Chamber Honors Farmers Thursday

Jack Jaquess, local implement dealer, was elected president of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce for the coming year, at a breakfast meeting of the board of directors Tuesday morning at the Stockman Cafe.

Herman Renfro, out-going president, will automatically become the vice president, succeeding Dean Taylor. Otis Spears is part-time secretary.

Jaquess will be installed as head of the organization at the Annual Farmer-Businessman banquet here on Friday, March 4. New members of the board of directors will be recognized, as well as the out-going directors.

New directors include Wilton Payne, Clint Walker, E. R. Edwards, H. B. McCord, Jr., Harold Green, Ray Adams, Jack Jaquess, and C. W. Roberts. Holdover directors are Wynne Collier, A. M. Bray, Dean Taylor, Frank Hill, John Reasonover, Mitchell Williams, Martin White, and A. C. Verner.

Jack Lacy, manager of Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, will be the speaker for the event when farmers, their wives, and wives of the members of the Chamber will be guests for the annual event to be held in the school cafeteria at 7:30 p. m.

Only 275 tickets will be sold at \$1.75 per person. At the Tuesday morning meeting the board also voted to support any person or group wishing to install a bowling establishment in Tahoka.

Rating Is High In Aptitude Tests

Thirteen Tahoka High School students have received results of the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test given here in October, 1959, and an additional 10 students have recently taken the tests, according to High School Principal Clifton Gardner.

Making the highest grade locally in both the verbal and mathematics test was Terry Spears, a senior student, who Gardner said was in the top category. Only about five percent of students who take the examination fall in the top category.

The other 12 students all scored far above average giving evidence of the good work being done in the local schools. These include Bill Smith, Danny Uzzle, Larry Forsythe, Paul Ford, Gerald Huffaker, Leighton Roddy, Gerald Short, Carol Smith, George Adams, Joe Phil Inman, all senior students, and Geanne Gandy and Martha Bell, junior students.

The Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test, which is taken voluntarily by students, replaces the College Board's annual Scholarship Qualifying Test. The PSAT is a National yardstick that gives a measure of ability independent of the school's own grading standards, Gardner said. The PSAT scores can be related to certain standards for academic success at over 250 colleges and universities that are members of the College Entrance Examination Board, as well as many other colleges.

Gardner continued that the PSAT is constructed exactly along the lines of the regular test which has been required for admission by an increasing number of colleges and universities. Acting upon this information, the College Board has introduced the PSAT to encourage earlier and better informed college guidance to the students.

Students who rank in the top half of their classes may thus generally be considered capable of college studies. A student who scores about 35 or above on the PSAT and is doing well in school should be considering college, according to the College Entrance Examination Board.

Sweet Street Revival Will Start Sunday

Six Accidents In County This Year

The Highway Patrol Service of the Texas Department of Public Safety investigated 6 rural traffic accidents in Lynn County during the month of January according to Sergeant E. L. Stroud.

In making this announcement the Sergeant reported 5 property damage, 1 injury and no fatal accidents. These wrecks caused a total property damage of \$3,390.00 with 3 persons injured and none killed.

The Highway Patrol Supervisor pointed out that the motoring public has begun the new year with an improved traffic record. "You can help keep it that way in this county by doing two things," he added. "Know and obey traffic laws yourself and insist that your neighbors do likewise."

"The knowledge and observance of traffic laws on the part of the highway users is the best antidote we know for preventing traffic accidents," he concluded.

Miss Vasquez attended school here until withdrawing during the fall semester.

Career Conference To Be Next Week

The third annual career conference of Tahoka High School is scheduled for Wednesday, March 2, and will be held at the high school auditorium.

Tahoka students from the eighth through twelfth grades and junior and senior students from New Home, Wilson and O'Donnell will participate in the conference.

Purpose of the conference is to instigate the students to begin to think and prepare now for their future careers, to help them choose those to which they are best suited, and to help them discover whether or not they are interested in vocations they now have in mind. By conducting such a conference, many students discover what they want to do upon their graduation from high school, have more ideas of what they want to make their careers in life, and what subjects they should take in high school and college to qualify themselves for a certain vocation.

The event of the day will get under way with a general assembly in the auditorium. Delivering the main address of the conference will be Charles B. Jones, lawyer from Lubbock. Introductions of other guest speakers will be made by members of the National Honor Society, the sponsoring organization of the conference.

Immediately following the general assembly, the students will adjourn to sectional meetings where discussion will be conducted on several different vocations. Counsellors for the different sectional meetings have been secured by the NHS and its sponsors, Mrs. F. B. Hegi and Floyd Tubb, and they feel that they have selected some very noted people who can assist young people with their problems of the future.

Separate conferences will be conducted for interior decorating, engineering, commercial art, medicine, office work, motor transportation, nursing, beautician work, coaching and teaching Civic service, journalism, religious education, communications and law.

Salvation Army Drive Below Normal

The annual Salvation Army drive is nearly complete here and Mrs. Florene McCracken, treasurer, reports that only \$1104.40 has been turned into her from workers in Tahoka.

A bonus has been made up from local merchants and will be presented each boy participating in the show. This will be in addition to any prize money he might win, the latter of which is being offered by the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce and Tahoka Rotary Club.

Members of the county 4-H Clubs add FFA will enter the junior livestock show held here. O'Donnell boys this week end are showing animals in the Dawson-Borden show at Lamesa, following their own event last Saturday.

Post Youth Injured In Near Fatal Mishap

Eddie Gandy, 7-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Gandy of near Post, was seriously injured Sunday, Feb. 14, while playing in a tractor shed at his home. He is a nephew of E. W. Roe of Tahoka.

The youngster was playing on a tractor and had a rope tied to his neck when he fell from the machine, almost hanging himself and receiving a severe blow on his head. When found by his parents he was unconscious and Tuesday of this week he had not regained consciousness.

He was taken to the hospital in Post where he received treatment, was later transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, and was returned to Post Tuesday.

FHA Approval On New City Addition

F. H. A. Subdivision approval has been received by the City of Tahoka and West Texas Builders for the new Lockwood Addition in northwest Tahoka with certain requirements attached, according to Mayor H. B. McCord, Sr.

Approval has been made with the understanding that street locations and street elevators be completed, and both the City and WTB are now working on this portion of the agreement.

As soon as these requirements are completed, plans and specifications for the first 29 homes to be built here will go into F. H. A. McCord said that this should be in the very near future.

West Texas Builders has already secured contractors and engineers for paving North Eighth and Ninth Streets, which comprise the Lockwood Addition. The company will erect three model homes and an additional two homes which have already been sold and have set April 1 as the deadline for completion of construction of these five homes, if not before.

Auto Club May Be Formed Here Tonight

A meeting is to be held tonight, Friday, at 7:00 p. m. in the City-Legion Building at which time plans for organizing an auto club will be presented before the public.

Help keep Tahoka clean

Lynn county shivered under a coat of ice and snow accompanied by eight below zero temperature reading here Thursday morning, the coldest minimum in about 13 years.

Snow began falling here early Wednesday morning and continued until about mid-afternoon, leaving an approximate five inches on the ground. Drifts in some parts of town were up to two and three feet deep. However, a freak of nature forbade an exact measurement of moisture content. The U. S. Weather gauge kept by The News is a long metal pipe about two feet long and three inches in diameter, topped by a large metal funnel.

When moisture began falling, it formed a thick sheet of ice over the mouth of the funnel, thus prohibiting any snow from falling into the gauge. The condition was not discovered until "measuring time" late Wednesday afternoon.

Lubbock reported a fall of seven inches of snow, but citizens report that Tahoka did not receive as much as the neighboring city. Nevertheless, the snow here added to the best winter season this county has known in many, many years and farmers are excited over the prospects of a very good crop year ahead.

Tahoka schools were closed Wednesday because of hazardous road conditions, extreme cold, but resumed again Thursday morning.

The Weather Bureau was predicting a possible storm to hit here as the News went to press Thursday night continuing into Friday. If the storm develops it is expected to top all others this year.

Coldest temperature readings on the South Plains was in January, 1947 when the mercury fell to nine degrees below zero. Other comparative temperatures in Tahoka the past six years include a two above zero on November 24, 1955 and again on Jan. 4, 1959. On Dec. 29, 1954 the reading stood at seven degrees above zero in Tahoka and on Nov. 23, 1957, eight degrees above zero.

Thursday morning's eight below zero is probably one of the coldest in this area. Wednesday morning's low was 12 degrees above zero.

The frigid temperatures of Wednesday and Thursday, however, were not as bone chilling as was Tuesday, when the temperature stood around 20 above, but was accompanied by a penetrating heavy wind as the cold front moved into the area.

Only one accident was reported in Lynn county as a result of glazed roads, and that in Tahoka on Wednesday morning. And Tahoka Hospital reported that no one had been treated for fractures there because of weather conditions.

Record Of Boys And Girls Loop Teams Are Compiled By Coaches

The Tahoka Bulldogs finished their season with a record of nine wins and 16 losses, coming in fourth in District 3AA. Conference record consisted of two wins and six losses.

In the 25 games played this season, the Bulldogs scored a total of 1,061 points while their opponents were making 1,214. Many of the games lost were by scant margins, sometimes only one to four points.

Coach Jake Jacobs' Bulldogs racked up 63 points against Frenship for their highest scoring of the year, and slumped to 30 points against powerful McAdoo for their lowest scoring game. Opponents scoring highest against Tahoka was Slaton with 74, while Wilson made the lowest tabulation with 18.

Individual total scores for the year included Frank Greathouse, 325; Gerald Huffaker, 191; Paul Ford 143; George Adams 141; Larry Spruiell 95; Gerald Short 77; Fred Hegi 29; Perry Flippin, 19; Larry Forsythe, 13; Doug McClellan, 8; Craig Leslie, 8; David Copeland, 2; Andy Bray, 2; and Billy Clinton, 1.

Spring training is now in progress and will end next Tuesday. Going through the paces preparing for next year's session are three juniors, four sophomores, and seven freshmen. Also in spring training are the eighth graders under Coach Moe Hodges. These boys will help make up the varsity squad next year.

Only one starter, Frank Greathouse, will be back from this year's squad so the field will be open for positions on the 1960-'61 team.

The "B" team and freshman team showed great progress under Coach Hodges and much is expected from them in the future, along with some good prospects up from the seventh and eighth grades.

Girls' Record
Coach J. D. Atwell's girls basketball team finished fourth in District 3AA competition compiling a record of conference games of two victories and six defeats. The girls won six games while losing 16 during the entire season.

The varsity girls totaled 852 points during the year while opponents were making 937 points. Like the boys team, the girls were plagued frequently by their competition coming out with only a few points ahead when the final whistle blew.

Coach Atwell is looking forward to a more experienced team next year as he loses only two girls from his squad, through graduation, Rebecca McCuiston and Sunny Gibson.

Kay Halamiciek made a total of 320 points during the year; Judy Thomas, 233; Loretta Short, 121; Jerry Wyatt, 86; Melissa Reece, 52; and Brooksie Reece, 40. Guards on the varsity squad included Sunny Gibson, Martha Curry, Nedra Roberts, Rebecca McCuiston, Paula Wood and Dianne Falls.

Girls are now playing volleyball and are entered in the volleyball tournament at Lamesa March 3-4-5.

Heart Consultant World Neighbors Is Rotary Speaker Program Offered

Robert Moore of Montana, heart association consultant of the American Heart Association was the speaker at the Tahoka Rotary Club Thursday noon of last week when he said that the only objective of the organization is the conquest of America's number one disease.

He was introduced to the group by Mrs. Loreta Cartwright of Lubbock, executive secretary of the district association comprised of 17 counties. She was introduced by Ronald Sherrill, who arranged the program.

Martin White, who has served the Rotary Club as a director, has resigned and is being succeeded by Roy Edwards. New officers for the coming year will be elected on the first Thursday in March.

Several members are expected to attend the District 573 Conference to be held in Plainview March 31, April 1 and 2. Otis Spears is chairman of the attendance committee of the local group for the conference.

In his talk to the Rotary group, Moore stated that there were 894,000 deaths from heart disease in 1958. Fifty four percent of all deaths in that year were from heart disease, 30 percent of which were people under 65 years of age.

The 20 forms of the disease affects 10 million Americans of which one-half million are school children. This tremendous attack on the American public not only affects the physical health of the nation, but has caused the loss of at least one billion dollars to industries through loss of man power. One out of two people now liv-

ing can expect to die of heart disease, while one out of 16 has some type of the disease at this time.

However, there are many hopeful aspects to the situation. The American Heart Association was set up in 1924 and reorganized in 1948 into a voluntary health agency to carry on its program in three ways:

1. Fifty percent of the funds of the association goes to research where a war is constantly being waged to find a better method of controlling or curing the disease. Of all the deaths from heart disease, 95 percent are caused from hardening of the arteries, rheumatic fever, and high blood pressure. The latter can now be controlled with new medicines developed through research. More progress has been made in the study of the heart in the last 20 years than was made in the previous 2,000 years, Moore stated.

2. The program extends into education of both the medical profession and to the general public, where fear is being replaced with facts.

3. The American Heart Association

Available to civic groups, church groups, women's clubs, youth groups, etc. is a film entitled "Wake Up or Blow Up" with a speaker, free of charge, in connection with World Neighbors, Inc., a self-help organization dedicated to stop the growth of Communism.

The film, along with a speaker, may be obtained by contacting Phil Jamson at 2402 40th Street in Lubbock, Phone Sherwood 4-2925. The 26 minute black and white film is narrated by Frank C. Laubach, world famous literacy specialist, who is an honorary president of World Neighbors, and by Dr. John L. Peters, who is president of the organization, and tells of the effectiveness of self-help and education programs through voluntary services in stopping Communism in its tracks.

Dr. Peters, a combat Chaplain who served in the Philippines and Korea, will speak at St. Luke's Methodist Church in Lubbock on April 29 at 7:30 p. m. and is also being approached for an appearance in Levelland while in this area. Although he will not be available to every town of the

area, Mr. Samson stated that there are many fine speakers in Lubbock who gladly give their time for such programs.

The five characteristics of World Neighbors, Inc. are that people are of primary importance, nothing is given away, it emphasizes the "each one teach one" method instigated by Frank Laubach, it cooperates with other agencies, and is completely nongovernmental and non-sectarian.

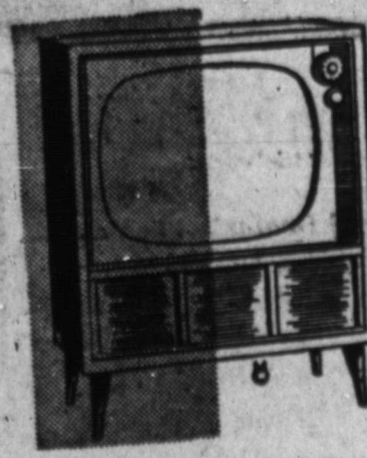

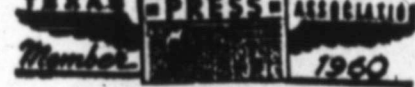

The Printer back in the 'teens was a "printer's devil" on The Roscoe Times, down on the T&P. The paper was hand-set—each letter, space, and punctuation mark put into a "stick" by hand one at a time. It was painstaking work, slow and tedious, but a good hand-spiker could set three galleys (column) or more a day, whereas most Linotype operators can set that much in an hour and a half. One day, we pied (spilled) a form—two pages of the paper—in the floor. Just then, in walked a tramp printer and helped us sort the thousands of pieces of type. Always, it seemed, such help would show up when you needed it the most.

The tramp printer, usually, was a well educated man—although usually self-educated. He had just got to roaming, got an "itchy foot," and could stay in no one place for long. He brought the news of what other papers were doing from coast to coast, taught us many little tricks of the trade, told us tales of the outside world that made our eyes bug out. Some were drunkards, some were dope-heads, but all were well-read and some were students of literature or the Bible. All were interesting fellows, although they lived a rough life riding the rods or "blinds," sleeping in box cars, mooching a meal here and there or cooking in a tomato can over a fire built in the railroad yards.

One of the most colorful was Weary Willie Waterhouse of Wala Wala, Washington, who called on us a number of times after we came to Tahoka. Another was "Peg Leg" Dawson, another we knew as "Sneezy" another as "Speedy," and still another as Mr. Snelser. The

latter finally settled down and worked for us when The Printer was associated with The Nolan County News at Sweetwater for a year in 1925.

This rambling may not interest our readers, but the death of "Ohio" just put us in a reminiscent mood.

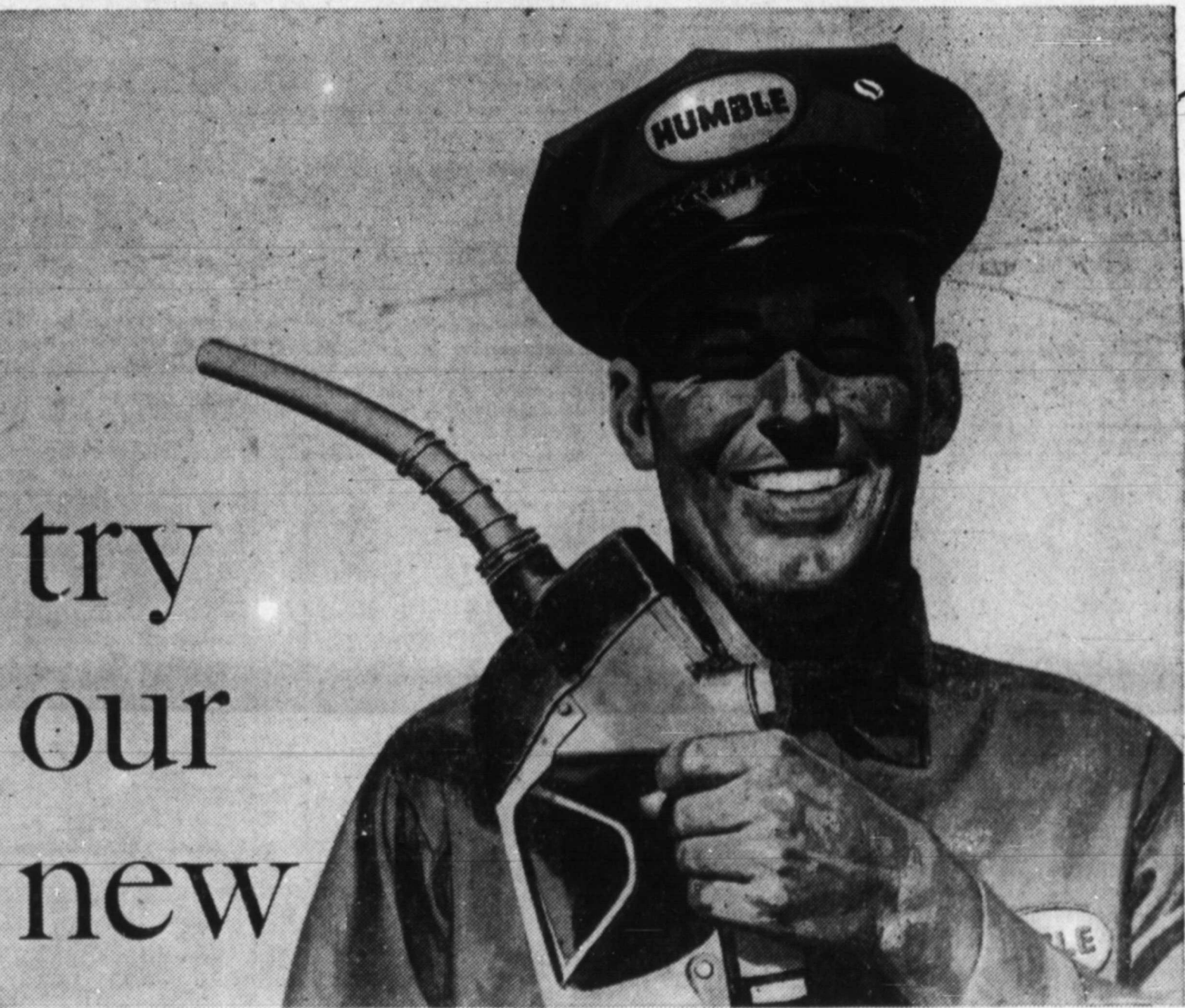

A conservation irrigation system is being developed on Theo Campbell's farm, located eight miles north of Tahoka. Campbell plans to install borders on both the irrigated and dryland portions of his farm. Borders will be installed, and leveling between borders will be done over a period of years by use of tillage implements to move soil from the top to the bottom side of the border.

people get lost in thought is that it is unfamiliar territory to them.

C. Wilke, who farms the Krause farm, located three miles northwest of Tahoka, is installing approximately 700 feet of bermigation pipe to be used to conserve water and soil. Cost share payment will be made through the A. C. P. program.

An irrigation system has been laid out for W. Pierce six miles east of Draw. Pierce will change the direction, and shorten runs for more efficient use of irrigation water.

Two waterways, and a terrace system has been laid out for Robert and Vernon Lust, who farm two miles west of Grassland. A conservation irrigation system consisting of level borders will be installed on the irrigated portion of their farm.

Lockwood and wife, Ione Lockwood, and that none of said streets herein named have ever been open for public use, and that same has been used and cultivated as acreage since its dedication in 1916.

3. That all of the blocks described in Paragraph One above and all of the streets and portions thereof, as described in Paragraph Three above, and the portion of the map and plat showing the same should be canceled and returned to acreage, so to throw the said lands back into acreage tracts, as it existed before such subdivision was made.

4. Petitioner represents that the cancellation and return to acreage applied for will not interfere with the established rights of any purchaser owning any portion of said subdivision and will be of great benefit of the Petitioner and will work no hardship upon anyone, and will greatly lessen confusion, labor, cost and expenses in the assessment and collection of taxes, and will promote the prompt payment of legal taxes on said property.

WHEREFORE Petitioner prays the Court that notice of this petition be given as required by Article 7227, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, and after such notice shall have been published as the law requires, that the Court hear and act upon this petition at the next regular term thereof after such publication, and that upon such hearing the Court shall make and enter its order cancelling so much of said subdivision known as the Lockwood Addition to the Original Town of Tahoka, Texas, as covers and includes the above described property now belonging to your Petitioner, and the streets and portions thereof, as above described, and authorizing the owner of said land, by written instrument such as is required by law, to cancel said subdivision to the extent defined in this petition and designated in such order of the Court, and record the same in the Deed Records of Lynn County, Texas, and authorizing and directing the Tax Assessor of Lynn County, Texas, thereafter to assess such property so thrown back into acreage property, as if it had never been subdivided and platted into blocks and streets, and otherwise to pursue the authority and requirements of said Article 7227, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas.

In the alternative, as respects such cancellation, your Petitioner prays that the Court at such hearing order and permit the cancellation of so much of said Lockwood Addition to the Original Town of Tahoka, Texas, as the Court shall deem proper.

NOW, THEREFORE, You are hereby commanded to summon all persons interested in the Lockwood Addition to the Original Town of Tahoka, Lynn County, Texas, and being the land described in the foregoing application and order, by making publication of this citation once in each week for three consecutive weeks before the return day hereof, in some newspaper published in the English language in Lynn County, Texas, to appear at the next regular term of the Commissioners Court of Lynn County, Texas, to be held at the

Court House thereof in Tahoka, Texas, on the second Monday in March, 1960, the same being the 14th day of March, 1960, then and there, if desired, to protest against the granting of said application filed in said Court on the 27th day of January, 1960, and being the application hereinabove set out.
