Lubbock Official Is Speaker Here

Death on the highways is important to the non-drinker, for "you can't just look out for yourself; you've got to look out for your fellow-driver. You've got to be your ellow-driver's keeper.

The speaker pointed out that many highway deaths are caused by drinkers who are not legally drunk. He cited tests as evidence that even minimum drinking affects the driver's perception. Two cocktails have virtually the same effect on a driver that it would have if a person put on dark sunglasses and attempted to drive at


Of the 400 deaths expected on the highways of the nation during the holiday season, a very minute portion will be caused by mechanical failures.
