## Choirs Win Top Contest Rating

Girls in the seventh and eighth grade choirs of the Tahoka schools were listed among those with the top ratings Saturday at an elementary school music meet held in Senior High School in Plainview for all elementary schools of the area.

There were choirs from nine schools and bands from nine schools entered—the largest number ever entered in an elementary meet to date in this area. Each event was graded rather than in competition with each other. Grades of I through V were given, with I being perfect.

Tahoka entered 13 vocal events with eight receiving I ratings and five receiving II ratings.

Eighth Grade Girls Choir sang three numbers, "Stars of the Summer Night," "This Is My Country," and "The Lord's Prayer." Barbara Thomas was the accompanist. This choir received a perfect rating, I. The other events entered from the eighth grade were as follows:

Girls Octet, composed of Patricia Sikes, Janis Gattis, Sharon Patterson, Montie McGinty, Nancy Colard, Louella Tomlinson, Arnetta Wood and Linda Thomas, sang "Joshua Fit De Battle of Jericho" and received a I. Two solos were entered from the seventh grade and they each received I ratings. They were Jean Flippin who sang, "Believe Me, If All Those Endearing Young Charms" and Jackie Burnett who sang "Lullaby."

Mrs. Bettye Green is the director for both the seventh and eighth grade choirs.

## Rainfall Here Above Normal

Rainfall for 1960 in Tahoka is slightly above normal for the first three months, according to records kept by The News for the U. S. Weather Bureau.

Total for the three months this year is 2.03 inches, with .85 for January, .96 for February, and .53 for March.

Normal rainfall since records were started in 1913 is 1.08 inches for the first three months. The normal for April is 1.33 but no rain has been received so far this month.

Farmers report the soil is still in excellent shape from rains last fall. There have been few sandstorms this year, but the one two weeks ago is said to have done more damage to topsoil than the other two or three previously this year.

Some farmers have already planted some acreage of both cotton and maize, but most of them will wait a while.

# City Prepares Contract For New Street Paving Program

## Millikens Die In Car Wreck

Three former Lynn county citizens were killed and another critically injured in the two-car crash that took the lives of seven members of two families Sunday at about 6:00 p. m. five miles southwest of Lubbock.

Mr. and Mrs. J. C. (Jack) Milliken 65 and 49 respectively, and son John Clenton Milliken, 22, all of 404 4th street Slaton, were killed, and the couple's youngest son, Carl, age 8, was critically injured. Also, Mrs. Milliken's nephew, driver of the car in which this family was riding, Walter Taylor, 15, of Wolforth, was killed. The Millikens were pioneer settlers of Lynn county.

All three occupants of the other car, Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Dean Tucker, 27 and 22, and son Darrell 5, all of 5107 42nd street, Lubbock, were killed in the wreck.

The Millikens lived near or in Wilson for many years, and he was the youngest brother of G. R. (Bud) Milliken of Tahoka. Mr. Milliken was a retired farmer and John worked for a wholesale grocery firm in Slaton.

The Millikens had been visiting the family of her brother at Wolforth, and young Taylor was driving them home along FM 1585, and the Tucker family was in a car traveling south along the SH 86 Road when the crash occurred.

Services for the Taylor youth were held in Wolforth Tuesday and those for the Tucker family were held in Lubbock. Services for the three members (Cont'd. on Back Page)

## Telephone Co-op Plans Extensions

An additional loan of \$413,000 to Puka-Lambro Rural Telephone Cooperative, which has headquarters in Tahoka, was announced last week end by the Rural Electrification Administration.

The loan is for construction of 247 miles of new line to provide service for 400 new subscribers, including the Union and Foster areas of Terry county and also for other extensions, plus improvement of the existing system.

Also, the loans provides funds for buying the former Buick agency building on North Main in Tahoka for headquarters offices of the cooperative which now serves rural customers in Lynn, Garza, Borden, Dawson, Terry, and Gaines counties. Puka-Lambro has leased quarters in the Wharton building.

W. D. Harmon, local manager, states the building will undergo extensive improvements before the move is made. However, there will be the usual red tape before the loan comes through and work can begin.

Most of the preliminary paper work has been completed, and City of Tahoka expects to let the new paving contract in the next few days, states Mayor H. B. McCord.

The City recently voted \$50,000 in bonds for its part, street intersections, in a new paving program and also for a new seal coat on much of the older paving.

Engineering work on the proposed paving has been completed by Roberts, Merriman, Bowden & Isbell, and plans were accepted by the Council Monday night.

Letting of the contract is being held up while the City arranges a financing plan with another agency which will permit property owners to pay out their paving assessments in three to five years.

The City is also laying sewer lines to the new Lockwood Addition, taken into the city limits several months ago, and laying of sewer lines in the Roberts addition has been completed. Also, light and gas utilities are now installing lines in the Lockwood addition.

This latter addition has been bought by Western Builders, Inc., which will lay the paved streets, using the same paving contractor with which the city makes a deal. Western expects to start some new homes in the new addition just as quickly as the paving contract is let.

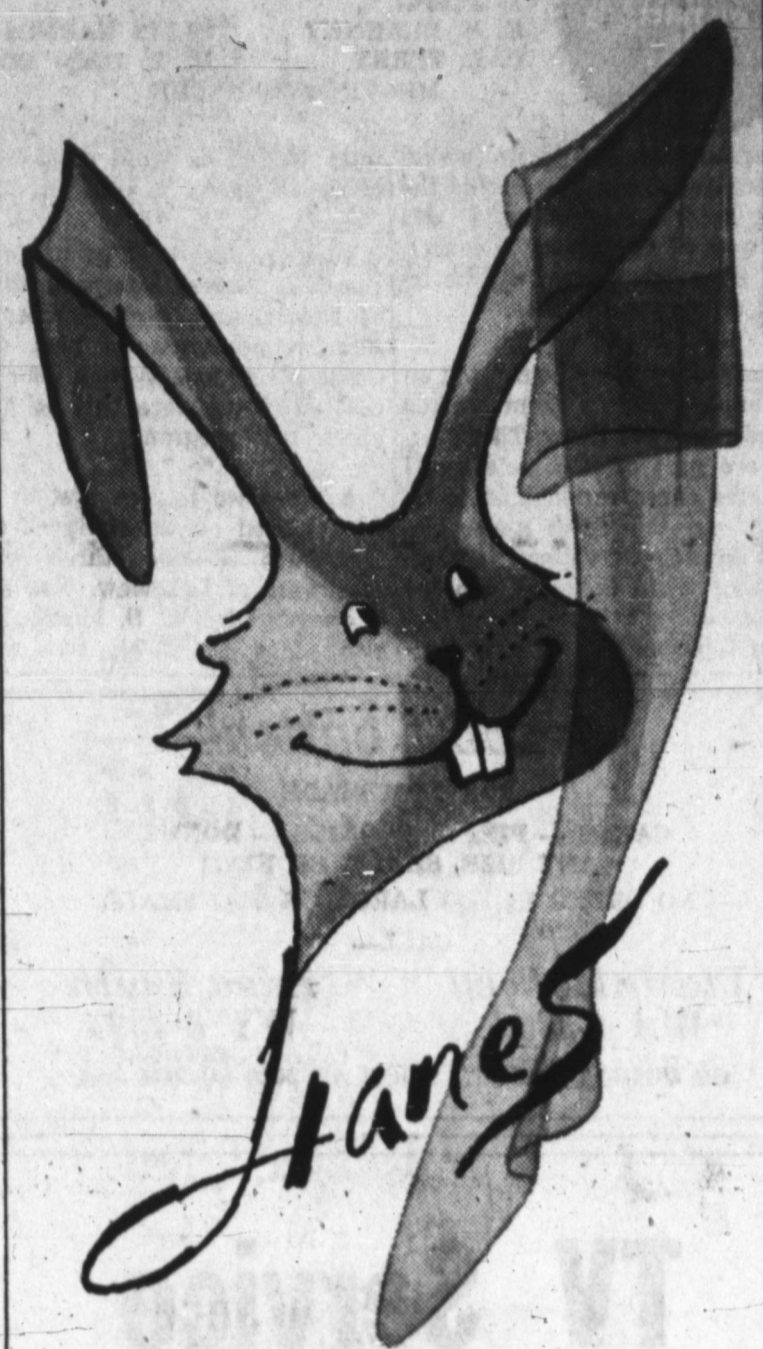

The plan also includes contour farming, conservation cropping system, and proper use of crop resi-

dues to reduce wind erosion and conserve water.

Terraces have been completed on the C. L. Anderson farm northwest of New Lynn. These terraces are being constructed as part of a Great Plains conservation plan, and cost share assistance will be given under this program.

A complete terrace system will be installed on the Sally G. Godfrey farm located three miles southwest of Lakeview. The farm is operated by W. S. Morris, who also plans to install two water-

# Printer's Ink-lings

If you think letters to your congressman and senators don't help sometimes, let them know what the people at home want, you should try writing them occasionally.

As a result of protests from the farming country, notably the Plains, South Texas, Arizona, and California, Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell's move to do away with bracero labor has received a setback for at least two years.

Last week the House Agriculture Subcommittee voted 5 to 0 to rescind the Labor Department's move which would virtually eliminate use of such migrant workers on American farms. In effect, the Subcommittee ruled Mitchell has no authority for issuing some of the regulations he has issued as minimum working standards for the Mexicans are provided for under a U.S.-Mexican agreement.

Mitchell's proposed regulations would make wages, working con-

ditions, housing and transportation standards so strict that the farmer could not use migrant workers.

This country is threatening to go to the mechanical picker, but with such costing from \$9,000 to \$18,000, the small farmer cannot afford such machines.

The "vacation" the Mexican bracero spends in this section each fall is a god-send for him, as he can make more money picking cotton here in one fall than he makes in Mexico in two years. Most of them live in the crudest kind of habitations. One told us a year or two ago his home in Chihuahua was under a tree, with some canvas and tin and board for protection from the elements. The housing furnished him here was a mansion in comparison to that where he was rearing his family.

Louis McKay a while back was recalling the tornado of April 26, 1938, which first hit in Dawson

county in the OK community, proceeded in an east-northeast direction just south of O'Donnell, through the Joe Bailey area, west and north of Draw and off into the brakes northeast of Draw. The tornado got Lewis' house and his year-old twin daughters were almost swept away and both were injured. They are now Mrs. Maurine Wilson of Lamesa and Mrs. Irene Gillespie of Kermit.

Killed in the tornado were a lady in the OK community; Mrs. Vernon Caswell, who lived west of Draw; John Walters and George Walters, son and nephew of the late Mack Walters, then living north of Draw.

Without warning, out of a dark cloud and accompanied by rain and hail, the tornado hit the Draw area at about 6:00 p.m. Clayton Beard drove to the Littlepage place at Midway and called in the news and asked for ambulances and help.

As in most bad tornadoes, many fantastic things occurred in this one. The two Walters' boys and John's sister, Mary Belle (now Mrs. W. I. Dorman of Lubbock) were caught in a car on the road east of the Walters home. The car was torn into a thousand pieces, and a man living on the Carl Williams place looked out the window and saw Mary Belle flying through the air. She landed some distance away and had scarcely a scratch.

Clayton found a bucket of coal oil blown 200 yards from the McKay home and was sitting upright and still half full of the fluid. Mrs. Caswell had just gone in the house.

Chickens were found running around farm places completely plucked of feathers. A windmill was blown away and the suckerrod completely pulled out of the well. No one died in this one.

But, still, tornadoes cover such a narrow path. Since the coming of television, the announcers keep people frantic this time of year for fear of tornadoes. At the same time, we don't worry too much about the terrible carnage on our highways, where many, many times more people are killed than in tornadoes. In fact, we read somewhere a few years ago that more people are killed each year in the U. S. falling in a bathtub than are killed in tornadoes and that more people are injured falling out of bed than are injured in storms. Then, why should we get so frantic? Before TV, we didn't imagine a tornado in every cloud.

We got into trouble again last week. In mentioning some of the kids in our neighborhood, we left out some, and one of them jumped us out about it. Well, let's try it again. There's Tommy Smith in addition to Mike and Susan, and Sudie, Nita and David Glenn in addition to Michael, and Sammy and Jan Ashcraft in addition to Zan. The McCord boys are named Jimmy, Gary and Terry, and we left out Jim Crawford, and somebody says we should have mentioned Becky, Barbara and Lisa Allsup, down in the next block.

There's one young fellow in our neighborhood who gives us a lift everytime we see him, and that's Donnie Hopkins. Critically injured in a tractor accident at Floydada and given little chance to recover and no chance ever to be normal again, Donnie fooled the doctors and continues to make progress. First day he was able to walk to school, he was the happiest boy in town.
