**Soil Samples Are Processed Promptly During January**

College Station - You can get prompt service on samples submitted to the soil testing laboratory during December. C. D. Welch, Extension Soil Chemist at Texas A&M, who is in charge of the laboratory, says that right now they are processing the samples and getting the returns to the producer within a week. They hope to maintain this prompt service through January, Welch says, but generally the requests for soil tests increase after Christmas and there is often a delay in getting a reply.

Welch suggests that you consult your county agent on how to take a representative sample. He can also tell you how soil tests can supply you with information that will help you make greater profits from the use of fertilizer.

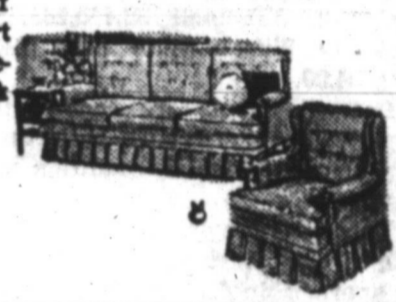

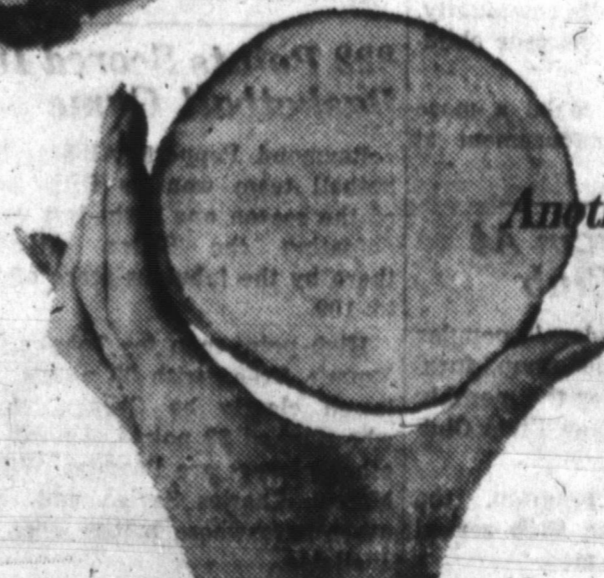

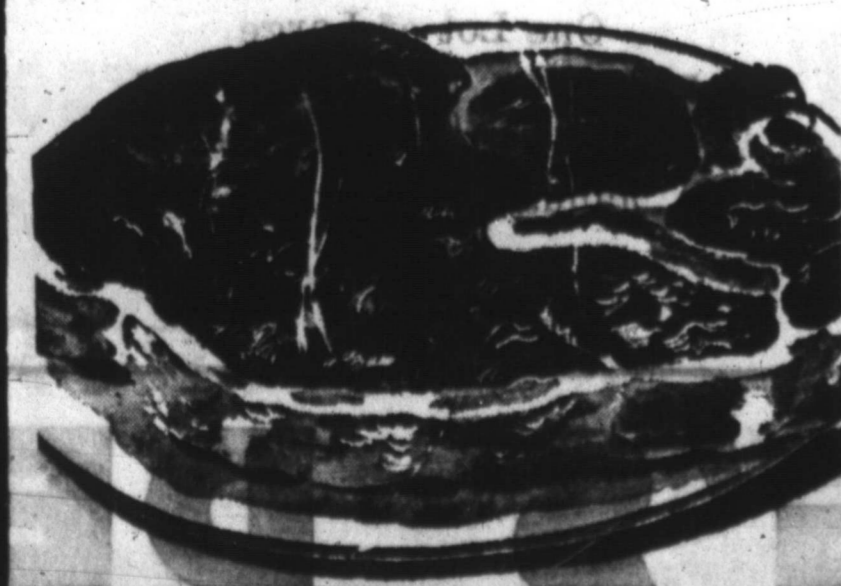

The Bulldogs put up a strong fight, especially the first half and the Tigers led 12-10 at the end of the first quarter and only by one point 26-25 at halftime. The local quintet was not able to contain the high scoring Slaton team and the Tigers held a 44-33 third period margin, before winning the game by seven points.

Bakers, to avoid this hazard, added an extra loaf to deliveries of 12, making the number 13 the well-known "baker's dozen."

## WASHINGTON AND SMALL BUSINESS

Perhaps the most frustrating job in the entire world is that of holding down the office of U.S. Secretary of Agriculture.

His primary job, of course, is to work toward bettering the lot of the farmer. The farmer is only well off when he gets a sufficient price for his produce, and yet the price to the consumer is not too high to stop consumption.

But as long as C. W. Harder as the American farmer is saddled with the promoters of monopoly labor in government, plus the promoters of an expanding welfare state, the Secretary of Agriculture may as well spend his time fishing.

The biggest expense item in these articles is created by Jimmy Hoffa, whose teamsters get the lion's share. For example, the cost of delivering bread to the grocery store now accounts for about 40% of the wholesale cost. In other words, it costs 5c to move from bakery store shelf a loaf of bread that contains 2.4c worth of wheat.

The same report says farmer receives only 11c for oranges in a 50c cart of orange juice.

On other canned fruit and vegetable products, the value of the farm product is even less, due largely to the welfare

## Tahoka Endorses Lubbock School

Local endorsement of the proposal to locate the new state school for mentally retarded near Lubbock was given here Friday as a result of a visit of 24 Lubbock business and civic leaders.

An equal number of Tahoka and Lynn county officials and business men met the Lubbock group at the City-Legion building and heard a 30-minute program presented by B. E. Rushing Jr., spokesman for the visitors.

Lubbock, among about 30 towns bidding for the school, to be located west of the 100th meridian, has offered a 200-acre site and many other advantages, Rushing said. The school is expected to have 1,500 to 2,000 students.

Other such schools in Texas are located at Denton, Mexia, Austin (2), and Lufkin, while others have been authorized for Richmond and Corpus Christi.

Mayor Meldon Leslie and Tahoka city councilmen present pledged support, as did County Judge Walter M. Mathis and two of the four county commissioners who were present.

Turner Rogers, Chamber of Commerce president, welcomed the Lubbock men. They were served coffee by Mrs. Retha Dunn, C. of C. secretary.

Perry Flippin, student in Abilene Christian College, was here last week visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Welch Flippin. Perry is working for the college newspaper, The Optimist. During the fall, he wrote sports for the Abilene Reporter-News.

## Allen Cox Speaks At Rotary Club

Allen Cox, senior in Tahoka High, was the New Year's speaker at Tahoka Rotary Club Thursday noon of last week, using the subject, "America On Trial."

In a stirring address, Allen cited that in these critical times we seemingly are losing our love for country, paying only lip service to God, becoming a nation of conformists, putting pleasure above vital things and thinking of small things when we need to think of more meaningful things like liberty, justice, religion, and equality.

He quoted Billy Graham as saying the life cycle of most nations has been only 200 years from slavery to freedom and then back to bondage. The pattern, he said, seems to be holding true in America as we give up our freedoms.

Bolshevism started in Russia in 1903 with 17 members, and today the Communists control more than one billion people. Khrushchev has openly set his goal for complete conquest of the world by 1973, which would be three years short of the prediction made by Billy Graham.

Pointing to disinterest of citizens to principles of the patriots who made America great, the growing juvenile delinquency, crime, unwillingness to take a stand for the right by so many people, our back-slides before the Communists, the playing-down in school textbooks of patriotism, and other signs of decay, Allen said we must reverse our trend toward decay. "A nation first falls from within," he declared.

The speaker was introduced by Calloway Huffaker, program chairman, as an outstanding young man, president of the senior class, vice president of the National Honor Society, and president of the Student Body last year.

H. B. McCord Jr., in a five-minute Rotary talk, emphasized the importance of club members attending all meetings. "You can not get anything from Rotary if you are not present," he said, and automatically lose membership on missing four successive meetings. He also cited the pleasure he got from making up missed meetings at other clubs.

President Don Browning announced a feature of club meetings, the selection of a "Rotarian of the Month" and proceeded to pay tribute to Wynne Collier, the first man selected for this honor, "a man who thinks and lives Rotary every day."

He named Calloway Huffaker, Alton Cain, and Harold Roberts to a committee to select a "Rotarian of the Month" for January.

Browning also announced a new attendance contest, with the 51-member group divided into three teams of 17 men each, with Harold Green, captain of the No. 1 group, George McCracken of No. 2, and Wayne Waters of No. 3. Loser will contribute a sum to Rotary Foundation, and the group finishing second will contribute a somewhat smaller amount to the fund.

Dr. Emil Prohl and A. M. Bray were appointed to prepare a tape recording to be sent to a Rotary District Conference in England, at which David Bray, Rotary Foundation student, attending Oxford University, will be a principal speaker.

Turner Rogers, C. of C. president, invited Rotarians to help greet the Lubbock boosters here Friday.

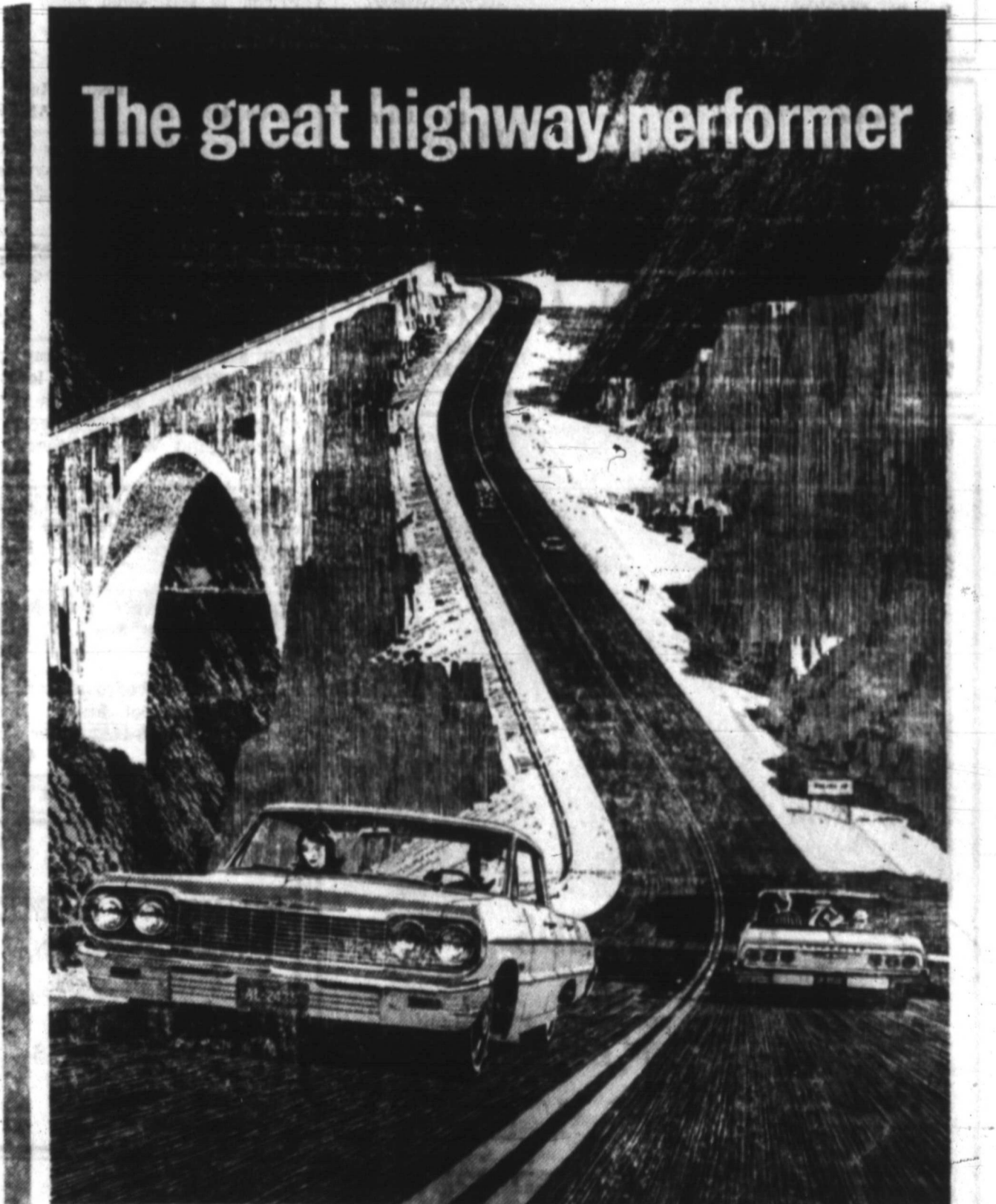

Let your child know from the start that you have no faith in your school system, and be sure to criticize the teacher in his presence.

When your child comes home day after day without any books or assignments, and tells you he has "nothing to do," always believe him.

Encourage your child to dress in a sloppy manner when he goes to school. It's cute, and besides that idea that sloppy dress, behavior, and achievement go hand in hand, is old-fashioned.

Keep him out of school each day attendance inconveniences you, or it rains, snows, or he wants to stay in bed.

When the teacher or principal sends a note home, read it, and then get mad about it. Rush over to the school and tell the teacher and principal they are "picking on your child."

This will guarantee failure in school . . . and in life.

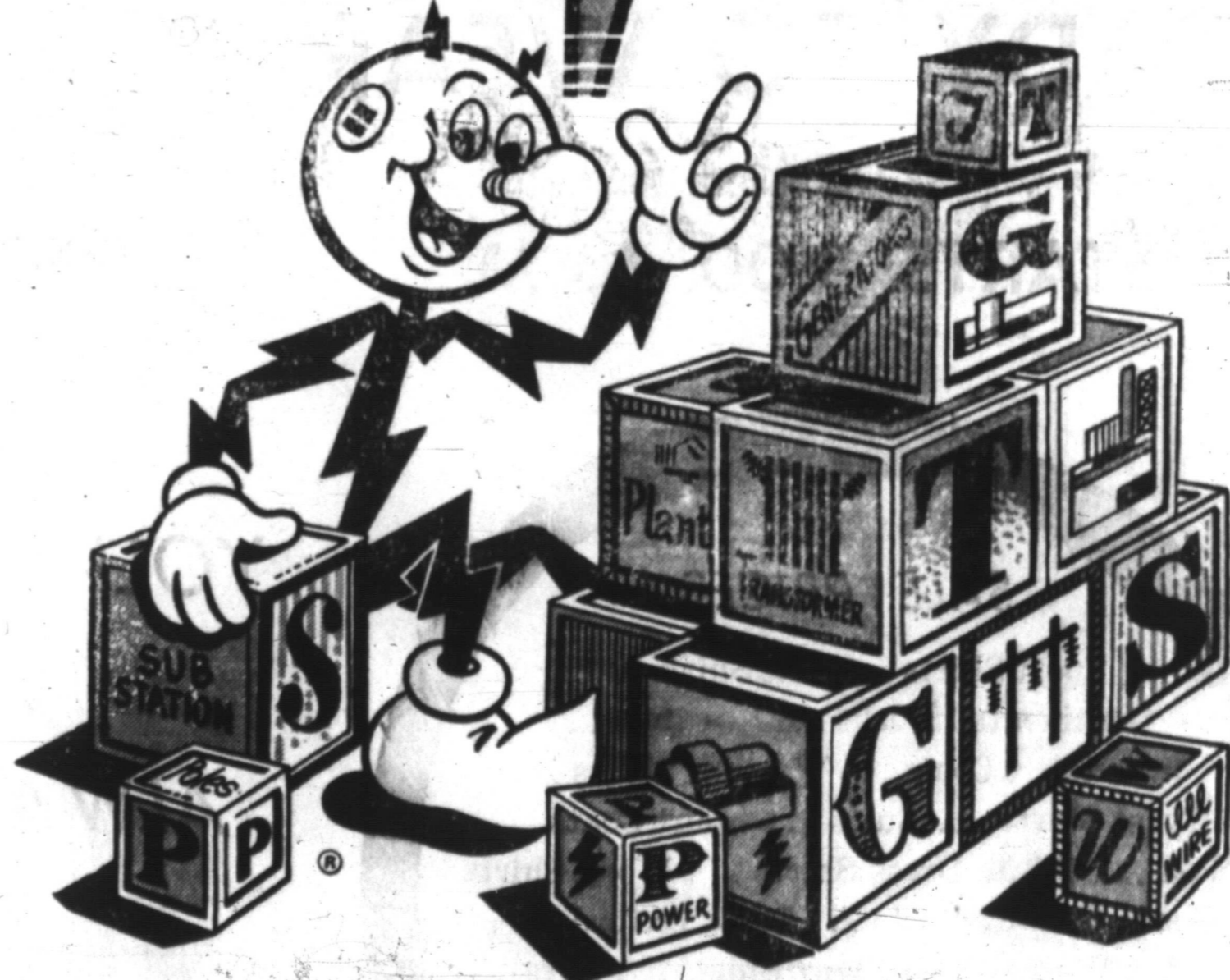
