Farm Facts

Farmers have long relied on signs to forecast the weather, but today's operations demand more precise information. Bad weather may hinder operations or nullify effectiveness of materials in which they have invested heavily.

The U. S. Weather Bureau, therefore, is providing forecasts tailored specifically to agricultural operations in key areas. News media, the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and other agencies are co-operating.

These services include an agricultural interpretation of the 30-day and 5-day outlook, as well as hourly reports and information at intervals throughout the day on the kind of weather to expect for the next 36 hours and for 24 additional hours.

Also issued are agricultural aviation weather forecasts and summaries during the spraying and dusting seasons. Forecasters are kept posted on "fire weather." Warnings also are issued of unusual disturbances or severe conditions as indicated by radar and other equipment.

Soil temperatures, wind speed and direction, dew, temperatures, and other factors are duly noted.

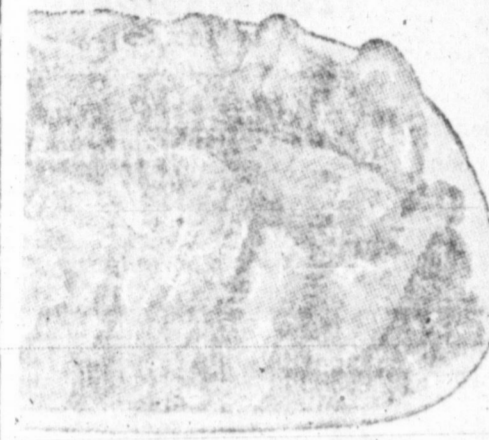

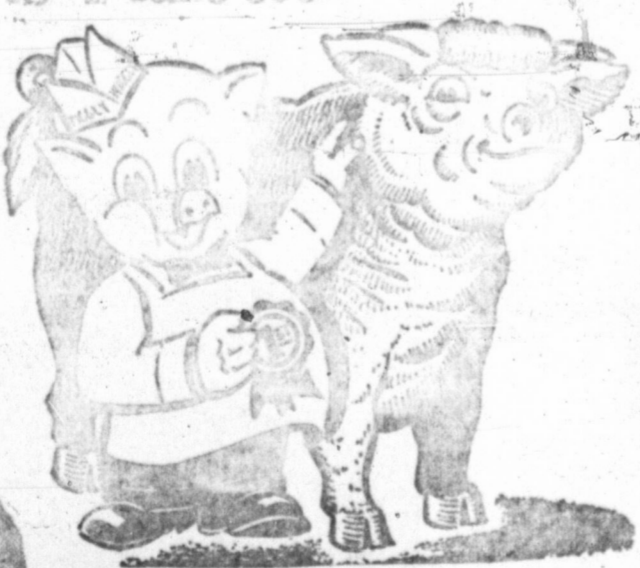

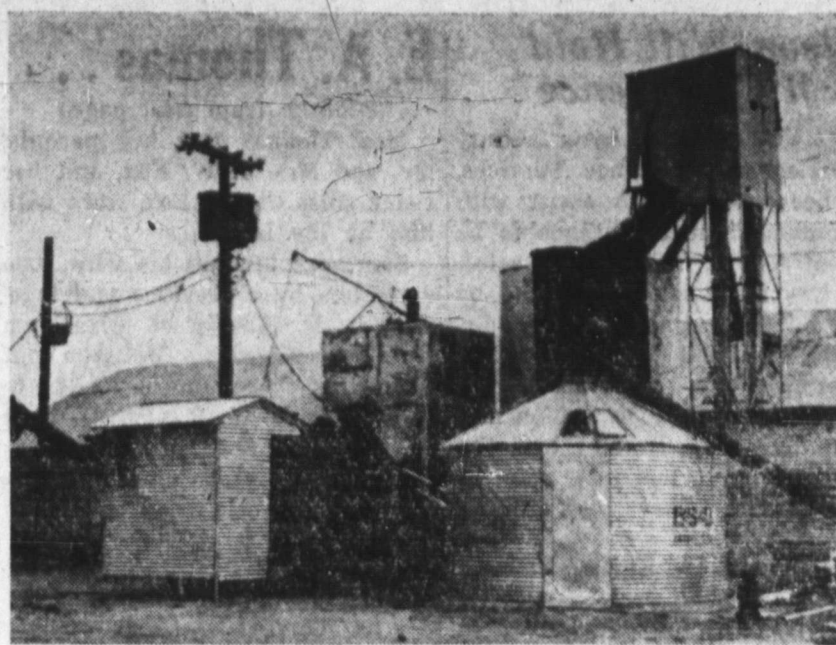

A. Scott has solved his out-water problem on his farm located one mile north and one west of Wayside. Excess water coming in on the north and south sides of the farm. As a result large gullies were washed through the field. A standard terrace system by itself was not enough to control the water. With the aid of the Soil Conservation Service technicians, two waterways were designed and constructed at points where the heaviest washing had occurred.

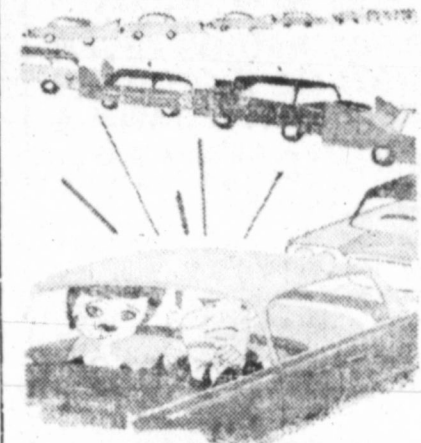


New feed mixing plant recently completed by Tatum Bros.

A conservation irrigation system has been installed on J. T. Forbes' farm located 3 miles west and 2 miles north of Draw. Graded furrows, approximately 450 feet in length, have been laid off and about 4,000 feet of underground pipeline has been installed.

Mr. Forbes will apply about 40 gallons of water per minute per furrow until water has reached the far end, then he will cut his application back to about 20 gallons of water per minute per furrow until about four inches of moisture is replaced over the entire length of run.

Tatum Builds New Feed Plant

In keeping with the new interest in feeding of cattle and hogs on a larger scale by more and more farmers, Leighton Knox, manager of Tatum Bros. Elevators of Tahoka and O'Donnell, announces completion of a bulk feed plant at the local elevators.

The firm has just completed installation of a feed plant designed to blend and mix feeds accurately for any size operation, 1,000 to 6,000 pounds and a daily capacity of 50 to 60 tons.

The centrally located mixer of 6,000-pound capacity is built upon platform scales with seven bulk feed tanks located to load different ingredients into the mixer. All operations can be controlled from within the scale house by simply starting and stopping feeder augurs for desired ingredients. Only one operator is required to handle all operations.

A bulk feed truck to deliver feeds in bulk is also a new feature.

Mr. Knox says cattle feeding is fast becoming a major business in West Texas. Some have been feeding on a smaller scale in the past than was profitable.

QUESTIONS FOR VOTERS

Editor Lynn County News: I would like to pose a few questions for serious consideration, especially all voter readers—questions that I think are pertinent and apropos, viz:

- 1) Do you believe the USA should be and remain an independent republic with all its freedoms as guaranteed by our constitution and bill of rights?
- 2) Do you believe in both individual and states' rights?
- 3) Do you believe in government of, for and by the people?
- 4) Do you believe in individual initiative and private competitive enterprises?
- 5) Do you believe that the federal government derives its powers from the states, and by consent of the governed?
- 6) Do you believe that political trends in Washington have been and now are leading us by wily steps away from our once prosperous, proud, dignified and respected state into a socialist "welfare state" and a possible condition of "police state" eventually?

Everyone should ponder these queries soberly. I cannot answer them for you; but maybe I can submit some data that may stimulate your thinking and spur you to action before it is too late. However, I think most readers from grade 8 upward will readily say "yes" to the first four. And doubtless all of voting age would give a hearty "amen" to all six. But, do you know that our only guarantee of retaining the freedom principles expressed in the first five of them, and the prohibiting of the sixth, is in our constitution as originally written and interpreted by a non-politically minded court? And do you know that should our constitution be mutilated and begin to disintegrate—it already has—that our precious heritage (above named rights) could be lost? It is possible. And do we realize that it is through our own unstudied voting habits (or our negligent behavior in not voting) that has caused the slump in our national prestige, and decline in our capacity for world leadership?

This country is—or was—a representative form of government; but are we sure that our representatives in both houses of congress really represent our ideals and wishes? In many cases I think it doubtful. A Republican senator from Illinois and a Democrat house member from Louisiana publicly stated that their views on matters relating to certain U.N. activities do not reflect the sentiment of their constituents! Isn't that bad? It is not democracy nor is it honesty.

Do we want the U. S. to disarm and turn over all arms, conventional and nuclear, to a "One World" dictatorship headed by known enemies of "capitalism" in general and as the United States in particular? I say NO! But such has been proposed by our top policy planners. What do you say?

How many times have you written your senators or representatives expressing your views on vital legislation topics, or asked for theirs? If we count them on our fingers, I am sure most of us won't have to use both hands. We should all be more concerned than most are about what goes on or comes off at the capitol.

Lobbies are many and powerful there; and these elected men are our servants, not masters. And when they vote or speak not in the best interest of our state and nation we should promptly tell them "where to get off."

Col. Cooper Is Visitor Here

Lt. Col. Truett Cooper of the U. S. Army and family from Fort Monroe, Virginia, have been here this week visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Cooper, and her mother, Mrs. George Knight of Lubbock, and other relatives. The Coopers have two children, "Butch," age 12, and Linda, age two.

Col. Cooper is executive officer of the Army School headquarters at U. S. Continental Army Command at Fort Monroe, near Norfolk, which is another interesting assignment he has had during his 20 years of service in the Army.

In his present responsible position, Col. Cooper has in his department the Command General Staff College at Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas, the Army War College at Carlisle Barracks, Penn., and 33 other Army schools in the continental United States, in which there are 150,000 resident students, 200,000 non-resident or correspondent students, and 7,000 students from allied nations.

He and his family flew here two weeks ago, and the wife and children visited here while he was setting up a Senior Officers' course in modern warfare at Fort Bliss, El Paso.

Truett is a little modest and was reluctant to give The News all this information without "pumping." However, he is a graduate of Tahoka High School, was commissioned a second lieutenant when he graduated from Texas A. & M. 20 years ago and immediately entered the Army.

In World War II, he served in Australia, and shortly was assigned to General Douglas MacArthur's staff and advanced with the Army up through New Guinea, the Admiralty Islands, the Philippines, and to Japan. In the Leyte invasion—and in the taking of Manila, Cooper was the "eyes" of MacArthur flying over enemy territory in a Cub plane to observe the movements of the enemy.

He later became food administrator for Korea, was a military advisor to Turkey, had a long "hitch" in Germany, and in between taught in the Army at Fort Sill, Fort Leavenworth, and in San Antonio. He is reportedly in line to a full Colonel within the next two years.

Guided Missile Show At Reese

One of the newest, most versatile Air Force strategic missiles, the GAM-77 "Hound Dog" will be on display at Reese Air Force Base, near Lubbock, May 12 during the annual observance of Armed Forces Day.

Missile experts from the Orientation Group of the Air Force at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, will be with the missile to explain and answer questions. The public is invited to see the "Hound Dog" and many other displays on May 12.

The missile is a supersonic air-to-surface weapon carried successfully under the wings of Strategic Air Command B-52 intercontinental jet bombers to form a powerful, deceptive weapons system. Two Hound Dogs on a B-52 can be released more than 500 miles from the main target to quash enemy defense centers and clear the aircraft's path, or to destroy the main objective itself with nuclear warheads.

An air breathing air-to-ground guided missile, the Hound Dog measures 42 feet, 6 inches long and 9 feet, 4 inches high, with a span of 12 feet, 2 inches. It has a range of more than 500 miles and altitude capability of more than 50,000 feet, with speeds from 1.8 to 2.2 times the speed of sound. Maximum gross take-off weight is 9,600 pounds.

The power system is a 7,500-pound thrust J-52 turbojet; guidance is inertial, and the warhead is nuclear.

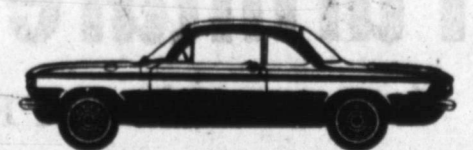
