## Bill Hancock Is Outstanding Lynn Farmer of the Year

N. B. (Bill) Hancock of route 4, Tahoka, has been named the Outstanding Conservation Farmer of the year by the board of supervisors of the Lynn county Soil Conservation District, and will be introduced as such at the annual Farmer-Businessman banquet, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, Friday night.

Farming 480 acres of dryland and irrigated land three miles west of New Home, Hancock has been farming on his own since 1949 and boasts a 95 percent complete conservation farm. He owns 320 acres of the land he is now utilizing.

Supervisors chose Hancock the farmer of the year for his excellent conservation practices which include a conservation cropping system on 287 acres, which is the playing cover crops on 140 acres, irrigated portion of his farm. Hancock seeds borders and turnrows, and has a 100 percent program of crop residue utilization, including rye, mungbeans on all feed land, cotton burrs, guar, alfalfa, sudan and cane.

Recently Hancock reorganized his irrigation system by installing 11,900 feet of underground pipeline to aid him in watering his 287 acres of surface irrigation. Of this acreage, over 160 acres are under irrigation water management. To conserve water, Hancock has 205 acres of bench levelled land and 50 acres of field levelled.

On 25 acres of land, the farmer of the year rotates hay and pasture. His impressive red brick home is protected by one and one-half acres of windbreak of Ariona Cypress in addition to burmuda rye, and alfalfa. Fences around his pens are built of iron and cable painted aluminum.

Although his conservation practices are extensive at the present time, Hancock has even more outstanding plans ahead. Since his windbreak has now become protection enough, he plans to plant an orchard near his home.

Hancock plans a program of conservation of irrigation water that will be engineered as a contractor would plan or build a house. He will employ his pipelines for conservation, as well as leveling to conserve rainfall according to the intake rate for length of the rows.

His irrigation practice includes prewaterings, one summer irrigation at the beginning of the bloom period but no late watering since Hancock does not like this practice, and the application of nitrogen to feed land.

This next year, the farmer of the year plans to alternate borders of cotton with a soil building legume, from which he will harvest some of the seed. Hancock says his farm hands had rather work borders, and that borders paid for his leveling with the first year of increased yield. In addition he plans to use some grass and cover crops to aid his steer feeding program, as well as to keep his land in the highest state of production with soil improving crops.

In recommending Hancock as Outstanding Conservation farmer in the State of Texas, the supervisors said that he "has a well balanced conservation plan in operation. He has done a great deal in conservation in practicing what he preaches. In addition to being outstanding as a conservation farmer he is also a successful farmer and is well respected in his community, county and High Plains area that he is known. In addition to the practices listed he is using legumes in his cropping system, applying cotton burrs and using the very latest methods of successful farming.

"Words really cannot describe what a nice farm that Hancock has laid out, for only seeing it on the ground can one really appreciate what has been done."

### Ice Glazes Lynn; Holds Moisture

Moisture this week that coated the area with ice measured only a trace, but with an estimated 25 of an inch of moisture last week in the form of snow, has kept one of the best seasons in the ground known in many years.

Ice made traveling hazardous Tuesday and Wednesday, but began thawing mid-afternoon on Wednesday and skies were clear Thursday morning. No major accidents were reported because of the slippery roads and highways, however, as traffic moved at a snail's pace.

Precipitation for the year totals 1.81 inches, with Tahoka receiving .85 in January and .96 in February. Rains of October and December, the latter totaling 1.78 inches has put farm land into excellent shape for this year's crops.

### Arthur Phelps Killed Aboard Navy Ship

A former New Home resident, Arthur Clarence Phelps, 19, died Monday after being stabbed aboard ship in San Diego, Calif. He was a seaman in the U. S. Navy. Funeral services are pending at Stephenville, Texas.

The stabbing occurred as a result of an argument between Phelps and Philip Meeks, 17, a seaman apprentice from Houston. Both men were mess cooks. Meeks has been arrested and is being held in custody aboard the attack transport Paul Revere, where the incident occurred, at the Naval station in San Diego, according to Navy officials.

Phelps is the son of Mrs. Ruby Lee Phelps of Stephenville and the late J. R. Phelps. He came to New Home as a small child, attended school there, worked for several years for J. W. Edwards, and entered the service following the death of his father in January, 1958. His father had been employed by New Home Gin Co. Young Phelps was a member of the New Home Baptist Church.

Other than his mother, Phelps is survived by one sister of Breckenridge, two half brothers and two half sisters, and his maternal grandparents of Stephenville.

Friends of the family in New Home plan to attend funeral services if weather permits.

### School Attendance In Dangerous Low

The local schools Average Daily Attendance (ADA) is suffering a tremendous blow following a two weeks' seige of measles, pink eye, flu and colds, reports Superintendent Otis Spears and School Nurse Lillian McCord.

Superintendent Otis Spears urges all parents to keep their children at home while infected with contagious diseases since the spreading of such is affecting the attendance so much. However, he also urges parents to try to give their children proper care and get them back in school as quickly as possible.

The effect of the fall in attendance may well mean that Tahoka schools will lose teachers next year unless the trend that is prevalent at the present time takes a turn for the better.

Although not quite to the epidemic stage, absenteeism from illness has reached an all-time high percentage wise in Tahoka system. There is no way of knowing exactly how many students have been absent because of illness since the extreme cold weather has kept many at home. However, figures are available on those children sent or taken home who became ill while attending classes.

During the past two weeks Mrs. McCord has seen the following number of students in her office: 35 cases of measles, 40 cases of pink eye, and 20 cases of flu and colds from the South Elementary School alone, which includes first through fourth grades; 25 cases of flu and colds from North Elementary School; and 10 cases of flu and colds from high school.

Total number of illnesses is 130. In addition Mrs. McCord says that she has traveled 458 miles in and near Tahoka taking ill children home from school, a mileage that more than doubles any previous month since she was employed as school nurse three years ago. It is possible that twice as many children have been ill than the number reported above because many became ill while at home and were not sent to school.

# Printer's Ink-lings . . .

Since the printer "stood on the corner" for me more than once during my short stay with the News, the lease that can be done in return is for these stiff and unsure fingers to dip into the "inkings." And although he never once got me into trouble, I may not be able to

The Tahoka City Council opened the door to new home building the day it set up a local housing authority for the building of a low-income rental project here, although the Council and no one else may have realized it at the time.

For years citizens of Tahoka have wondered why it had become so difficult to obtain loans in this city from FHA and other lending agencies for the erection of homes. After this rental project began, the council found its answer, because the Public Housing Authority demanded certain requirements before all the red tape could be cut.

First of all, Tahoka had no zoning committee, no plumbing or electrical codes and all the other protections that FHA must have before guaranteeing loans. After these committees and codes became City ordinances, that heavy door finally began to swing open on its rusty hinges.

New home building in Tahoka has hit an all-time high, and from many indications, such as the new Lockwood Addition and the opening of new blocks in the

The hatbox in her hand drew a long dark look from her husband. "Darling," she hurriedly explained, "I was down in the dumps today so I bought myself a new hat."

What has happened to the common decency of the men and women of this great country of ours that we have allowed the censorship of the motion picture industry and the publishing companies to let down their barriers to the point that they hold nothing sacred anymore?

Time was, when a young boy or girl could read a book or go to the movies without their parents feeling the necessity of first having to investigate the material. Most of us can remember going to the movies on the average of two or three times a week, and maybe once or twice each year a film would be produced that was termed undesirable by our parents.

About the most off-color thing filmed in my day was Betty Grable's shapely leg. But if we thought the movie queens of the 1920's, 1930's and the 1940's were scandalous, we just hadn't seen Brigitte Bardot, Marilyn Monroe, or Elizabeth Taylor, to name a few. And even our so-called pure, untouchables such as Debbie Reynolds having been joining the ranks lately.

And when there is no picture of this type showing, it is usually only because one of the "horror" pictures has taken its place.

It has come to the point in the year of our Lord, 1960, that maybe

once or twice a month there might be a movie scheduled that is decent enough to let the youngsters see.

At the risk of sounding straight laced, some of our movies remind us of the squalor of low morality that humanity had fallen into at Sodom and Gomorrah when the Creator became so disgusted with the souls He had placed on this earth that He could stand it no more.

This is one angle of the American scene that many indignant citizens are glad to see the Congressional investigating committee sticking its nose into. If the public won't take a stand, someone has to.

And if this investigating fails to produce any results, then what? Are we going to be content to sit quietly on the outside and allow movies and books to become worse and worse?

It is doubtful. There is some decency in every young person, parent and grandparent, and sooner or later the public will have had enough. Frankly, a great number of us have had enough already.

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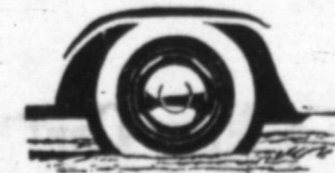

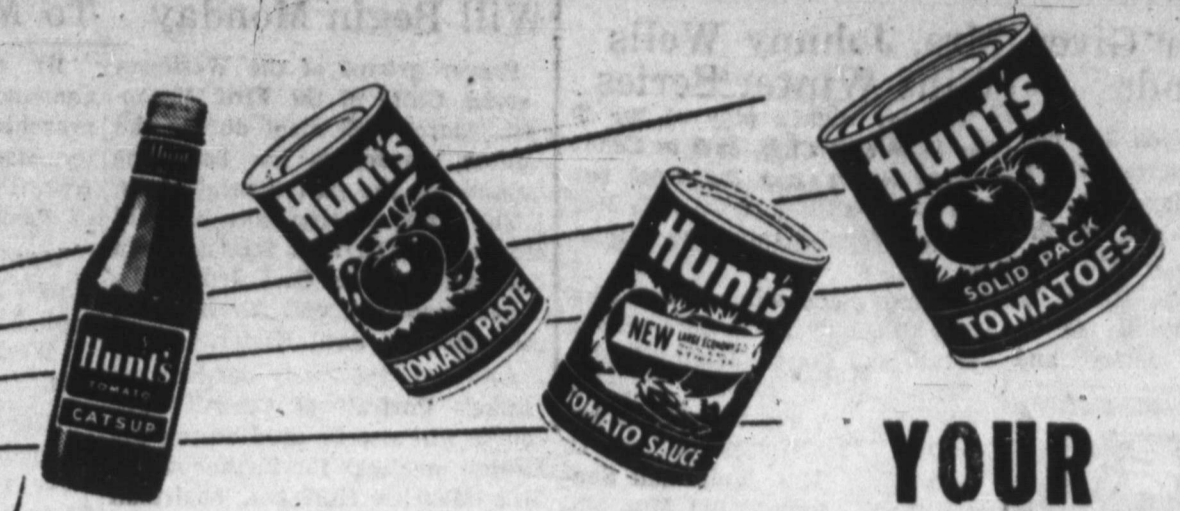
