## Contract Is Due On Low Rent Housing

The low bid of \$128,700 of Smith & Wardrop, Inc., of Lubbock on the 14-unit low rent housing project for Tahoka has been approved by the architect and Public Housing Authority officials, and contract for the work is expected to be let shortly, according to J. M. Uzzle, executive director of the Housing Authority of the City of Tahoka.

The duplex homes will be of brick veneer construction and complete in every detail down to landscaping of the yards. Uzzle says. There will be six units near Tahoka City Park for white families, four units for Mexicans in southeast Tahoka, and four units for Negroes in northeast Tahoka.

Uzzle does not know how much delay there will be by FHA in signing of the contract, but has been assured this will come through promptly.

Construction is to start within ten days from signing of the contract.

W. C. Hedrick of Fort Worth is the architect on the project. The housing project will be administered and operated by the local Authority of which A. M. Bray is chairman; A. C. Verner, vice chairman; Harold Green, Dean Taylor and H. B. McCord Jr., directors; and Uzzle, executive director.

## Library Presented New Set of Books

Lynn County Library will receive the eight-volume set comprising the official publications of the 1960 White House Conference on Children and Youth. In all 8,000 books are being given to Texas libraries by Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Meadows of Dallas through a Meadows Foundation grant of \$12,000.

The books, representing the combined findings and thinking of the nation's outstanding leaders in the field of child care, will be a source of authoritative information on the nation's children for years to come. An estimated half million citizens interested in the welfare of children have joined the nation's foremost educators and child care authorities in the gathering of information which will be condensed and incorporated in the books.

The White House Conference, just completed in Washington, D.C. was attended by 7,000 delegates from every state in the union. The conference is called every ten years by the President of the United States to consider issues concerning children and youth.

## Farmers Experimenting With Vegetable Crops

In an effort to find some crop to augment the income from cotton and to take the place of milo, several Lynn county farmers are getting into the vegetable business this year.

Up to 100 acres of irrigated land are being planted to vegetables this spring.

Eighteen portions of the acreage will be in onions, already planted and growing nicely. A. N. Noeman has 25 acres, J. A. Fehseworth 25, Lewis Allsup and Winston Wharton 15, and Bill McNeely 15. This will be sufficient acreage to get a cutter to come in, which is necessary before they can be marketed.

## Junior Baseball Help Is Needed

Very little interest is being shown so far in Little League and Pony League baseball for this summer's play, states A. M. Bray, temporary chairman, succeeding C. W. Conway.

Boys now eight years of age and under twelve, born on or after August 1, 1947, who have not played before should register for Little League immediately with Johnny Wells, player agent, at Tahoka Drug. Pony League players are 13 and 14 years of age. Registration blanks must be signed by parents and accompanied by birth certificates for those who have not certified in previous years.

Work-outs will begin next Tuesday. Mr. Bray says two managers and two coaches are needed for Little League and one manager and one coach are needed for Pony League.

O'Donnell has joined the Pony League this year, making five teams in this competition, along with two teams from Tahoka and one each from Wilson and New Home.

"We must have the interest of the citizens of Tahoka to make our summer baseball successful," Mr. Bray says. "All our help is voluntary, and we are in dire need of managers, coaches, and umpires for both leagues."

## Borrowers Asked To Return Hospital Beds, Wheel Chairs

Anyone having wheel chairs, hospital beds or crutches borrowed from the American Legion or VFW is required to report same immediately to J. M. Uzzle, Tahoka city secretary.

Martin Wuensche Jr., commander of the American Legion Post, says this equipment is needed for emergency use and location of practically all of the equipment is unknown.

The Legion and VFW are supposed to have about eight wheel chairs, eight hospital beds, and 20 or 30 pair of crutches, which they have been loaning out free of charge to people of the county who needed them.

Where such equipment is not in use, people who have any of the items are asked to return them, as other sick people need them. If such is still being used, the user is asked to call J. M. Uzzle at Tahoka City Hall, anyway so that a record may be made. In the future, Uzzle will keep a record of the persons to which such equipment is issued. All the user needs to do is call in his name, and if he is through with such equipment a member of the Legion will pick it up.

In some cases, people borrowing the equipment have passed it on to others. In this case, cooperation of the public is asked in locating such equipment. Thus a favor may be done some person or persons who are ill and in need.

### New Home Gets School Approval

New Home Schools have again been recommended for full accreditation by the Texas Education Agency, Supt. H. L. Miller was informed this week.

Last year, the State Department made extensive recommendations for improvements in the school and threatened removal of accreditation. Two representatives of the department made a survey of inspection of the school in March, and continuation of accreditation was a result of their visit.

During the past year, the school has made a number of minor improvements in both the physical plant and in the curriculum, meeting most of the major recommendations of the State Board. Most of the others can be and will be corrected, Mr. Miller said.

More playground space has already been provided and a modern homemaking cottage erected. This summer, the old building will be removed and artificial lighting improved.

School officials from O'Donnell, Tahoka, Wilson, and New Home met in Tahoka Wednesday to make plans for employment of two guidance counselors for the four schools, whose salaries will be paid by the State.

### Tornado Takes Life of Hogan

Thomas Riley (Ronnie) Hogan, 51, son-in-law of Mrs. D. C. Cooper of 1929 Sweet Street, was one of those killed in the terrible Sunnyside tornado Tuesday night of last week. His wife, Margie, 50, was critically injured, and daughter, Mrs. Milton (Jo) Peoples of Lubbock, was slightly injured.

Funeral services for Mr. Hogan were held Friday at 9:30 a. m. in the First Methodist Church of Littlefield with Rev. Harry Vanderpool of Snyder, Rev. Alby Cockrell of Littlefield, and Rev. C. M. Rogers of Sunnyside officiating. Burial was in Littlefield Cemetery.

Mr. Hogan, wife and daughter, who was visiting the couple from her home in Lubbock, were in their home in the Sunnyside community. He was killed instantly as their home was blown away. Mr. Hogan had both arms, her pelvis and three ribs broken, and received head injuries and severe bruises and lacerations. She is reported improving in a Lubbock hospital and Mrs. Cooper is at her bedside. Mrs. Peoples received light injuries.

Po Hogan Peoples is well known here, having lived with her grandmother and attended the Tahoka schools one year.

Mr. Hogan was owner of the gin at Sunnyside, which was damaged but not destroyed in the tornado. He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. T. R. Hogan of Littlefield, three brothers and a sister.

### QUESTIONS, PLEASE

Question: "What is Lent, Holy Week and Easter?"

Answer: Lent comes from an Anglo-Saxon word meaning "spring." It is a penitential period in the spring covering about forty days in which time preparation for Easter is made. It is interesting to note that the word Lent does not occur one time in the Bible which makes it nothing more than tradition of man. The term "Holy Week" is applied to that week preceding Easter Sunday in which the passion (suffering) of Christ is commemorated. It is also interesting to note that this term does not occur in the Bible which makes it nothing more than tradition of man. Easter is an Anglo-Saxon word taken from the name of an old Teutonic goddess of spring which is taken purely from paganism and applied to Christianity. The word does occur one time in the King James version and was recognized as an error at the time but was used to keep from offending the Catholic church. The sole occurrence is in Acts 12:4 which should have been translated as "passover" and is so translated in every other version known to this writer.

Had it not been for this error in translation the Protestant world would never have had a day called Easter. According to man this day has been set to fall on the first Sunday after the first full moon which occurs either on or after March 21 (vernal equinox). Never have we been authorized nor commanded to set aside one season in the year to celebrate the resurrection of Christ. The Lord instituted His Supper just before His death and said, "This do ye, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me." I Cor. 11:25. Paul goes on to say, "As often as ye eat this bread, and drink of this cup, ye do show the Lord's death till he come." I Cor. 11:26. The apostles and other disciples set the example for us by meeting each first day of the week to commemorate the resurrection of Christ (Acts 2:42; 20:7; I Cor. 16:1, 2). We, too, are to conclude that we are to "show the Lord's death till he come," and this each first day of the week. It is amazing how people will follow tradition in things religious. This is one of the things that the Lord condemned in the Pharisees and he condemns traditionalism in us.

**"SMALL BUSINESS"**

By C. WILSON HARDER

It will probably be around May or June before this session of Congress takes action on taxation, but perhaps this is the time for Congressmen to receive the views of the people.

There are many inconsistencies showing up in the various programs.

For example, there is a drive on to raise Social Security taxes in order to provide for medical insurance. This could probably result in the government virtually fixing medical fees.

Yet, on the other hand, there is a drive to eliminate as income tax deductions the present provisions made for medical expenses.

There is also a move to eliminate income tax provision that makes it possible to deduct money spent for interest on loans, mortgages, et al.

Yet, on the other hand, there is also a drive to permit the government to pay higher interest rates on loans it makes.

This, of course, would result in all the interest rates going up. Thus, government which has already fed the fires of inflation with extravagance, foreign give aways, and other schemes, would again give inflation another boost.

This twin development, if it occurs, raising interest rates, and not permitting tax deductions for interest payments, could easily wipe out entire independent business structure.

When small business today is

able to borrow money for operating or expansion needs, it is having to pay, thanks to government fiscal policies, at least 6%. Unless permitted to deduct interest paid, in many cases firms at this rate would end up in the red.

In addition, many things that small business now sells on installment terms, would soon experience a sales decline when purchasers discover that they could no longer deduct from income tax the interest paid out.

There is also a strong move to again raise the gasoline tax, and also the postal rates. As any small businessman knows, both the gasoline and postage used in operations becomes quite an item of expense.

None of these proposals have much effect on the huge corporations. As big public stock owned corporations, if the interest rates are too high, they just no longer on dividends to stockholders, using their earnings largely for financing. Other taxes are passed along to consumers.

So the net result is that the consumers and small business pay these increased taxes.

There seems to have escaped from official mind the fact that a billion dollar cut in expenditures is the same as a billion dollar increase in taxes.

Yet so far there have been no complete and concrete plans presented for cutting the costs of government. Yet nation's independent businessmen, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, have often pointed out there are ways of cutting huge sums off government expenditures without weakening true national defense one whit.

# New Texas Party Affiliation Law Is Explained By County Demo Chairman

The Democratic Party of Lynn county is offering an explanation of Texas' new "Party Affiliation Law," which calls for a statement of political affiliation, in order to dispell some of the confusion in connection with the same.

S. M. Clayton Jr. of O'Donnell, Democratic chairman of Lynn county, releases the following information to acquaint voters with the new regulation which utilizes the poll tax receipt or exemption certificate for specifying party preference to the voter.

The new "Party Affiliation Law" provides:

1. A change in the form of the poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, providing a space for specifying party affiliation.
2. That judges at the primary election polls stamp the voter's party preference in the provided space.
3. That the party preference blank must remain blank until stamped by the election judge.
4. That presentation of the stamped poll tax receipt or exemption certificate shall be the only means of entrance into a party's political convention.

Points of confusion arose concerning voters who are more than 60 years of age and who in cities of fewer than 10,000 population, automatically are placed on voting lists and do not have to obtain a poll tax receipt or exemption certificate.

Another point of confusion arose over voters who may lose their poll tax receipts or exemption certificates.

**Explanation**  
The Party Affiliation Law provides for handling such cases. In the cases of the elder voters, of whom the poll tax payment or exemption certificate is not required, the primary election judges shall issue the voter a special certificate showing that the voter participated in the party's election. The certificate

shall bear the voter's party preference and shall entitle him, or her, to participate in the party's political conventions.

**Admission**  
Similarly, in case of a lost poll tax receipt or exemption certificate, the primary election judges shall issue a special affidavit of loss. This affidavit will be stamped, showing that the voter has voted and specifying his party preference. The stamped affidavit will be his admission ticket to the party's conventions.

**Purpose**  
Basic purpose of the Party Affiliation Law is to prevent persons of one political party from participating in another party's political conventions. There have been instances of Republicans stampeding Democratic conventions.

The new law applies to the stamping of the poll tax receipts, exemption certificates, affidavits of loss and "over age" certificates of all political parties in Texas.

**Republicans**  
Republicans will not hold a primary election. Their receipts and certificates will be stamped with party preference at the party's conventions.

Importance of the conventions cannot be over-stressed. It is in the precinct conventions of the party, held on the same day as the primary election, in the case of Democrats, that the average voter has his say pertaining to party affairs.

**Nominations**  
It is in the precinct conventions that the nomination of presidential and vice presidential candidates begin in presidential years such as 1960.

Demands of the precinct convention delegates are carried in to county conventions, to state conventions, to the national nominating convention of the party. Obvious, there, is the manner in which a group of one political faith can control the affairs of another party when allowed to participate in the second party's conventions.

The Party Affiliation Law applies to the party affairs.

In the general election of November, 1960, the voter will be confronted with a general election ballot listing both Democrat and Republican candidates (and those of other minority parties).

The voter then is alone with his conscience in following party affiliation.

Charles Townes was in charge of the program.














# Printer's Ink-lings . . .

The Easter "spell" has come and gone, the lilacs, rebuds, and fruit trees have bloomed, the mosquitoes are putting out—and Spring surely must be here!

Do you realize that the Primary election is just two weeks away. We're having a hard time getting warmed up for an election date this early—more than two months earlier than the fourth Saturday in July to which we have become accustomed.

Also, Saturday, May 7, is the only opportunity, Mr. Citizen, you will ever have to assist in the selection of a nominee for President of the United States for the coming four years. This is the date for your precinct convention, and most of us will not be present to make our wishes known.

The convention system as it operates today has become the biggest piece of hocus in our so-called democratic process, in our opinion. In North Tahoka, our precinct, and probably in yours also, the precinct convention is distressingly undemocratic.

If our precinct convention runs true to form on May 7, there will be four or five voters present out of a potential of 692 poll taxes paid, or about 900 eligible voters representing fully 2,000 people. These four or five people at the convention will have everything cut and dried and the so-called

"convention" will be over in about five minutes—with themselves or those who think like themselves appointed delegates to the county convention.

Now, we can't blame these loyal voters who go to and control these conventions. The whole blame rests on me and you! And you and I probably won't be at the precinct convention. But you and I will do a lot of griping about the man who is nominated, to carry the banner of the party in the presidential election.

But, one of the main reasons that voters have quit attending conventions is their disgust with the skulduggery, maneuvering, ram-rodging, and legal mumbo-jumbo used by the politicians to control these meetings from the precinct level to the national convention. There ought to be some changes made. Why not a poll of voters for choice of a candidate in Texas?

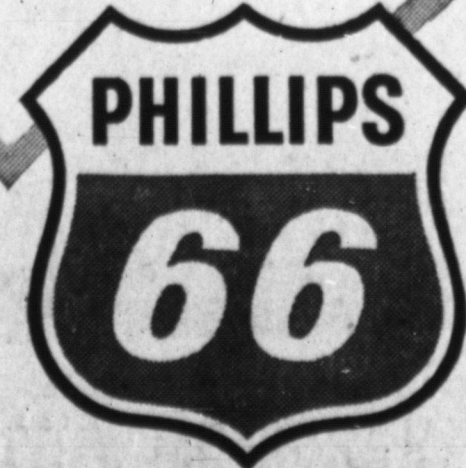

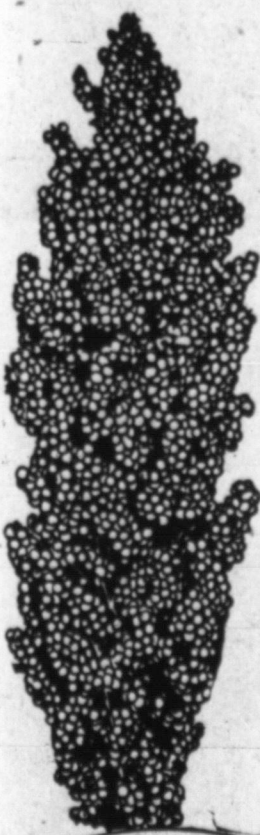
