Courteous Employee Contest Set Up Here

Customers of Tahoka stores and offices are being asked to vote each month on the "most courteous employee" in town, the winner each month, beginning the month of June, will receive a \$10.00 cash award, and a winner for the year will also be selected to be honored at the annual Tahoka Farmer-Businessman banquet.

The contest, a series of contests, is being sponsored by Tahoka Chamber of Commerce under the direction of Harold Roberts and Elbert King.

The project is another in a series being promoted by the C. of C. to help make Tahoka a more friendly town and to help sell Tahoka to its own citizens.

Elsewhere on this page is a ballot which anyone may use in voting for any store or office employee in Tahoka. These should be mailed to the C. of C. Although the contest does not start until June 1, Roberts says there is no limit in time when employees may attempt to be more courteous to the customers. Therefore, customers may start now mailing in ballots for the month of June.

Employees of all stores and offices are eligible whether the proprietor is a member of the C. of C. or not. Anyone may vote. The clerk or employee receiving the most nominations in a given month will be declared the winner.

Tahoka Will Close On Memorial Day

Most Tahoka businesses and offices will be closed all day next Wednesday, Memorial Day, in honor of the dead of foreign wars.

This is one of five holidays taken annually by the business firms, the other four being New Year's, July Fourth, Thanksgiving, and Christmas.

Girls Coach Is Named For School

Miss Marsha Scoggin, graduate of Wayland Baptist College and a member of the Flying Queens basketball team, has been employed as girls basketball coach in Tahoka High School, according to school officials.

She will receive her B. S. degree from Wayland this spring and will move to Tahoka some time this summer if work is available and when she can find a furnished apartment or small furnished house.

A student at Wayland for four years, she lettered in basketball as a forward all four years. She was a United States representative that played for this country in the Pan American games in Chicago, and was also a representative of the United States when this country's team played Russia both in this country and in Russia.

A native of Collinsville, Texas, Miss Scoggin also played high school basketball there and was captain of her team for two years.

O'Donnell Sets Integration Vote

An election has been called for June 1 by the O'Donnell Consolidated Independent School District board of trustees to determine whether or not schools will be integrated there. The election was called after a petition was submitted to the board on May 14.

The proposition to appear on the ballot is the following: "Shall the Board of Trustees of the O'Donnell Consolidated Independent School District authorized to abolish the dual public school system of the Consolidated Independent School District have the right, and be O'Donnell Consolidated Independent School District and to abolish arrangements for transfer out of the O'Donnell Consolidated Independent School District for students of any minority race?"

The election will be held at the O'Donnell High School.

The question is being put to the school district since it is becoming increasingly difficult to maintain a school for colored students in that district, and to retain state accreditation for the public schools because of that fact, citizens have reported.

Methodists Will Attend Meeting

Methodist pastors and layman delegates from Lynn county will attend the Annual Northwest Texas Conference beginning Monday afternoon in Big Spring.

Unless plans are changed, Rev. J. B. Thompson will be returned to Tahoka, The News is informed. Since all other Methodist pastors in the county have been on their present charges only a year or two, there may be no changes in these assignments.

Otis Spears, superintendent of schools, is the official delegate from the First Methodist Church of Tahoka. Several members of the local church expect to attend some of the Conference sessions.

New Auditor For County Contracted

Robt. E. Abbe, local certified public accountant, has been given the job of auditing the county's books, states County Judge W. M. Mathis.

Harold Wine of Ballinger has been doing the audit work the past several years, but Mr. Wine died a few months ago.

South Plains Jaycee Clubs Propose Support For Local Ranch For Boys

Fifty Jaycees from four South Plains towns met here Thursday night of last week in a dinner session at the City-Legion building to discuss plans for a financial drive to support the South Plains Boys Ranch building program. Clubs represented by from two to 12 members included Lubbock, Idalou and Greenfield, Tahoka had 20, and Jense one.

Jesse Dorman, president of the local Jaycees, was master of ceremonies, explained the proposed project and its need, and Harry L. Short told of the plans and financial progress of the local drive.

Jack Miller, executive director of the home for boys, told the history of the organization setting up the ranch, the dire need for

such an institution, and the loss by fire of the home building on May 1.

Bill Adams, president of the Lubbock club, suggested that all South Plains clubs take on the project and "get the thing rolling." He said they had received much encouragement in Lubbock, but had not received the proper publicity to date and were seeking to put over a successful drive.

He declared they had assurances of support from Preston Smith, candidate for lieutenant governor; Waggoner Carr, in the run-off for attorney general; "Doc" Blanchard, newly elected state representative; the Board of Realtors, Union Labor, some bankers, and an arch-

Drouth Continues To Plague Area

Drouth conditions continue over the South Plains, and farmers and others are beginning to get nervous about the prospects for a crop this year.

Farmers would like to have their cotton up and growing by now, although it is possible to plant successfully up to the first of July.

There is an estimated total of 70,000 acres of irrigated cotton land, but some of this has not had a good start and a large acreage of irrigated crops were destroyed by hail Wednesday of last week.

In fact, the hail last week was more extensive and damaging than indicated by The News in last week's issue, when estimates were hurriedly gathered on Thursday morning.

Practically all crops were wiped out across a wide strip from a point southwest of West Point all the way to the Lubbock county line west of Slaton.

Except for irrigated cotton, most of the county has little or no dryland cotton up and growing. Some had been planted and some was up but much of this was damaged by the high dry winds and died.

Lynn county farmers are an optimistic lot, however, and have not given up yet.

He will arrive here about the middle of July for a visit in the homes of Rotarians for several weeks.

Bartlett will receive a degree in electrical engineering from King's College in the University of Durham in June. He is the son of G. Bartlett, Esq., of "Bristow," Ham Lane, Lenham, Maidstone, Kent, who is a bank manager.

Born in Leicester, he lived six years in Bristol. The family's present home in Kent is named "Bristow" which is the oldest known spelling for Bristol and means "little town on the bridge."

As an Experiment Ambassador he said, "I have always taken a keen interest in America and will welcome the opportunity of living in an American family. I have considerable experience of the way engineers are trained in this country and would be extremely interested to compare our methods with those of America."

Garbage Pick-Up Will Be Increased

'Are your garbage cans filled and overflowing?
There's a reason.
There have been no trash pick-ups since last week end, but the garbage truck will be giving the citizens of Tahoka relief today and tomorrow.

The City of Tahoka garbage packer truck went to San Antonio Monday, and was due home Thursday night with a new 16-yard body replacing the 10-yard body, which will permit picking up garbage in the city twice a week instead of once, as has been the practice in the past.

Citizens are asked to be patient for a few days, as some time will be required to work out a schedule. However, City Secretary J. M. Uzzle says the truck will start today in the north part of town and start working south.

Warren Smith, superintendent of sanitation, also requests that citizens refrain from burning trash in their garbage cans as such makes some of them impossible to handle and is a threat to burning the truck.

Also, citizens are being asked to replace their old 30-gallon oil drums with smaller covered garbage cans. Some times, there large cans are too heavy for lifting.

Only 15 Absentee Ballots Are Cast

Only 15 absentee ballots had been cast up to Thursday morning in the June 2 Democratic Run-off Primary election, according to County Clerk C. W. Roberts.

Two other ballots have been mailed out on which there has been no return up until this time.

Tuesday, May 29, is the last day for casting an absentee ballot.

Saturday Will Be Poppy Day

Although next Wednesday, May 30, in Memorial Day, VFW Buddy Poppies will be sold in down-town Tahoka this Saturday, May 26, according to Mrs. R. L. Richardson.

The sale of poppies is sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary, and all proceeds are used exclusively for the benefit of disabled and needy veterans and the widows and orphans of deceased veterans. Motto of the drive is "Honor the dead by helping the living."

Mayor Meldon Leslie has issued a proclamation setting this day for sale of Buddy Poppies, in which he joins the Auxiliary in urging citizens of this community to "recognize the merits of this cause by contributing generously through purchase of these poppies to honor the dead of our foreign wars, and as an expression of our gratitude to the men of this country who have risked their lives in defense of the freedoms which we continue to enjoy as American citizens."

Dearing Is Critical Result Of Wreck

E. L. Dearing, about 40, was in critical condition at Methodist Hospital after receiving head injuries when his pickup truck overturned eight and one-fourth miles north of West Point on a farm-to-market road early Wednesday morning. He is a farmer in the Lakeview community.

The wreck was discovered at about 5:30 a. m. Wednesday, but the accident apparently occurred some hours earlier. When a White ambulance arrived Dearing was in the pickup, his leg was caught under the steering wheel and his head had been driven through the right side window by the force. The pickup was lying on the right side although Dearing's head was not touching the ground.

His pickup truck apparently went out of control and overturned. He was found by unidentified people who were on their way to work about one half mile from his home, where he lived with his mother, Mrs. Fannie Dearing.

Investigating officers were unable to determine the time of the accident but said it occurred either Tuesday night or early Wednesday morning.

Consumer Buying In County Last Year Totaled \$17 Million, Report Shows

(Special to The News)
New York, April 23 — Because consumer buying was at a high level in Lynn County in the past fiscal year, the county was able to contribute its full quota toward the overall business results that were achieved nationally.
Local residents, through their spending, had a proportionate part in the attainment of a gross national product of \$516 billion, a new high. The previous year's GNP was \$504 billion.
The GNP, which is the sum total of all goods and services produced in a year, is used by economists as a principal gauge of business activity.

The bulk of this output, Government reports show, is due to consumer spending. It constitutes two-thirds of the total.
The remainder consists, for the most part, of expenditures by Federal, state and local governments and of capital outlays for industrial expansion.
Of the year's \$516 billion, some \$336 billion was in consumer outlays, \$196 billion of it for goods and \$140 billion for services.
Lynn County's output of goods and services in fiscal 1961 was a sturdy \$16,983,000, an increase over the previous year's \$16,606,000.

As usual, local tastes and attitudes determined the way the people spent their money. Their expenditures ran the gamut, from automobiles to travel to apparel.
While there was little change in the amount they spent for durable and non-durable goods, there was a considerable rise in outlays for services. The increase in the year was \$8 billion, nationally. Part of this increase, it is noted, was due to the rising cost of many services.

Of the \$16,983,000 spent in Lynn County by consumers, \$13,569,000 was for goods bought in local retail stores and \$3,414,000 was for services of all kinds.
The Commerce Department is highly optimistic about business in the months ahead. It feels that the advance that has been in progress will continue, subject to occasional fluctuations, and that the GNP will hit \$565 billion or better in 1962.

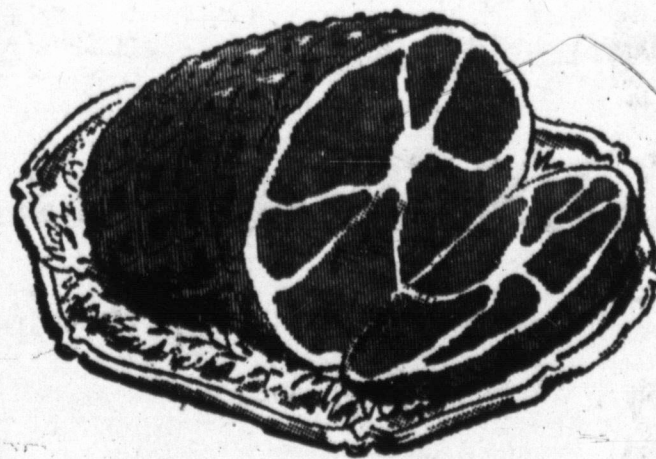

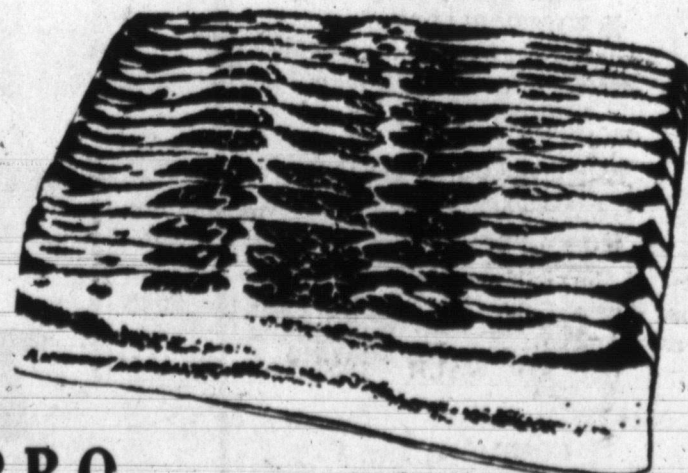

Spray Livestock For Screwworms

Periodic spraying of livestock with Co-Ral or ronnel (Korlan) will aid greatly in the prevention of screwworm infestations, County Agent Bill Griffin emphasized today.

Stockmen are urged to spray their livestock regularly to prevent as many screwworm cases as possible. Every screwworm case which is prevented or controlled by chemical treatment will also aid greatly the effectiveness of the overall screwworm eradication program.

Although several insecticides will effectively control screwworms, County Agent Griffin said sprays of Co-Ral or ronnel (Korlan) give better protection from screwworm attack. These sprays also will give good control of most other external parasites such as horn flies, lice and ticks.

Stockmen also are urged to inspect all livestock regularly and treat all wounds promptly. Ten or more worms should be collected from deep in each wound and taken to your local county agricultural agent or mailed to Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program, Box 969, Mission, Texas.

Plan Carefully For Farm Profit

College Station, May 24—Many Texas farmers and ranchers are asking how they can make more profit. Cecil Parker, extension farm management specialist, points out that before a profit can be made, something must be produced. This production requires land, labor, capital and management.

Since any one producer has a fixed supply of one or more of these resources, the amount he can produce over a short period of time is limited. Over a longer period, however, the supply of resources may be increased, thus increasing potential crop and livestock production.

Profits now and in the future depend on how well the producer uses his available resources, says Parker. Maximum utilization of resources requires careful study and analysis, and thus a complete inventory of each resource.

An inventory of all the land you control is a good place to start, says Parker. A knowledge of the various types, capabilities and acreages of each is necessary in planning cropping systems. Make and keep a yearly plan for each field, showing rotations, crops grown, fertilizer used, cultural practices and yields. This will prove to be very valuable.

It is also important to study your labor requirements for the year's operation. Know the capabilities of both family and hired labor. Once labor is committed to the farming operation for a year the most will remain the same whether it is used to the best advantage or not.

Make an inventory of available money to carry out the year's operation and consider the need for capital investments, suggests Parker. It is important to study carefully your capital needs and plan how to use available capital to the best advantage.

What is the condition of your machinery and equipment? Are your building facilities adequate? Inventory all these items and evaluate them for optimum use, advises the specialist.

Contact your local county agent for ideas on the use of your resources for maximum profits from your farming operations. The trouble taken to complete this analysis will pay dividends, concludes Parker.

In "Atholie" by Racine, a chorus of Jewish girls sing an ode about the giving of the law on Mount Sinai. The refrain has a beautiful phrase, "O Charming Loi" or in English, "O Charming Law." The psalmist in the first psalm says of the "blessed" man, "His delight is in the law of the Lord; and in his law doth he meditate day and night."

The modern attitude toward laws and regulations can hardly be called one of delight. We never hear anyone exult about our "charming laws." Now charming may be a rather tipid English word, but the chorus was singing of something of great value which we would do well to grasp in our day.

In the nineteenth psalm we find it expressed in the same mood. "The statutes of the Lord are right, rejoicing the heart," and, "more to be desired are they than gold, yea than much fine gold; sweeter also than honey and the honeycomb."

Honey was their sweet tooth delicacy. Sugar is not mentioned in the Bible but honey and sweetness appear often.

This gives the law of God a clear dimension that we need to get the feel of today. We need to feel that God's way is the way of delight and we too need to meditate upon His charming law which is "sweeter also than honey and the honeycomb."

"This office belongs to the people of Texas, not to the organization backing my opponent." Jerry also made a plea for people to turn out and vote on June 2.

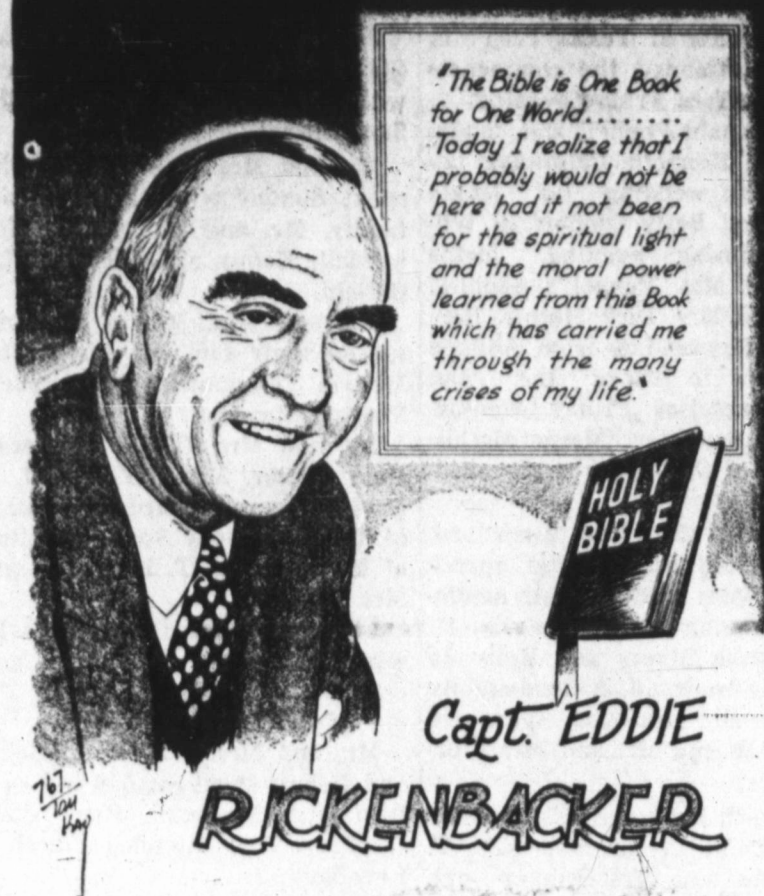
His talk was a thoughtful, sensible and inspiring message.

itect. The latter has already drawn tentative plans for a permanent home to house 24 boys.

Although the permanent organization is not complete, Miller pointed out, South Plains Boys Ranch has been granted a non-profit charter by the State of Texas, has approval from the State Department of Public Welfare, and citizens of Lynn and Dawson county, for the most part are at present supporting the ranch with operating expenses. Contracts drawn by an attorney will vest authority in a board of 15 trustees, and obligate the land owner of the site to a lease with option for the organization to buy the site.

"Uncle John" Graves, 85, of Amarillo, oldest active peace officer in Texas, who had been wearing a gun for 67 years, died Wednesday of last week in an Amarillo hospital — not entirely from old age, but from injuries received in a car wreck a few years ago.

He was an uncle of Mrs. Lee M. Shockley, who lives north of Wayside, and has visited here a number of times. Mrs. Shockley had visited him only a few days before his death.

Born and reared at Belton, he became a deputy sheriff of Bell county at the age of 18, later served on the Mexican border as a Texas Ranger for eight years, and has served continuously as a deputy sheriff at Amarillo since 1922.

As an officer, he had participated in many thrilling gun battles and was reputed to be one of the best shots with a pistol. Just three years ago, a prisoner he was escorting tried to escape. Mr. Graves yelled twice at him to stop, and then winged him in the arm at 50 yards with a .38.

However, the colorful officer was once quoted as saying, "The Golden Rule will get you by a lot of times when a six-shooter won't. You don't have to be a gunman to be an officer. Horse sense and courtesy will serve you better." He proudly claimed he had never struck a man with a gun or blackjack or mistreated a prisoner.

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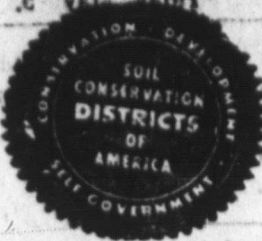
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Lynn County Soil Conservation District News

A quick check on conservation practices that have been applied since the first of the year proves that the members of the Lynn County SCD are doing their part to conserve soil and water.

To this date better than 900,000 feet of terraces and 21,000 feet of divisions have been constructed to control water erosion and prevent run off. In connection with this more than 100,000 acres have been contour farmed.

Some 140 acres have been bench leveled to afford more efficient use of irrigation water and to control erosion by containing run off. Twenty or more graded and level furrow irrigation systems

have been installed plus several sprinkler systems.

At least 125 acres of grass have been planted to take out of cultivation land unsuitable for cropland and to serve as a part of a rotation system on cropland suitable for cultivation. Three farm ponds have been constructed to supply water for livestock where more suitable supplies are not available.

At least 40,000 acres were protected from wind erosion by the use of grain sorghum residue and better than 7,000 acres were protected by a cover of small grains
