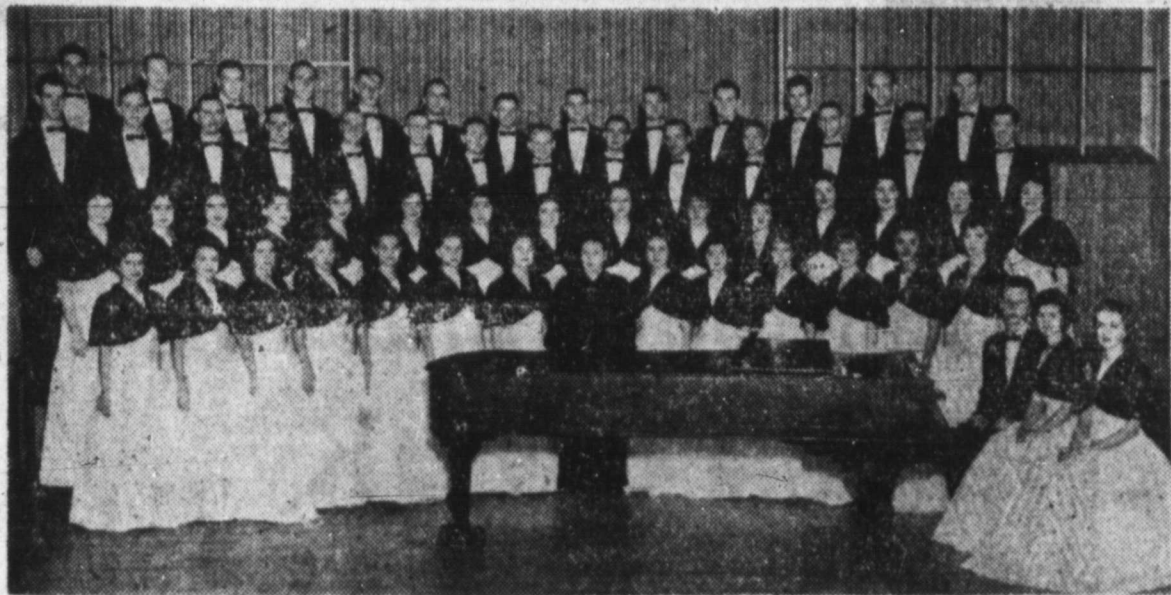

Baylor U. Choir Coming Sunday

The Rhapsody in White and the Baylor Bards, choral ensemble of Baylor University, Waco, will appear in Tahoka under the auspices of First Baptist Church Sunday, Feb. 7, at 10:55 a. m., according to Rev. T. James Eford, pastor.

These touring units were organized in 1937 by their present conductor, Miss Martha Barkema, professor of voice and director of glee clubs in the Baylor University School of Music.

The personnel of the ensemble includes students from 15 states. They have presented programs in all parts of the Eastern, Midwestern, Southern United States, and Mexico. There are about 50 singers in the touring group, representing students from all departments of the university.

Their repertoire includes sacred works from the master pieces, classic and modern, especially arranged for them. This group has also been very popular on radio and television throughout the Southwest.

Also appearing with the group will be Niklos Benzec who arrived in the United States in May, 1957, as a refugee of the Hungarian Revolution in 1956, with his wife. In September, 1958, he joined the music faculty of Baylor University and is at present professor of voice and artist in residence.

These young people bring a refreshing and altogether entertaining program. The public is cordially invited to attend.

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16 Are Indicted By Grand Jury

Sixteen indictments were returned Monday by the Lynn county grand jury, the largest number in many years, according to District Clerk W. S. (Skip) Taylor.

The indictments were returned against the following people, all in custody here or elsewhere:

Robert David Sarson, two counts, charged with burglary of H. M. Hart-Jr. residence near Wilson on about January 21.

Don Ray Willis, same offense, two counts.

James Barbee, two counts; one theft of property of value over \$50, about February, 1959, from Fred McGinty, batteries, generator and wrenches; and theft in March, 1959 of welding helmet, arc welding leads, cutting torch, etc., from Jack P. Robinson.

David L. Flowers, two counts, same offenses.

Gregory Hernandez, Guadalupe Pina, and John Henry Pina, two counts each, on charges of burglarizing home of Vernon Green near Wilson on about Jan. 14.

Guadalupe P. Guillen, Daniel Palmeres, and Bartolo V. Gonzales, each charged with burglary of the W. J. Shook office in O'Donnell on about January 8.

Mary C. Perez, charged with defrauding by worthless check in the sum of \$129.48 on about Dec. 11, 1959.

Joe Ortega, charged with forgery by two checks for \$41.20 and for \$26.20.

Ray Flores and Alex Castillo, each charged with burglary of the C. C. Donaldson office on about Dec. 21, 1959.

3,058 Poll Taxes Paid In County

Poll tax payments total 3,058, a record for recent years and possibly a record for all time, states J. E. (Red) Brown, tax assessor and collector.

Thus, from 4,200 to 4,700 Lynn county people will be eligible to vote this year, as the estimated over-age exemptions total 1,200 to 1,500.

In recent presidential election years, as a comparison with payments this year, 2,992 poll tax receipts were issued in 1956, and 2,606 were issued in 1952.

The 3,058 total includes 75 exemptions, those young voters becoming 21 years of age, but does not include over-age voters, who are not required to secure exemption certificates in Lynn county.

Salvation Army Drive Feb. 15-19

The Salvation Army drive for Tahoka and surrounding communities will be held during the week of February 15-19 with Rev. J. B. Thompson serving as drive chairman for the annual campaign.

Exact date of the kick-off will be announced next week, when local workers will contact citizens of the various county communities. This will be the only time during 1960 when citizens will be given the opportunity to contribute to the organization, and since less than \$15.00 is the balance of funds in the Tahoka area, everyone is urged to give generously.

During the past year, a total of \$644.80 has been spent in the Tahoka, Grassland, Wilson and New Home communities, according to Mrs. Florene McCracken, treasurer.

Telephone Co-op Buys Building

The REA in Washington, D. C. has given approval for the purchase by Poka-Lambro Rural Telephone Cooperative of the former Buick agency building on Main Street from Calloway Huffaker for \$30,000, according to announcement of W. D. Harmon, manager.

The building is one of the finest in town, is 65 by 123 feet in size, and has a large parking lot adjacent to the building.

Plans are being drawn by a firm of architects for remodeling the structure for use by Poka-Lambro headquarters.

The front will be remodeled with face brick and porcelain paneling, and the interior front will be cut up into offices to fit the need of the telephone cooperative. Plans call for paving of the parking lot, and enclosure of the rear of this lot for storage of heavy equipment, this area being 55 by 125 feet.

However, Mr. Harmon says REA funds are not available immediately for the work, and the remodeling will not start until an REA appropriation is forthcoming, which will possibly be several months.

Headquarters are now located in the Wharton building, where Poka-Lambro pays rent.

The telephone cooperative has been growing gradually in number of customers, and now 1880 rural telephones in Lynn, Garza, Borden, Dawson, Martin, Gaines, Terry, and Yoakum counties.

The new Loop exchange area in northeastern Gaines county is almost complete, and about 150 new customers will be cut-over to the telephone system in two or three weeks this exchange serves the Loop, Sawyer Flat and Ashmore areas.

In Terry county, approval has been received for the Union and Foster area of south Terry county, and 100 or more new members are now being signed for this extension.

County Exceeds Quota Of Bonds

Sales of U. S. Savings Bonds during December in Lynn county amounted to \$18,006, bringing the 1959 total sales for the county to \$319,628, according to A. C. Vermer, chairman of the county's Bond committee.

This was 123.4 percent of the goal of \$250,000, and made Lynn one of the leading counties in the state of Texas in bond sales.

Crosby county, however, led Lubbock district with 144.4 percent of its quota; Garza was second with 125.2 percent, and Lynn followed Garza.

He had just recently returned from a visit in California. Funeral services will be Saturday, but exact arrangements had not been made Thursday at noon.

Tony Leonard McGlaun was born February 20, 1895, at Thornton, Navarro county. He was married to Miss Virgie Stone in Corsicana, and the couple moved to Lynn county in 1925. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. H. C. Bradshaw Jr. of Irvington, Calif.; four sons, T. L. Bill, and Buford McGlaun, all of Tahoka, and Bobby McGlaun of Aransas, N. M.; a sister, Mrs. Lockie Rodgers of Houston; and 11 grandchildren.

Taylor Knight To Meet Governor

Taylor Knight, 14, Tahoka Eagle Scout, has been selected to represent the Quannah Parler District South Plains Area Council of the Boy Scouts of America, at the annual "Report to the Governor" ceremonies in Austin on Saturday, February 13.

Taylor is one of seven Scouts from the seven districts comprising the South Plains Area Council chosen for the honor. The others are from Halfway, Jayton, Levelland, and three from Lubbock.

Governor Price Daniel will be the principal speaker at the noon luncheon Saturday after the Scout Parade in downtown Austin and the "Report on Scouting." Every Scout Council in Texas will have an official delegation. At the time a special "Golden Anniversary" celebration will be held in Washington, D. C., when the "Report to the Nation" will be made to President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

This is one of the activities of Boy Scout Week, Feb. 7-13 in observance of the 50th anniversary of Scouting in America.

Taylor, who will be 15 on March 6, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Roy Knight, and was born and reared in Tahoka. He is a member of Troop 21, of which Allyn Cox is the scoutmaster. Taylor has risen from Tenderfoot to the high rank of Eagle Scout since entering the program at age 12.

He is a freshman in Tahoka High and participates in all athletics. He has played Little League and Pony League baseball, and horseback riding is also one of his hobbies.

City Paving Bond Election Saturday

Citizens of the City of Tahoka will vote this Saturday on a proposed bond issue of \$50,000 for street paving.

The election has been called by the Tahoka City Council because of increasing demands from citizens wanting their streets paved. If voters approve the bonds, every one, on any street, will be given an opportunity for paving in complete blocks that will connect up with existing paving.

If the bonds carry, the City proposes to pay about ten percent of the cost of the street paving, which will include the curbs and gutters and street and alley intersections. Estimated cost of 36-foot paved streets will be \$3.75 per front foot to property owners. The City also proposes to repave some of the old paving.

Requests for paving have come from parts of North Sixth, North Seventh, parts of the Roberts Addition, and also from South Tahoka. A street would probably be paved to the City Park, and also encouragement will be given to pave other streets in South Tahoka, in keeping with a new policy of the City to encourage more home building in South Tahoka.

The City, to secure FHA approval, will be required to pave two blocks north on Sanders street to connect up existing paving with the new Lockwood Addition, and the 20 to 30 acres of land optioned to the City from the Fred Hegi farm and recently taken over by West Texas Builders of Lubbock.

No money will be spent by the City on paving in the new addition, as this paving will be done on North Eighth and Ninth streets by the development firm.

If paving bonds are voted, valuations will have to be raised slightly to take care of a 20-year bond issue, or slightly more for a 10-year issue. There has been no general raise in valuations in about 25 years. Members of the Council state a slight raise soon seems almost imperative, whether bonds are voted or not, due to increasing costs of the City government.

Paving of streets in Tahoka would raise valuations of the city, and promote more home building, as well as aiding beautification.

Since many of the boys wish to carry their animals on to the area show at Lubbock, no sale is held following the Lynn county show. However, local merchants make up a bonus fund, from which every boy showing an animal in the Lynn county show gets a bonus in addition to any prize money he may win.

The bonus fund will be raised next week by the following Tahoka businessmen: A. M. Bray, W. C. Wharton, H. W. Carter, Granvel Ayer, Alton Cain, Ronald Sherrill, Dale Thuren, Mel Leslie and Wilton Payne.

The prize fund and other expenses are paid by Tahoka Chamber of Commerce and Tahoka Rotary Club.

O'Donnell Community Show will be held February 19 and 20, and the judge is B. F. Yeatts of Plainview.

Wilson-New Home show will be held at New Home February 26 and 27, and Paul Gross of Seminole will be the judge.

O'Donnell boys also expect to show in the Dawson-Borden show at Lamesa February 25, 26, and 27.

A number of boys are carrying animals to the El Paso show next week, February 7 to 13.

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Printer's Ink-lings . . .

Quite a stir was created in the ranks of the Democratic party when Senator Ralph Yarborough slapped in the face his fellow-Tex-

an and fellow-senator, Lyndon B. Johnson, with his vote, along with 11 other left-wing Democrats, on the Gore resolution aimed at curbing the power of Johnson as Democratic majority leader of the Senate . . . and the following statement by Representative Sam Rayburn, also of Texas, the power over in the House, castigating Yarborough for his action.

But, strange things happen in politics, especially in this day and time when most of our lawmakers seem to be playing every card to gain more and more political power and prestige.

We remember that Mr. Sam used his influence for Yarborough in several of the latter's campaigns in Texas, and even came out for Yarborough, although at the last minute, in his successful campaign for Senator. At that time, Johnson said nothing for or against Yarborough, as is the usual practice of one politician in regard to the campaign of another.

However, it now seems that Yarborough has resented all this time the fact that Johnson made no public statement in his favor when Yarborough needed all the help he could get to be elected senator. Therefore, it may have been revenge that prompted him

to vote to curb Johnson's power at a time when almost everyone in this section was pulling for Johnson to build up sufficient prestige and gain enough support to become a top contender for the presidential nomination.

Actually, we believe Yarborough is prompted by other reasons in opposing Johnson. Yarborough has aligned himself with the ADA's of the Hubert Humphreys and "Soapy" Williams stripe, the Labor bosses who gave him financial support to gain election, and other extreme left-wingers in the party.

Even Senator Johnson is courting the favor of the liberals by promising passage of a civil rights bill, which most Southerners oppose, liberalization of labor control laws, banning the poll tax laws, advocating federal aid to education, and doing little or nothing to halt spiraling inflation.

For that matter, V. P. Richard Nixon, sure of the Republican nomination, is just far to the left—or further—than Johnson.

If you are a conservative, or a middle-of-the-roader, you won't have much choice, come presidential election day. Every candidate on the horizon promises to carry us further down the road to socialism, more deficit spending, higher taxes, less individual freedom, fewer states rights, more centralized government. Maybe we ought to just turn over the government to Hubert, "Soapy," Ralph and Earl Warren and go all the way.

Now, to something a little more pleasant.

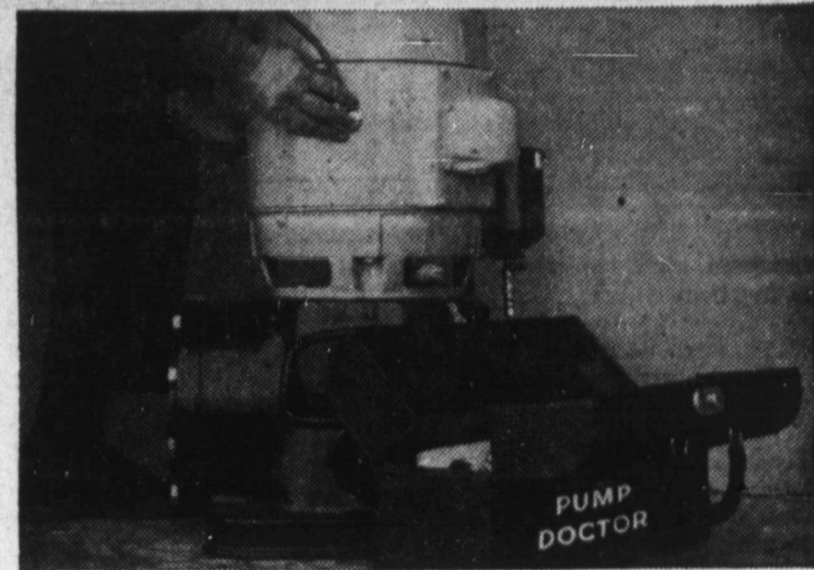

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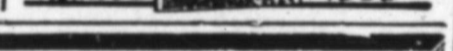

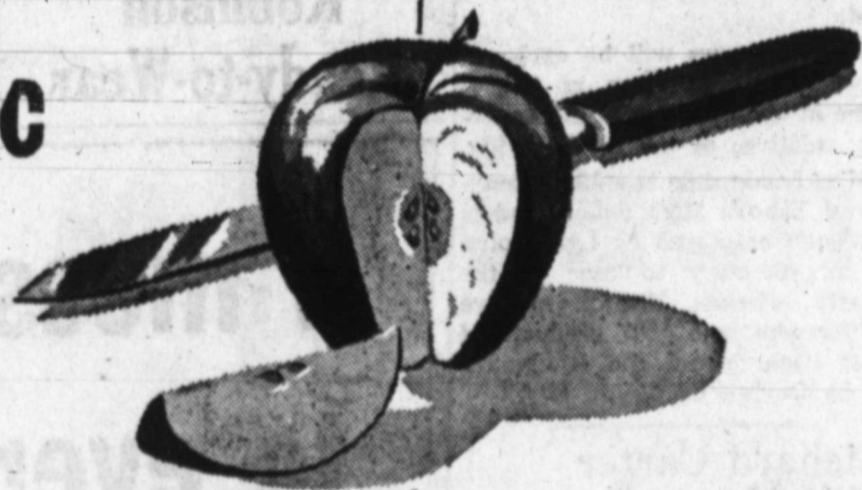

McCord Tells Of Polio Foundation

H. B. McCord Jr. told of the local work being done by The National Foundation, the "March of Dimes", at the noon meeting of Tahoka Rotary Club last Thursday.

He said 25 cents of every dollar raised in the annual fund campaign remains in the county, 25 cents goes for research, and 50 cents goes for patients care. In fact, 91 percent of the total actually goes to patients and research, with only 9 percent remaining for administration and miscellaneous expenses.

However, a local community can secure any amount needed, as has Lynn county, for patient care. This county has been receiving more some years than it has raised in the fund drive.

He cited some examples of local children who had received help who may otherwise have not been able to receive treatment.

Although polio is being decreased rapidly in young children as a result of the Salk polio vaccine shots, there are still many patients suffering with the effects of polio and these still need treatment, he said. The number of polio patients under 15 years of age are decreasing, he declared, but the number over 15 is increasing, the latter because many grown people do not feel they need to take the shots.

As a result of the decrease in young patients because of the Salk vaccine discovery, made possible by the March of Dimes, the National Foundation has added to its scope of work birth defects and arthritis.

McCord then showed a film, "The Challenge" depicting the effects of birth defects and arthritis and the work being done in research, treatment, and correction.

The program was arranged by Happy Smith and C. W. Conway.

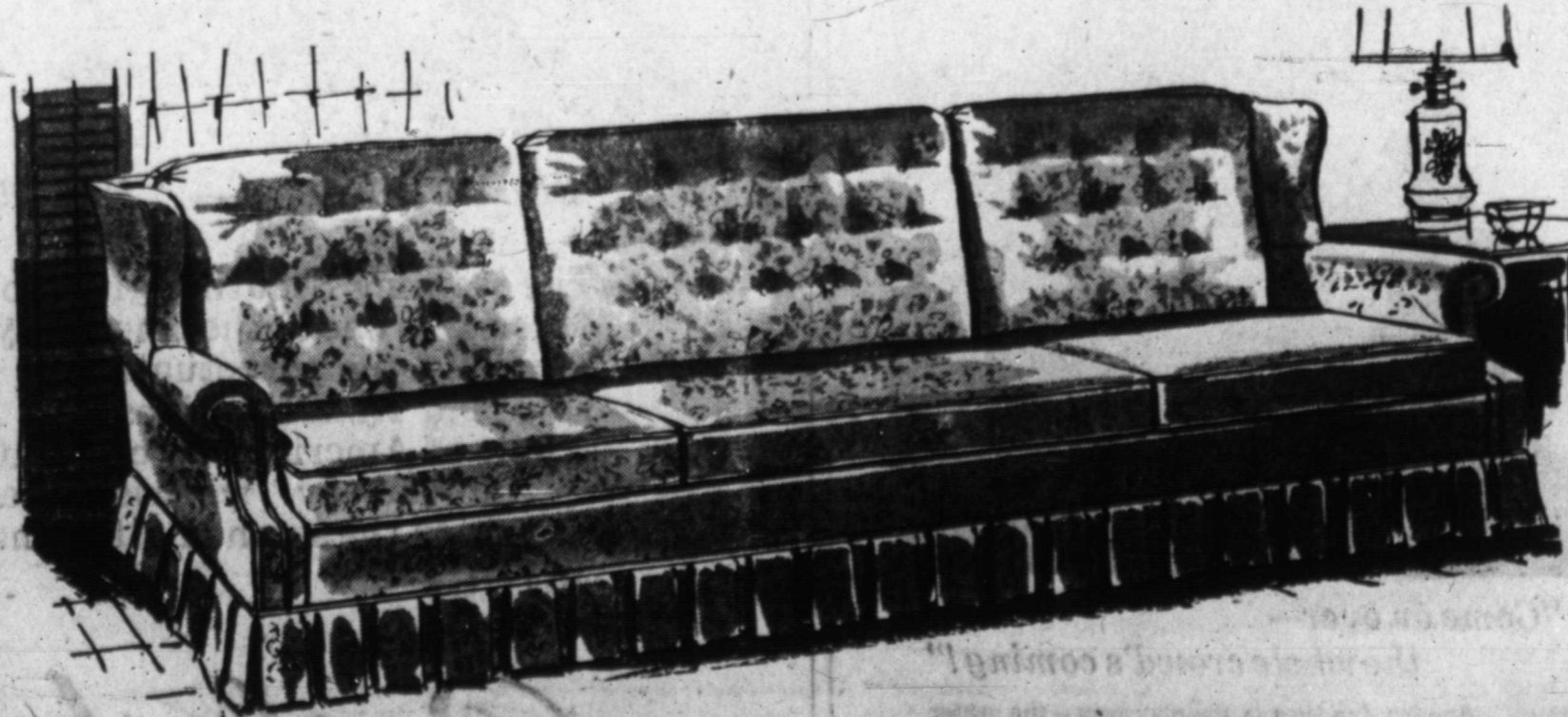
