Terrace construction has begun on the Fannie Walters Estate, located one mile north of Draw. Terraces are part of a complete Soil and Water Conservation Plan being installed on this farm under the Great Plains conservation program.

The plan also includes approximately 15 acres of cropland being converted to grassland, contour farming, cover cropping, a conservation cropping system and proper use of crop residues.

The Great Plains contract covers approximately 680 acres. The farm is operated by Lewis Bonham.

Most foot prints in the sands of time are made by work shoes.

Terraces have been completed on W. C. W. Morris' farm located northeast of Draw.

Latest figures show nearly 4,000 farmers and ranchers have signed Great Plains contracts covering more than 10,850,000 acres.

Terrace construction has been completed on Alex Sanders' farm located southwest of Tahoka.

Irrigation systems have been laid out for Charles Siewert and Leonard Dube. Rows will be on the level, and length of run will be shortened for more efficient use of irrigation water.

Terrace lines have been run on the H. A. Smith farm located north west of New Lynn. Terraces will be constructed, and all farming operations will be on the contour following terraces.

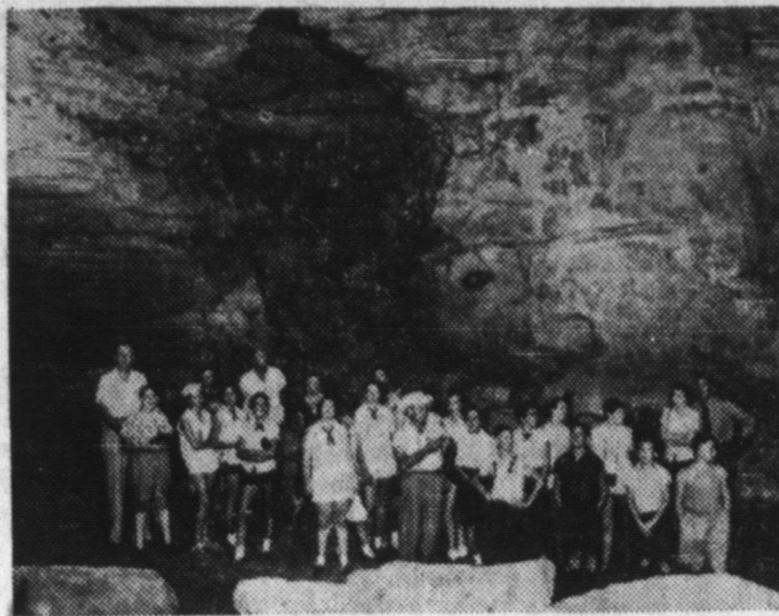

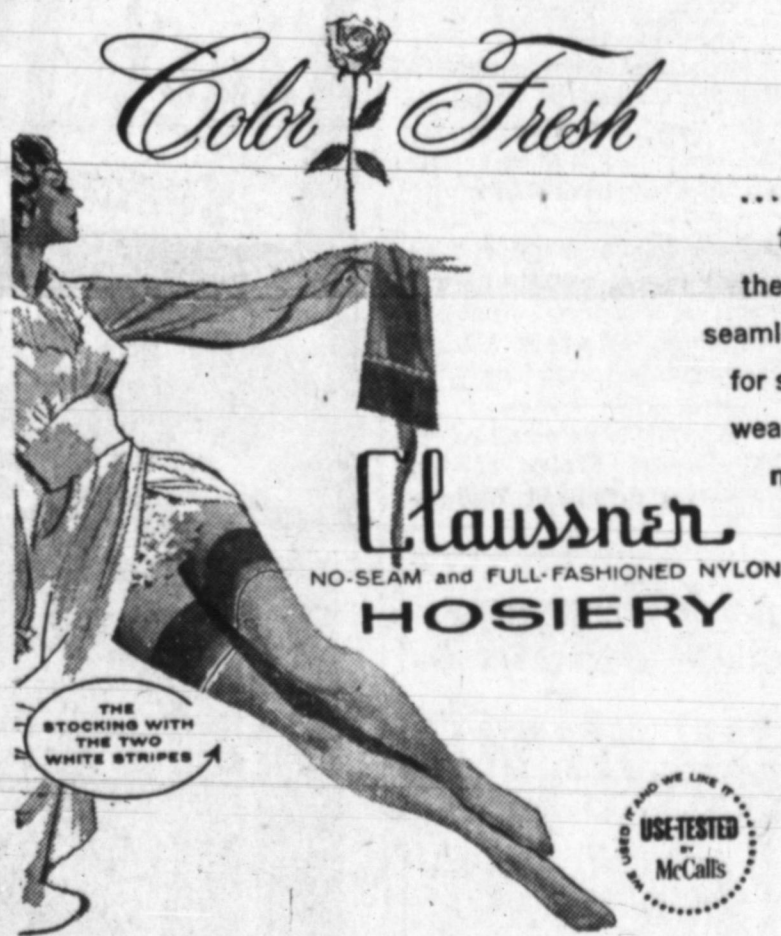

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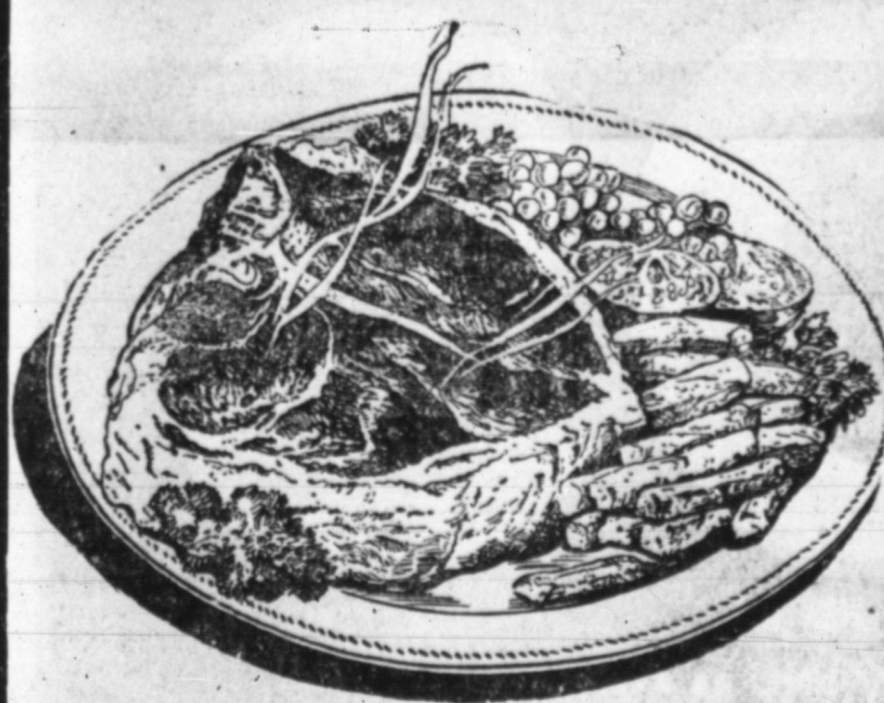

Have found the Savior near.



moment, a contract has been made and it would be hard to break, and we may be obligated to pay the State and Federal Government all expenses for the work they have done on this route, which is several thousand dollars.

"There are a few, we understand, who voted for the bonds for this route who would like to withdraw their vote or ask us to break the contract that you asked us to make. Would you break an important contract after you had made it? We only want to carry out the wishes of the people of Tahoka as best we can. The City Council voted 100 percent to carry out your wishes. No one had an axe to grind, as your City Council has worked hard and spent lots of hours trying to better our town. They have made mistakes, sure! But, after the election on this project, our Highway Engineer at Lubbock told us we saved quite a bit of money on the right-of-way, as the right-of-way west of town would cost from \$200.00 to \$1500.00 per acre besides the five irrigation wells the county and state would have to buy.

"When I say \$1,500 an acre, West Texas Builders set the price on land adjoining the north and west city limits and this same firm has an option on adjoining land at \$2,000.00 per acre. Regardless of the price, a highway 300 feet wide taking out across the middle of irrigated farms is going to cost money.

"We will not have a large and unsightly overpass here in town, as the Highway Department now proposes that US 87 will go under US 380, and there will be two-way access paved roads on either side with facilities to get on or off the four-lane and also to get on or off US 380.

"Mr. Crain, our district Highway Engineer at Lubbock, tells me they have preliminary plans drawn for the route through town. He says every property owner is pin-pointed on their maps and part of the right-of-way deeds prepared are for this route and would have bought part of it by now but have been short on money.

"As you well remember, at the beginning, the Highway Department told us it would be 1960 and 1961, after the cars were registered, before money would be available for any right-of-way through town or otherwise.

"We certainly do not wish to displease anyone, but this City Council has no desire to sit down and do nothing, as we are your servants.

"Hope you will remain our friends and customers. We have elections coming up soon. Please go vote and cooperate with the majority of the votes counted.

George W. Turner, 77, a retired farmer who had lived three miles north of New Home nearly thirty years, died at about 1:00 p. m. Friday in Methodist Hospital following an illness of two years with multiple sclerosis.

Funeral services were held Sunday at 2:00 p. m. in New Home Methodist Church with the pastor, Rev. Vernon O'Kelley, officiating, assisted by Rev. Hugh Daniel, pastor of Overton Methodist Church in Lubbock and a former pastor of New Home. Burial followed in Resthaven Park, Lubbock.

Mr. Turner was born in Red River county on June 7, 1882. Moving out to Haskell county, he met Miss Nora E. Marcy, who later moved out to Lubbock with her parents. Mr. Turner was married to Miss Marcy on January 6, 1903, in the old Lubbock courthouse by Judge R. Bean, and took his bride back to Haskell county to live.

The family moved out to Ropesville in 1924, and to New Home in 1931 after buying his present farm there. He retired from active farming about ten years ago.

His was the second death in the immediate family, a son, Taft, having died in a car-train wreck near Reese Airforce Base, Lubbock, in January, 1958.

Survivors include his wife; four sons, G. W. (Dick) Turner Jr. and Woodrow Turner, both of New Home, Henry of Hobbs and Virgil of Brownfield; five daughters, Mrs. John Lee of Rochester, Mrs. Alton Hardin of Dallas, Mrs. Raymond Hitt of Wolforth, Mrs. Finn Burleson of Lubbock, and Mrs. Otis Holly of Midwest City, Okla.; 23 grandchildren and 16 great grandchildren.

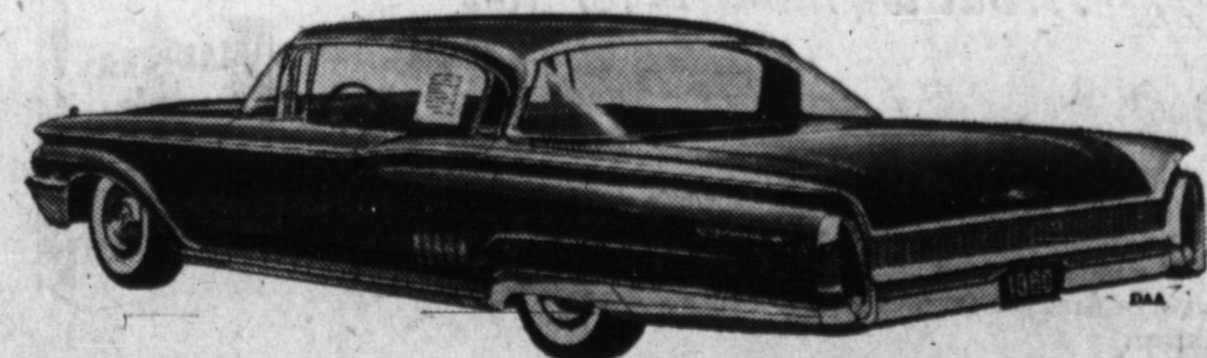

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
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
