Plans Complete For Mass Immunization

Further plans for the Mass Polio Immunization program on Sunday, August 26, were made at a meeting of 60 workers from over the county in the City-Legion building here Friday night.

The program is being underwritten by the county's physicians, and the Sabin Oral Vaccine, which is taken three drops on a lump of sugar by mouth, will be given 8,000 or 9,000 county citizens, it is hoped. Only cost will be a donation of 25 cents or more to cover expenses, and even then no one will be required to pay.

"This is Lynn county's chance to completely immunize itself from polio," one doctor says. "The past year, Texas has had half the nation's polio cases."

The vaccine is tasteless, odorless, harmless in every way, has proved 100 percent effective both in immunizing the person and eliminating him as a carrier, can be taken by anyone from three months to 110 years of age, and should be taken even if the person has previously had the Salk vaccine.

Friday's meeting was principally to complete the organizational set-up.

The first series of oral vaccine will be given Sunday, August 26, from 1:00 to 5:00 p. m. in Tahoka City-Legion building and O'Donnell school cafeteria, under supervision of doctors and nurses.

No vaccine can be given at Wilson and New Home because there are no local doctors or clinic with nurses, proper refrigeration and other equipment, and people in these areas are asked

W. L. Gardenhire Rites Wednesday

W. L. Gardenhire, 77, prominent O'Donnell retired farmer and a citizen of Lynn county for 40 years, died at 8:05 a. m. Monday in St. Mary's Hospital at Lubbock. He had been ill several weeks.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 2:30 p. m. in O'Donnell Church of Christ with Ode Prescott, minister, officiating, assisted by Minister Earl Danley of Lubbock. Burial followed in O'Donnell Cemetery.

Born at Round Mountain, Mr. Gardenhire moved to Lynn county in 1922, and long has been one of the county's leading citizens.

At the time of his death, he was president of the O'Donnell school board and was a member of the board of directors of Plains Co-op Oil Mill. He was also a member of the board of Farmers Cooperative Association of O'Donnell. He was a member of the Church of Christ.

He is survived by his wife; two sons, J. W. and Billy Gene, both of O'Donnell; four daughters, Mrs. O. E. Smith of Lubbock, Mrs. Farris Heathington of Muleshoe, Mrs. Beatrice Neill of Lamesa, and Mrs. R. L. Stokes of Causey, N. M.; five brothers, Grady of Stanton, Lawrence of Sterling City, J. N. of Tahoka, Thad of Hugo, Kansas, and H. E. of Lubbock; 12 grandchildren, and 19 great grandchildren.

Wilson Election On Sewer Bond

City of Wilson has called an election for Saturday, August 18, to determine if taxpaying property holders in the town favor issuance of revenue bonds for the purpose of installing a sanitary sewer system.

There will be two propositions on the ballot.

The first would determine if citizens favor issuance of \$60,000 in revenue bonds to build the sewer system and pledging revenues of the City's combined waterworks and sewer system for the payment thereof.

The second proposal is for issuance of \$25,000 in general obligation sanitary sewer system bonds and the levy of a tax in payment thereof.

Mayor Thad Smith says Wilson faces a possible water pollution problem from cess pools, and he thinks a sewer system will have to be installed sooner or later. He says the bond issue would not require a raise in City taxes.

He says Wilson has 175 water connections, and therefore would have 175 potential sewer connections. However, the sewer system would pay out if the City could start off operation of a sewer system with 80 connections.

The Wilson City Council officially ordered the election in its meeting last Thursday. Aldermen present were Mayor Smith, Oscar Follis, A. N. Crowson, Bill Rhoads, and Victor Steinhauer. Alderman Sam Gatzki was not present.

Rains last week finished covering the dry spots, and rains starting this Wednesday night poured more moisture onto the land—although not wanted over most of the county. Threatening clouds Thursday promised more wet weather.

Meanwhile, crops have been making almost fantastic recovery from the drought and farmers had just gotten well started in the "battle of the weeds" when the new rains came.

Tahoka received .09 of an inch Wednesday afternoon, followed by .38 inch during the night, for a total of .47 inch. Thus, during July and on the first day of August, Tahoka had received more rain than it had received the first six months of the year. From Jan. 1 through June 30, total precipitation was 4.50 inches. Rainfall during July totaled 4.26 inches, and Aug. 1 fall of .47 inches brought the year's total to 9.23 inches.

Some areas, including the Six-Miles station area east of Tahoka, New Home and Lakeview areas, and parts of the Three Lakes and Newmoore areas have reported as high as 10 or 12 inches in July.

Last week after The News went to press, dry spots in the Gordon to Draw areas received rainfall up to an inch, and the 50 to 100 received this Wednesday night was needed by many crops in these areas.

Floyd Smith of New Home reported about 2.5 inches Wednesday night from Lakeview to Wayside, in the northwest part of the county, and said he had received about eight inches the last two weeks. Maurice Small reported 1.8 inches southwest of Petty.

The last rain was general over the county, according to hurried reports gathered by The News Thursday morning.

Crop prospects have improved remarkably the last two weeks as a result of the rains coming just barely in time, farmers say. But, some warm, dry weather is needed and some possibly showers the last of August. Some late crops will have to hurry for full production before the killing frost this fall.

Rodeo Planned Last Of Month

Championship Rodeo featuring 15 top performers in each event of shows staged in Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Colorado this year by H.K. Rodeo Co. of Snyder will be held in Tahoka on the nights of Friday, Aug. 31, and Saturday, Sept. 1.

Jerry Church, vice president of Tahoka Rodeo Association, says the local organization and Alvin Koonsman of the H.K. Co. are sponsoring the show here because of the fine reception they received at the two previous shows and because they like the local facilities.

This should give rodeo fans an opportunity to see the top performers, as no outside entries will be taken except those ranking high in the year's rodeos.

Events will include bareback and saddle bronc riding, tie-down calf roping, team tying, barrel racing, bull riding and bulldogging.

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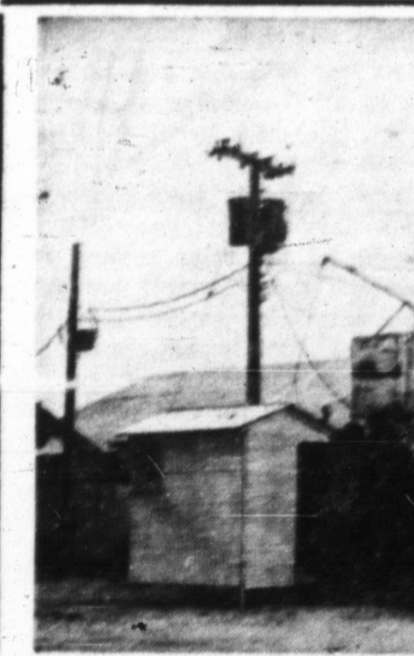

Many FHA Loans Are Paid Off

Lubbock—Joe L. Meharg, area supervisor of Area 19 of the Farmers Home Administration in Texas, announces that during the past fiscal year, July 1, 1961, to June 30, 1962, the FHA collected \$3,749,972 in the counties that make up Area 19. These counties are Crosby, Garza, Gaines, Lubbock, Lynn, Terry and Yoakum.

Meharg also explained that during the past fiscal year, 1961-'62, the Farmers Home Administration has assisted a large number of farmers to produce their 1962 crops by making loans totaling \$2,717,130. These farmers had been unable to get financed through the conventional lending sources. These loans were made up of Operating Loans, Farm Ownership Loans, Rural Housing, Soil and Water Loans, and a few Emergency Loans.

Meharg said that many borrowers had paid their loans in full in 1961 and that if the present prospects for crops in his Area continued that a considerable number of borrowers would pay their loans in full out of their 1962 crop sales.

Meharg stated that about the end of the drouth, about 1958, the number of farmers using FHA assistance was about 80 percent more than are using FHA help today. Most of these borrowers, who received FHA help during the drouth and have paid FHA in full, have returned to the regular conventional sources of credit that they were using before the drouth. Assistance such as FHA gives to farmers and ranchers is a contributing factor in the overall economy of a county or community and especially so if it is in a practically total rural area without any industrial payrolls.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARRER

The Twentieth Century formula on how to succeed in politics without really trying is to find out what a large bloc of voters would like free, then figure out way to make them think they are getting it free.

This basically explains the strike of doctors in the Canadian province of Saskatchewan against the socialist government of Premier Woodrow Lloyd. Lloyd had forced into law a medicare program. How this crisis will be resolved is still a moot question.

Some U. S. newspapers with apparent leanings to left are appalled at the action of the doctors. Yet from all reports, majority of the people in this Canadian province are quite bitter toward government for creating such a crisis.

There is a sobering thought here. If the U. S. government follows a present proposal to bring a portion of American medical practice under the control of bureaucratic direction, there is no predicting what the American doctors will do.

If they should adopt the strategy of the Canadian medical men, it is a certainty that they and the American Medical Association will be more bitterly attacked than they are at present for merely opposing the drive to sacrifice the integrity of American medicine for political expediency.

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QUESTIONS, PLEASE

Cotton Insects Are On Increase

Activity of cotton insects increased over much of the western part of the state during the past week as gathered from reports from county agricultural agents. Bellworms caused most concern. Insect damage to date has been light in most High Plains counties. Bill Griffin, Lynn county agent has stressed the importance of frequent checking of all cotton during August. During most years, bollworms have appeared in heaviest infestation during this month. Bellworm damage has increased in many areas with some growers reporting poor control. Best control is secured where insecticidal applications are made while worms are small, with repeat treatments until worms are brought under control. Light infestations were present in most fields checked in Lynn county, however egg population was very light.

to come to Tahoka for immunization.

This is a big operation, and the sponsors believe 1,500 people an hour can be immunized. Actually, the process is very simple. Each person registers, takes a cube of sugar, and returns to his car. In the case of babies, nurses will be on hand to administer the three drops in the baby's mouth.

Between now and August 26, there will be registration blanks in the paper, in grocery bags, in letters mailed out by the ASC office and others, which citizens will be asked to fill in and bring with them when they come to take their vaccine.

Drs. Emil Prohl and Skiles Thomas and H. B. McCord Jr., county chairman of the National Foundation, will be in charge of the program in Tahoka. Dr. Noble Rumbo will be in charge at O'Donnell.

Dr. Rumbo will have Supt. John Criner in charge of registration, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Minter in charge of promotion, study clubs furnishing workers, and the fire boys directing traffic and taking vaccine to the bedridden.

V. L. Botkin is chairman of the committee to secure community committee members over the county.

Rev. James Efrid is chairman of the pastors' committee to carry the word through all the churches of the county.

Mrs. Truett Smith is chairman of the women's club division.

Mrs. Helen Ellis will be in charge of registration secretaries and tabulation clerks.

E. L. Short is chairman of the publicity and promotions committee.

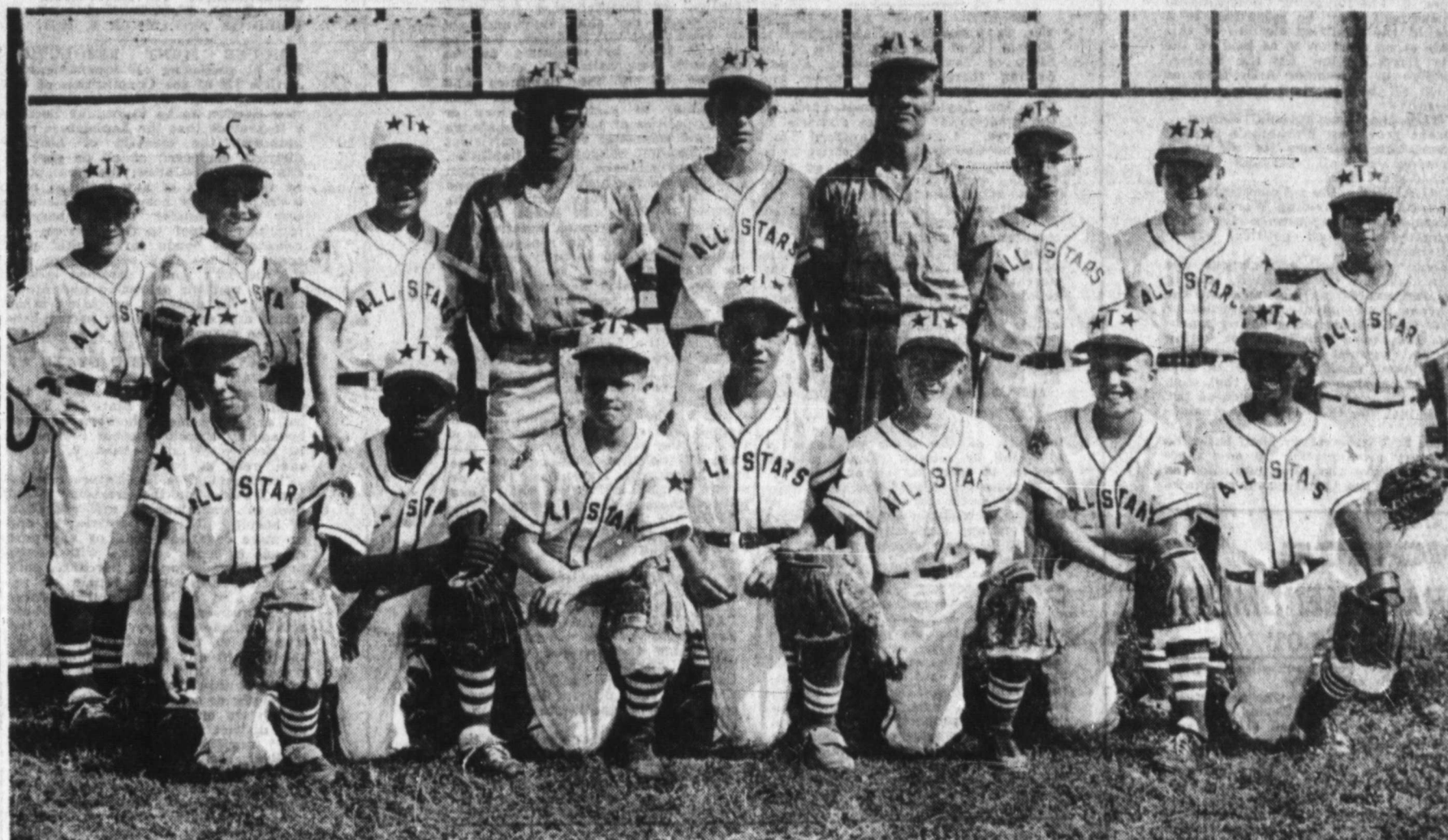

Rev. James Efird Rotary Speaker

A part of the book, "Seven Paths to Peace," was reviewed Thursday noon at Tahoka Rotary Club by Rev. James Efird, pastor of the First Baptist Church, these "paths" being patriotism, consultation, freedom, progress, justice, sacrifice, and loyalty.

Rev. Efird pointed out the real purpose of Rotary is meeting together to develop acquaintance, friendship, fellowship, and to promote service to fellowman, all of which is bound to have some effect on peace and better understanding among the peoples of the world.

Since there are more than a half a million men, leaders in their communities, in Rotary in 11,000 clubs in more than 120 nations of the world, all with the same Rotary objectives, he declared there is bound to be some impact on the peoples and governments of the world.

He issued a plea that we try to understand peoples of other races of the world, not try to judge them by our customs or to try to impose our customs on them but to try to help them adjust to a better life.

Efird told something of his personal background, being born in Ohio, raised in the hills of North Carolina the son of a farmer-merchant, his education, and marriage. He met his wife while attending Southwestern Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, served first as Baptist pastor at Hurst, then at his wife's home church of Harmony in Fort Worth, then went to El Paso. He said he came to Tahoka three years ago this week, had come to love the town and hoped he could stay here forever. He declared this to be the finest community in which he had ever lived.

Jack Stricklin Buried Sunday

A. J. (Jack) Stricklin, 81, dean of South Plains newspaper publishers and editor and owner of the Terry County Herald at Brownfield for 45 years, died Friday after a brief illness while visiting his daughter in Snyder.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon in the Crescent Hill Church of Christ in Brownfield.

He had many friends over Lynn county, especially among oldtimers and had attended the Pioneer Reunion a time or two. Rogers Curry of The News force formerly worked for him, and he and his family attended the funeral services.

Jack, an editor of the old school who called himself "The Old He," edited one of the most interesting papers in all Texas, for he spoke his mind on all issues, people respected him for his stand, and

he made hosts' of friends and admirers.

He first came to Terry county in 1906, worked for the Herald, bought the paper for \$750 in 1909 from Judge W. R. Spencer, and traded a shotgun to the late Tom Hunter, once a candidate for governor of Texas, as down payment on his first home.

On July 6, 1910, he washed off the printer's ink in a barber shop bath tub, the only one in town, put on a tie, went to the farm home of Uncle Joe Hamilton, and was married to Miss Texie Holden. After the wedding, he returned to the Herald office to get out the paper which had to come out 36 hours later. He sold the Herald in 1954 to Curtis Sterling, who consolidated it with the Brownfield

At that time, there were 300 people in Brownfield, 1400 in Terry county, and the nearest railroad was at Tahoka. He often picked up his supplies from the late Joe-Heare at the Tahoka Santa Fe station.

Born in Tennessee, Jack received a crippled leg when a tree fell on him while cutting timber.

He is survived by his wife; one son, Jack Jr., who owns the newspaper at DeLeon; one daughter, Mrs. Herman Trigg of Snyder; four grandchildren, and two great grandchildren.

Mrs. Bland Tells Of Arrival Here

Mrs. R. E. Bland and son, Elzie, were here Monday from their farm six miles southeast of Meadow, to which place they moved in 1940 from Redwine.

Mrs. Bland recalls that she and the children came out to Tahoka from Knox county "a cold, cold day in January" of 1916 by train while the late Mr. Bland came with the household effects, livestock, and farming equipment in a freight car.

She says she was about to go back to Knox when they set up housekeeping in a tent at Redwine until a house could be built. Since her marriage in 1899 in Falls county, Mrs. Bland says she has moved only four times, to Knox county, to Lynn county, to Terry county, and from the tent to the house.

DO AWAY WITH SUPPORTS?

Henry Hazlitt writes in Newsweek: "The policy of farm price supports, over-stimulating production and creating unsalable surpluses, plus the attempt to offset these consequences by acreage and marketing controls, began in the Roosevelt New Deal. But it was continued by the Truman and Eisenhower administrations, with ever-mounting problems, because neither they nor successive Congresses had the courage to stop it. The economic problem is not at all baffling. The situation can be cured by abandoning and reversing the policies that created it. It is merely necessary to halt all further price supports; and to sell the surpluses back to the farmers themselves, on a pro rata basis, below the free-world price, leaving it to the individual farmer to decide whether to hold or resell, and how much to plant under the new conditions."

MORE SOCIAL SECURITY

Edgar Hays in Lockney Beacon: "Benefits already promised and enacted into law, will require a 48 percent increase in Social Security payroll taxes between now and 1968. The current maximum of \$150 a year will raise to \$222; the 1968 rate for the self-employed will be \$331.
