Tax Collections For Year Above Normal Big Harvest Season Nearing End

have been unusually good accordSkip-Row Rule Tax collections up to January 1 ing to local tax collecting agencies. State and county taxes, on which discount is allowed for payment Helps Farmers a discount is allowed for payment

in October, November or December, are much higher in comparison to city and school district taxes, where no discount is allowed for early payment.

State and county were 80 percent paid up as of January 1, according to George McCracken, county tax assessor and collector. Of the total tax roll of \$247, 232.70 on a county valuation of \$10,956,139.00, a total of \$198, 233.29 had been paid up to January 1. The county rate is \$1.90 and the state rate 42 cents. Property owners in the water district in the north part of the county also pay a five cent water district

Many school and city tax payers do not pay their taxes until January, but 65 percent of the Tahoka school district taxes and been paid to date.

J. M. Uzzle, city secretary reports that \$27,616.63 in city taxes have already been paid out of a total due of \$44,071.89. City valu- crop. ations total \$2,938,105.00, Mr. Uzzle says.

Tahoka School District, according to J. M. Small, tax collector, has collected \$101,536.25 out of a total of \$153,810.17 on a total valuation of \$8,789,287.00.

Many local cotton producers think relaxation of the four-row limitation on "skip-row" planting, announced Wednesday by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman, will be the biggest benefit to dryland cotton farmers that has come in the last few years.

Under the new ruling, farmers may plant two-in and two-out, or any method of skip-row planting, without the blank rows being counted as cotton acreage. In the past, this was limited to four-in and four-out, and anything below this had to be counted as cotton acreage for blank rows.

Tahoka's ginnings had reached 33.632 up to 10:00 a. m. Thursday, but this was an increase of 2,655 bales over the report of a week before for possibly the best record

in history. Considerable cotton is still being ginned from the Gordon, Grassland, Draw, and O'Donnell areas, but strippers are reported to be winding this up rapidly.

O'Donnell reports approximately 40,000 bales ginned in the town. Reports indicate that New Home, Lakeview and Petty have ginned approximately 30,000 bales. The News had no late authoritative report from Wilson, but only a very little "scrapping" remains in that area and about 20,000 bales
