New Home Accepts Bid On Building

The major contract for the new school building and other school improvements at New Home was let late Wednesday afternoon by the school board, Supt. H. L. Miller states.

West Texas Builders of Lubbock was low bidder on the general contract at \$182,900. The firm proposes to complete its contract in 90 days.

Electrical and mechanical contracts were not awarded Wednesday pending some adjustments in plans, but these contracts will probably be let at a meeting of the board next Tuesday.

Bonds for the school improvements in the sum of \$200,000 were authorized by district voters a few weeks ago.

The new high school building will be erected on the former site of the New Home Baptist Church, adjacent to the present school grounds on the northwest. Plans call for a completely new high school building, including science laboratories, library, gymnasium, and offices in addition to classrooms. The structure will be handy to the homemaker cottage and to the school cafeteria.

Also included in the contract is a four classroom addition to the relatively new elementary school building. Expansion to the school plant was made necessary by a large growth in scholastics the past few years.

D. C. Davis, 89, Funeral Monday

David Crockett Davis, 89, died at his home in Tahoka Monday at 10:20 p. m. following a long illness.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 3:00 p. m. in the First Methodist Church with Rev. Aubrey White, pastor, and Rev. Clyde Smith, district superintendent of the Big Spring District and former pastor here, officiating. Burial was in Tahoka Cemetery under direction of White Funeral Home.

Born April 8, 1874, in McLennan county, he came to Lynn county in 1925 from Crosbyton, where he had been engaged in farming. He and his wife bought property about a mile north of Tahoka, improved it and made it their home for many years before moving to town.

He was married to Nina Lorena Maddox Dec. 25, 1899 in Desdemona and the couple celebrated their 63rd wedding anniversary last Christmas. A long-time leader in the Methodist Church, Mr. Davis served as a steward for many years as well as a Sunday School teacher.

Of an unusually cheerful disposition, Mr. Davis was loved by the entire community. He was a man of strong convictions and highest principles, and few, if anyone, ever questioned his integrity.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Mrs. Lorena Tinsley of Lubbock and Mrs. Evelyn Dollins of Tahoka; one son, Travis B. Davis of Lubbock; nine grandchildren and 17 great grandchildren. He was preceded in death by nine brothers and sisters.

Pallbearers were M. M. Boyd, Earl Tunnell, Roger Bell, C. O. Carmack, Roy Edwards and John Price. Honorary pallbearers were members of the Men's Down Town Bible Class, which Mr. Davis attended regularly until his illness.

Head Of Nazarene Church Is Former Resident Of Tahoka

Dr. Hardy C. Powers of Dallas, former resident of Tahoka, will preside at the meeting of the Abilene District of the Church of the Nazarene in sessions held in Lubbock May 9-10.

Dr. Powers, general superintendent and highest elective official of the Church, was a bank employee in Tahoka until 1932, when he moved to California. He first attended a Church of the Nazarene at Lynn Chapel, although he did not affiliate with the denomination until after he moved to California. His impression of the first meeting he attended at Lynn was, "My, they had a time!"

The former Tahokan retains much of the typical West Texas spirit and attitude, and boasts of his Texas origin in his travels around the world. Rev. James H. Robertson of Abernathy informs The News. In fact, Powers credits the ideals and attitude acquired in West Texas as being vital in his responsibilities which carry him to the most remote areas of the world.

Bids Sought On FM Road Paving

Three miles of new farm-to-market road will be built in Lynn county this summer by the Texas Highway Department, bids for construction of which will be opened in Austin on May 18, according to A. W. Fartain of Lamesa, resident engineer of the Department.

The new paving will be in the Lakeview-Petty area of the northwest part of the county and will extend south from the intersection of Farm Road 1073 and Farm Road 211 at Lakeview Church to intersect with Farm Road 1317, two miles west of Petty gin.

Scholastics Show Increase of 275

Lynn county had 275 more school children enumerated in the recent scholastic census for the 1963-64 school term than for the current 1962-63 term, announces J. P. Hewlett, county superintendent.

A total of 3,203 children of school age have been enumerated for next school term as compared with 2,928 for last year, the highest in many years. Of this number 216 are colored children, compared to 213 last year.

Tahoka shows the largest increase, 142. O'Donnell has a growth of 87, New Home 31, and Wilson 15.

Bloes collected \$175.34 in a house to house drive last Thursday night.

Tahoka's drive is incomplete, but local Boy Scouts received \$274.44 in a canvass of the residence section last Thursday, under direction of Mrs. O. P. Rutledge. Mr. Hewlett collected \$676.94 from business institutions. The Boy Scouts will complete their canvass of the residence section Thursday night, May 9, and Larry Hagood will finish the canvass of the business section, and "Red" Denby will solicit the Colored section of town.

Lakeview Man Dies In Wreck

Funeral services for William Charles Felty, 76 year old Lakeview farmer who was killed Saturday morning in a collision south of Woodrow, were held at 3:00 p. m. Monday in Sanders Funeral Home Chapel in Lubbock.

Rev. J. W. Goforth, pastor of the Primitive Baptist Church in Hale Center, officiated. Burial was in City of Lubbock Cemetery.

Mr. Felty was dead on arrival at Methodist Hospital Saturday following the accident at the intersection of U. S. 87 and FM 41 at 11:30 a. m. when a car driven by Kenneth D. Carmichael, 22, of route 1, Ackerly struck the victim's automobile broadside. Both Carmichael and his wife were injured. The driver received cuts and bruises and Mrs. Carmichael was admitted to Methodist Hospital for treatment of a fractured leg, bruises and abrasions.

Highway patrolmen said Mr. Felty was driving west on FM 41 and the Carmichael car was headed north on U. S. 87. Mr. Felty was thrown from his car just before it stopped off the highway at the northwest corner of the crossing.

Mr. Felty had bought a new car for his wife and she was following him from Slaton in this second car when the fatal accident occurred.

A retired farmer, Mr. Felty had lived in the Lakeview community for about 30 years.

Survivors include his wife; one son, Charles Felty of Slaton; one daughter, Mrs. Kermit Pettyjohn of Amarillo; one brother, Newton Felty of Celeste; five grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

91 Bales of Cotton Are Burned Here

Fire Monday morning and Tuesday night destroyed 91 bales of cotton at C&H Processing Co. here, according to H. W. Carter, owner.

The fire was discovered at 5:45 a. m. Monday by Raymon Montemayor, night watchman at nearby Tahoka Compress, and he turned in the alarm. The fire was believed to have been extinguished by Tahoka Fire Department, but it broke out again during Tuesday night and just about completely destroyed all the re-ginned cotton on the yard.

Line Is Approved For Postmaster Job

Harold Line has been approved as the new postmaster at O'Donnell, according to press reports. His nomination by President John F. Kennedy was approved a few days ago by the U. S. Senate.

Frontier Days got off to a big start here Thursday afternoon with a parade preceding the initial evening performance.

Winners of the float and sheriff posse entries in the parade, or the candidate named Rodeo Queen, had not been announced when the News went to press.

The three-day event will continue through today and Saturday with performances of top rodeo hands featured each night on the stock furnished by M-R Company of Tahoka. Tickets for the events sell at \$1.25 at the gate.

Tahoka Rodeo Association is sponsoring the Frontier Days celebration and will award cash prizes to winners of rodeo events.

Beginning at 8:00 p. m. each evening at the rodeo arena in southwest Tahoka, events will include wild mare racing, bareback bronc riding, calf roping, open barrel racing and bull riding. Saddle bronc riding will carry an added purse of \$100, and bull-clogging \$100 added purse. There will also be junior ribbon roping for boys 17 years and under and an after show event of club roping.

Boyce Hart will entertain at the rodeo as clown. "Speck" Lunkford of Oklahoma will take over the microphone as announcer and Ron Constar of the M-R Company is the arena director.

Light Showers Fall In County

Light showers the past week brought much needed moisture to dry Lynn county, but not enough for dryland planting.

Tahoka received 31 inch Wednesday night and Thursday morning, .07 last Friday and a bare trace on Wednesday of this week.

A strip of country from New Home to the northeast received a half to an inch last Friday, and another light shower in the southeast part of the county brought .20 to Draw. At the same time, O'Donnell reported a half to three-fourths of an inch.

Farmers say right now is the ideal time for a planting rain, but most dry land needs two or three inches to make the moisture meet.

Some early planters have both cotton and maize up to a stand, especially in the north part of the county, but this is a small percent of the total acreage to be planted.

The shower this week brought total precipitation in Tahoka for the year to 2.33 inches, far below normal. In fact, there has been little rain since last mid-October, when 2.01 inches were recorded. Since then, Tahoka has received .44 in November, .72 in December, .02 in January, .76 in February, .70 in March, .54 in April, and .31 in May.

Skies were cloudy, however, on Thursday morning, and there was a possibility of more rain.

New Home, Wilson And O'Donnell Ag Teams Win Places At Tech

Lynn county boys from New Home, Wilson and O'Donnell, and teams from New Home and Wilson took many honors in the 36th annual Texas Tech Vocational Agriculture Judging contests held Saturday.

Considering the immense participation in the contest, 1,500 students on 507 teams representing 157 South Plains and Panhandle schools, Lynn county boys made an excellent showing in the event. The teams were competing with those from Lubbock, Monterey, and many schools much larger.

New Home won the overall high team in the crop division with overall high individuals being Dave Hancock, first; Terry Brown, second; and Elton George, fourth. The New Home team also won second in seed identification teams with high individuals being Dave Hancock, who tied for first, and Brown, second. In grain judging, the New Home team won second and Wilson fifth. Hancock tied for high individual. First place in commercial grain grading teams went to New Home with Brown rated highest individual, George second and Hancock third.

In the meat division Wilson tied for third in judging teams.

New Home was second in overall high teams in the cotton division with Dickie Turner the high individual and Kenny Timmons, fourth. The team took second in grading teams with Turner rating high and Timmons third as individuals. New Home again took third in the stapling team with Adrian Hill the third highest individual.

Dairy Cattle competition saw Gene Herzog of Wilson rated the highest individual in Holstein section, Dennis Woolam of O'Donnell was fourth in Guernsey division.

Wilson took first place in beef

cattle teams as Valton Maeker took second high individual rating. Tommy Swann, in a six-way tie, was second in sheep individuals.

In poultry judging John Navag of Wilson was fourth in overall high individual competition.

A colorful new travel brochure, "Texas... Today's Fun-Tier," has been released by the Texas Highway Department.

The 32-page booklet emphasizes Texas as a land of infinite variety and carries the theme that yesterday's frontier has yielded to "today's fun-tier." The new slogan was adopted by the Highway Department's Travel Division after scores of suggestions had been studied and re-studied.

To overcome the conception of Texas as a vast desert, the brochure stresses lakes and rivers, mountains, forests and greenery, beaches and water sports, tall buildings and a cultural atmosphere. This emphasis is not out of place, says the Highway Department, since Texas has more inland water than any other state except Alaska.

There are 76 full color pictures in the 9 by 12 inch booklet and the cover is a bright, imaginative one painted by a Texas artist. Designed primarily for the out-of-state resident, the new publication will be sent on request to persons contemplating Texas visits.

By-Laws Amended By Farmers Co-op

An amendment to the by-laws and improvements to the old gin plant were authorized at a membership meeting of Farmers Co-operative Association No. 1 of Tahoka in a meeting here Saturday morning.

We are living in unusual times, he said, and the common man is being put on a pedestal. But, our country was founded by uncommon men. Many students today tend to draw back into the crowd. Our goal should be to be outstanding—be willing to make decisions, as men and women and as athletes, and then stand behind them.

Students Challenged
Coach Green declared it is refreshing to see a young man who says "This is what I believe, this is right, and have the courage to stand behind his beliefs. . . Many athletes miss the mark of true greatness because they are unwilling to take a stand, to work extra hours, to put forth that extra effort that makes the difference between common and greatness. . . doing their dead level best is outstanding, not caring if they are uncommon."

Coach Gilbert Hough introduced the speaker, a former halfback at University of Oklahoma, and former assistant coach at Univer-

sities of Wichita, Missouri, and Arkansas.

O'Donnell Dedicates Church, Organized 52 Years Ago

History of the O'Donnell First Methodist Church has been recounted as a result of dedication ceremonies for the new \$75,000 plant at which Bishop Paul V. Galloway of San Antonio officiated.

The new building was completed in 1900, and the entire plant is valued in excess of \$100,000.

Participants in the service also included Rev. Howard Marcom of Merkel, former pastor under whose leadership the new building was erected; Rev. Hugh A. Hunt of Lubbock, architect; Dr. Dallas D. Dennison of Brownfield, district superintendent; Rev. David Hamblin, the pastor; and Carl Sanders,

chairman of the official board. Mrs. Hester Gates Horgan, 218 S. Humboldt, Denver 9, Colorado, furnished the O'Donnell Index. Press the following history of the church will be of interest to many oldtimers of Lynn county:

History Given Of O'Donnell Methodist Church

In 1878 Lynn County, Texas, was created and named for G. W. Lynn. It was in 1902 that Lynn Mission (County) first appeared in the Conference records of the Abilene district of the Methodist Church. In 1904 the Colorado District was created from the Abilene and Clarendon Districts. Gail, Lamasa and Tahoka were "charges" listed in 1909 "Pride charge" was added.

In 1911 the First Methodist Church of O'Donnell was organized by T. A. Knight, who became the first pastor. Draw was a part of the O'Donnell Circuit until 1928; T-Bar was an afternoon appointment until about 1943.

In 1920 the first church (Methodist) was built by Jim Shook, (father of Jeff Shook) Wiley Phillips and Jake Gates. Prior to this time services were held in the school building. Bro. W. C. Hart and his wife, Angie, lived in the parsonage just west of the present church.

Jim Shook's funeral was the first one held in the new church the following year. A few years later the church sponsored a church crop. Some land west of town was rented by the church. Local members who had farm machinery met and planted the cotton. The congregation turned out to chop and pick the crop. Picnic dinners were prepared and served by the women folk. The income from the crop enabled the congregation to enlarge the church building in 1929 when C. A. Duncan was pastor.

Another addition was made in 1948 when Alby J. Cockrell was pastor. The old parsonage was sold and lots purchased to the east of the present sanctuary in 1950 and a new \$14,000 parsonage was built while H. A. Longino was pastor. On April 28, 1963 the new church will be dedicated. It was built in 1960 during Howard Marcom's pastorate. This new building is a fitting tribute to the early members and pastors of the past 52 years.

The only charter member still active in this church is Mrs. Glen (Fleta) Allen. (Land was donated to this church and other churches of the young town by H. E. Baldrige and Chas. Doak, who developed the townsite. Mr. Baldrige was the father of Mrs. Ben Moore, Sr.) The following pastors serving O'Donnell were:

T. A. Knight, T. A. Jackson, W. R. Kirkpatrick, J. W. Fulton, W. C. Hart, Joseph E. Eldridge, W. B. Hicks, J. P. Weems, C. A. Duncan, W. R. Burnett, M. R. Pike, J. H. Crawford, O. M. Addison, H. H. Hollowell, E. H. Crandall, Alby J. Cockrell, H. A. Longino, Marvin Menefee, Marvin Fisher, Howard Marcom and David Hamblin for a total of 24 pastors.

Local Men Weigh More, Women Less Than In 1929

(Special To The News) New York—Lynn county's male population is carrying around tons of excess weight.

The average man, locally, is about five pounds heavier than was his counterpart, of the same height, in 1929.

What this adds up to, for the male community as a whole, is an increase of 27,400 pounds, or 13.7 tons.

The figures are based on averages determined through national surveys conducted by the Society of Actuaries and by the Department of Agriculture.

The degree of overweight, compared with 1929, appears to vary with age and with height. For the 5-foot-8-inch group, it is found that 4 extra pounds have been put on by those who are 25 years old, 6 pounds by the 35-year-olds, 8 pounds by those who are 45 and 3 pounds by men at age 50.

What about the women? For them the weight trend is just the opposite. They weigh less today, at a given height and age, than women did in 1929.

At age 22, the average 5 foot 4 inch woman now weighs 121 pounds. She would have weighed 128 pounds in 1929. The woman of 27 tips the beam now at 125, compared with 129 previously.

Age 40, however, is her nemesis. After she reaches that milestone she starts going up in weight. Within a few years, the gains she had made disappear.

To get back to the men, just getting rid of that extra five pounds they have put on in the last 20-odd years would not be sufficient to satisfy the medical authorities. They contend that the average American male is about 20 pounds too heavy from a health standpoint.

At his present weight, they say, the mortality rate is about 10 percent higher than it should be. "It is quite clear that among

men at ages 30 and over the lowest mortality ratios are consistently associated with underweight," state the actuaries.

For Lynn county's male population to take off the recommended 20 pounds would mean disposing of 55 tons of beef.

Cutting down on the food intake is considered the best means of reducing. Exercise, however, is an important adjunct. The Air Force finds that running, rowing and the twist burn up the most calories. These are not recommended for overweight men over 40.

Steven Palmer, 12 year old seventh grade son of Mr. and Mrs. Cleddie Palmer of Vernon, will make the trip to Washington, D. C. to participate in the National Spelling Bee representing the Wichita Falls region.

Steven's mother is the former Claudia Draper, well known in Tahoka.

The boy is making his second trip to Washington, going two years ago when he was 10 years old and finishing seventh in the nation. However, the Wichita Falls region does not allow a speller to compete two years in a row and he was denied the opportunity last year, as he will be next year.

The Palmers have an older daughter, Virginia, who is a high school student.

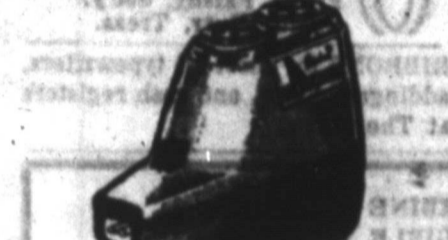

WASHINGTON AND
"SMALL BUSINESS"

While the nation's independent business and professional people, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business favor a reduction in taxes now, almost 85% of the businessmen also say government costs should be cut to offset a tax slash.

Now, there seems to be a strange reaction to this request for cutting government costs along the program. The very ones who are just where costs can be cut.

For quite some time, the nation's independent businessmen have voted protesting foreign aid.

Why is this not done? No body seems to know.

The entire foreign give away scheme was sold as a means of helping some war torn nations get on their feet. \$100 billion later it is well to review some facts.

For example, somehow the Swedes get up to the trough. As everyone knows, Sweden is the most prosperous country in Europe and with an average factory wage scale of \$1 per hour, maintains the highest wage scale in Europe. In addition, through two world wars, Sweden was neutral.

Thus, not only has a shell or bomb never dropped on the Swedes, but during the hostilities they have been able to do some quite profitable business in military hardware.

Thus, the Swedes need help about as much as Paul Getty needs to receive social security checks. Yet, they have been able to tap the American taxpayers for \$11 billion. About 20% of this is in the form of "loans," the rest has been an outright gift.

And there are other paradoxes. On one hand, the American taxpayer has been tapped to give Israel some \$570 million, of which 40% is an outright gift, and also \$628 million has gone to the United Arab Republic, of which 40% is also an outright gift.

This is somewhat similar to the situation that would result if a City Council voted about equal amounts of money to buy ammunition with which to shoot at each other, and then gave the Mayor, say we want peace around town.

In addition, there has come into being another new wrinkle. Every time a black tribe in Africa decides to set up a nation under the guise of anti colonialism, they apparently immediately qualify for U.S. foreign give away gifts. There is even some wonder if this concentration on anti-colonialism would have become so great if there were not U.S. foreign give away funds around.

At the present time, the American taxpayer has been tapped for \$4 billion to spread around some 28 African nations. Some billions have been given, not loaned, to the Congo, the Ugandas, the Mali, the Ghana, and all the rest, because no matter how primitive these tribesmen are, there is always a chief smart enough to know the value of the U.S. dollar.

NOTARIES PUBLIC MUST RE-QUALIFY DURING MAY

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1963 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1963 and June 10, 1963.

Martin emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between April 1, 1963 and May 20, 1963. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of re-appointing present Notaries.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk. 31-4tc
