## O'Donnell Calls Bond Election

O'Donnell school district has called a \$275,000 bond election for Saturday, April 4, same time and place as the trustee election, in the school auditorium for a proposed new construction program.

### Foods Plentiful As April Arrives

College Station — April brings a shower of foods, along with traditional rain showers, as seven foods are especially plentiful, reports the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Such items as beef, cottage cheese, eggs, rice, canned ripe olives, dried beans and canned corn are expected to be abundant, according to the Agricultural Marketing Service, the U. S. Department of Agriculture agency that compiles the monthly list of plentiful.

Egg prices paid to farmers dropped more than 10 percent between mid-January and late February. April supplies are expected to be above those of a year ago, with prices below last year's attractive retail level. As of January 1, canned corn stocks were at a record high, and heavy supplies also should be much in evidence during April.

Substantial January-to-March increases in the number of fed beef cattle have resulted in a much larger meat supply.

Creamed cottage cheese production is expected to exceed last year's 787 million pound record. Dry bean production netted a record 12 percent above average. A record-rice crop and the possibility of a record canned ripe olive supply make these big items for April.

Most of these foods are produced extensively in Texas, says the Service.

Foods listed as "plentiful" by AMS are expected to be more than adequate to meet normal trade needs.

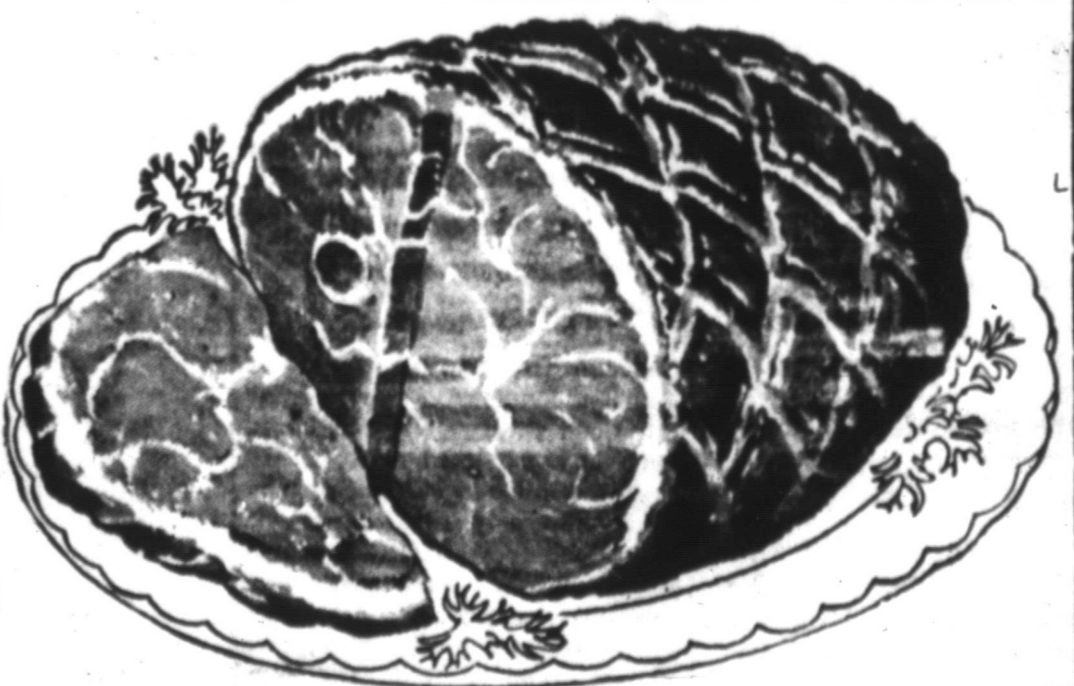

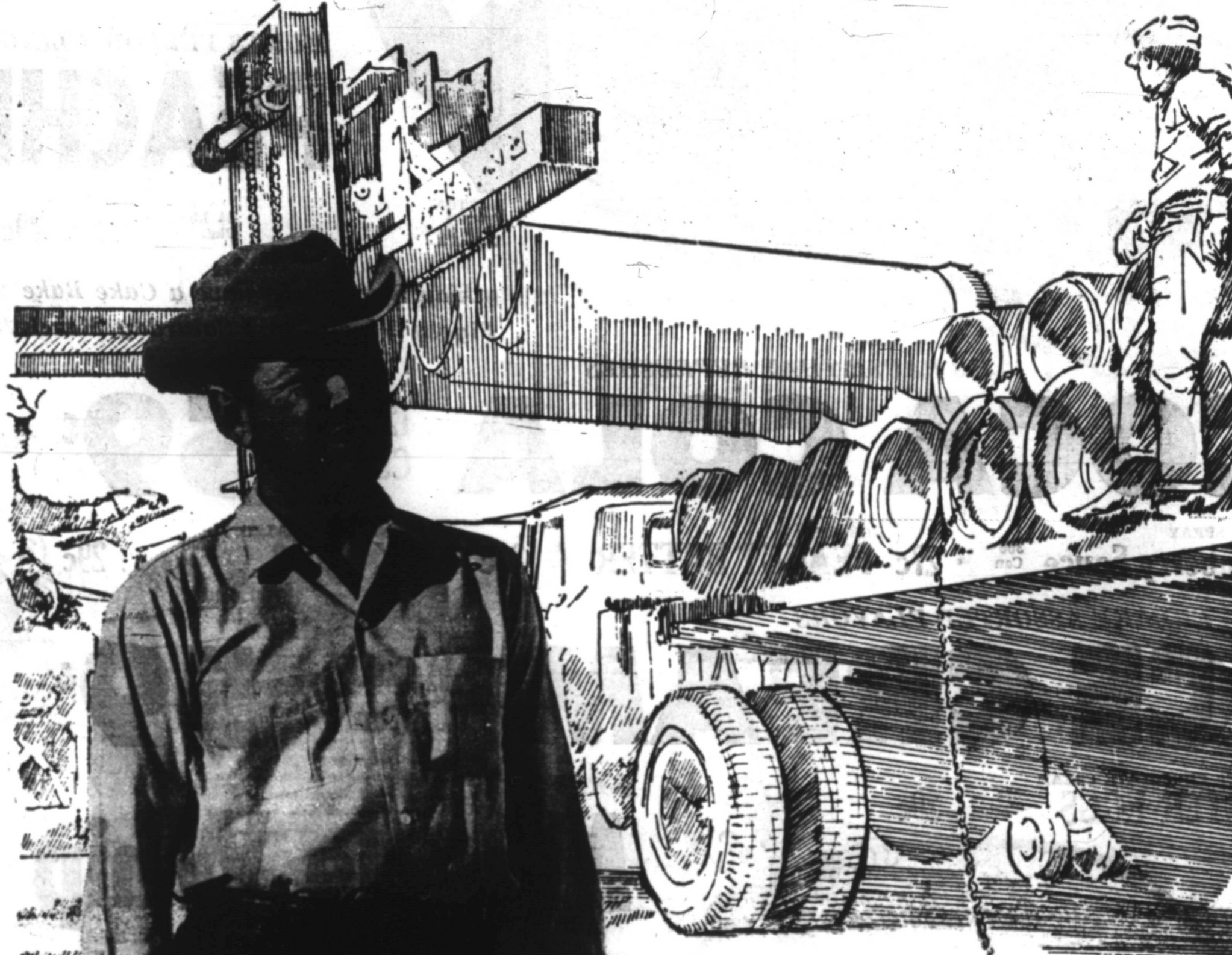
The Zip Code number should be placed two spaces to the right of the State named in the return address.

As soon as the Zip Code is accepted and used nationally, all mail will be delivered more expeditiously than has ever been possible before. In the future there will be much more publicity explaining just how this speedup in delivering will be effected. In the meantime, all are urged to put the Zip Code on all mail.

## Cooking Easier For Modern Housewife

(Special to The News)

New York — Believe it or not, more than 5 percent of the housewives in Lynn county were still cooking on wood-burning or coal-burning stoves as recently as 1940.

Today it would be difficult to find any who continues to use wood. Coal is also a rarity in the kitchen. Gas and electricity are the fuels that are used most generally now.

This is but one of the many changes that have taken place in the way of life locally in the last 20-odd years.

The improvements in living standards and in housing conditions, as they affect the local area and other parts of the country, are highlighted in a study of data from the Commerce Department's Census of Housing.

In addition to the 5 percent of local housewives who had wood or coal stoves in 1940, there were 67 percent who used kerosene or other liquid fuels and 27 percent who relied on gas, either bottled or piped in. Only 1 percent of them were equipped with electric stoves.

The changes since then have been dramatic. Wood, as a fuel, is now to be found in hardly any of the kitchens in the area. Coal and coke are in use in less than 1 percent of them and liquid fuel in another 2 percent.

The current figures show that 82 percent of the families in Lynn county are cooking with gas and 14 percent with electricity.

At the national level, the survey reveals that nearly two-thirds of the homes across the country are now using gas for cooking. Although gas holds a commanding lead over electricity, the lead is being whittled down rapidly.

Radical changes have also taken place in recent years in the way homes are heated, the survey shows. Only 12 percent of them are being heated by coal today, as against 55 percent in 1940. Wood dropped from 23 percent to 4 percent.

The big gainers were liquid fuels and gas. Gas usage rose from 11 to 48 percent in the period and oil and other fuels from 10 to 32 percent.

In the number one spot in Lynn county at the present time is gas, which is the heating fuel used in 93 percent of local homes.

## Parcel Post Rate Goes Up April 1

Residents of Tahoka are reminded by the post office here that an increase in domestic parcel post rates goes into effect on April 1.

The parcel post increase—approved recently by the Interstate Commerce Commission and averaging about 13.1 percent—is expected to yield about \$75.4 million annually.

Catalog rates will be increased about 13 percent and will produce produce added revenue of about \$2.4 million if 1963 volume is maintained.

The higher rates do not affect air parcel post or international parcel post, according to Postmaster Happy Smith, who said he

has been advised by the postmaster general that the decision of the ICC will assist the post office department in carrying out its objective of reducing the drain on the federal treasury by \$100 million.

The last parcel post rate increase was on Feb. 1, 1960.

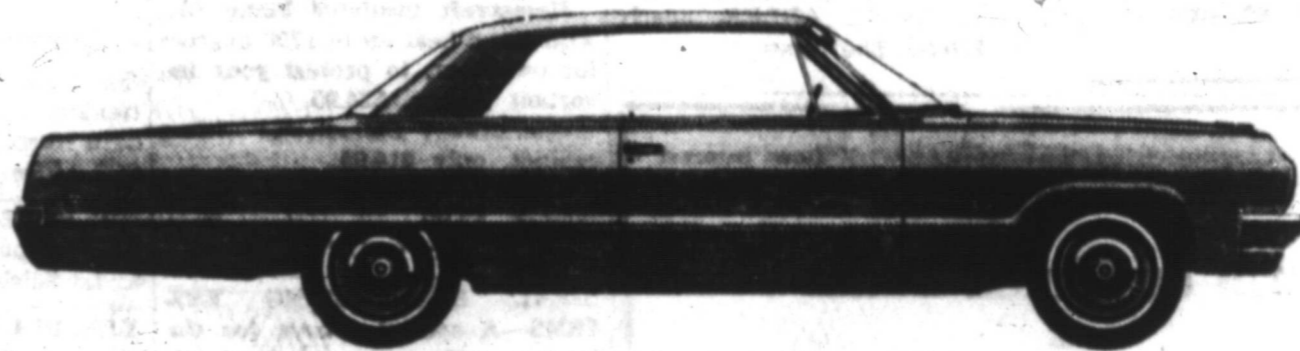

high, visible from the highway, and formerly there were some hackberry trees and shinnery oaks around the dunes. Many people traveling this section frequently commented on the sand dunes—in fact, they were not too good advertising for Lynn county as most remarks about them were uncomplimentary.

When The Printer first came to Tahoka 40 years ago, the sand hills furnished a site for frequent picnics, a place where the children and even grown-ups enjoyed playing in the sand, and a place where others hunted Indian artifacts. This had obviously been a favorite Indian campground. Many fine arrowheads, especially birdpoints, have been found there, indicating that the Indians camped here and chipped out arrowheads by the campfires, charcoal and flint chips from which were still numerous. In fact, The Printed still has several fine birdpoints found there and has others in Tech Museum.

An old buffalo hunter once told Jake Leedy a story about the time he and his party surprised a small band of Comanches camped at the sandhills. When the Indians saw the buffalo hunters approaching, they jumped on their horses, one yelled, "Tahoka, Tahoka," and the Redmen took off to the north toward Tahoka Lake.

Ted Rogers tells The Printer that people once sort of made fun of the Newmoore country because of the sandy land, but now it seems like everybody would like to own some of the sandy land country. There have been similar sandhills in Terry and Gaines and other counties on the Plains, but due to modern farming methods, they are just about all gone now. He says that in dry years the sandy type soils which hold moisture better than tighter soils and will produce some kind of a crop.

Speaking of the Tahoka Sandhill reminds us of Leonard Craft, who for years operated a tailor shop here in a little frame building and later built the present brick building of Quality Cleaners. Leonard had a lot of interesting hobbies and one was hunting lost Spanish gold in the Sandhill and Tahoka Lake country. He never found it, but since moving to Andrews we hear he has struck "gold" by another means.

Always dabbling with new ideas, Leonard developed a device to put in the bottom of oil wells to pre-

vent paraffin from stopping up such wells and is making "a boot full of money" from the invention. He has also dabbled in oil and uranium, in which he has made a "pocket-full."

Good friends here kidded old Leonard a lot about his inventions. When running the tailor shop, he had some weird contraptions among the belts and pulleys and engines and boilers—but he made 'em work. He invented his own well drilling rig, and he built a garage out of adobe brick. After leaving Tahoka, Leonard lost his much-loved wife, long-time Tahoka first grade teacher. He became mayor of Andrews, served a long time, and served as president of both Tahoka and Andrews Rotary clubs. A lot of people here are proud of old Leonard.

We hope you read that statement by Tahoka School Board in last Friday's paper in regard to selection of a superintendent. We know from personal experience, the board has a tremendous job and a lot of responsibility in trying to select the right man. Our school is the biggest business in Lynn county both from the amount of money spent and the number of people involved. It is the most important — to Tahoka, anyway. There are 1,300 students involved, 60 employed personnel, 5,000 patrons. There are a lot of candidates for the superintendent. There will be pressure from friends of some. Probably a number are fitted for the position. We have confidence in our board coming up with the man they think best fitted.

### Press Association Offers Scholarship To Study Journalism

The West Texas Press Association today announced it will receive applications until April 15 for its 1964 journalism scholarship which will be worth \$900 to some West Texas high school graduate for studying newspaper journalism for four years in college.

All applications for the scholarship should be sent by interested seniors to the WTPA scholarship chairman, Jim Cornish, publisher of the Post Dispatch, Post, Texas. Announcement of the scholarship winner will be made by May 10.

Students who desire to apply for the scholarship should talk with their high school principal and editor or publisher of their hometown paper, who will be glad to help them with necessary application details.

The scholarship winner receives \$150 per year (\$75 per semester) for each of the four years of his or her college career, providing academic requirements are met.

The WTPA has offered this journalism scholarship each year since 1956 and have had as many as five students in college at one time drawing scholarship funds.

Applicants must be in the upper

25 percent of his class, must have demonstrated ability in newspaper journalism and a desire for a newspaper career.

Several copies of all rules concerning application for the scholarship have been mailed to each high school principal in West Texas and interested students may secure full details at their high school office.

Ten West Texas colleges and universities have been designated for scholarship winners by the West Texas Press Association but the scholarship committee will consider making an exception for other colleges or universities if they have a qualified journalism course of study.

The ten designated schools for scholarship recipients are Abilene Christian College, Hardin-Simmons University, Howard Payne College, McMurry College, Midwestern University, Sul Ross College, Texas Tech, Wayland Baptist College, West Texas State University and Texas Western College.

Lubbock — What should prove to be a valuable production tool for farmers in this part of the country—a specialized agricultural weather service—is expected to begin operation in time to aid in raising this year's crop.

Oliver Newton, Agricultural Advisory Meteorologist, says weather releases should start going out to area radio stations, newspapers and television stations by May 15th. Weather releases will be disseminated by means of a teletypewriter circuit in operation 24 hours a day and available to users under a rental arrangement. To date 32 teletypewriters for receiving the service have been contracted for in the area.

Essentially the Weather Bureau, through this specialized service, purports to improve the farmer's batting average against the curves he is constantly being thrown by the weather. Weather information tailored to the particular needs of aviation have long been a vital aid to pilots in making flight decisions, and the same information tailored to the needs of agriculture can be a valuable asset to farmers making decisions on planting, poisoning, irrigation, defoliation, etc.

While a weather service is not likely to mean the difference between life and death to a farmer as it often does to a pilot, it can mean the difference between profit or loss. Each seed that is planted and then rots in the ground, each seedling stunted by cold weather, and each insecticide or defoliant washed off before it takes effect cuts into the farmer's pocketbook and hurts the entire economy of the area. These and other losses, plus losses of crop quality, can be minimized by an effective agricultural weather service.

The first such service was instituted several years ago in the Mississippi Delta region, and farmers there are loud in their praise of its effectiveness in reducing production costs and improving crop quality.

To meet the basic requirements for letting weather information work for the farmer, the service will give timely and detailed weather forecasts tailored to current farming operations; offer extension advisory service to show farmers how best to use the information made available, and aid research into agriculture-weather relationships.

Features of the service will be weather forecasts for the next 36 hours and the outlook for an additional 24 hours, issued three times a day and including the probability of rain, cloudiness, dew conditions, wind speed and wind direction as well as temperatures; special spraying-dusting forecast and summary during that season,

released evening and morning; an agricultural interpretation of the 30-day weather outlook, given twice monthly, and daily soil temperatures from selected locations over the area.

Newton is the first of what will be an addition of at least nine employees to the existing Weather Bureau staff in this area. Also, 20 or more weather observers will be located at vantage points over the 23-county area. These will report conditions to the Lubbock office in order that weather reports can be pinpointed to given localities.

There are now 16 such specialized agricultural weather services operating in 14 states, and if we can judge from farmer reaction in these states all of the efforts expended to secure this service for the High Plains will have been well worthwhile.

In the "interesting information" category, we stumbled onto the fact the other day that there are 20,841 mechanical cotton strippers in the 23-county High Plains area that produced slightly over two million bales of cotton in 1963. That's approximately one stripper for each 100 bales, or enough to harvest the entire crop in less than a week if the crop were all ready at the same time, if the weather cooperated, if the strippers were well distributed, and if we had enough trailers.

You can probably think of some other "ifs" that would apply, but even so harvest time sure "ain't what it used to be!"
