Pioneer Starts Gas Line Work

Construction work began Monday morning on Pioneer Natural Gas Company's pipeline across Lynn county to increase the company's transmission line capacity from the Permian Basin to the South Plains area.

Twenty five miles of 20-inch pipe will be installed between the Tahoka booster station and Lubbock, replacing one of the two 10-inch lines to Lubbock, states T. S. Whitis of Amarillo, vice president in charge of transmission.

The 10-inch line north which is being replaced will be reconditioned and laid as the third 10inch line loop from Tahoka to Lamesa.

Purpose of the project is to provide additional gas supply from the Permian Basin for Lubbock and other South Plains customers. R. H. Palton Co. of Lubbock is the contractor, and moved a crew of men here last week end to start the project.

For several weeks Tahoka school board has been studying ways and means of relieving congested conditions in the local physical plant, and on Tuesday night authorized a study of the feasibility of long range building plans.

Arnold Maeker, Lubbock archiect who has handled all the school districts building the last 12 years, has been authorized to map out preliminary plans for a new senior high school building and renovation of other buildings.

The board has hired a fiscal agent, Ernest Dickey of Underwood-Mehaus Co. of Dallas, who has handled the last two bond issues, to study and recommend the financial plans. Enrollment in the Tahoka

schools has been growing the past two or three years, and this year has jumped 15 percent to a total of 1,227 as of Monday of this week, or an increase of about 200 over last year. Local school authorities say prospects are that enrollment will increase further in the coming few years.

All available classroom space is now being utilized, and Texas Education Agency is putting the school in jeopardy because of the crowded condition of many class-

Moving to a new site would require a much larger issue and a much larger tax increase. Tahoka district taxes are now

much lower than most surrounding districts, and bond men say the increase in taxes would take care of the issue. Right now, the board sees no other alternative than to call for a bond election some time in the near future.

The prospective bridegroom is a graduate of Wilson High School and is a junior at Texas Tech, where he is an industrial engineering major.



Added Cost of Social Security In Lynn Walker Agency Will Jump To Nearly \$100,000 In 1963 Is 10 Years Old

(Special to The News) New York-For the Lynn cour ty residents who are employed

Social Security taxes will be 16 percent higher after January 1st. Their payments will be at the rate of 3 and 5/8th percent of

earnings, instead of 3 and 1/8th percent, as it is at present. This applies to the first \$4,800 of wages or salaries. Similar amounts must be paid by their employers. For self-employed persons, there

will be an increase of 7/10th of one percent. They will be paying 5.4 percent in the future. Their maximum cost will be \$261 a year, compared with \$216 now. For employed people, the maximum cost per year will be \$174.

It is now \$144. next year, assuming no change in the number of people employed, will be \$95,000. This is based on this subject." ~ an analysis of data released by the Internal Revenue Service.

Half of this extra cost will be borne by employees, through payroll deductions, and the other half by employers.

Locally, per capita payments to the pension fund have been higher than in many parts of the country because incomes have been

running higher. The average employee in Lynn county was taxed an estimated \$81 during fiscal 1961, compared to \$73 throughout the West South Central States and \$78 in the State

Nearly \$11.6 billion was con tributed to the fund in the year by the nation's 64,639,000 workers and their employers.

Some \$591,000 of that total came from local sources. It is expected to reach \$686,000 in 1963. The new jump in the tax rate is in accordance with the planned development of the Social Security system, which calls for periodic increases. The final one is to go into effect in 1968.

That will bring it to 4 and 5/8th percent for employee and employer alike. Self-employed people will pay 6.9 percent.

These rates offer no leeway for any further expansion of benefits, such as would be offered through a hospitalization plan. Should that take place, there would be an additional hike in the rates.
