## Grain Prices May Increase

With maturity dates approaching for a number of grains which are under price support in this area, Charles G. Bragg of the Lynn County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office, Feb. 17 reminded farmers that they should be alert to market prices that will enable them to redeem their grain at a profit.

It was pointed out that under new legislation, effective first with last year's crops, so-called "equity" payments are no longer made in connection with the takeover of commodities pledged as collateral for price-support loans. 4-H Club girls from over Lynn county will participate in a county-wide bake show at the Lyntegar REA Conference room here March 26 beginning at 9:00 a. m. according to Mrs. Connie Anderson, home demonstration agent.

Mrs. Anderson says the event is hoped to become an annual affair, similar to the annual dress revue. Lynn County Farm Bureau will award a plaque to the high point girl in each of three divisions and the Lynn County Home Demonstration Council will give ribbons for winners of each product.

Each girl may enter three products in her particular division: Junior group, baking powder biscuits, quick coffee cake, brownies; elementary division, drop biscuits, refrigerator cookies, plain bread muffins; senior division, fudge cake, cherry pie, banana nut loaf bread.

Judges will be the following home demonstration agents, Mrs. Betty Moore, Terry county; Mrs. Myrna White, Yoakum county; Mrs. Leta Smith, Garza county; Miss Jo Crabtree, Dawson county.

In addition to the bake show, Mrs. Anderson is planning a County Dairy Foods Demonstration eliminations for 4-H girls to be held April 2. Elementary girls will present their demonstrations at the Home Economics Cottage in Tahoka from 8:30 a. m. to 5:00 p. m., while the junior and senior girls give their demonstrations in the Lyntegar kitchen at the same time.

## City Installs Radio Equipment For Police

City of Tahoka is adding short-wave radio equipment to two pickup trucks and the city hall in order for more efficient service between the hall, service equipment, and the police patrol car.

The police car already had short-wave equipment for contact with the Sheriff's office and other nearby towns.

The new sending and receiving equipment will reach out only five or six miles, but is sufficient for the city's needs, said Pat Hines, water superintendent.

Before 200 farmers, businessmen and their wives, N. B. (Bill) Hancock of New Home was recognized as the Outstanding Conservation Farmer of the Year and Jack Jaquess took the reins as president of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce at the annual Farmer-Businessman banquet held here last Friday night in the school cafeteria.

Jack Lacy, manager of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, addressed the group. Emphasizing that people of today are too impulsive with pointing their finger at the other fellow, Lacy said that a look in the mirror would tell what is wrong with the world.

## "SMALL BUSINESS"

Anyone who doubts that the bureaucratic mind reaches a point where it holds itself superior to the Congress should carefully read the just published of the hearing held by a sub committee of the Senate Small Business Commission on the Federal Trade Commission's interim report on mergers and unfair competition in food marketing.

Sen. Humphrey heads the sub committee. C. W. Harder, Flanked by various functionaries, Earl Kintner, FTC chairman, appeared.

Kintner has perhaps created more personal publicity for himself than any person to ever serve on the FTC through his inconsequential disc jockey probe. Presumably he will go down in history as the Don Quixote of Tin Pan Alley.

In 1958 Senate Small Business Committee requested FTC to study in food retailing.

FTC dilly-dallied finally releasing a major press release on an "interim" report just before appearing before committee.

Sen. Humphrey did not appreciate this procedure at all. In fact, he told FTC Chairman Kintner, "The Federal Trade Commission is not an executive agency. Your responsibility is that of a quasi-judicial or quasi-independent regulatory body established by Congress. The Senate Small Business Committee made a request to the FTC for this investigation. . . . I don't like the fact that an



agency, an independent agency, that is fulfilling the request of a duly constituted body of the elected representatives of the people ignores the request of Congress."

In defense for delay in complying with the request of Congress the FTC introduced a resolution it had adopted initiating a study into the economic abuses in the food industry.

Senator Humphrey then said, "I merely want to be sure we are not going to content ourselves with some more of these pious platitudes. 'Whereas' sections of resolutions are just about as worthwhile as fluff in the sky. And many people 'whereas' themselves to death in the hopes that somehow this will appease the people who are injured or claiming injury."

The Senator then pointed out that the FTC resolution rather ignored instructions to probe into collusive pricing. Kintner replied he and his four colleagues would give it prayerful consideration.

Senator Humphrey replied "I do not want a prayerful consideration, because this resolution says nothing about prayer in it. It speaks of action."

The full report makes appalling reading for anyone who believes in the Constitution.

It is generally forgotten Russia, after Caesar's overthrow, freely elected in 1917 a democratic Duma, or Congress. But a small corps of Bolsheviks, by issuing orders, by ignoring the Duma, took over control. Probably as never before, U. S. needs support of the people if representative government is not to be replaced by bureaucratic rule.

### Sales Prices Set For Upland Cotton

Minimum sales prices for Commodity Credit Corporation stocks of upland cotton have been determined for the 1960-61 marketing year, according to Charles G. Bragg, Office Manager, Lynn County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The new sales prices are intended to emphasize farmers' marketings. The announcement at this time will provide farm operators with information on CCC's sales prices before the March 16 deadline for electing Choice (B) allotments and price support for the 1960 crop.

For 1959 and prior crops of upland cotton in CCC inventory, the new minimum sales prices will be the higher of (1) the market price as determined by CCC, or (1) 115 per cent of the 1960 Choice (B) loan rate. (This compares with the current 10 percent of the loan rate.)

For 1960-crop cotton, the minimum sales price is as follows: When the cotton is sold by local sales agencies, the minimum sales price will be 110 per cent of the Choice (B) loan rate; when the cotton is sold by the New Orleans CSS Commodity office, the minimum sales price will be the higher of (1) the market price as determined by CCC, or (2) 110 per cent of the Choice (B) loan rate.

Mr. Bragg pointed out that carrying charges will be added to the sales price, beginning with 10 points in October 1960, and increasing 20 points per month for each month thereafter to a maximum of 190 points in July 1961. The current monthly increase for carrying charges is 15 points per month for each month after October 1959.

Applying these figures to the announced "B" support rate, the following comparison could be made:

"B" Loan Rate for Middling 7-8 inch, 23.18 cents per pound.

Minimum Release Price by CCC for the 1960 crop 25.50 plus charges per pound.

Minimum Resale Price CCC for 1959 and prior years, 26.65, plus charges.

"A" Loan Rate, 28.97 cents per pound.

Minimum Resale Price by CCC cotton for both 1959 and 1960 would be increased up to 1.9 cents per pound for carrying charges. It can be seen that the minimum resale value, especially for 1959 and prior years, will be within a few points of the "A" support rate, which should materially strengthen the market price for "B" cotton.

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### RESEEDING PASTURES

(By A. T. Wilhite)

Due to excellent moisture conditions that now prevail in the Lynn County Soil Conservation District many ranchers are planning to reseed deteriorated rangeland this year. The rangeland will be seeded to native and introduced grasses to spur the growth of forage.

Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service says that it is very important that seed of merit and high germination be purchased. Not only should the highest quality seed be selected, but those seed which are grown in the general area where they are to be planted should be demanded. It has been found that it is difficult to grow successfully many seeds from other climatic areas.

Much disappointment will be avoided if this factor is taken into consideration before seeds are bought. Study along this line will be most profitable for the ranchmen.

Terrace lines have been run, and construction started on Ward Eakin's farm east of Tahoka. Cost share payment will be made under the A. C. P. program for construction of these terraces.

R. W. Fenton is planning on seeding 100 acres of rangeland to side oats gramma and green sprangle-top. This seeding is being done on shallow range land that is now infested with snake broomweed or commonly known as turpentine weed. A seed bed for drilling the grass seed is being done with a one way disc set shallow. This is also cutting off the broom weed and leaving the residue on the surface for protection against wind erosion. Fenton has been hand grubbing the scattering mesquite over his pasture land.

The Board of supervisors met March 1st in regular session of the Lynn County Soil Conservation District. Plans were made to hold a special meeting inviting all of the ministers to a special program in May, prior to Soil Stewardship Sunday. The Board of

supervisors reviewed Great Plains Conservation Program Contracts on George C. Wells and H. A. Smith. Agreements with the District were approved and signed on H. A. Smith and Magnus Klatenhoff.

## Junior Fitts Ends Brilliant Cage Career; May Enter Pro Ranks

Milt (Junior) Fitts, Tahoka's all-time basketball great, has played his last college game, but although one door is closing on his fabulous career a larger one began opening before him when he was contacted by the St. Louis Hawks of the NBA and at least two National Industrial Basketball League teams.

Accord to the Amarillo Globe-Times, Fitts has established himself as one of the finest cagers in the Southwest and will be remembered as one of West Texas State's all-time greats.

The 6-foot, five inch Tahoka product, who made history in Tahoka by appearing on all-state records two years in a row, finished his college career with an outstanding record.

## High Plains Project Is Weed Control

Weed control research is a new program at the High Plains Research Foundation for 1960, with flame cultivation being the first phase of the program.

Dale Price, Agricultural Engineer, is the new member of the Foundation staff to conduct the weed control research program. Mr. Price is a 1954 vocational agricultural graduate of Texas Tech and has taught in this field in Texas. The Gotcher Engineering Company of Clarksdale, Mississippi is furnishing the flame cultivator and basic education in weed control. Gene Bumpus and W. R. (Bill) Taylor are underwriting the project and the Warren Petroleum company is furnishing the propane.

The flame cultivation experiment will include cotton, grain sorghum, corn, sesame, soybeans, castor beans, and possibly onions and potatoes.

The project will cover angles of eliminating weeds and labor. New techniques in cultivation, planting, and harvesting of individual crops will undoubtedly be discovered.

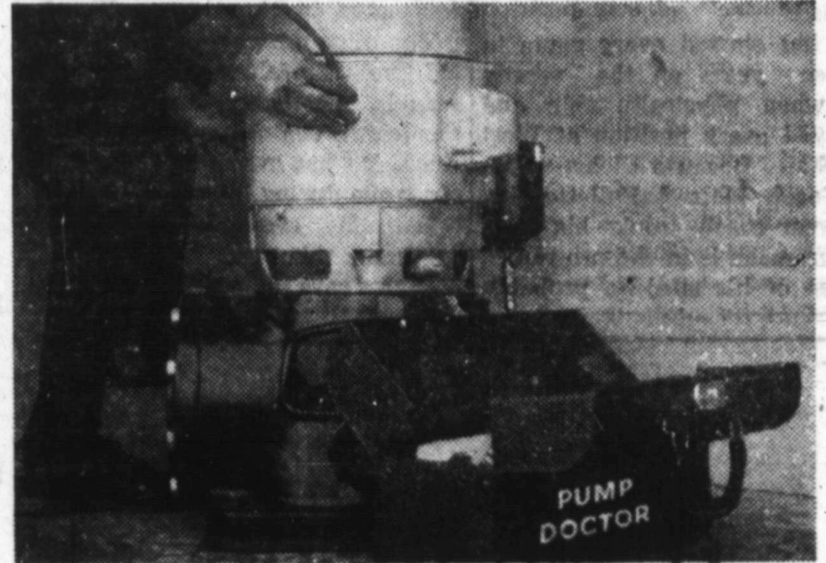

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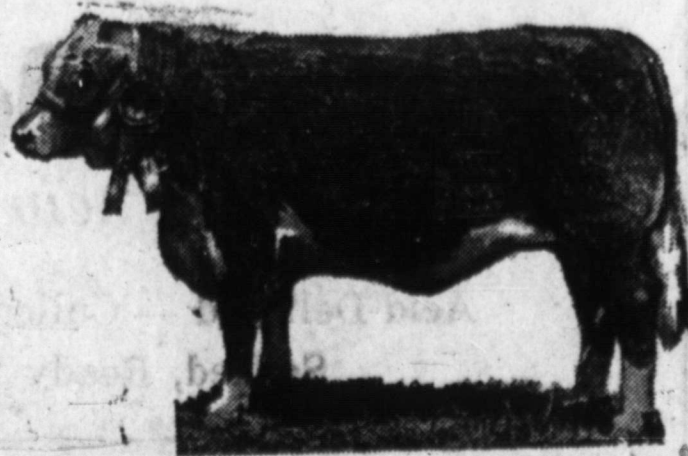

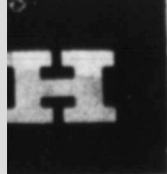

of commodity under price-support loan was above the loan plus charge.

While equity payments will not be made, producers may continue to obtain any equity they may have in loan collateral by repaying the loan before maturity, thus regaining full ownership of the commodity for whatever disposition they may choose to make.

"Farmers who follow increases in local grain prices in this way are using the price-support program as it was intended," Mr. Bragg said. "The price-support rate puts a floor under prices and offers price protection at harvest-time. If prices rise to a point where farmers can sell on the open market and still repay their loans plus interest with a profit, it is better for them to do this rather than deliver their grain to the government, which already holds large stocks."

Farmers are urged to check with their local ASC office if they have loans that might be redeemed profitably.

## Cattle, Land Sale Money Taxable

The sale of cattle is subject to income tax, no matter what use the proceeds are put to, according to Ellis Campbell, Jr., Dallas District Director of Internal Revenue Service.

Numerous questions at farm tax schools have pointed up misunderstanding on the part of some farmers. The sale of cattle, land, and other farm capital assets are taxable no matter whether the proceeds are reinvested in similar property or not.

There is one exception in the case of condemnation proceedings or other involuntary conversion. Farmers having a problem in this area were advised to get a free copy of the "Farmer's Tax Guide" from their County Agent or the Internal Revenue Service.

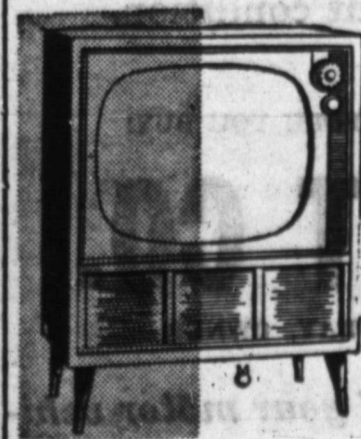

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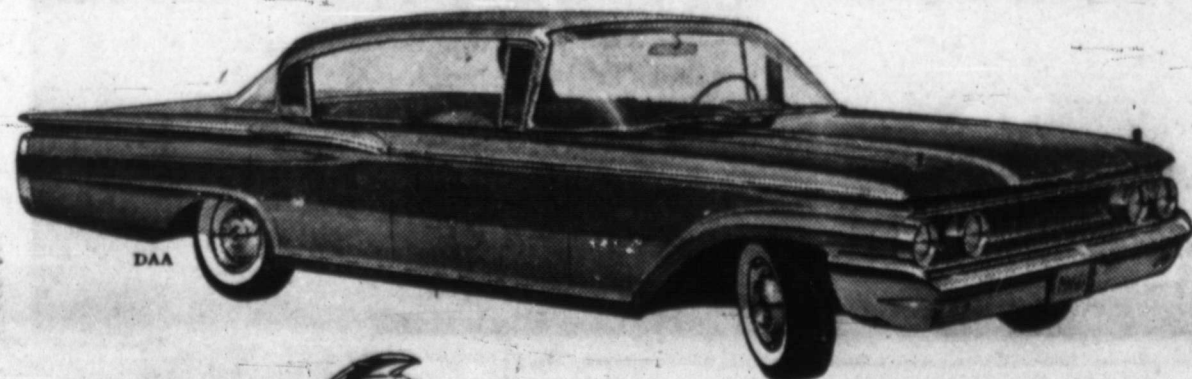
