was in the wagon yard and saddle shop business at the southwest corner of the square where the Larkin (Hamilton) building is now located. Moving his shop to the Cowan building, he was in the saddle business until 1913, when he sold out and went to the farm.

He farmed for Mr. McGonagill, putting in the north field, later bought and improved the Charley Finch place, and next bought and improved the Roy Poer farm. He broke out the land on both these places, drilled the present water wells, built houses, and planted feed and a little cotton. He accumulated a few head of cattle also.

He quit farming and moved to town in 1922, and has lived here ever since, most of which time he has engaged in the building trades. Many homes in Tahoka were built by Bud Milliken.

From about 1907 to 1911, he worked part time each year on the T-Bar Ranch, usually during roundup as cook.

In 1908, he was on a cattle drive to Plainview, then the nearest railroad point, driving the chuck wagon for the trail crew.

He'll long remember that trip. W. T. Petty, ranch manager, had arranged for cattle cars to be in Plainview when the trail herd got there. But, there were heavy rains, and everything was under water, and cooking was difficult at times.

Mrs. Petty and "Aunt Becky" Roberts went along in a hack and slept in the hack bed. They drove to Olton, where W. P. Soash was just starting a town and had set up tents preparatory to starting building, then drove east to Plainview. However, the cars had

not arrived, and Mr. Petty and the ladies returned home. Under wagon boss Tom Preston, they grazed the cattle back toward Runningwater and Olton and marked time for about two weeks until the cattle cars arrived in Plainview. The railroad crews were then laying the rails from Plainview to Lubbock.

The Millikens have raised a family of eight girls and one boy.

## Denton Candidate For Court Post

Lubbock—Judge James G. Denton today announced candidacy for his first elective term as Chief Justice, Court of Civil Appeals Seventh Supreme Judicial District. Judge Denton was appointed to the office last October following the death of Chief Justice E. L. Pitts.

He will run in the May 7th primaries as a candidate for the Democratic Party's nomination for the office.

Denton was judge of the 99th Judicial District (Lubbock County) at the time of his appointment to the Court of Civil Appeals. He served as District Judge for six and one-half years. Before that he served nearly two years as judge of the Lubbock County Court of Law. He has also served on the Executive Committee of the State Judicial Conference.

Chief Justice Denton was born in Bonham in 1917. Following graduation from high school there, he entered Texas Technological College and graduated with a BA degree in Government in 1938. He then entered the University of Texas law school. In 1941 he was licensed to practice law. He enlisted in the U. S. Navy shortly after Pearl Harbor. For more than four years he served aboard minesweepers in both the Atlantic and Pacific. Early in 1946 he received his honorable discharge and began practicing law in Lubbock. In 1950 he was chosen the first judge of the Lubbock County Court.

While living in Lubbock, he was active in the First Baptist Church, Kiwanis Club, and Boy Scouts. He is now a member of the Executive Committee of the South Plains Council of Boy Scouts. He is also the present lieutenant governor of the Texas-Oklahoma District of Kiwanis International. He has been president of Lubbock Kiwanis Club. He and his wife have two boys and two girls, ages 14, 12, 9 and 7.

A terrace system has been completed for R. W. Fenton who farms three miles west of Tahoka. 27,801 feet of level ridge type terraces were installed with ends closed.

Glen Norman, who farms one mile north of Grassland, has completed construction of approximately 32,060 feet of level closed end terraces.

A Great Plains Conservation Plan is being developed on H. A. Smith's farm, located five miles northeast of Tahoka. The complete conservation plan developed by Smith includes approximately 200 acres of cropland planted to grass, 15 miles of terracing, proper residue use, and a conservation cropping system based on the needs of the land. Costs for installation of these practices will be partially shared by the ASC and the Great Plains Conservation Program.

On April 18, 1960, a new 4-cent Conservation postage stamp will call attention to the urgency of water conservation in this country. A total of 120 million of the new stamps will be printed and formally released at the Seventh National Watershed Congress in Washington, D. C.
