School Bonds Are Sold On Bid Of 3.5 Percent

Tahoka school board has sold \$215,000 bonds of the authorized \$500,000 issue and contracted to sell \$235,000 bonds to be delivered in the summer.

Underwood Neuhous and Company bought \$215,000 bonds at 3.5178 percent. Columbia Securities will buy the \$235,000 bonds at 3.7458 percent after property valuations in the school district are raised.

The bonds were sold to the lowest bidders from a field of seven bids, the highest standing at 3.77 percent.

Supt. Otis Spears said that some remodeling will probably be done this summer. However, there are still many plans to be made in usage of space in the new high school building before the architect can begin detailed blueprints.

C. T. Tankersley Buried Monday

C. T. Tankersley, 83 year old prominent Lynn county retired farmer, died at 5:00 a. m. Sunday in Tahoka Hospital, where he had been a patient about two weeks.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Monday in the First Baptist Church with the pastor, Rev. James Eflord, and Rev. Murray Fuquay of Oklahoma, whose first pastorate was at West Point, officiating. Burial was in Tahoka Cemetery under direction of White Funeral Home.

Mr. Tankersley was born Nov. 2, 1879 in Hamilton county, Texas, where he was married Aug. 1, 1908 to Miss Fernella Sulman. They came to Lynn county in 1920 from Dickens county and bought farming interests in the West Point area. The couple built a new home and moved to Tahoka a few years ago.

He was one of the county's leading citizens, was active in school and church affairs and took great interest in anything for the betterment of his community and county.

Mr. Tankersley's death is the first in the immediate family since his and Mrs. Tankersley's marriage 33 years ago.

Survivors include his wife; six daughters, Mrs. Leta Williamson of Tulsa, Mrs. Beatrice Noble and Mrs. Violet Bragg, both of Tahoka, Mrs. Geneva Taylor of Seymour, Mrs. Nola B. Munson of Eatherville, Iowa, and Mrs. Pansy Rutland of Waco; one son, Hubert Tankersley of Tahoka; one brother, Joe of Alpine; two sisters, Mrs. Nell Brown and Miss Clara Tankersley of Alpine; 23 grandchildren and 48 great grandchildren.

Funeral services were held at the Sweet Street Baptist Church at 3:00 p. m. Wednesday with Rev. Joe Webb, pastor, and Rev. D. W. Copeland of Knapp, officiating. Burial was in Tahoka Cemetery under direction of White Funeral Home.

J. M. Christopher Dies Wednesday

J. M. Christopher, 85, O'Donnell and Borden county pioneer rancher and farmer, died at 7:15 p. m. Wednesday in a Lamesa hospital.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p. m. Thursday in O'Donnell Church of Christ with Arthur L. Golden of Stratford and Ode Prescott, O'Donnell minister, officiating. Burial was in O'Donnell Cemetery.

Born in Tarrant county, he had farmed in Borden and Lynn counties for 58 years. He had been a member of O'Donnell Masonic Lodge since 1925.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Dahlia; two sons, Lee of San Antonio and J. G. of Amarillo; three grandsons, two great grandsons, a brother and a sister.

Mrs. Calloway Huffaker entered Methodist Hospital Wednesday for minor surgery and was expected to be dismissed Thursday.

Six Sentenced In District Court

Six pleas of guilty were heard in District Court here Monday morning before Judge Trusty Smith, according to County Attorney Harold Green.

Amelio Flores and Alberto V. Aleman, both of Tahoka, were each sentenced three years in the state penitentiary on burglary charges. They broke into Farmers Co-op Gin of Tahoka office last summer, rolled the safe from the building, and were caught in the act while attempting to load the safe in a car by David Renfro, City policeman.

Billy Jack Baker of Lubbock, Larry Pace of Abernathy, and Tom Whitehorse of Brownfield each received 3-year probation sentences on provision they make restitution for \$200.00 in goods stolen from the residence of Charlie Debbas of Gordon. They pled guilty to entering the Debbas residence, taking food from the deep freeze, some electrical appliances and clothing. Most of the merchandise they returned to the owner.

Eristeo Mendonza of Ackerly was given a 2-year probation sentence pending his making restitution of funds he received fraudulently. He allegedly received a check for Lynn Birdwell from Paymaster Gin at O'Donnell. The check was supposed to have been for \$38.87 but was erroneously made out for \$388.75, and Mendonza is alleged to have pocketed the difference.

Samie Norwood Accident Victim

Samie Ewell Norwood, 35 year old Tahoka resident, died Sunday at 5:00 p. m. near Putnam when he came in contact with a high voltage line and fell from a pole on a transmission line project. A lineman, for 12 years for Lewis Construction Company, he was working on a job that was in the finishing stage.

No one saw the mishap, according to construction foreman Jimmy Dykes. Mr. Norwood died about 20 minutes after falling from the pole and efforts of the Cico Rescue Unit to revive him with a resuscitator failed. Officials of Wiley Godfrey Funeral Home in Baird, Texas said it was apparent he had come in contact with the high voltage line. A relative said the line carried 12,000 voltage, but a crushed chest was apparently the cause of death.

He had begun climbing again in February when he was dismissed by his doctor following another accident on Aug. 27, 1962 when he came in contact with a 7200 voltage line, causing burns and the fracture of two vertebrae.

Born July 1, 1924 in Tahoka he attended the Tahoka schools.

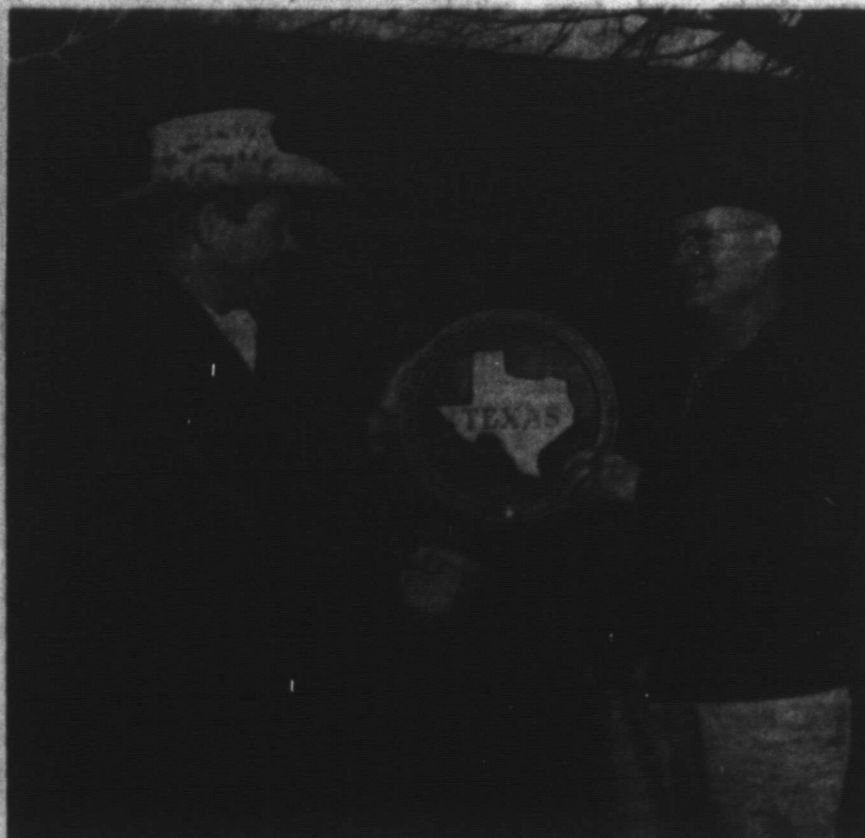

T-Bar Ranch Is Awarded Historic Site Medallion

T-Bar Ranch headquarters, nine miles northwest of Tahoka, is the first historic building in Lynn county to receive one of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee medallions.

J. H. (Mutt) Huddleston of Grassland, county chairman, recently presented the medallion to Cass Edwards of Fort Worth, one of the ranch owners. The medallion was purchased by Tahoka Chamber of Commerce.

This is a part of a state-wide program to mark and publicize historic spots in Texas in order to promote community pride and point out places of interest to tourists. Latest project of the State Committee is the marking of Confederate veterans' graves, and projects to follow include marking such historic sites as Tahoka Lake, old Grassland, and possibly others.

T-Bar Ranch, officially Tahoka Cattle Company, was formed in 1883 or 1884 by Cass O. Edwards, grandfather of "Little Cass," and the south front room of the present ranch house was the original ranch headquarters building. (Cont'd. on Back Page)

Rural Mail Boxes Must Be Moved To Right Side Of Road

A recent ruling by the Post Office Department makes it compulsory that all rural mail boxes in the United States must be located on the right-hand side of the rural carrier's line of travel.

All rural mail boxes located on paved roads and served by local rural carriers are on the right side of the line of travel already and will not have to be changed, but many of those on dirt roads are on the left-hand side of the line of travel and will have to be changed.

The usual fine cooperation given by our rural patrons to changes of this nature is sincerely requested in this instance. Driving on the wrong side of the road by the rural carrier is not only a violation of the state law but is very hazardous to his safety.

In the event of an accident occurring while he was in the left hand lane of traffic, he would be legally in the wrong even though he was performing his prescribed outline of duty.

It is requested that all rural mail boxes affected by this new regulation be moved immediately to the right-hand side of the carrier's line of travel, and, in no case should the change be made later than April 1, 1963.

Crops in the district are for the most part deep-rooted and take most of their moisture from a depth of 6 inches to 4 feet and will remove moisture from a depth of 6 feet. Irrigation farmers should not only think about how many acres they will irrigate, but how much water will be required to bring this number of acres to field capacity to a depth of 5 or 6 feet.

There are several things that should be considered when pre-irrigating. Six questions the farmer should ask are: How deep is the soil? What type is the soil? How much water will the soil hold per foot of depth? How fast will the soil take water without getting run off or puddling when using a sprinkler system? How long can the row be without an irrigation on one end and another irrigation on the other? And how much moisture will the soil lose between pre-irrigation and planting time?

In the district there are several types of soils and each soil will hold different amounts of water at different depths. A few of these soils with approximate average water holding capacity per foot of depth are as follows: Loam, 2.1 inches per foot of depth; fine sandy loam, 1.8 inches per foot of depth; fine sand, 1.8 inches per foot of depth.

There are several other types of soils in the district with different depths and textures that should be considered when planning pre-irrigation. Over irrigation is not only a loss of time, money and water but also a loss of soil fertility through leaching.

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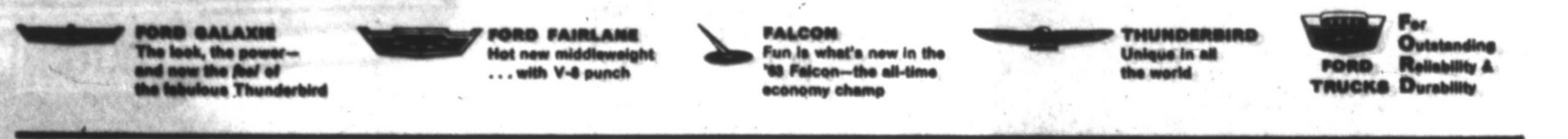

 house has since been remodeled and added to. The original cowboy bunk house also still stands on the site.

T-Bar Ranch has been under the ownership of one family longer than any other ranch on the Plains, and is said to have been the first permanent cattle ranch established that remained in business on the lower South Plains.

The Edwards family history extends further back in Texas history, as the late Mr. Edward's father settled on the site of Fort Worth in the 1840's, a year before the fort was established and long before the city was founded. "Little Cass" and his mother, Mrs. Willie Mae Edwards, still own a part of this ranch, now virtually hemmed in by Fort Worth, and operated by Crawford O. Edwards until his death a few years ago. Incidentally, "Little Cass" and wife have a son also named Cass O. Edwards.

Back about 1879, the founder of T-Bar Ranch came to Crosby county with Will and John Slaughter, where the three were grazing cattle.

Mr. Edwards once told The News man that in 1883 they were grazing free land in Crosby county when other stockmen and settlers began to crowd them. The Slaughter brothers decided to pull up stakes and move to the American Valley in Western New Mexico. Mr. Edwards thought he saw the time coming when he would have to have permanent pasture.

Boyd and Frank Porter from Parker County had driven a small herd of about 300 cattle and set up headquarters at the springs at the north end of Double Lakes, Lynn county, where they had grazed a few months when Mr. Edwards bought them out in order to get the water hole. Later, he filed on some of this land, had his cowboys file on some and then bought them out, other settlers filed on land and he bought many of these out until finally he had over 100 sections of land which he fenced. A few of these cowboys, like Elton George, kept the land they filed on and continued to work for him many years.

Since, many sections of the ranch have been sold off to farmers, and the ranch owners have put some in cultivation, but many sections still are grazed.
 The second Mrs. Cass O. (Mollie) Edwards, who owns part of the ranch, donated 125 acres at the northwest city limits a few years ago to the people of the county for T-Bar Country Club.

But, Double Lakes was a part of Plains history before it was turned into a cattle ranch. The springs were a favorite Indian camp ground, and later the camp site for buffalo hunters such as the late J. Wright Meador.

General Randal S. Mackenzie and Army detachments visited the place more than once in the campaign to contain the Comanches and to force them back to Indian Territory.

Double Lakes was the last point of succor for the famed "Lost Nigger" expedition of 1877, when the 10th Cavalry from Fort Concho under command of Capt. Nicholas Nolan and Lieut. Chas. L. Cooper filled their canteen for the last time before becoming lost in the "desert waste" to the northwest while trying to trail a band of Indian raiders. The present News editor uncovered this true story through War Department files in Washington back in the early 1930s, and some historians now declare the account of the troops' suffering and famishing from thirst on the South Plains was one of the most pitiful and lurid in all War Department history.

Double Lakes was possibly the site of the last battle between Indians and cowboys on the Plains. In 1879, a band of Indians, just recently confined on the reservation at Fort Sill, Okla., had escaped, come down across the Pease River country, stolen some horses from the Slaughters in Crosby county, stolen some more from a cowman on the Yellow house, possibly killed a camper in Yellowhouse canyon, and headed out onto the Plains of what is now Lynn county.

Slaughter cowboys took the trail. In the party was Jack Alley, father of Mrs. Hall Robinson, and Cass Edwards was also likely in the party. They followed the Indian trail past Tahoka Lake and caught up with the band at the south end of Double Lakes, and started firing as they chased the Indian band nearly to the present site of Newmore. The Indians had their women and children with them. In their flight, the Indians lost much of the "duffle" and a few horses. No cowboys

 phone connection with Brownfield is expected to be cut-in at the same time.

Operation of the system for station-to-station calls is being explained in a series of stories in The News, but Grizzle added other information on new telephone developments.

He said DDD will permit much more convenience to the subscriber and the placing of long distance calls much quicker. A direct call to Chicago, or to any other point in the nation, in less than a minute.

Back in 1915, he said, such a call took an average of 14 minutes to complete and required the services of eight or more operators along the way.

In comparing costs, he said that as recent a station-to-station call to Washington, D. C., cost \$4.00, as compared to \$1.40 today.

Person-to-Person calls will have to be placed as in the past through the operator, but new equipment speeds up these calls.

The new Brownfield plant for this new service, now being cut over, was installed at a cost of \$1,248,000, he said.

Coach Jacobs Tells Objectives Of Tahoka Athletics Program

When L. F. (Jake) Jacobs gave up his boys' basketball coaching duties last week to give more time to his work as school athletic director and North Elementary principal, he ended 16 years of coaching duties in the Tahoka schools.

Succeeding Jake as boys basketball coach is Milt (Junior) Fitts, one of his star pupils, who was twice an all-state selection while playing for Tahoka High, won a scholarship to West Texas State, and while playing for that school was twice named to the All-Border Conference team.

Fitts turned down pro offers to teach a year in the Amarillo system before moving home in 1961 as an elementary teacher and assistant basketball coach.

For two years, Fitts has been assistant to Jacobs in coaching the varsity team, and also has coached the Seventh Grade team each year to district championships. This year, his Seventh Grade team went through the season undefeated.

Of Fitts, Jacobs says, "He had much to do with the success of the team this year and has the qualifications of a good coach and handler of young people."

Jacobs came to Tahoka after an outstanding player career at West Texas State on teams that attracted national attention as the number one team in the Nation and as "the world's tallest team," and was several times invited to Madison Square Garden for games in New York City.

Jacobs' teams won the south half district title in 1948, district championship in 1952, a co-championship in 1956, and a bi-district championship in 1958. This year, he had one of his best teams, but still finished third in the district behind two top teams, Seagraves and O'Donnell. His Tahoka teams have won 220 games and lost 128.

He assisted with football four years, and helped coach two district champions, 1947 and 1952. His Seventh Grade football team was district co-champion in 1959, and his 1961 team was district champion. Fitts assisted him with coaching the latter team.

In 1958, Jacobs was voted AA basketball coach of the year in

Jerry Dale Todd Has Third Place Essay In Soil Conservation Contest

New Home High School student, Jerry Dale Todd, son of Mr. and Mrs. Duster Todd, submitted the essay that placed third in the annual soil conservation contest, the title this year being "Conservation, A Way of Life." Winners were named at the Farmer-Businessman banquet recently.

Conservation, A Way of Life. Conservation is the preservation of natural resources. If America is to remain a nation of plenty, all types and methods of conservation must be put into practice. America has many natural resources. Of these, soil and water are the most important.

Soil is useful to the farmer in that it furnishes food for his livestock as for himself. Both man and animal eat plants which could not be grown without topsoil. Topsoil is the upper layer of soil which supplies plants with food and certain essential bacteria. This valuable layer is only about ten inches in depth. When this soil is gone, the fertility of the

soil is also gone. It is for this reason that we must guard against erosion, which is the loss of soil by either wind or water. Erosion is a serious threat to farmers everywhere, but by using the proper methods, it can be conquered. Of the methods used to fight water erosion, terracing, strip cropping, and contour plowing are the most reliable. Each row, terrace, or strip of crop serves as a small dam which will hold the water until it can be absorbed into the soil. If gullies have already been formed, it is wise to plant grasses in them.

Wind erosion can be checked by growing cover crops. Cover crops not only help to absorb water, but they prevent the needless shifting of soil.

Although good soil is an essential in crop growth, water is also required. This valuable substance, which is lacking in many areas, must be preserved at all costs. The preservation of water can be accomplished merely by applying the methods that have already been mentioned. If such methods are practiced, America shall continue to exist as a nation of plenty.

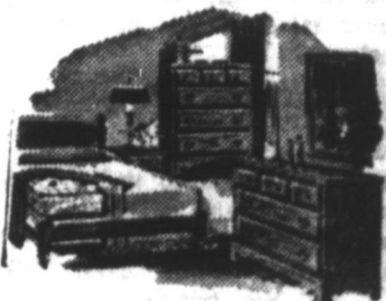

Direct Distance Dialing Details Are Given By General Telephone Man

(Ed. Note—In this last article of a three-part series on Direct Distance Dialing, we have asked W. A. King, Lamesa district commercial manager for General Telephone Co. to answer some of the most popular questions on the subject.)

Q. What kind of calls will the DDD equipment handle?

A. You may only place station-to-station calls using Direct Distance Dialing. In other words, you want to speak to the person who answers and you want it billed to the phone from which you dial. Other special long distance calls, such as person-to-person, collect, credit card and calls from pay telephones will still be handled by the regular long distance operator.

Q. Will DDD cost more?

A. No. As a matter of fact, since the more economical station-to-station rates apply to DDD calls, it should result in a saving to the customer.

Q. How do I know whether the town I wish to call may be dialed by DDD?

A. A city or area must be properly equipped to receive DDD calls, and while some 50 million are, others are not. To become a party of the nationwide DDD network, an area or city must have phone numbers consisting of seven units or dial pulls (either two letters and five numbers or seven numbers). If the place you wish to call is not listed, you may determine if it is dialable by calling the long distance operator, who will place the call for you if the area is not dialable.

Q. What if I should reach a wrong number?

A. Disconnect as soon as possible, call the long distance operator immediately and report the details of the call. She will take steps to see that you are not charged for the call. And, along these lines, if you should dial some distant point and get no answer or a busy signal, treat the call just as you would a local call—hang up and try again later.

Q. Suppose I want want the time and charges on a call?

A. Since it will not be possible to obtain the time and charges on DDD calls, you should place your call through the long distance operator if you need this information. Also, requests for time and charges must be made at the time the call is placed.

Q. What if I have trouble getting my DDD call through?

A. Normally, a properly dialed DDD call will go through to its destination speedily and without trouble of any kind. In case difficulties are encountered, however, remember that a helpful operator

is always handy to assist in getting your call through. So, if you have trouble, just dial "0" (zero) and tell the long distance operator about it.

Amarillo, March 21 — Emory Stokes, Jr., a former Tahoka boy, is now making his home at Cal Farley's nationally famous Boys Ranch near Amarillo, where 312 boys from all over the nation are now making their home.

Emory was welcomed to the Ranch by his dorm parents—a young couple with children of their own—who provide as near a normal family type life as is possible for the 36 boys who live with them. Emory's new home is a large Colorado stone ranch house that has been donated to the boys, all of whom are of different ages.

Emory was an 8th grade student at the Tahoka School, and is now enrolled in the fully-accredited Boys Ranch School, and from where he will eventually be awarded his High School Diploma. He will also have an opportunity to learn a trade from among the fourteen skills that are available to the older boys in the Ranch's vocational training program.

All of the boys at the Ranch are from 5 to 17 years of age, and leave when they are awarded a vocational training certificate or their High School Diploma.

Boys Ranch was founded 24 years ago by Cal Farley, former world's champion athlete and successful Amarillo businessman. Dr. and Mrs. Ralph H. Wells of Brandon, Vermont left Monday morning after spending two weeks here visiting their daughter and


family, Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Huffaker, Cal and Ralph.
