## Former Lynn County Resident Sends New Second Edition Of Book To News

This week The News received a new copy of the second edition of the book "The Dream of a Youthful Cowboy" by Frank Courtney Mellard of Marfa, a former Lynn county man.

Mellard, who is 85 years old, filed on two sections of land eight miles west of Tahoka Aug. 13, 1902, almost a year before the county was organized and lived there six years before moving to Marfa where he established a ranch. His years in Lynn county, instances about T-Bar Ranch, etc. are covered in his book.

This is his second publication, the first being a story of his life. Following is a letter written to the editor accompanying a complimentary copy of the edition:

I am writing you since I see that Saturday, June 22, is near the 24th and wish to know if the Old Settlers Reunion will be on that date.

I settled on some land eight miles west from where the City of Tahoka now stands on Aug. 12, 1902 and drove to Lubbock that evening and the next morning filed on two sections. The county was organized in 1903.

## Small Acreage Wheat Growers May Participate In National Program

Lynn county wheat producers with less than 15-acre allotments, for the first time, may elect to participate or not participate in a national wheat program.

County Agent Griffin said among the provisions of the proposed 1964 wheat program were those covering the less than 15-acre allotments. Such a producer if he desires to vote in the May 21 referendum and be eligible for price support and land diversion payment, must declare his intentions at least seven days prior to the referendum.

If the small producer files a written intention to participate in the program, thus becoming eligible to vote in the referendum he obligates himself to participate if two-thirds or more of the nation's growers vote "yes." (All wheat producers, including the 15-acre man, will be under acreage allotment provisions.)

On the other hand, County Agent Griffin pointed out if the less than 15-acre producer does not desire to participate in the program, he files no intention and will not be eligible to vote in the referendum. He will not receive certificates, price support or land diversion payments. However, such a producer still will be required to plant within his acreage allotment and his wheat must find a sale on the open market.

And finally, the county agent reminded small growers of the county not to fail to file an intention at least seven days before May 21 if they would like to have the privilege of voting in the referendum.

## Cattlemen Warned Of Nitrate Poison

College Station — Nitrate poisoning is a danger to all livestock but poses a particular problem where cattle are grazing plants recently fertilized with high levels of nitrates, says Dr. C. M. Patterson, extension veterinarian. The problem becomes especially acute if the growth of the plants has been stunted by low moisture levels following the fertilization, he adds.

Non-toxic forms of nitrates are reduced to toxic nitrates in the animal's system and enter the blood stream where they tie up the blood hemoglobin. As a result, the oxygen carrying capacity of the blood is greatly reduced and the animal may suffocate, says Patterson.

Signs of poisoning are a bluish skin color, a staggering gait, rapid pulse, evidence of abdominal pain, bloating, excessive salivation, and labored breathing, he says. Also quantities of nitrate too small to kill an animal may lower milk production or cause a cow to abort, he explains.

Cattle may be poisoned by eating weeds and forage crops that contain high levels of nitrates or pre-formed toxic quantities of nitrates. Out hay is the most likely of the cereal grains to cause nitrate poisoning and the young plants are generally more dangerous than older ones.

Inorganic sources of excess nitrates may be fertilizer bags or fertilizer spreaders left where cattle have access to them, says Patterson. Contaminated water draining from barnyards or bunker-type silos may also be a means of poisoning. Sometimes the combined intake of nitrates from two or more sources can cause a ser-

## Lynn County Citizens Spend Million A Year On Health

(Special to The News)

New York — How much do residents of Lynn county spend a year for medical, dental and hospital care? What is their annual health bill, taking into account the amount they spend for health insurance?

According to recent studies, made by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and by the University of Michigan, the cost is going up rapidly in the local area and in most other sections of the country.

Because of the higher prices, especially for hospital care, the millions of Americans who see doctors, buy drugs or go to the hospital each month are finding that their health dollar is buying only two-thirds as much as it did 10 years ago.

In Lynn County, on the basis of the latest figures, the out-of-pocket expenditures for medical care amount to approximately \$89 per person per year, or 5.7 percent of net income.

Some 68 percent of this represents the cost of health insurance direct payments and the re-

that have been noted nationally, the current expenditures locally compare with \$67 per capita 10 years ago.

These sums apply merely to private expenditures for health care. They do not include government outlays or medical care provided through private charity.

The Social Security Administration finds that all categories of medical care are becoming more expensive. In the period of one year, hospital care in the United States went up 9.8 percent, and eyeglasses, hearing aids and other appliances, 2.3 percent.

The net cost of health insurance, meaning the difference between the amount paid for insurance and the benefits paid by the carriers, increased 15.7 percent.

The American public, according to the latest Government figures, is spending \$21.1 billion a year for medical care. About 28 percent of that bill is met through insurance benefits.

In Lynn County, the overall cost of medical care in the one-year period is estimated at \$971,000.

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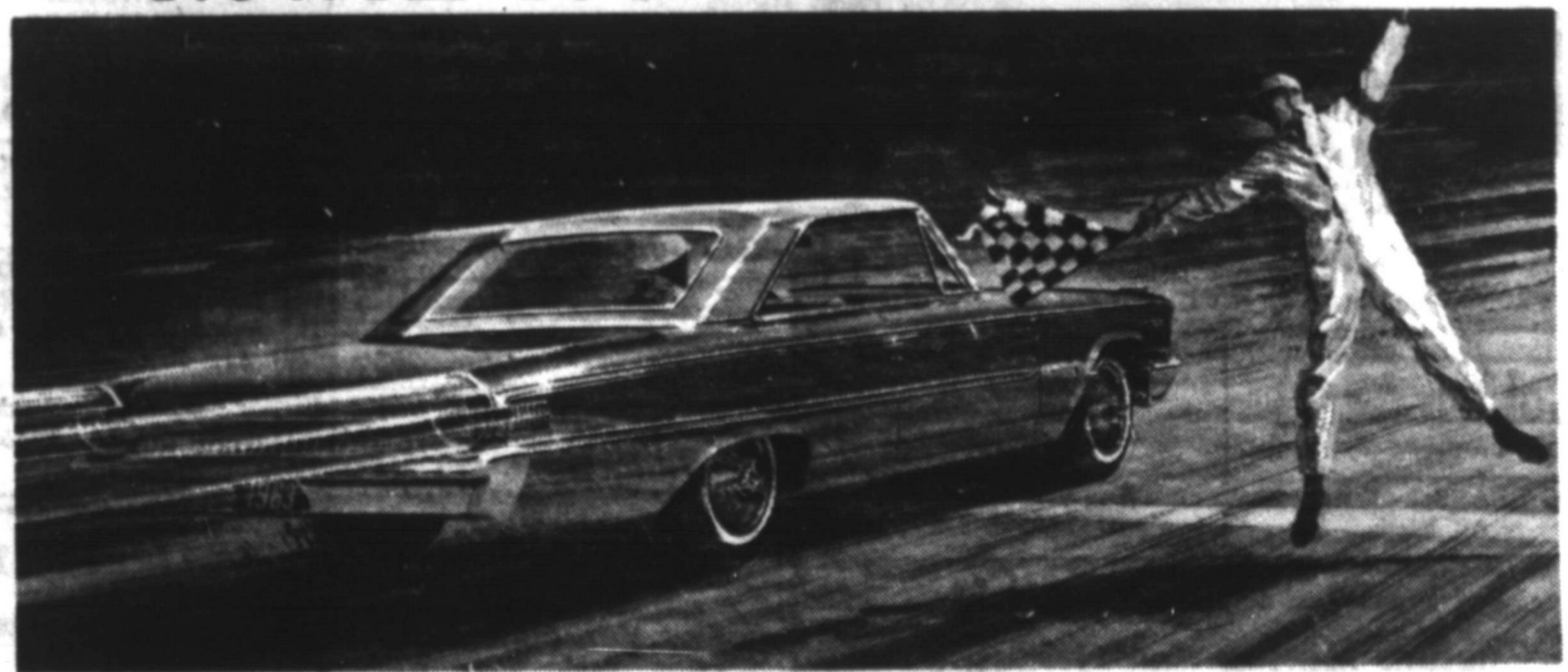
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

Most of us modern newspaper editors are very tame compared to the old-time newspaper reporters. Mrs. K. M. Moore (Bobby Lynch) left us a few copies of The Telluride (Colo.) Times, the editor of which quotes these items from the Rico (Colo.) News-Sun of the 1890's:

"Ernest Bode was seen Saturday night riding his horse in Crew Lane. Drunk as usual."

"The neighbors of Mrs. Katie Gregg saved her from being murdered last week when they found her husband beating her with a piece of stove wood. He has been drunk for three years."

Mrs. Martha Gullic had a strongly worded "Card of Thanks" in The Muncie Star. It seems her husband, Theodore, had just died and she wanted to deny the gossip that he passed away in consequence of drinking wood alcohol. "It was nothing more," she

said, "than cramps of the stomach."

Turner Rogers found this somewhere: The vice-president of a big company collected 25 cents from each of 2,000 employees to purchase a gift for the president who was getting married. With this \$500 he purchased 2,000 packages of cigarettes—removed the coupons and traded them for a silver serving set as a gift for the boss. Then he gave every employee a package of cigarettes for the two-bits he had donated, thus no one was out a red cent. When the big boss learned of this satisfactory deal, he wanted to compliment the vice-president but was told he was on a fishing trip—trying out the fishing gear he had received from the trading stamps he got when he purchased the cigarettes.

Here's another story Bill Reddell told us about the older days as a rural mail carrier down at Chico: One day, he came to a 30-foot bridge over a creek, water almost out of banks and barely flowing over the bridge floor. He took a look and decided it was safe to cross. As he drove his "litsney" over the bridge, he felt it wobble a bit. Just as he drove off on the other side, he turned to look and saw the bridge floating down the flooded creek.

We'll bet D. C. Carroll could tell a lot of mail carrier stories, too.

Price Thomas says there's a lot of Lynn county history that may be found in abstracts to property. His farm immediately south of Grassland is a part of the old Enos L. Seeds property, and he says the abstract reveals some interesting trades back in the early days.

Seeds first came to the Plains in 1878 with Col. Jasper Hayes' surveying crew making the original survey of Lynn county, which stopped out at Double Lakes. He was so impressed with the country that he came back in about 1880, set up headquarters at present day Grassland in a dugout, drilled a well, later built a house, set up the first store and postoffice on the lower South Plains, which he named Grasslands. This was on the stage route from Colorado City to Gail and Lubbock, and he handled a few provisions for the few ranchers in the country and travelers such as ammunition, flour, coffee, beans, bacon, syrup, sugar, salt, etc. After a few years on the frontier of civilization, he "pulled up stakes" and returned to his native Philadelphia, where he became a millionaire building and bridge contractor. The News has a copy of the letterhead he



used at Grasslands, and a photograph of the 24-foot yacht bearing the name "Tahoka" he acquired after becoming rich. Mr. Seeds visited us twice in the 1890's to see the country he had helped pioneer.

Do you know how Draw got its name? From Moar's Draw, south of Grassland, which heads in Grover Stewart's pasture and becomes quite a scenic canyon down in the Double U and Slaughter pastures. The present lake in Stewart's pasture covers the original springs, where stages changed mules on the Colorado-Gail-Lubbock run. Moar's Draw is named for John and J. Wright Moar, buffalo hunters of the 1870's, which is actually the south fork of Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos river.

Miss Emily Waller, who came to Draw in 1906 with her parents, has promised to help Mrs. A. R. Hensley, the Luttrells, Guy Le Mond, and The Printer work up a list of the first settlers, school teachers, preachers, and store operators in the area.

Albert Williams came bust'g in the office the other day waving a subscription receipt to prove he had already paid for his paper after we had sent him a bill. We bought him a cup of coffee, and he seemed sort of appeased. We're sorry, but occasionally we mail a statement when we shouldn't. In fact, we had three such complaints in one week. Well, The News ain't perfect, and in trying to keep track with 2,000 subscribers we're gonna foul up on a few.

One out of seven Americans is working for the government—federal, state or local. No wonder taxes keep getting higher. You and I and four other workers have to make enough to keep up a tax-supported worker, plus all the other expenses and help to other nations.

Kathy, 10, and Brenda, 6, daughters of J. D. and Joyce Davis, were "raising Cain," and J. D. scolded with much emphasis, "If you don't be quiet, you're going to get grounded for two weeks." Little David, age 5, studied a moment, looked up at his mother, and asked, "Joyce, when is Daddy going to drown me?"

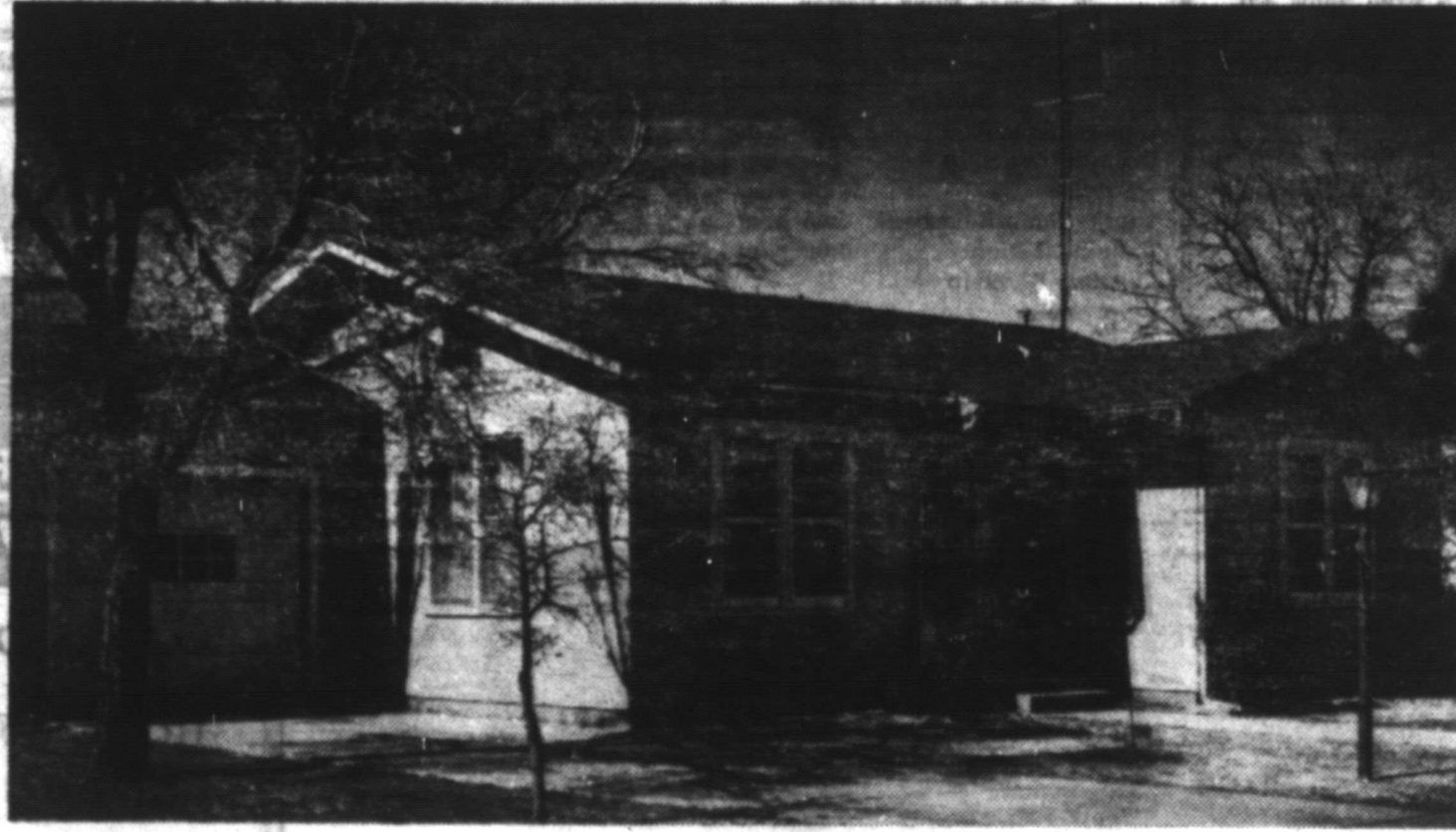

## Better Business Bureau Is On Job To Protect Public, Manager Says

Object of the Better Business Bureau is to promote truth, honesty, and integrity in advertising and selling practices, Tom Watson, manager of Lubbock BBB, told Tahoka Rotarians Thursday noon.

By promoting such honesty, he said, the organization helps protect the free enterprise system. The program of the organization is voluntary self-control by business itself.

Most all business men are honest and their businesses are legitimate. But, there are always a few shysters, usually fly-by-night business men, who promote questionable schemes, confidence games, rackets, etc.

The Bureau of Better Business protects the legitimate merchant and the buying public from such schemes when they come to the organization's attention.

He cited several such questionable schemes now being "worked" in this territory, one being the promotion of lots for retirement homes, vacation cabin sites, etc., most of which he said are "gyp" deals.

He cited one in the Big Bend, for which chances were given at last year's South Plains Fair.

Another deal just ferreted out in a promotion wherein many people have received a notice from a Chicago address that they have won a "free" lot near Taos, N. M.

All the winner has to do is pay the "closing costs," and the lot is his. But, the closing costs are \$49.50, and the land is waste land valued at about \$10.00 per acre.

Among other such schemes being worked in this territory include vacuum cleaner, sewing machine, and automatic ironers deals, which are supposed to work similar to the chain letter deal; free coupon book promotions; postal cards sent out from California advertising "distress merchandise" at fabulously low prices; and the "pitch" on aluminum siding for roofs for homes, wherein the promoter promises to put on aluminum siding worth \$2,600 for \$1,900 as a demonstration and advertising deal for the first home owner in a community, when actually the value of the job is less than \$1,900.

He said his organization in Lubbock welcomes anyone coming in contact with questionable salesmen and promoters.

## "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

There is considerable thought that one reason for labor trouble is so many employees do not realize how well they are paid.

The average worker, whose pay is subject to withholding, only considers the money he gets after the tax bite as his pay. In addition, neither does the average worker realize what government is costing him, hence increased taxes, increased social welfare levies, et al., seem to him to be something the other fellow pays.

It is perhaps not surprising that this slight-of-hand tax collection system was suggested by Beardley Ruml who was a top executive of R. H. Macy. Macy's was one of the first of the big department store operators to inaugurate the revolving plan of credit.

The customer can keep charging items up to a certain credit limit, as long as a stated monthly payment is made, to which is added 18% interest.

The shopper in so many cases fails to realize that the price of everything she buys under this system is in actuality jacked up by 18%.

Thus, there is a sense of well being and security created.

When Macy's Ruml propounded the withholding tax plan, it was immediately recognized as a very cute device to get more and more out of the worker without the worker being too overly conscious.

For example, a laborer may be working for a base pay of \$125 per week, and end up with a pay check of around \$80. He does not say he is getting \$125 per week, he says he's getting \$80 per week. Thus, he can be made unhappy.

But there are some employers around the country who are bringing home to the worker and his wife, the true facts.

Under the law, an employer has to collect the withholding tax, and once a month deposit the collected funds to the credit of the government.

So some employers are paying their workers for three weeks of the month their total pay with no deductions. On the fourth week of the month they deduct the entire tax bite.

Thus, for example, as deductions vary according to dependents, a worker gets his full \$125 per week, for three paydays, and on fourth payday receive something like \$12.50.

There are several advantages to this method. One is with a large payroll the employer can operate with fewer bookkeepers as once a month computation of individual deductions is far simpler than doing the same process every week. In addition, there is far better labor relations, because this method impresses on the workers they actually are quite well paid. In addition, it is making these workers more conscious of waste in government, and hence more responsible citizens. If it is not too far-fetched to predict if a majority of nation's payrolls were handled in this manner, there would be some great economies effected in government.

## Jacobs Nephew Dies In Gas Explosion

Donald C. Patchin, 31, of Perryton, who died Saturday night as a result of burns received in a gas well explosion near Gray, Okla., 12 miles north of Perryton, was a nephew of Jake Jacobs of Tahoka.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon in Pampa at the First Christian Church.

Two other men were injured in the 30-foot flames that were not

extinguished until Sunday when carbon dioxide was used to subdue them.

The victim is survived by his wife and two children.

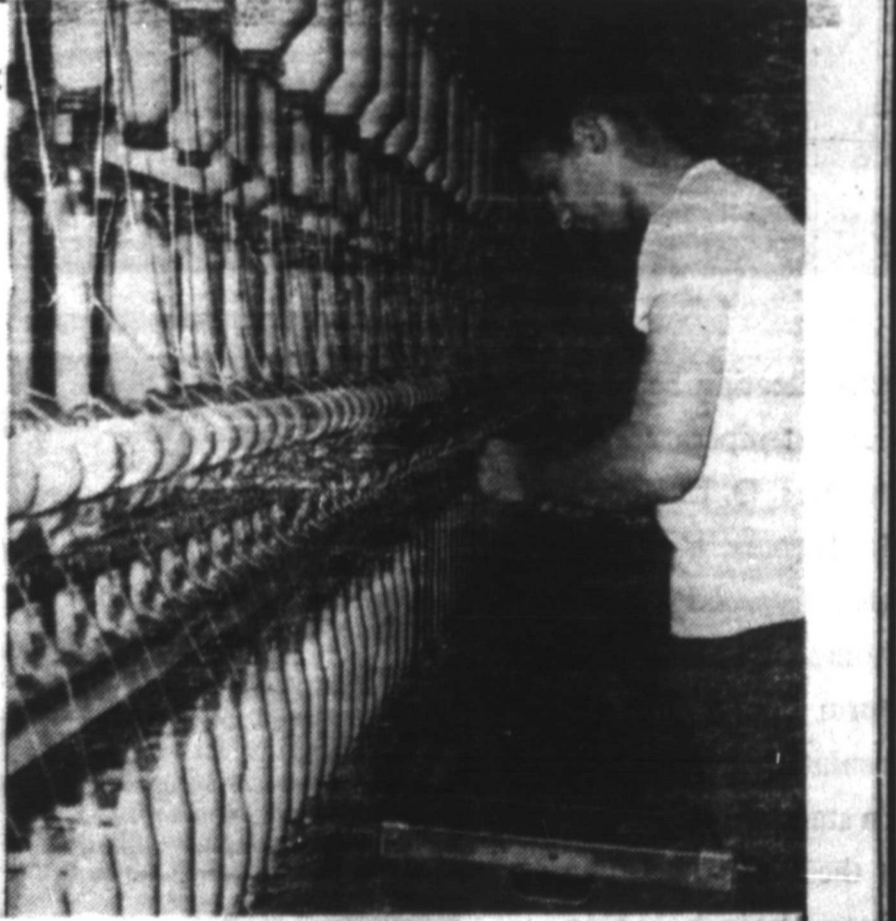
