15-Acre Wheat

The 15-acre marketing quota exemption for wheat production is no longer in effect. Charles G. Bragg, Office Manager of the Lynn County ASCS, underscored this

statement this week. "Many farmers still ask us about this at the ASCS office, Bragg said, "and I want to emphasize this change in the law."

Under the 1962 wheat stabilization program, there is no exemption for a farm which has no 1962 wheat allotment and which did not have wheat for harvest in any one of the 3 years 1959, 1960, and 1961. On such a farm, the entire harvested wheat acreage would be subject to marketing quota penalty, Bragg said. Under previous the first 9 months of 1961 totaled programs, farms that produced no more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest were not subject to marketing quotas even though they had allotments of less than 15

> For 1962, the marketing quota exemption for a farm is the smaller of: (1) 13.5 acres, or (2) the highest acreage the farm had for harvest in the 3-year period 1959, 1960, and 1961. The marketing quota exemption is not an allotment. If the acreage harvested is within the farm allotment, all of the wheat produced on the farm may be marketed free of the marketing quota. If, however, the wheat acreage on the farm exceeds the allotment or the exemption, whichever is higher, the penalty will be computed on the acreage in excess of the allotment.



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The Highway Patrol investigated six accidents on rural highways in Lynn county during the month of September, according to Capt. E. L. Posey, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person killed, two persons injured and a property damage of \$8,320.

The rural traffic accident summary for Lynn county from January through September of 1961 shows a total of 47 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were one person killed and 26 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$40,264.00.

"Shorter days and longer nights spell disaster on the streets and highways," Capt. Posey said. Next time you turn on your headlights, glance at your watch and see how much earlier you are using lights than you did only a week or two ago. And, as time moves on during the next three months, carlights will be needed earlier day by day.

No matter what anyone may tell you as to how good a driver he is after dark, you had better take it with a grain of salt, because no human sees as clearly or as well light. Some people may see better than others, and some may not be bothered too much by bright lights in traffic; but if they will be honest with you, they will admit that they do not consistently employ For Girl Scouts the same driving tactics after dark as they do in the daylight. The veteran Highway Ptarol Supervisor added that night driving is different; therefore, it calls for a driving technique very different from that used during the day-

nomics Division, Agricultural Marketing Service. Output was equal to that of Mainland China and almost 60% higher than that of the Soviet Union—the world's two other largest agricultural producers.

On a per capita basis, our production was double that of the Soviet Union. It was four times that of Mainland China. Record output in the United States was accomplished with 30% fewer workers and about 5% fewer acres of crop land than in 1947-49. There was a 43% increase in yields per acre for field crops

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

Department of Agriculture officials have announced a national marketing quota of 15,714,000 bales and a national acreage allotment of 18. 101,718 acres for the 1962 upland cotton crop. The acreage allotment includes an allocation of 100,000 acres from the national acreage reserve to take care of minimum farm allotments.

The referendum on marketing quotas is to be held December 12. and at least two-thirds of the upland cotton producers voting must approve them if they are to be effective.

Based on recent planting and yield trends, the 1962 allotment is expected to produce about as much cotton as will be used in the 1962-63 season, leaving the carryover on Aug. 1, 1963 at about the same level as the carryover for Aug. 1,

The national acreage allotment for 1962-crop upland cotton will be apportioned to states, state allotments to counties, and the countv allotments to farms. Individual farm allotments will be made available to producers prior to the referendum, the USDA reported.

If marketing quotas are approved in the referendum, price support will be available to growers who comply with their farm allotments at such level as is determined appropriate by the Secretary. If marketing quotas are not in effect for the 1962 upland cotton crop, the allotment program will remain in effect and price support will be available to cooperators at 50 percent of parity.



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
