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
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



occurs throughout the world wherever cotton is grown. It is one of the most damaging plant diseases in Texas, and during recent years has caused an estimated \$37 mil-

lion yearly loss to Texas growers. Several races and varieties of this pathogen are known, but only two are widely distributed. The organism enters the plant through open stomata and wounds in the leaves, bolls and stems. The bacteria break down the cell wall of the spongy tissues, releasing cellular juices.

Infected leaves soon turn yellow and are shed, and excessive leaf shedding reduces the yielding ability of the plant. Boll lesions provide ports of entry for boll-rotting fungi, thus bacterial blight is one of the principal causes of boll

The blight organism may overwinter in the soil on undecomposed plant debris, but more commonly is carried from season to season within and on planting seed. Once in a field the disease is spread from plant to plant and from old to new tissues by winddriven, splashing rains. The disease may also be disseminated from field to field by whirlwinds, running water, equipment and gin

Bacterial blight can be controlled by a combination of four practices: rotating cotton with other crops, planting disease-free seed, growing resistant varieties and fertilizing with nitrogen.

No chemical control for bacterial blight is now known, so cultural practices are very important to the grower. For more information on this disease and on preventive cultural practices, ask your county agent for a copy of MP-534, "Bacterial Blight of Cotton."





"What think ye? They answered and said: He is guilty of death." Matt. 26:66.

"Guilty of death" was the verdict of the court that tried Jesus. We cannot imagine a sentence more unjust. Hundreds could rise to tell of the good He had done in their hour of need. A worse threat than this, however, is the so-called Farm Labor Recruitment Bill, S-119, now before Congress. It would create a compulsory closed shop in agricul-Club Thursday night of last week. ture. It would give dictatorial power to the secretary of labor. tess. This Thursday night, guest It would force farmers to assume responsibilities under contracts, without comparable responsibilities for workers.

All of these objections are based upon careful analysis of this bill by such reputable organizations as the American Farm Bureau Federation, the National Cotton Council, Texas Cottonseed Crushers Association, Texas Cotton Ginners Association and many others.

More than opposition to paying higher wages is involved. Farm employment dropped last month to the lowest level of record. There were 6 per cent fewer hired hands, 4 per cent less family labor working than a year ago. The Kennedy administration is asking for power to retire 50 million acres of farm land into parks and recreation areas. Cotton exports are sharply smaller than a year ago. Dairy prices are weak as supplies of products pile up.

How can farmers pay higher wages and all of the fringe benefits that unions demand under! such conditions? The only possible answer is that they cannot stand this last straw on their sore backs —unless they are given more money by the federal government and-or higher support prices for their products.

You, of course, must pay the cost of this, as a consumer and as a taxpayer. So, the farmer's fight against government-imposed controls and a closed shop dictated by Washington, is your fight, too. No matter what you do, no matter where you live, you, too, will lose if the farmer loses.
