The population of Muleshoe was 1,326; this was almost double the population in 1930

There were 324 enrolled in Muleshoe High School and 260 in the grammar schools for the 1940-41 school term.

Lloyd Quesenberry sold the first bale of cotton in 1940 to the Burrow Gin Co. It weighed 453 pounds, and he received 10c a pound for the bale.

1940 - the year you could ouy Sliced Bacon for 19c a pound and three loaves of oread for 25c. There were 144 Telephone connections in Muleshoe that year and the cotton yield fas set at 25,000 bales for Bailey county.
