March with an infection in her left leg will undergo major surgery, Tuesday morning. We wish her the best of luck and a speedy recovery.

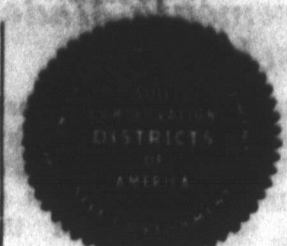

Lynn County Soil Conservation District News

At the present it appears that some stands of blue panic froze out this winter. True, it was a cold winter, but the plants had to be in a weakened condition for the complete stand to freeze. Heavy or overgrazing is probably the major reason the plants could not survive. When grass is overgrazed, the root system remains small and close to the top of the ground. With the root system stunted, the grass could not withstand the severe cold.

This not only applies to blue panic but to all grass. Grass cannot remain if it is continuously overgrazed.

Charles Baker and Lawrence May have become concerned over the condition of the May estate ranch which they lease and they plan to do something about it. Charles and Lawrence have signed a Great Plains Conservation Program Contract and are ready to start on a five year program that will enable them to apply all necessary conservation.

Their plan calls for about 1000 acres of brush to be sprayed or root plowed. The root plowed areas are to be reseeded to native

grasses. Wells are to be drilled and storage facilities constructed. Fences are to be built and a farm pond constructed.

All of these practices when carried out will result in a better job of management thus making the ranch more productive. Charles and Lawrence will receive cost share through the GPCP and technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service.

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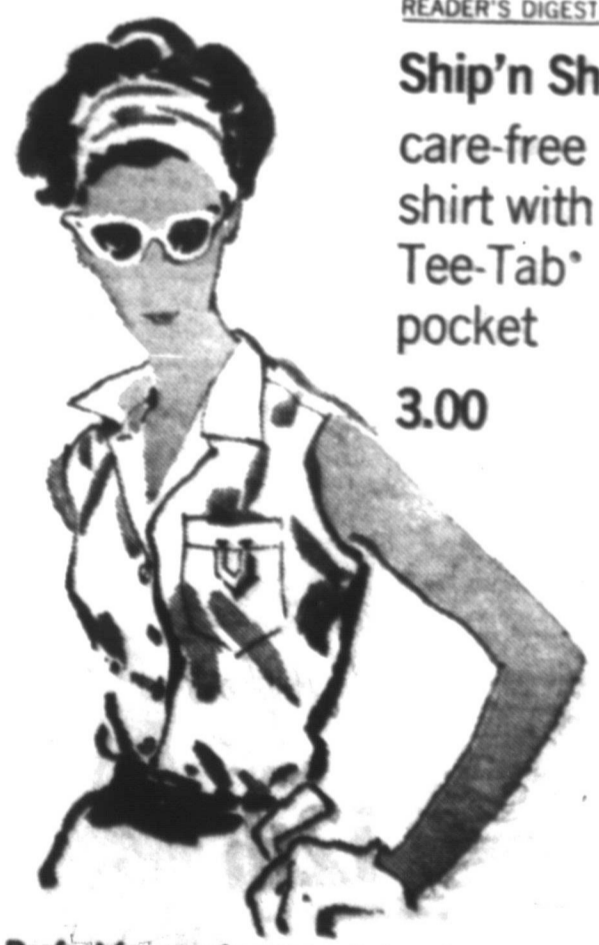
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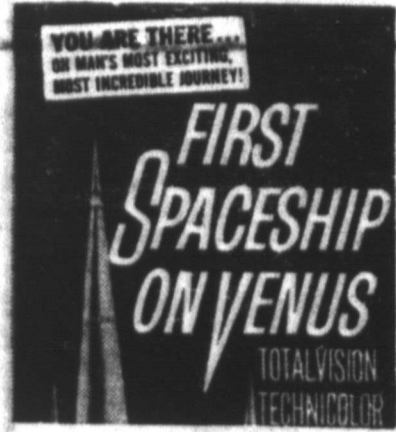

Wheat Program Warning Given

County Agent Bill Griffin says there are still a number of Lynn county wheat producers with small allotments (15 acres or less) who do not understand that they have to sign up by Monday, May 13, at the ASCS office to become eligible to vote in the referendum of May 21.

If such a grower does not sign up by Monday, and the referendum vote on May 21 is "yes" by two-thirds of the nation's wheat growers, this small grower will not be eligible to participate in the new program.

Regulations definitely state a small grower must sign up seven days before the referendum to become eligible for price support and land diversion payment when and if the program is approved. Filing of written intention to participate in the program, if approved by two-thirds, he obligates himself to participate.

On the other hand, if the small producer does not desire to participate in the program, he files no intention and will not be eligible to vote in the referendum.

Furthermore, he will not receive certificates, price support, or land diversion payments. However, he will still be required to plant within his acreage allotments and find a sale for his wheat on the open market.

Huffaker Raps Critics of Farming, "The Wanderers" Sing At Rotary

"The Wanderers," a seventh grade choral group directed by Mrs. Vic Kyler, presented a program of three numbers at Tahoka Rotary Club Thursday noon of last week.

Debbie Wright introduced the group and accompanied the group at the piano. Other members are: Beverly Falls, Loretta Webb, Jan Roberts, Zan Ashcraft, Elva Jo Edwards, Vicki Jacobs, Brenda Drager, Quaydene Pool, and Janis Swinford.

Calloway Huffaker, club president, stirred up a "hornet's nest" of approval from club members when, in a brief talk, he said he was getting tired of hearing various forces in Washington and in urban centers lambast the farmer and farming for about \$14 billion of the current federal deficit.

He declared there is not a person in Tahoka who does not depend entirely, directly or indirectly, on farming for a livelihood, and the time has come for all forces in this area to take a firm stand in defense of farming and farm economy.

He asserted that in the first place all this deficit should not be charged to farming. The Federal government charges up many expenses to farming, such as the school lunch program and upkeep of the national parks, for which the farmer is not responsible at all.

"Cut off the school lunch program in some city like Boston, and you'd certainly hear a big howl," stated Huffaker.

Our government is subsidizing so many other lines of business, such as airlines shipping, defense plants, etc., that it is hard for agriculture to maintain its position without subsidization.

The government, in effect, even subsidizes Dupont to build mills for manufacture of synthetic goods to compete with cotton but places no controls over the manufacture of these fibers; while the cotton farmer is cut down 20 percent or more on his production capacity. Cut down on Dupont's production, and you'd certainly hear a holler.

"If we're going to control one, we must control the other," Huffaker declared. Cotton is in bad shape, man-made fibres are taking its place, and we should all unite and put on the pressure to save our top money crop.

Several other club members jumped to their feet to heartily approve Huffaker's statements, one pointing out that also beef imports have risen from 6 to 9 percent recently; another that we are still importing beef from Argentina and Australia to feed the Armed Forces, that we are still sending farming experts around

the world to teach foreign countries how to raise cotton; and another pointed out we should start an economy program on the local level and give more attention to taxes and candidates for office.

Charles Brock was in charge of the program.

President Huffaker imposed fines on four Rotarians for various "offenses." Leighton Knox to furnish fish for a club fish fry, and Larry Hagood, Lynn Seale, and Fred McGinty to fry and serve them.

Don Browning and Maurice Small, club president and secretary-elect, were attending a district Rotary Institute for incoming club officers at Littlefield on last Thursday.

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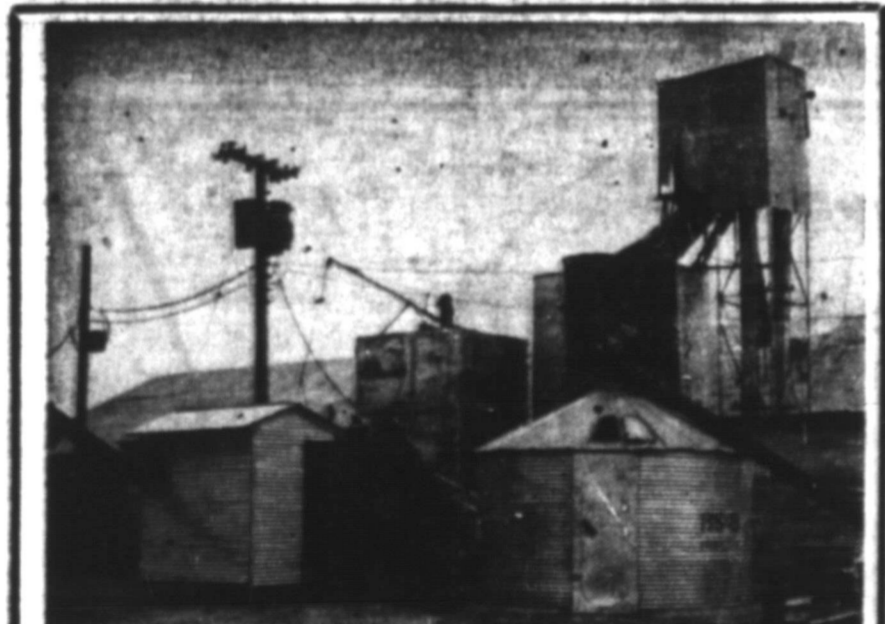

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We wish our Congressman, George Mahon, could sit in our office a few days and hear some of the comments by the average run of farmers coming into this place. Fully 60 or 70 percent comment on some phase of Federal government with which they are not at all pleased. First, they are concerned about agriculture, especially cotton, and wonder when Congress is going to quit making a political football of agriculture. They wonder why we can't have a long range program with a minimum of control and red tape. Most oppose excessive foreign aid. Most oppose the big spending program. Most are critical of the unions, the growing power of organized labor, and making the use of braceros practically impossible. Most are inherently Democrats, voted for the Kennedy administration, but disagree with most of his radically-left programs. A number comment unfavorably on Mr. Mahon's vote to pack the House rules committee, which was a move to try to get Mr. Kennedy's proposals put over in Congress.

One thing we can't help but notice: Farmers feel much freer to express themselves on government than businessmen.

One farmer told us Saturday: "I vote Democratic as the lesser of two evils. I can still remember Hoover and the depression. But, I don't agree with the Kennedy Administration, either—I just hope—and I am disillusioned. I don't believe George Mahon knows the score (of people's thinking at home). Yarborough doesn't represent us; any good reasonably strong Democrat should beat him. John Tower talks good sense, but a good strong reasonably conservative Democrat will beat him. Things are all mixed up, and the farming country is not being represented as it should be."

Not all great men are known far outside their home territory. Many people of this area will long remember D. C. Davis, 88, who died last week after having lived here 38 years. He was a man of highest morals and integrity, a true Christian, and never wavered in his sound beliefs. He believed in the things that made America great, never backed up on these principles, but at the same time he was not offensive to others. Men like Mr. Davis are hard to replace. He has influenced the lives of many for the good. And, while we're at it, we'd like to point out that Mrs. Davis is the same kind of lady that Mr. Davis was a man.

Named David Crockett Davis, for the Texas hero, he was a true Texan of the old school. Born in Texas and reared in Texas, his feet had never touched any other soil. In fact, he was so proud of his Texas heritage he never in his 89 years stepped across the state line because he half jokingly said he "didn't want to dirty up his feet."

And, say, don't forget the mothers while they are still with us. Our mother is gone, but, if you'll pardon the personal note, we'd like to say the greatest woman in the world today to The Printer is the gal who has been his partner for all these years. We don't know what we'd do without her. And, to all the other mothers, we tip our hat—the world will be fine as long as we have good mothers!

Basemen of the Thomas (Rutherford) building was flooded, as was Craft's tailor shop, and Jake Leedy had to build a dike at the front door to keep his cafe from being flooded.

The issue also reports the sentencing of Elmo Banks, Negro, to death by electrocution by Judge Gordon B. McGuire for the March 6 murder of Deputy Sheriff F. E. (Ed) Redwine. Redwine had gone to the jail to feed prisoners when Banks wrested the pistol from him and fired three shots into his body. Banks escaped, but, after a man-hunt, was found near Wells store.

P. W. Goad was county judge, Hobert Nelson was state senator, T. L. Price was district attorney, and Truett Smith was county attorney. Harley Sadler Circus was coming to Tahoka, D. B. English had just opened the new Ada Theatre, and Tahoka was preparing to participate in the Texas Centennial parade at Lubbock. Prentice Walker was high school coach, Wilson had 123 pupils in high school, and M. L. H. Baze reported Brownfield had 950 school students.

NOTARIES PUBLIC MUST RE-QUALIFY DURING MAY

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1965 must re-qualify

by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between June 1, 1963 and June 10, 1963.

Martin emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk between April 1, 1963 and May 20, 1963. Application during this period will assure prompt attention before the rush procedure of re-appointing present Notaries.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk. 31-4tc

Ethel Robinson "Dean" Of County's Pioneers

Robinson's Ready-to-Wear was opened in 1935, but the owner, Mrs. Hall (Ethel) Robinson, has lived in Lynn county longer than any other living person. As the county celebrates its 60th anniversary, this fall she will have been here 65 years.

Born in old Caughman, a suburb of Dallas, she first came to Lubbock with her mother, then Mrs. Effie Cooke, in 1891, when Ethel was an infant, and returned to make their home in 1896. Mrs. Cooke a widow, met and married Jack Alley on November 28, 1898, and she and her little daughter came here to live on the ranch.

Mr. Alley was manager of Col. C. C. Slaughter's Tahoka Lake Ranch, the headquarters of which was then where Marshall Stewart now farms, west of Grassland. Alley filed on four sections of land at Tahoka Lake, and unknown to the Alleys, Col. Slaughter had the ranch house moved to the north springs at Tahoka Lake and donated the house to Mrs. Alley. The remodeled ranch house had the first bath tub in this section.

Tahoka Lake Ranch then covered much of the east half of the county. During this time, two of the highest Hereford bulls in the world, up to that time, were among the stock on the ranch.

As a child, Ethel, and also her mother, frequently rode the range with the cowboys, attended cowboy dances and parties, and even helped fight prairie fires. At one time Ethel was the only child in the county.

Mr. Alley had the first car in the area, a 1902 Model F. Buick, secured the dealership for the car, and sold the first automobiles to men in Terry, Borden, and Scurry counties. He was an early day postmaster here and also owned local businesses, a part of the time still managing the ranch.

Mr. Alley was one of the organizers of Lynn county in the spring of 1903, when a group of settlers met at Tahoka Lake south springs to plan the formation of the county and town of Tahoka. He was also an original member of the Tahoka Townsite Co.

Ethel attended school at Lubbock, a convent in Stanton, old Birdwell College in Big Springs, and Simmons College in Abilene. She was married to Hall Robinson in 1908, and he and their only son, Jack Alley Robinson, operate Lynn County Tractor Co., dealers in Ford tractors, implements, and Mercury cars. Jack and wife, Jobelle, member of another pioneer family, the Millikens, have two children Britt and Julie, in whom they all take

much pride.

Mrs. John (Loreta) Hill is Mrs. Robinson's chief clerk, and joined the firm in 1942. Born at Crowell, Mrs. Hill was reared at Stephenville. When she came to Slaton to work in 1928, she met John Hill of Wilson and they were married that fall. They moved to Tahoka in 1939. The Hills have on daughter, Mrs. Charles (Jereta) Smart, who lives in Lubbock.

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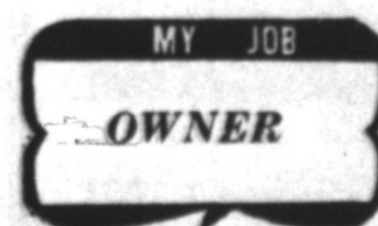
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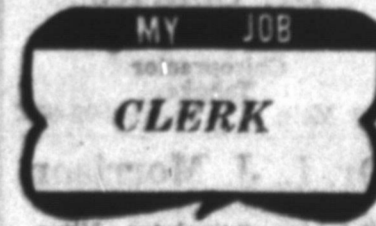
