## Kidwell, Sherrill, Wharton Elected City Councilmen

Two new members were elected and a present incumbent returned to office on the Tahoka City Council in voting here Tuesday. A near record vote was cast with 273 ballots being counted.

W. T. Kidwell, Piggly Wiggly store owner, received 212 votes; and Ronald Sherrill, manager of Cicero Smith Lumber Co., received 174 votes as the two new members of the council to succeed Albert Curry and Everton Nevill, who did not stand for re-election.

Wharton C. Wharton, owner of Wharton Motor Co., was re-elected when he received 165 votes.

Other candidates whose names had been filed were C. W. Conway, manager of D & H who had just been transferred to a Lubbock store, 104 votes; and B. R. Taylor, employee of Lyntegar and operator of a Dixie-Dog Drive-In, 124 votes.

Holdover members are H. B. McCord Sr., mayor and Dr. C. Skiles Thomas and Meldon Leslie.

At Wilson, only 36 votes were cast as William G. Lumsden and M. L. Murray won re-election. Lumsden received 21 votes and Murray 20.

Other names on the ballot for the two city council posts were A. N. Crowson, who received 18 votes, and Jim E. Lane, 12 votes. Clarence Church is mayor at Wilson.

**O'Donnell**  
Mayor L. J. (Jimmy) Hash Jr., unopposed for re-election, received 105 of the 114 votes cast in the O'Donnell City election. Hash, a former mayor, had been serving out the unexpired term of J. T. Forbes, who resigned on going into the First National Bank there.

Two councilmen were also re-elected, Homer Hardberger receiving 68 votes and Harvey Line 98. Clyde Winans, the third candidate, received 57 votes.

## B. J. Carlisle, 29, Accident Victim

Billy Joe Carlisle, 29, formerly of Tahoka, was killed Saturday morning at Terrell, where he was working on a road construction job. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe L. Carlisle of Tahoka.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 2:00 p. m. in Archer City with Rev. Linley Vowell, pastor of the First Methodist Church, assisted by Rev. R. E. Carley, pastor of the First Baptist Church, both of that city, officiating. Burial followed in Archer City Cemetery. He was a member of the Methodist Church.

He is said to have been killed when a giant shovel dropped on him while working at a rock crusher. A brother, Marvin, was working on the same job.

Billy Joe was born in Eastland county on September 24, 1930. He was married to the former Miss Hazel Roberson of Archer City. He had attended school in Tahoka and was graduated from O'Donnell High School in 1948.

Survivors include his wife and one daughter, Carolyn, age four; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe L. Carlisle of Tahoka; four brothers, R. L. of Sweetwater, Marvin of Terrell, Melvin W., who is with Western Geophysical in Tripoli, North Africa, and Richard, who is in the Army in Korea; two sisters, Mrs. Weldon (Ouida) Walker of Baird and Mrs. Clyde (Margaret) Waldrop of Plains.

Among other survivors known here are an aunt, Mrs. W. K. Kelley, who works in the county superintendent's office here; an uncle, Edward Carlisle, now of Seagraves; two aunts, Mrs. H. C. Warren and Mrs. L. D. Evans, both of O'Donnell; and a grandmother, Mrs. E. D. Archer, also of O'Donnell.

Mrs. Jack Henry was admitted Saturday to Tahoka Hospital and dismissed Monday.

## FFA Team Wins Judging Contest

Lester Adams, local FFA advisor, took his FFA team consisting of Johnnie Wheeler, Leighton Roddy, Philip Havins and Larry Owen to the Sul Ross Livestock Judging Contest held in Apline Saturday, April 2.

The team placed second in beef cattle judging and third in swine judging. More than 30 teams participated in the F. F. A. Division of the contest.

In individual awards Wheeler received two high awards, placing first (high point individual) in the swine judging and tenth high individual in the entire contest which included beef cattle, swine and sheep judging.

The team will enter the contest at Texas Tech on April 23 to work for district and area honors in livestock judging.

## Woman Hangs Self Saturday

A Latin-American woman, Mrs. Isabel Sanchez Huerta, 25, died Saturday morning from hanging in her home on the Elmer Lagrone place, farmed by Welch Flippin, near Newmoore Saturday morning at about 9:00 o'clock.

Her husband was visiting his parents about a mile away at the time. Three little children found their mother hanging in a clothes closet of their home and walked more than a half mile to notify their father.

Sheriff's officers, called to investigate the death, said the woman was hanged by an electric wire which formerly had been attached to a radio. One end of the wire was tied to a clothes rack and the other end around her neck.

Justice of the Peace C. A. Clem at an inquest ruled the death self-inflicted by strangulation.

A Stanley ambulance was called, and the body brought here. Funeral services were held Sunday at 4:30 p. m. in the Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church and burial followed in Tahoka Cemetery.

The couple married at Snyder in 1950. Survivors include the husband, Guadalupe Huerta; three children, Guadalupe Jr., 7, Elda 5, and Erlinda 3; her mother, Mrs. Amanda Cantu of Boerne; a brother and sister, Johnny Cantu and Miss Margie Cantu, also of Boerne.

## Plan New Park At New Home

Franchise has been received for the new Little League which will be composed of New Home, Wilson, and Woodrow, in which there will be at least four teams. E. R. Blakney and Delbert Mouser are co-chairmen at New Home.

Work was started Tuesday at New Home on a new park, on the same location, similar to Tahoka's park.

Building of the park on the same site was made possible when New Home school bought some more land north of the Community Center on which the football field will be moved.

# Housing Project Bids Low

Bids were received here Wednesday and a contract will be let early next week on Tahoka's 14-unit low rent housing project for which \$170,306 was appropriated by the Public Housing Administration several months ago. Work will start in 10 days after contract is awarded.

Low bidders were Smith & Wardrop, Inc., of Lubbock, \$128,700, and V. B. Likins & Associates, Inc., of Abilene, \$129,310. There were eight other bids ranging up to \$162,340. Wyatt C. Hedrick of Fort Worth is the architect.

One of the two low bidders will most likely get the contract, which will be awarded jointly by the Housing Authority of the City of Tahoka and the Public Housing Administration, stated J. M. Uzzie, executive director.

The 14 units in seven buildings will be of brick veneer and concrete construction, designed to last 40 years, and will be complete with all improvements including landscaping.

There will be six units for white families located at Sanders and South Seventh, a block north of

City Park. There will be two 2-bedroom units and four 3-bedroom units.

Four Latin-American units will be located at McDaniel and South Third, just south of the Catholic Church, which will have two 2-bedroom and two 3-bedroom units.

Also, there will be four Negro units at Standifer and North Seventh, immediately west of the old Negro School, of two 2-bedroom units.

Paper work was initiated in January, 1958, on the project by the City of Tahoka and the Public

Housing Administration. Since that time approximately \$10,000 has been spent from the appropriation for architect, engineering and lawyers' fees, surveying, the sites, and other overhead. Actually, \$142,306 is available for the project, which is, in effect, a loan from the Federal Government.

The project will be operated strictly by the Housing Authority of the City of Tahoka of which A. M. Bray is chairman; A. C. Vermer, vice chairman; Harold Green, Dean Taylor, and H. B. McCord Jr., members; and Uzzie, director.

## School Trustees Named In Four County Districts

Balloting in the school elections Saturday in Lynn county was fairly light except at O'Donnell.

Clint Walker and Clint Sikes were elected to the Tahoka Board without opposition, each receiving 45 of the 48 votes cast. Three write-in votes went to Mitchell Williams and Charles Verner. The two new board members succeed L. A. Forsythe and Reble Thomas at O'Donnell, Ralph Beach received 138 votes for re-election to the board, and Elbert Crawford of Draw received 133 votes to replace Ben Moore Jr., present board member, who received 89. J. C. Harris, also a candidate, received 89 votes.

At Wilson, Edmund Maeker, board secretary on the ballot for re-election was returned to the board with 79 of the 129 votes cast. However, Jiggs Swann voted out Charles Baker, a present member, 69 to 62 votes. A fourth candidate, Carl Stone, received 48 votes.

New Home elected two new board members, neither of the old members being up for re-election. Edwin Nettles received 53 votes and Roy Blevis 50 to win places on the board. Other candidates were Foy Swinson, who received 48, and L. D. Halford, who got 28. A total of 66 votes were cast.

For county trustee from Precinct 4, Harlan Dean won over E. R. Blakney by two votes, 47 to 45 at New Home. Dean received 47 votes and Blakney 43, but in the Tahoka district lying in Precinct 4 there were only two votes cast and both went to Blakney.

For county trustee from Precinct 2, G. Q. Hensley was re-elected without opposition.

## Swine Meeting At O'Donnell

A swine meeting for adults and boys will be held in O'Donnell Monday and Tuesday, April 11 and 12, at the O'Donnell Community Center, according to Bill Griffin, Lynn county agent.

There will be a barrow evaluation contest in which judging will be done on the basis of carcass cut outs. Six to eight hogs are in the program, will be judged on foot, slaughtered and the carcass evaluated.

Speakers for the program are T. D. Tankersley, extension swine specialist, and Roy W. Snider, extension meat specialist.

The program is to teach meat-type swine production and will start at 9:30 a. m. Monday.

Prizes in the contest are furnished by the First National Bank, O'Donnell, Paymaster Feed Store, O'Donnell, and Dale Thuren Farm Stores in Tahoka and O'Donnell.

All swine producers, both commercial and registered, are invited to attend.

Also, Tahoka recently entered a golf team in the district golf competition held at Hill Crest Country Club in Lubbock, but the team was disqualified on a technicality.

## Cancer Crusade Gets Underway

Mrs. Beulah Applewhite, director of the 1960 Cancer Crusade in Lynn county, states that the local drive which began April 1 is now in full swing. H. W. Carter is chapter chairman.

In an earlier statement, Mrs. Applewhite urged "all public-spirited citizens of our community to make this a full-scale offensive against cancer."

Many local people wonder what happens to the money one gives to the American Cancer Society Crusade.

"Sixty cents out of every dollar we raise will stay right here in Texas," Mrs. Applewhite said. "And I think that's the first thing our residents will want to know. They like the feeling of joining together and fighting cancer as part of a country-wide offensive. But they also want to know that enough of their money is used for local and regional cancer control programs."

"We are happy to answer questions about how public money is used. We don't want anybody to buy 'a pig in a poke.' We know that people ask questions of this sort, because they are deeply concerned about cancer and what's being done about it. That's why they decide to support our Crusade, it's the greatest incentive of personal giving."

Mrs. Applewhite said that 40 percent of funds raised will go to the national Crusade; twenty-five per cent to support nationwide research; 12 per cent to administer national program of professional and public education and service; and the remaining three per cent for medical grants, scholarships and fellowships.

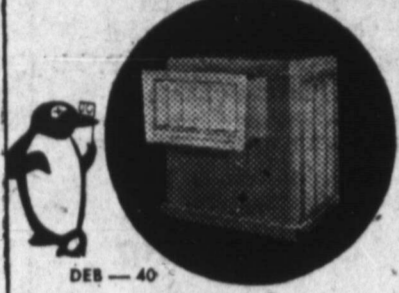
Memberships sell for \$100, which may be paid out in monthly installments, and dues are \$7.50 per month, including tax.

## Chairman of State Welfare Board Tells of Problems Faced In Program

Burton Hackney, a graduate of Tahoka High School, now a Brownfield attorney and chairman of the three-man board of the Texas Department of Public Welfare, spoke at the Rotary Club here Thursday of last week.

He said welfare work has become extensive and the expenditure each year has become stupendous as the Legislature and the Congress have continually broadened the program. The Department now has 1,800 employees and spends \$185 million a year.

The program covers four major phases: 1. Old age assistance; 2. Aid to the blind; 3. Aid to dependent children; 4. Aid to the totally and permanently disabled. It also has under its jurisdiction the old age and survivors program, family service, child welfare, licensing of child welfare homes, orphanages, and distribution for farm surplus commodities.

He said Lynn county has 175 people receiving old age assistance, three blind receiving help, seven families with 27 dependent children, and five totally disabled, receiving a total of \$11,000 per month.

However, he said, some East Texas counties are filled with old people on the program, some having 1800 to 2000 such people. Hopkins county, for instance, has 1780 on OAS. Half of the economy of such counties depends on the Welfare program.

Expenditures have tripled in 16 years due to people living longer and due to broadening of the program by law.

He said one big problem is what to do with the dependent children under the child welfare program. In 1958, he said, there were 111,000 admitted illegitimate children in Texas under 14 years of age. We are encouraging illegitimacy in Texas by the program, but the State is hampered in controlling the program by rules of

the Federal Government, which furnishes half the money. Texas spends \$48 million a year on the program, and a mother with four illegitimate children can draw \$96 per month for their support.

At the present time, there are on the program the third generation of illegitimate families. Under the Welfare Program, if one of these people work at any job, the amount of money made from such job is deducted from benefits. Also, a child is virtually forced out of school at the age of 14, when his benefits stop and he may go to work. The program discourages work and thrift and encourages dependence of the state; it encourages women to produce more illegitimate children.

Another problem is orphans. A white child can be adopted in 15 minutes, but a Negro child has no chance of adoption and there is not one Negro orphanage in Texas.

Since coming onto the State Board, Hackney has been working to "cut out some of the foolishness" of the various programs, and has been making a lot of headway, but there is still a long way to go. The present board is making many recommendations for betterment of the program, he declared, and some have been accepted, but right now the Federal government is proposing further liberalization.

He says, however, Texas' fight is being taken up by some other states.

Incidentally, Hackney says, the Texas program is the most efficient in the nation, with the administration cost being only \$1.32 per case per month, the lowest in the U. S. Calloway Huffaker arranged the Rotary program.

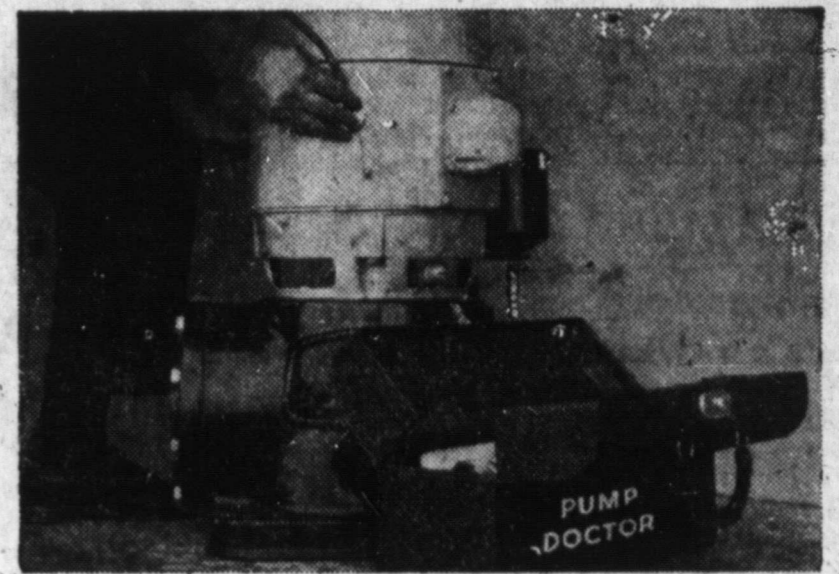

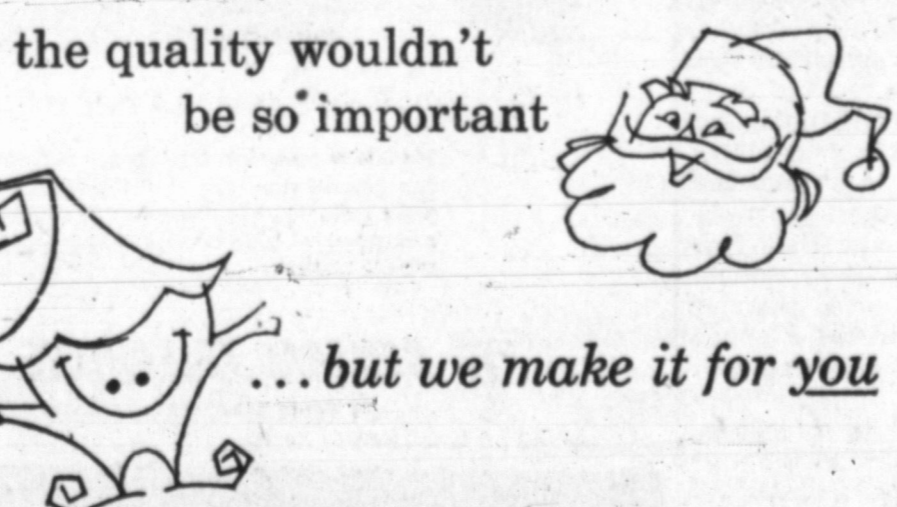

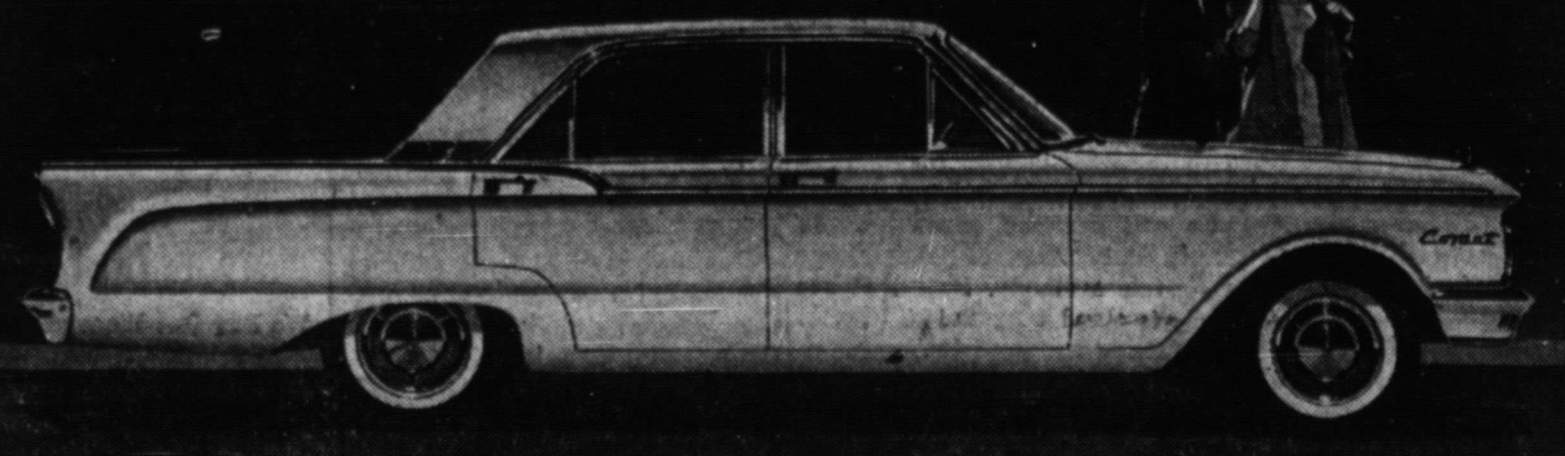
