Financial Drive For Boys Ranch Starts

Substantial support for South Plains Boys Ranch, which lost its main building by fire Tuesday of last week, is in prospect as a result of action by the newly organized Tahoka Jaycees.

The Jaycees have raised \$1,500 in cash, \$963.75 of which came as the result of a door to door canvass of homes last Friday night.

But, the big blow to support of the project came Wednesday night of this week when Tahoka Jaycees met with the Lubbock Jaycees and were promised full cooperation of that body, which expects to start a drive today for Boys Ranch funds.

Lubbock Avalanche-Journal and television stations KCBD and KDUB have also promised full support. A Lubbock architect has offered his services free of charge to draw plans for a permanent concrete block building to house the ranch boys. Lubbock Union Labor has agreed to donate most of the labor for construction of such a building.

Lubbock Jaycee and press representatives were to meet here Thursday afternoon to inspect the site, take pictures, interview boys, and complete plans for the drive.

Local Jaycees are in the process of getting the Boys Ranch approved as a special project of all South Plains Jaycee organizations.

Wilson Lions Club, through President Hubert Heinert, has already made a \$100.00 contribution to get the ranch on its feet. Mr. Teinert brought the check to Tahoka last Thursday.

Charter for South Plains Boys Ranch has been received, as a non-profit organization, approval having previously been received from State Welfare agencies, and a permanent board of directors is in the process of being set up.

Police Chief Jack Miller, originator of the ranch idea, owner of the land, and leader in the project, has agreed to lease the land to the organization on a 99-year basis, sell the land to the body, or sign an option to sell.

Attending the meeting with Lubbock Jaycees were: Mel Leslie, Mayor; Jack Miller, head of the ranch; Jaycee President Jesse Dorman, and members Binie White, Wayne Huffaker, Wiley Curry, Ike Carter, and Harry Lee Short.

New Home Boys Will Get Honor

Two New Home boys, John Lynn Edwards and Ronnie Mouser, are in line to receive the Lone Star Farmer degree, the highest award possible on a state level in Future Farmers of America work. The degrees will be presented them at the State FFA meeting this summer, according to Terry Brown, a friend.

Both boys are Juniors in New Home High School, have good scholastic averages, FFA chapter officers, and members of the FFA Dairy judging team competing at A&M College this week in the state contests, and both have had milk, cotton, and swine as projects.

John Lynn, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Edwards, is president of the FFA chapter and vice-president of the student council. Ronnie, son of Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Mouser, is FFA vice president and president of the student council.

Boys on the Dairy judging team in the state contest are Edwards, Mouser, and Basil Salmon, having made a good showing last week in the contests at Tech.

This is the second fellowship she has received. Last summer she attended Texas Christian University under the program.

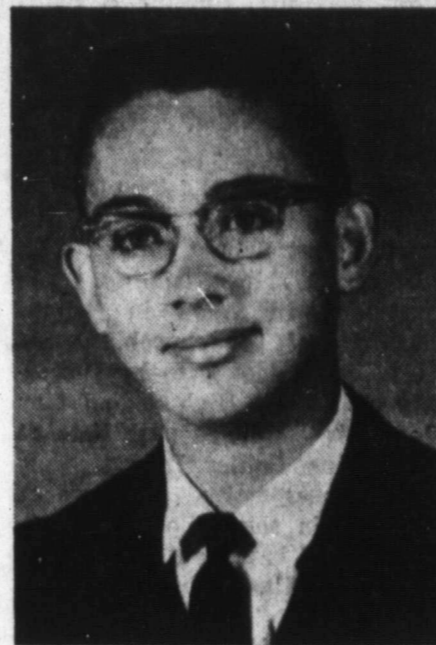
Mrs. V. C. Lauderdale was dismissed from the Tahoka Hospital Tuesday morning. She was in the hospital with a back injury.

Brewer Re-elected, Cain Is In Run-off, Local Voting Is Light

Republican Party Holds Primary

Sixty-two votes were cast in the Lynn county Republican primary election last Saturday.

For governor, Jack Cox of Breckenridge received 39 votes and Roy Whittenburg of Amarillo received 18.

For lieutenant governor, Bill Hayes of Temple received 49 and Kellis Dibrell of San Antonio, 8.

For congressman-at-large, Joe Phillips of Lubbock received 50; Desmond Berry of Houston, 7; and Giles Miller of Dallas, 2.

On the race horse betting poll, 49 opposed and 10 favored.

On abolishing the poll tax, 39 were against abolishment and 15 for.

The Republicans took a poll on the Padre Island park issue, and 10 voted in favor of a federal park, 11 in favor of a state park, and 13 were against any kind of a park.

Larry Hagood was elected the county chairman, C. Edmund Finney precinct chairman for Tahoka; Roland Stegemoeller, Wilson; and Mrs. C. N. Hoffman, O'Donnell.

Hagood said he was hoping for fifty votes, and was therefore well pleased that 62 voted in the Republican primary.

Cain, Pendleton In Run-Off Race

Jerry Cain, Tahoka, is in the run-off Democratic Primary election, set for June 2, with R. G. (Randy) Pendleton of Andrews, who led the four-man race on the big vote he received in his home county.

Highway Work Scheduled Here

Fourteen miles of retopping work and three miles of new farm-to-market road are scheduled for Lynn county this summer, according to announcement of O. L. Crain, district engineer, Texas Highway Department.

Bids will be received May 22 on resurfacing 13.7 miles of the old part of U. S. 87 from a point two miles north of Tahoka to the Lubbock county line. The new lanes are now under construction to make this a four-lane divided highway, and the two old lanes are being rebuilt.

New farm-to-market paving will be the three mile gap south from the intersection of FM 211 and FM 1073, two miles east of Lakeview, south to intersect FM 1317, one mile west of Petty Gin. Estimated cost of \$83,000.

Wilson Team Is Second At A & M

The Wilson Dairy Products team won second in the State FFA judging contest held at College Station, May 5. In the Dairy Products division there were 61 teams, and one hundred and eight individuals participated. Keith Sander was fourth and highest individual in the contest. Other team members were Ray Ehlers and Tommy Swann.

The livestock judging team, Bobby Stone, Billy Baker, and Larry Mears, placed 27 out of 83 teams. The poultry team, Gene Herzog, Ted Bartley, and Rodney Crews, placed 40 out of 78 teams.

The boys were accompanied to College Station by their vocational agricultural instructor Bobby Lee.

New Home Youth Injured In Fall

William Lee Shockley, 12 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee M. Shockley, Jr., of New Home was injured Monday afternoon when he fell from a school bus near his home in the Joe Stokes community, six miles northeast of New Home.

He is in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where his condition is not entirely known at this time, although it is considered serious. He received head lacerations and a concussion.

The New Home school bus was slowing to stop near his home when the boy fell from the door of the vehicle.

E. C. Houchin Gets Prize Winning Bass

E. C. Houchin of route 1, Slaton not only is telling a big "fish story," but has the picture, certificate and news stories to prove it.

This is the one that didn't get away.

Houchin won the Grand Prize in the bass division of the Lake Mathis Fishing Rodeo near Corpus Christi last week end after catching a six pound, six ounce bass on a rod and reel. It won the daily prize on Thursday and the overall bass championship at the end of the eight-day rodeo in which 700 fishermen participated.

He was accompanied on the trip Wednesday by Troy Brown and Bobby Johnson of Hale Center and their wives and children.

On Friday Mr. Johnson caught a three pound bass and won the daily prize.

Mr. Houchin's catch was the largest bass ever to be caught in the lake since it opened in 1928.

In addition, the group caught 300 cat fish from one-half pound to three pounds.

A comparatively light vote of 1,883 was cast in Lynn county Saturday in the Democratic primary election, with voting going about as expected in most races.

Only local contest was for County Commissioner of Precinct 2, with present incumbent Woodrow (Ode) Brewer winning a 258 to 143 vote victory over his opponent, Clarence Williams.

In a write-in campaign, Harry L. Roddy, retired rural mail carrier, defeated C. A. Clem, present incumbent as Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, Tahoka, who had not filed for a place on the ballot. Roddy received a total of 39 votes, 17 in North Tahoka, 17 in South Tahoka, and five in West Tahoka. Mr. Clem received 10 votes, all in North Tahoka. J. D. Polk received 4 write-in votes in North Tahoka, and 2 in West Tahoka. Earl Gridler received 7 write-in votes in South Tahoka.

G. S. Perez was elected Constable by write-in, receiving 20 votes, 10 of which were in North Tahoka, 8 in South Tahoka, and 2 in West Tahoka. The county, The News is informed, pays \$1.00 a year to the constable.

Jerry Cain, candidate for State Representative from the 75th district, received a fine vote from his home county of Lynn, but faces a run-off battle with R. G. (Randy) Pendleton of Andrews, who piled up a big vote in his more populous home county to take a commanding lead for the office. Cain received 1,358 votes in Lynn county to 172 for Pendleton. The two other candidates, Robert E. Owen of Seminole and Don Grimes of (Cont'd on Back Page)

Local Students Win High Scores

Scores have just been received on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying tests which were taken in March.

About 80 percent of the junior students taking the test scored above the middle of all those in the nation taking the test.

According to the report received by Clifton Gardner, high school principal, half of the juniors taking the test were in the upper one-fourth.

Exceptionally high scores were made by eight students. Those scoring in the high bracket were Billy Clinton, Craig Leslie, Alfred Lawrence, Jimmy Wright, Tony Spruiell, Andy Bray, Sandra Reid, and Sharon Drager.

There is a possibility that some of the juniors will qualify and be given another test to qualify for a scholarship or to be given Letters of Commendation by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation.

Wilson Students Are Rated High

Seven of the juniors in the Wilson High School made scores on the upper 25 percent of students in the Nation on the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Tests according to a report just received by D. H. Koeninger, high school principal.

The students making the highest scores in order from the top were: Allen Wuensche, Jerelene Wied, Sandra Lumsden, Sandra Behrend, Billy Hatchell, Don Schneider and Helen Schneider.

The 14 juniors taking the tests scored a total average of 65 percent or better than 64 of each 100 taking the test over the nation.

The big one is over, but it's no less important than the run-off primary coming up in less than a month. In fact, voters in the farming country had better do some careful figuring before they cast their ballots in the one coming up.

As expected, Lynn county gave Jerry Cain a wonderful vote for State Representative, but he's going to need a lot of help to win over the Andrews county man.

In the governor's race, it is John Connally of Fort Worth and Don Yarborough of Houston, two new-comers on the Texas political scene. Neither is friendly to the farming country, as Connally has pitched his appeal to the city voters. He is considered a moderate,

and some are calling him a conservative. On the other hand, Yarborough is an ultra-liberal, backed by AFL-CIO and the ADA crowds. West Texas failed to stay with Marshall Formby as it should.

West Texas and the farming country should be behind Preston Smith, an old Dawson county farm boy who has done well by Lynn county as a State Senator, in his up-hill battle in the run-off against Jimmy Turman. For your information, Turman is backed by Union Labor, and Labor is no friend of the farmer.

One race hard to figure out was the contest for Congressman-at-Large, in which the run-off is between Woodrow Wilson Bean of El Paso and Joe Pool of Dallas. This fellow Bean, almost an unknown, is backed by Union Labor also, but a lot of Lynn county farmers and others voted for him. A few days before the primary, it was revealed that he had not filed an income tax return since 1952, which probably got him a lot of votes. Pool is a conservative opposed to excessive government spending programs and a bitter enemy of the Labor Unions.

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Ever since we can remember, the NEA and other educational circles have rated Texas' support of public education 30 to 40-odd down the list of states. We don't know the system used to rate Texas so low, but we think most of this information about Texas' rank is a lot of bunk. According to figures of U. S. Dept. of Commerce, just released, "Texas in the fiscal year ending June 1961 paid out the nation's fifth largest amount of money for educational purposes," being exceeded only by California, New York, Michigan, and Pennsylvania. Furthermore, the report says Texas has more than doubled its out-go for education in the past decade.

Those who rate Texas and some other states so low fail to state the cost-of-living index in the four states named above is 25 to 30 percent higher than the average for Texas. Illinois and Ohio are usually rated a way up high on the list. But, we are told on good authority, each of these states still has several hundred one- and two-room schools. Figures don't lie but prevaricators sometimes juggle figures.

Speaking of education, Ernest Herring says instead of Federal education aid for "yokels" out in the "sticks," he believes the boys in Washington need to take a course in fourth grade arithmetic.

The News has been asked to identify the Walter Thomas Jr., buried in the Thomas plot of Grassland Cemetery in 1943. Mrs. E. A. Thomas says Walter Jr. was the son of Mrs. Maude Thomas of Graham Chapel and the late Walter Thomas, born following the death of his dad. 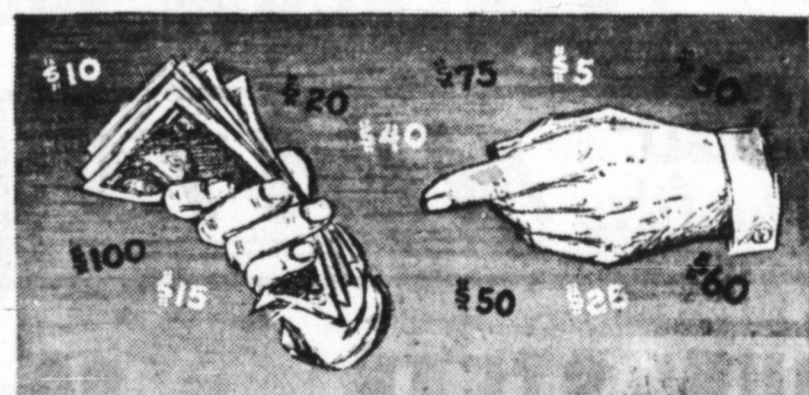

QUESTIONS, PLEASE

QUESTION: DOES THE BIBLE SAY THAT BAPTISM SAVES YOU?

ANSWER: The only answer that can be given is YES! (1 Pet. 3:21) "The like figure whereunto even baptism doth also now save us, (not the putting away of the filth of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience toward God.) by the resurrection of Jesus Christ."

The apostle affirms that water, utilized in baptism, "after a true likeness," of that characteristic of the deliverance of Noah and his family from the old world, now saves. "After a true likeness doth now save you, even baptism" is, literally, in the Greek text, "Which antetype is now saving you, even baptism." The salvation of Noah and those with him is thus made a type of the deliverance which the sinner receives in passing through the waters of baptism. The "likeness" obtains in the following manner: (1) In the waters of the flood bore up the ark and delivered its occupants from the destruction of the antediluvian world; (2) these waters separated those who were saved from those who drowned in them; (3) the flood destroyed the evils of the old world and enabled Noah and his family to emerge into a new existence. In like fashion, (1) baptism is the final condition in a plan through obedience to which one is en-

abled to escape the condemnation of the lost. (Mark 15:15, 16.) (2) Baptism designates the line of demarcation between the saved and the lost. (3) In baptism the "old man of sin" is buried, and from its watery grave one comes forth to "walk in newness of life." (Rom. 6:4.)

It should be noted: The baptism which is here declared to save is water baptism—baptism being the antetype of the water of deliverance in the flood. "Which also..." is a reference to water, ordinary water, the same kind of water in the flood. The baptism which saves is, therefore, water baptism.

The mention of water in connection with Noah's deliverance from the old world immediately suggested to Peter a resemblance which exists in the water of our salvation, "even baptism." It should be noted that Peter does not affirm that Noah and his family were saved BY water, nor IN water, nor FROM water; they were saved THROUGH water, i.e., the water was the means through which God exercised His saving power. Following "a true likeness" baptism "saves now, not of course as a Saviour, but as an instrument through which God exerts saving power. We must understand that the power of forgiveness resides in God and that baptism is a condition precedent to receiving salvation from God's hand.

Lynn Home Demonstration Clubs Observing 38th Year, History Reveals

(By Mrs. Wilmer Smith)
During the week of May 6-12, the H. D. clubs of Lynn County are observing National H. D. Club Week, and the 38th anniversary of H. D. club work in Lynn County. Histories of local clubs are being studied and written.

Through the efforts and promotion of such county citizens as Mrs. Lonnie Lumsden, the late Mr. Walter May, and others, H. D. club work was begun in Lynn County May 1, 1924 when Miss Millie M. Halsey (the late Mrs. E. I. Hill) came to Tahoka as the first agent.

Miss Halsey's major concern at this time was to help the women preserve the great variety of foods raised by each family at that time. The pressure cooker had just come into use, and for Lynn County homemakers, these became the "canning years," and the pressure cooker the marvel of the home. Supervising the canning of one beef in one day was just an average day for Miss Halsey, but the day she supervised the canning of three in one day was called one of her busier days. Neighbors met in the homes of three different members to assist with the canning, and Miss Halsey supervised all three operations by driving from one home to the other. A "hotel type" cooker was owned by Mrs. W. C. Huffaker, Sr., however, most of the canning was done in a large family-type cooker such as the one owned by Mrs. A. R. Hensley at that time.

The four "charter clubs" organized when Miss Halsey began her work May 1, 1924, were the Draw, Midway, New Home and Wilson clubs. Reports are not available from all of the original clubs, but Mrs. Frank Lisemby, Sr. says that

one of the first club meetings of the Midway club was held in her home, and Miss Halsey "gave a demonstration on the culling of hens." Among those present for the meeting were Mrs. J. R. Strain, Mrs. I. M. Draper, and Mrs. T. B. Cowan, Sr.

At New Home, the first club meeting was held in the home of Mrs. H. R. Minor, 1½ miles southeast of New Home. "An all-day meeting was held, and Miss Halsey and the members canned an entire beef. To make the meeting even more outstanding, the school children came to the meeting for lunch." The first officers of this club were Mrs. J. B. Love, Mrs. Joe W. Armontrout, and Mrs. R. H. Bates.

Even though the Dixie club was not one of the charter clubs, it was organized during the first year, and is one of the few that has been in continuous activity since 1924. The average membership has remained approximately 20 members, and its constant aim has been to "learn how to live today—to make tomorrow better."

The first yearbook for the county was published in 1926 by the Lynn County News Press. Twelve clubs were now active in the county. These were the Dixie, Draw, Redwine, Edith, Gordon, Grassland-Magnolia, New Lynn, Morgan, New Home, O'Donnell, T-Bar, Wells, and Wilson clubs. The primary aims of these clubs were "to develop an abounding faith in the importance of work; develop the ideals of true economy and thrift through systematic conservation and the elimination of needless waste; to encourage home industries; to foster the underlying

The value of leaving crop residue on the soil surface to control erosion and reduce evaporation was very apparent. One plot of cotton produced a bale per acre on four inches of total moisture where evaporation was completely eliminated. Plastic covering was used to completely seal off evaporation as well as any additional moisture entering the soil.

Approximately eighty people attended the annual affair.

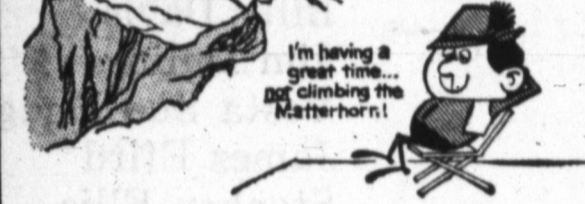

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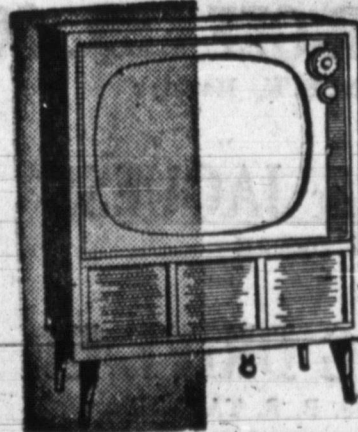

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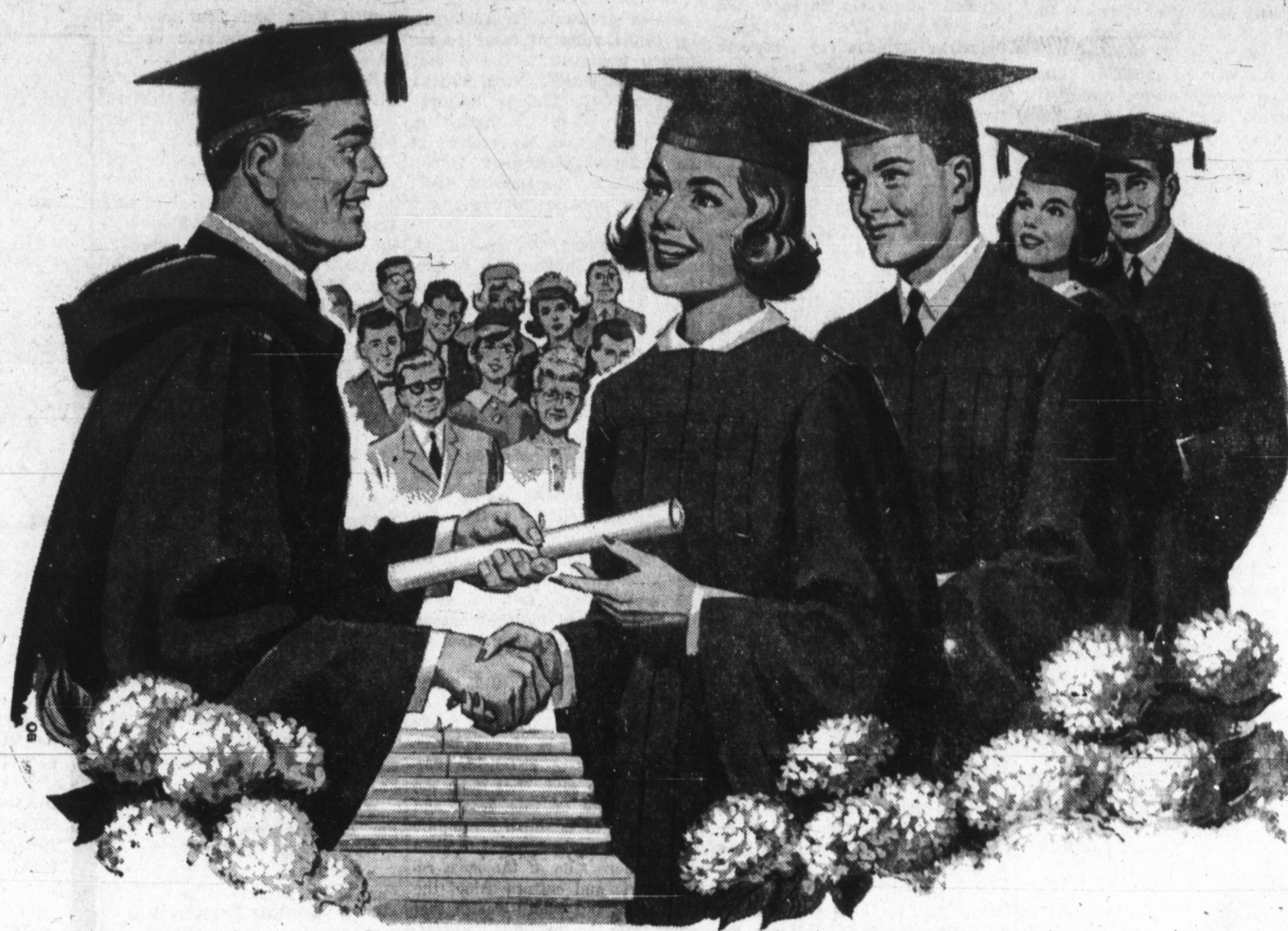

(Cont'd. from Page 1, Sec. 2) principles of good dress; and to develop leadership through and for community life." Their home industries included (1) a one-acre garden, (2) have 100 hens, standard bred to lay 120 eggs per year, (3) one acre of orchard, and (4) enough dairy cows to furnish each member of the family 3 glasses of milk per day and enough butter for table use.

The county's second agent was Miss Thelma Greenwade (now Mrs. G. B. Sherrod) who began her work in 1928 with 16 active clubs. Since the members had received 4 years of intensive training in cooking and canning, Miss Greenwade stressed sewing and home improvement. The first state Living Room Improvement Contest was won by Mrs. Ed Anderson of the Slash-L Club of Lynn County.

In 1928 two fairs were held, one at O'Donnell, and one at Tahoka. These were held in tents, and were very successful when it wasn't raining. Winning exhibits were taken to the Dallas Fair.

A major project in March of 1929 was furnishing, preparing, and serving a lunch for 800 persons attending the annual meeting of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce held in Tahoka. Each club provided 12 chickens for the meat. The desert was "home-made ice cream and angel food cake." They made over \$400, so were able to send 11 members to the A. & M. Short Course. Those going were Mrs. Loyd McCormick, Mrs. J. R. Strain, Mrs. A. L. Faubin, Mrs. J. B. Lowe, Mrs. S. M. Clayton, Mrs. J. O. Patterson, Mrs. Georgia Cook, Mrs. L. C. Crews, Mrs. G. W. Spears, and Mrs. Lit Moore, Sr.

During the "depression years," the clubs did much canning for the Red Cross. A beef furnished by Mr. W. D. Nevel was canned for this purpose.

As the needs have changed over the past 38 years, the activities of the clubs have changed. A major concern this year (1962) is the proper management of time and resources, and the proper placement of values.

During the years since its beginning, 11 agents have served Lynn County. Other clubs have been organized, and some have ceased to meet because of community changes. The Joe Stokes Club was organized in 1939 with Mrs. I. L. Johnson as president. The West Point club was organized during the earlier years, and is still an active club. Mrs. Roy Stephens is the president.

The latest club to be organized in the county was the Tahoka Young Homemakers' Club which says Dunlap is the president, Mrs. Jo Ann Hammonds, vice president, began January 23, 1962. Mrs. Pat and Mrs. Gwen Seales is Secretary-Treasurer.

Members of the Lynn County clubs have made a contribution to area, state, and national homemakers' activities. In 1929, Mrs. R. W. Fenton, Sr., of Tahoka, was named one of the five Master Homemakers of the state, and was

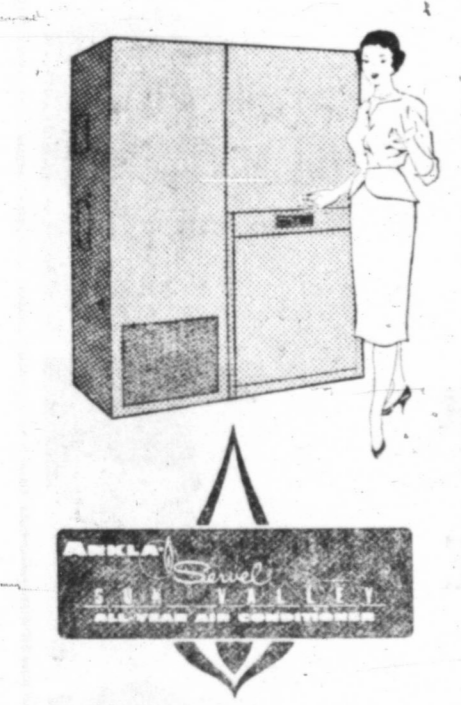
