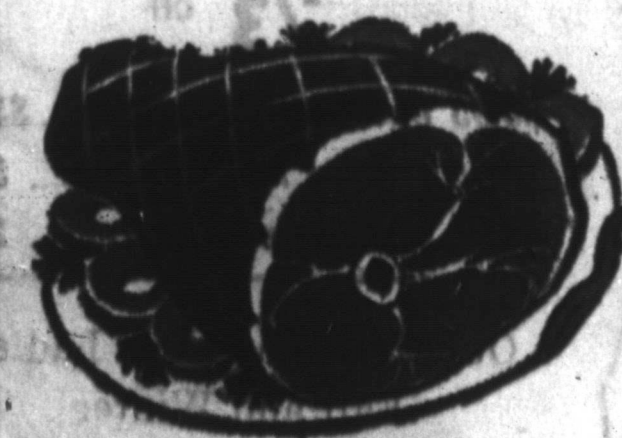

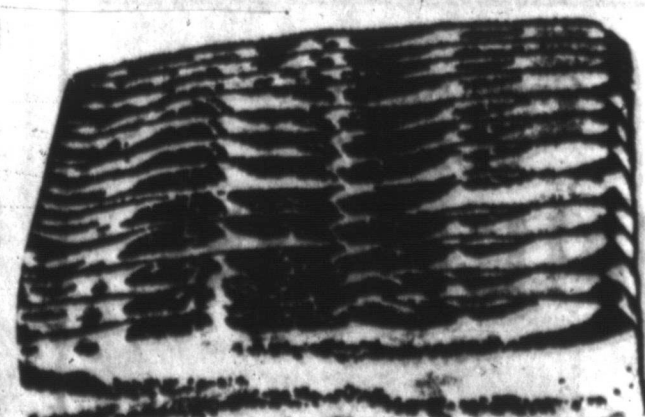

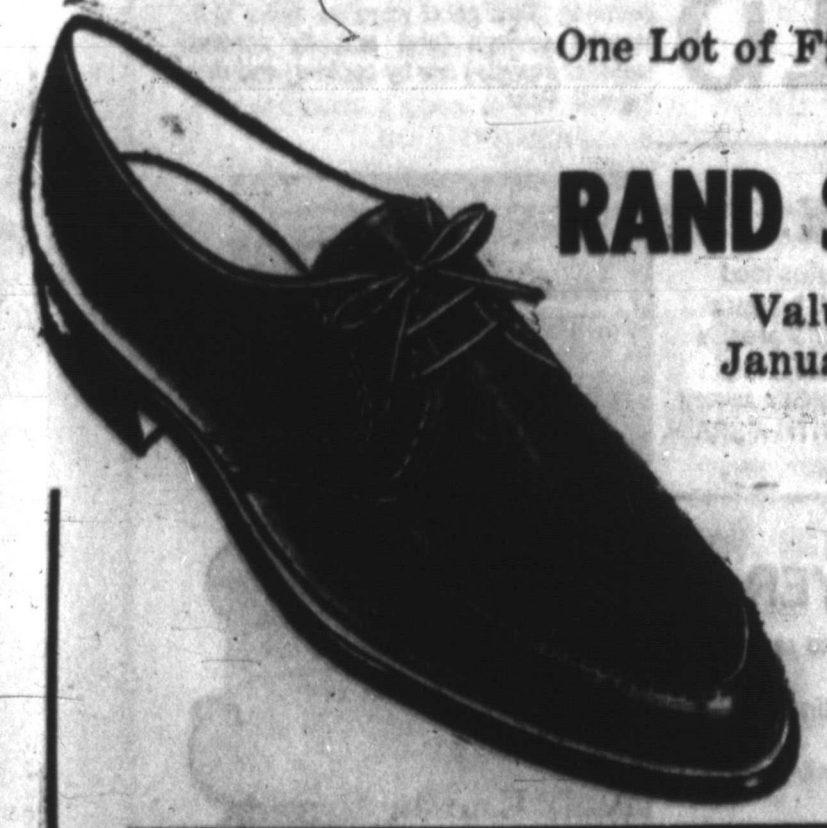

# History Group Meeting Called

County Judge W. M. Mathis has issued a call for a meeting of the newly appointed Lynn County Historical Survey Committee on January 19 at 10:00 o'clock a. m. in the County Court room in Tahoka.

This meeting is being held in accordance with a proclamation by Governor John Connally, declaring January 19 as Texas Historical Preservation Day. Over 2,000 committeemen in some 240 County Historical Survey Committees over Texas are expected to convene on that day to elect officers and formulate plans for the year's work.

"Every county has a history all its own, and Lynn County is no exception," said Judge Mathis. "The County Historical Survey Committee has unlimited possibility for doing our county a great service in the field of preserving our history for future generations."

"The tourist trade stimulated by history-seeking travelers will be an aid to the economy of the county," he said.

County Historical Survey Committees are currently concerned with historic buildings, markers, museum pieces and records of the counties.

# Tahoka Boys Basketball Team Wins Third Place in Slaton Tournament

Tahoka Bulldogs won third place in the Slaton basketball tournament last week end, defeating Shallowater 52-41. The girls lost the consolation title to Spur by a score of 21-21.

Lockney boys and Post girls were tournament champions, Lockney winning over Slaton, and Post winning over the host team also.

The Bulldogs had three players hitting in double figures in the third place game, Billy Clinton making 13, Allen Cox 13, and Craig Leslie 12. Tahoka took a 11-7 first quarter lead, widened it to 24-16 at halftime, and held a 39-24 lead at the end of the

third, before winning by 11 points. The girls from Tahoka and Spur were tied 4-4 at the end of the first stanza of the consolation finals and Tahoka trailed by only one point, 12-11 at the half. ## FFA Boys Place At Odessa Show

Tahoka FFA members participated in the Sandhills Hereford and Quarterhorse Show held in Odessa recently and three were among those who sold 40 steers out of a total of 215.

Jerry Forsythe placed fourth in medium heavy class and sold his steer for 56 cents per pound. The animal weighed 878 pounds.

Taylor Knight placed 11th in medium weight with his 815 pound steer, which sold for 51 cents per pound.

Phil Adams placed 15th in the medium weight class with an 863 pound steer, which also sold for 51 cents per pound.

Dean Hamilton placed 26th in the heavy weight division. Although his steer did not sell, Dean was named in the top 10 out of 100 boys for the showmanship award.

## Extend Barrier On Screwworms

Mission—Officials of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program have announced that the artificial barrier of sterile screwworm flies along the international border in Mexico has been extended from Laredo to above Del Rio. A 25-mile-wide strip from Brownsville to Laredo has been seeded with sterile flies since early last month.

The barrier zone, which is eventually expected to extend from Brownsville to the New Mexico-Arizona state line, is designed to prevent the migration of native screwworm flies from Mexico into the Southwest. A weekly average of 600 sterile flies per square mile is being dispersed in the 13,000 square mile barrier at the present time.

## Car Inspection Time Is Here

"Our weather is getting worse all the time and April 15 will come before you know it," Captain Alan Johnson, Texas Department of Public Safety Supervisor, commented this week.

He was talking about the time left for Texas motorists to get the 1963 vehicle safety inspections. The seven and one-half month period for getting inspections is more than half finished. Inspections started September 1 and will continue through April 15.

Since the period is so long, Johnson stated, no allowances are made for bad weather. He pointed out that inspections may not be made when streets are wet. "From now until April 15, we usually have a seige of bad weather in this part of the state which eliminates many inspection days," Captain Johnson said.

He also pointed out that inspection of vehicles now will insure that they are safer for the rest of the winter driving period, when good lights, brakes and other equipment are so vital.

Failure to have a 1963 inspection sticker displayed on the windshield of your vehicle after April 15 is a violation of the law and is punishable by a fine not to exceed two hundred dollars.

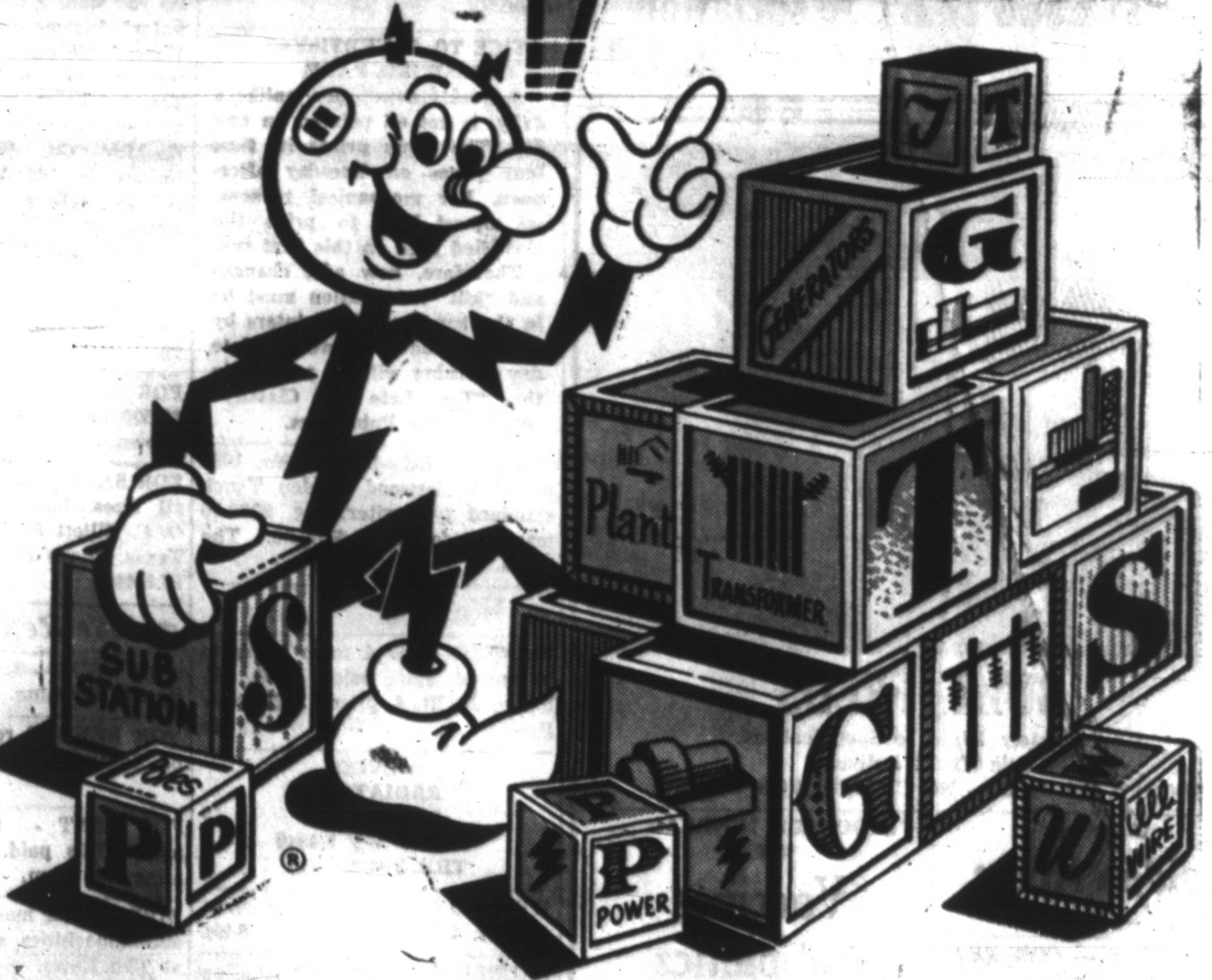
