





Friday, January 10, 1964 Reviewing Tax Rules Boll Weevils May Save Money. Specialist Saus

College Station-It soon will be ime to start to work on your income tax report, says Mrs. Wanda B. Meyer, home management specialist with the Agricultural University.

You may want to review some alive. of the rules which may help you save-if they apply in your case. Here's a checklist:

A portion of a dividend payment on stocks that is designated as return of investment is not subyour profit when you later sell the stock.

A mutual-fund dividend, the portion that is designated as capital gain, is taxable, in effect, at only one-half of your ordinary

Capital gains allotted to you on mutual-fund shares, but not paid, have to be reported as capital gains on your return. But you can claim credit of 25 percent of the amount as taxes you have paid, as that's the sum paid by the com-

A child who finished college in June, 1963, can be claimed as an exemption, under the rule for fulltime student of 19 years or over, provided you furnished more than in the area of conservation in the one-half of his support for the entire year.

Scholarship payments received Helen Peek rolled 190 and 439 live in the city or in the country by a child in college aren't count--are land users in their own right in calculating whether you furnished more than a half of his

support. Social security and other taxexempt income received by a dependent doesn't count toward the income test that has to be met the care of your land may help for an exemption. But any such income spent by the dependent for his own support has to be included in estimating whether you furnished more than half.

Other rules to consider are: A couple married at any time during the year, as late as December 31, can get the benefit of a lower rate for 1963 on a joint return; a dependent who died during the year, even the first week, can be claimed as an exemption if you were furnishing more than half of his support; people who reached age 65 on January 1, 1963, are entitled to an extra exemption and larger medical deduction.

Don Rummel, Area Extension Entomologist, says even if no weevils are alive, it might take up to five years of work to prove conclusively the weevil can't sur vive the winter on and near the ject to tax, although it reduces High Plains. But if weevils in the the cost basis on which you figure cages are alive at winter's end, the question will be quickly answered Then control measures wil be begun with aid of researchers, chemical companies, and farmers.

In addition to the cage studies, trash samples from various possible over-wintering sites will be examined for weevils during winter. This part of the study may also indicate which sites might be most favorable for weevil overwintering.

The Extension Service is planning a spring survey of earlyplanted cotton in an attempt to! detect emergence of overwintered weevils. If weevils are present in early season, a chemical control program would be the most logical approach to control, says Rummel. This, combined with a fall spray program to reduce numbers before they enter diapause, will be recommended to prevent yield loss and provide control.






