## Man Paying Off On Bad Checks Given For Grain

Bert Theodorf, a Pittsburg, Texas, grain buyer, was recently found guilty in district court here of swindling by worthless checks and has been released on probation pending making restitution.

Theodorf is alleged to have bought eight truck loads of grain from Tatum Bros. Elevators here, for which he gave worthless checks totaling about \$5,000.

On paying \$5,000 of the amount due Tatum, he was released on probation on provision that he pay off the remainder at \$100 per month.

## Absentee Voting Is Slow Here

Thirteen prospective voters have applied for absentee ballots to be voted in the May 2 election, but only two people have cast absentee ballots in person, County Clerk C. W. Roberts states.

In every case, Roberts states, the applicants have failed to mail their poll tax receipts along with their applications, causing delay. The time is very short, and those voting absentee must send their poll tax or exemption receipts in making application for a ballot.

Absentee voters must have their marked ballots postmarked by April 28 to be legal.

## Negro Family In Trouble With Court, Face Hearing

Five of the 11 children of Mrs. Beatrice Carter, 41, O'Donnell Negroes, were found to be dependent and neglected at a hearing in 100th District Court before Judge Truett Smith here last Saturday.

Mrs. Carter was given until this Saturday at 10:00 a. m. to produce some defense against making the ruling a permanent one.

The Carter case is one of the most unusual ever to come before a local court. County Attorney Harold Green said Mrs. Mildred Crump of the Dawson-Lynn Child Welfare office assisted with the investigation.

The Carter family lives in squallid quarters. Mrs. Carter's husband died a year ago. For years, off and on, the family has drawn the maximum amount of aid to dependent children, since September, 1964, from about \$95 to \$167 at present.

Mr. Billy Goat had other ideas. Thursday he broke the chain, and was later found four and a half miles northeast of town. But, with thirty minutes he broke lose a gain and was later at B. A. Young's northwest of town.

Then, on Saturday, the wild goat broke loose again and the Jaycees don't know where he went. No one wants him, it seems, and the Jaycees can't keep him—but if found again they expect to tie him with a stronger chain.

Top cowboys and cowgirls from all over the West will be competing for awards in the fourth annual Tahoka Rodeo here Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of next week, according to Oran Short, president of Tahoka Rodeo Association, the sponsor.

Festivities open with a street parade next Thursday at 6:00 p. m. featuring Sheriff's Poses, bands, all the horseback riders who wish to enter, floats, decorated cars. Merchants, clubs, and school classes are especially urged to enter the parade. Trophies will be presented the winning Poses and also for the top floats.

Rodeo Secretary "Dub" Powers will begin taking cowboy contestant entries this Saturday, and all entries must be in by next Thursday at noon.

Among the top calf ropers competing will be Jack Kirkpatrick and R. E. Josey. The open barrel racing contest is expected to draw entries not only from a large area of West Texas but also from New Mexico.

Many top cowboys have also already been assured in the saddle bronc riding, bulldogging, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, and wild mare race contests. There will also be ribbon roping for the kiddies 17 years of age and under.

Salty stock just fresh off winter pasture is being furnished by Sand Hills Rodeo Co. of Seagraves.

Billy King, the popular clown of the first annual rodeo, will be back with a lot of new acts.

Miss Nancy Parker, the reigning queen from last year's event, will appear in the parade, and \$100 in Savings Bonds will be presented winners in this year's contest for which candidates are competing by selling advance tickets at \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for children. Tickets at the gate will be \$1.50 and 75 cents.

Queen candidates are: Misses Linda Ward from the Jaycees; Montie McGinty, Rotary; Leah Short, Chamber of Commerce; Rhonda Littlepage, Lynn County Sheriff's posse; Eugenia Smith, New Lynn-Grassland; and Patricia Palla, New Home.

Street decorations have been put up, stores are asked to decorate their windows and fly flags during the rodeo, and everyone is invited to dress Western all next week.

Everyone interested in the town and county is invited to participate in the tours of about twenty area towns Monday and Tuesday to advertise the event. E. L. Short and Harold Roberts are in charge of the tours, which will leave Tahoka each day at 8:00 a. m. from the courthouse square.

Each night there will be a dance at the City-Legion building featuring the music of Jimmy Mackey.

Tahoka Jaycees will be in charge of concessions at the rodeo grounds, and funds raised will go toward their community projects.

Members of the Rodeo Association have been working hard to get the grounds in the best shape ever, a new fence built around the rodeo area, and a new ticket booth erected. The Association is operating on its own, refraining from financial drives, and with good luck on the weather should be able to come out "in the black" this year and turn some more funds into improvements. A new grandstand was installed last year, and further improvements made this year.

RESOLUTION AND ORDER FOR CITY BOND ELECTION

ON THIS, the 8th day of April, 1964, the City Council of the City of New Home, Texas, convened in Special session, at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall, there being present and in attendance the following members, to-wit:

- J. W. EDWARDS, MAYOR
BOBBIE L. GILL
M. S. RENFROE
W. W. DAVIES
ORVILLE R. PHIFER
G. B. MAYFIELD

ALDERMEN and with the following absent: none, constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had were the following:

Mayor Edwards introduced a resolution and order. Alderman Renfro moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Alderman Gill. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Aldermen Gill, Renfro, Davies, Phifer and Mayfield.
NOES: None.

THE RESOLUTION AND ORDER is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of New Home, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the

bonds of said City for the purposes hereinafter mentioned, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF NEW HOME, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 2nd day of May, 1964, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1 "SHALL the City Council of the City of New Home, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of FORTY EIGHT THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$48,000), maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than FORTY (40) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, for the purpose of purchasing, constructing and improving a Waterworks System in and for said City, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, and secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2 "SHALL the City Council of the City of New Home, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of TWENTY TWO THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$22,000), maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than FORTY (40) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, for the purpose of purchasing, constructing and improving a Sanitary Sewer System in and for said City, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, and secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of the City's combined Waterworks and Sanitary Sewer System?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 3 "SHALL the City Council of the City of New Home, Texas, be

authorized to issue THIRTY SEVEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$37,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of purchasing, constructing and improving a Waterworks System in and for said City; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually, and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 4 "SHALL the City Council of the City of New Home, Texas, be authorized to issue EIGHTEEN THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$18,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of purchasing, constructing and improving a Sanitary Sewer System in and for said City; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed SIX PER CENTUM (6%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually, and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the Community Center in the CITY OF NEW HOME, TEXAS, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election, to-wit: Dick Turner, Presiding Judge; Bobby Carroll, Jr., Judge; Marlin Maloney, Clerk; and Howard Mayfield, Clerk. ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the City Secretary's Office in the City Hall, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 424, Acts of the 56th Legislature, Regular Session, 1963.

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, and provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

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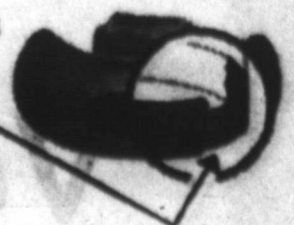



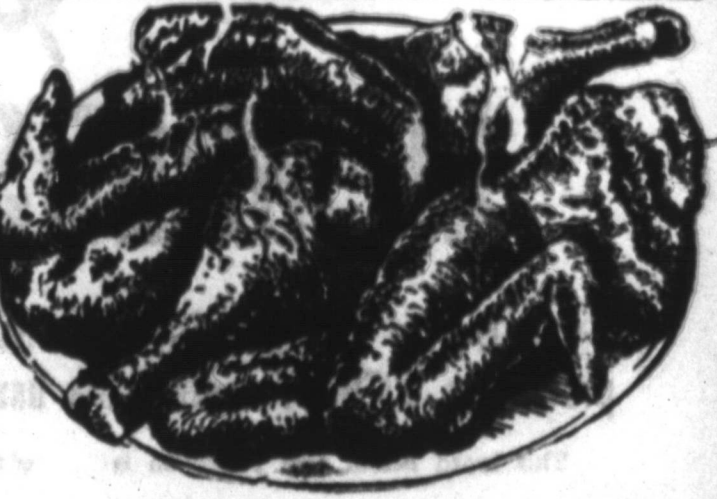

### Junior Athletic Banquet Tuesday

Over 300 seventh and eighth grade boys and girls, members of junior high athletic teams in Tahoka, their parents and special guests attended a banquet Tuesday night in the school cafeteria.

Rev. Gordon Smith, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Shallowater, a former outstanding Tahoka athlete and student, and son of District Judge and Mrs. Truett Smith, was the guest speaker.

Athletic teams were introduced by Jake Jacobs, who told of their achievements during the year. Coaches of the teams made brief speeches when they praised the boys and girls for their desire to win, for their winning records and their courage when the "chips were down."

Teachers, principals, and the teams' most faithful fans, Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Slover, were recognized.

Rev. Smith, accompanied by his wife, related to the boys and girls the parable of the talents. He pointed out that they are given talents according to their capacities, are expected to develop their talents, and are expected to always do their best even though their talents may not be as great as some given to others.

After reciting the nursery rhyme "Simple Simon", who is told to "show me your penny", Rev. Smith said that boys and girls will always throughout their lives be faced with that statement. They must be able to show what

they have accomplished and will be able to accomplish in order to be acceptable to the world of today. He said that in the field of scholastics, they will be asked to "show me your penny" when applying for entrance in colleges and universities, which are becoming ever-increasingly difficult to enter.

The speaker was introduced to the group by Athletic Director Jacobs, who said Gordon had always been an inspiration to the young people of Tahoka because of his outstanding leadership during school here. Rev. Smith, who not only played football, basketball and ran track, was top in his class scholastically. He served as president of the student body, was a member of National Honor Society, and took much of his time for church work, which he has continued for his lifetime vocation.

In describing the athletic program here to the parents, Jacobs said that boys and girls of this age are in their developing years, are at the stage in life when discipline and training are so important because of the eagerness and receptiveness of junior high age students. He said that many times boys and girls are disciplined in ways that may at the time seem harsh, but in ways that will pay off later on in high school and in their future lives. Jacobs encouraged the help of the parents in the training program "because this is in the best interests to the boys and girls."

# Consumers Desire Clothes Requiring Minimum Ironing

College Station — Consumers want spring clothes which may be worn, washed and worn again with little or no ironing, says Dr. Graham Hard, Extension clothing specialist at Texas A&M University, and former home demonstration agent in Lynn county for five years.

After much research, the Good Housekeeping Textile Institute has come up with these guidelines for buying easy-care clothes:

1. Look for a label that lists the name of the manufacturer, the fiber content, laundering instructions, extent of ironing needed, colorfastness and assurance of shrinkage resistance.

2. If the label specifies synthetic or a blend, look for a high percentage (at least 50 percent) of a wash-and-wear fiber.

3. If the fabric is cotton, look for one with a good, brand-name finish.

4. Look for a sturdy fabric.

5. Check to see how the seams are made, since a good wash-wear finished fabric must be sewn properly to be wrinkle-free after laundering.

6. Examine other construction points; Buttonholes should be firmly stitched, lie flat, have no loose threads; shoulder pads, if any, should be of synthetic material that is washable and quick drying; zipper plackets should be smoothly stitched.

7. Garments with simple lines will look best after laundering; frilly trills and tucks make ironing a must. Be prepared to pay a bit extra for quality.

A number of prominent speakers have been secured for the forum. Mrs. Verner has been honored with a place on the program, and will speak Friday, May 1, at

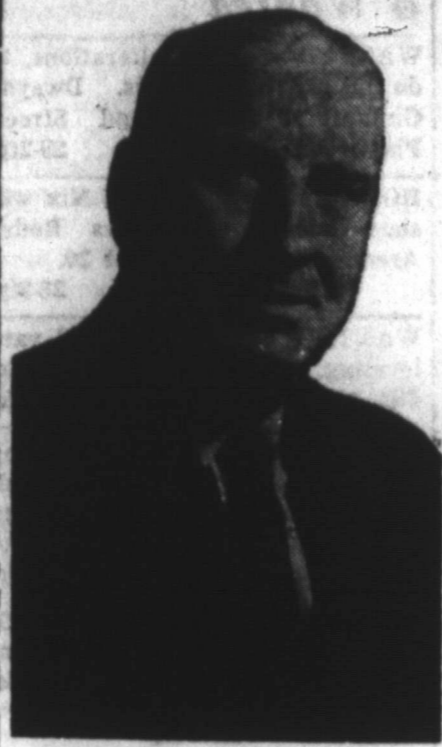

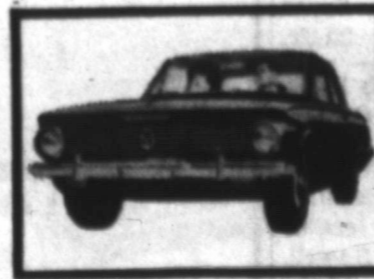

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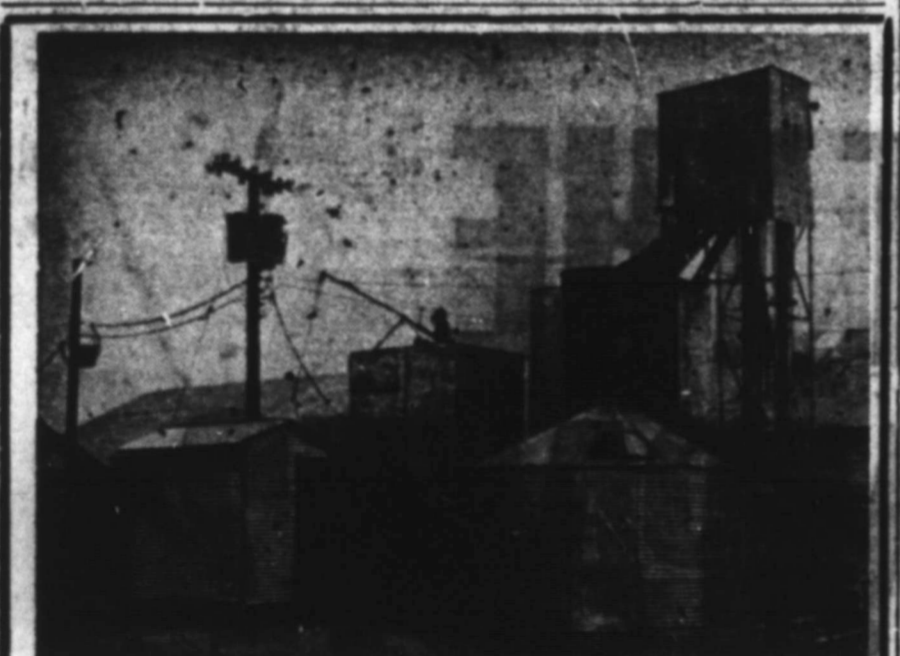

The passing of General Douglas MacArthur brings to the mind of the Printer a story that may be of interest to readers of this column.

The late R. L. "Kid" Gibson, who farmed out near Tahoka Lake, hunted wolves, at one time was the oldest Flying Farmer in America, and enjoyed reminiscing about his colorful career. He was a veteran of the Spanish-American War and as an Army enlisted man was among the troops

landed by Admiral Dewey's fleet to take over the Philippines. He remained there several years doing "mopping up" work among the islands of the Philippines, was an orderly to Capt. "Blackjack" Pershing, later to become a great general of World War I. As such, he came to know General Pershing personally. As a messenger, he frequently had contact with General Arthur MacArthur, father of Douglas MacArthur, who, as we remember was then attending West Point. The latter was home a time or two and the "Kid" also came to know him personally.

At one time early in World War II, The Printer sort of questioned the "Kid's" acquaintance with these great men, and to prove he knew them he brought us personal letters to read from both. Mr. Gibson wrote his encouragement to Gen. Douglas MacArthur, and the General fired a letter right back telling his appreciation. He showed us letters from General Pershing, then in Walter Reed Hospital in Washington, in which "Blackjack" recalled many happenings during the Philippine campaign.

Early in World War II, all the armchair generals and newspaper columnists here at home were theorizing on where General MacArthur's forces would land in the Philippines. As it turned out, all were wrong. One day, the subject was being discussed in the barber shop, and "Kid" Gibson said, "I know exactly where MacArthur will land for the invasion. He will land at Leyte." We pushed the "Kid" for his reasons.

He explained that General MacArthur knew the Philippine people and terrain like a book, and that he (Kid) knew them fairly well himself, having been on all the islands and fought against all the various island factions. He said MacArthur would not land at the top of Luzon and march south be-

cause of the terrain offering such good defense; that he would not land on Mindoro because of the difficulty getting there; that he would not land near Manila Bay because of the concentration of Jap defenses; that he would not land on Mindanao because the natives there had just as soon fight Americans as fight Japs—they liked to use their machetes on anyone. He said MacArthur would land at Leyte because of the friendliness of the people, their liking for the MacArthurs and all Americans, the excellent landing beaches, the terrain, the availability of bases to attack Manila. That's exactly where the Americans landed a few weeks later. "Kid" Gibson made a believer out of us.

Appropriate to the season is the following little bit of verse once written by the late Frank Grimes of the Abilene Reporter-News entitled "The Old Mesquites Ain't Out."

## GRASSROOTS

### CHLOROSIS

In Lynn county both alkaline soil and alkaline water supplies may cause many common garden plants to become chlorotic or to develop yellow leaves.

While chlorosis may be caused by several soil or plant conditions, the most common cause of this trouble is a deficiency of iron in the soil or plant, or in both. The symptoms of chlorosis, or yellowing of the leaves due to this condition usually develop slowly, becoming evident at the tips of new growth on the plants and then progresses downward on the plants. This condition occurs most often in areas where large amounts of lime accumulate in the soil and where calcium in other forms is added to the soil by the use of alkaline water. These materials, when present in large amounts, combine with the available iron in the soil to form insoluble compounds, making it impossible for the plants to absorb the required amount of iron to produce good green foliage.

When the weather begins to warm up in the spring and plants are watered more frequently, the salts in alkaline water begin to accumulate and chlorosis results. This condition can be corrected most easily by anticipating it at this time of the year and by adding soil conditioners that have an acid reaction such as pine bark or peat moss and by beginning a schedule of regular applications of iron chelates applied in accordance with the directions on the package.

Some plants that are grown widely in Texas gardens are more susceptible to iron deficiency than others. Some of the most susceptible are azaleas, camellias, gardenias, roses, hibiscus, hydrange-

as, pyracantha, bottle brush and photinia.

Toward the end of April when warm weather prevails, many gardeners have an established practice of moving their potted plants out into the garden. This is a time-worn practice that should be avoided if possible. It requires a considerable number of weeks to get plants adapted to indoor environments. When they are moved outdoors for several months and are then moved back in, they must undergo this slow process all over again, making the practice of moving them outdoors during the summer months more harmful than beneficial.

More details will be announced next week.

Now being considered for commercial production is a new evaporated milk tasty enough to drink. It was developed by the USDA and can be made at a concentration of either two or three times that of whole milk and dilutes to a high-quality beverage resembling fresh milk in flavor and color. Agricultural Research Service chemists are working to further improve the product, especially to prolong its fresh-milk flavor and to prevent the slight

sediment that sometimes forms after a few weeks of storage.

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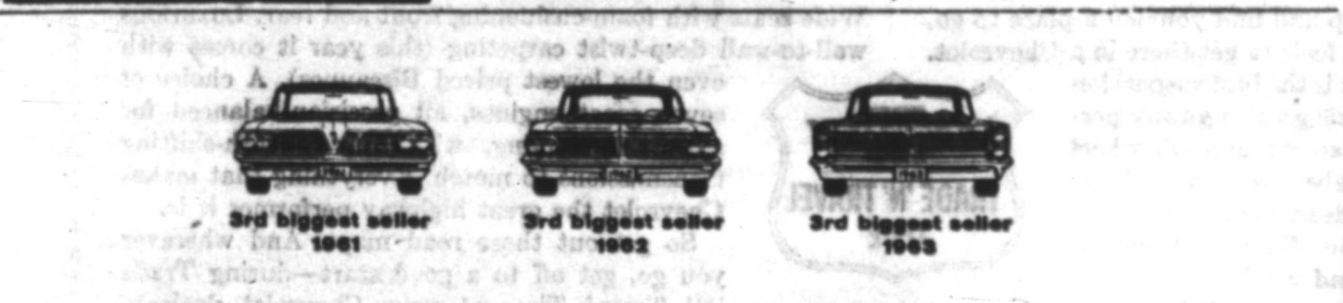

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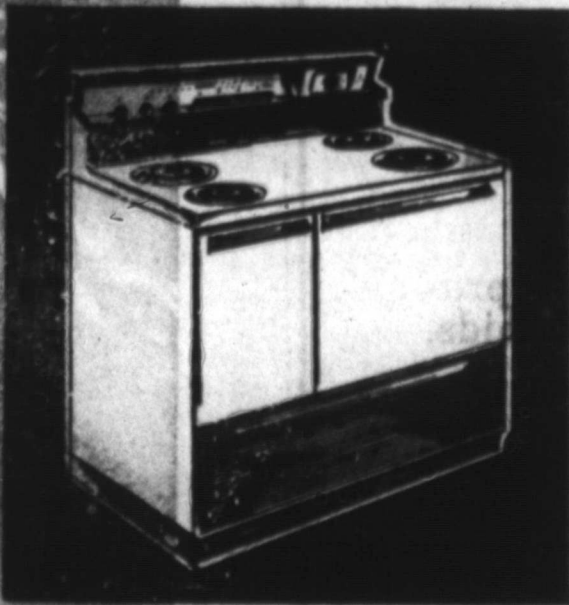

### Judge Martin . . .

(Continued from Page 1, Sec. 2) The Court have not increased, this condition no longer exists. Instead other Courts are having to assist the Amarillo Court—thirteen cases were transferred from the Amarillo Court to the Waco Court of Civil Appeals on January 11, 1964.

More important than the mere number of cases disposed of by the Court is the type of justice under the law as reflected by the Court's opinions. In 1956, while I was on the Court, the majority of the Court, the then Chief Justice and my present opponent as the other Associate Justice, wrote an opinion styled "Stanley v. Stanley, 294 S. W. 2d, Page 132." This case reflects that a 40-year-old career army sergeant married a former school teacher who had been successful in the finance business. The sergeant contributed nothing to the marriage but, the undisputed record discloses, in six years squandered \$94,044.63 of the profits earned by his wife's business. He also squandered \$41,911.13 of the wife's capital investment. On dissolution of the marriage, it was the sergeant's theory the wife had mingled her earnings, as community property, with her separate capital and through such commingling of her earnings with her separate capital, he was entitled to one-half of all remaining property owned by his wife. In the judgment of divorce, the trial court awarded the sergeant an additional sum of \$29,881.89.

The widow appealed from the trial court's judgment and on appeal the Chief Justice and the other Associate Justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, such Associate being now a candidate for election to the Court, agreed with the sergeant's theory and affirmed the judgment of the trial court awarding him the additional sum of \$29,881.89. This opinion of the majority of the Court was directly contrary to the undisputed audit of a Certified Public Accountant who traced all funds and proved that all the wife's earnings had been squandered by the sergeant and a large part of her original capital and that her earnings were not mingled with her capital. As an Associate Justice of the Court, based on this audit and the applicable law, I wrote a dissenting opinion holding that the sergeant was only entitled to his equity in a 1955 Station Wagon for which he had traded an old Station Wagon owned by him at the time of the marriage.

Other similar and equally inequitable opinions were rendered by the Court acting as a majority and on which I dissented, but the above opinion is discussed here because the same reflects clearly and unequivocally the opposite points of view on the duty of the Court as held by me and my opponent for Associate Justice. The most essential element of every judgment of the Court of Civil Appeals should be justice under the law and facts. If the citizens of this district will take a few minutes' time to go to a lawyer's office and read the Stanley opinion, I am confident I will be elected to the Court of Civil Appeals by an overwhelming majority vote.

As a member of such Court, I never have and I never shall subscribe to the proposition that justice under the law and a citizen's property rights should be bartered for political favors. No Court judgment should dissipate an elderly person's savings of a lifetime where the basis of such judgment is a strained and superficial ruling under a highly technical theory not supported by the evidence. The personal rights of every citizen and the property rights of every citizen have always been a sacred trust of the Courts. This essential and vital element of our judicial system should not be lightly cast aside in order to favor a friend or political supporter. I am certain the present members of the Court with whom I would serve subscribe to the principles herein set forth.

I ask every citizen to support me on the principles enunciated herein. I particularly ask every client whom I have ever represented to give me in the coming campaign the same untiring loyalty and effort toward my interests that I have exhibited over the many years of my practice for their interests. I pledge to every citizen that their rights and property shall be secure under the law. It shall be my constant endeavor to write opinions of the Seventh Court of Civil Appeals that shall be based soundly upon the law and the facts and shall reflect credit and honor upon such Court.

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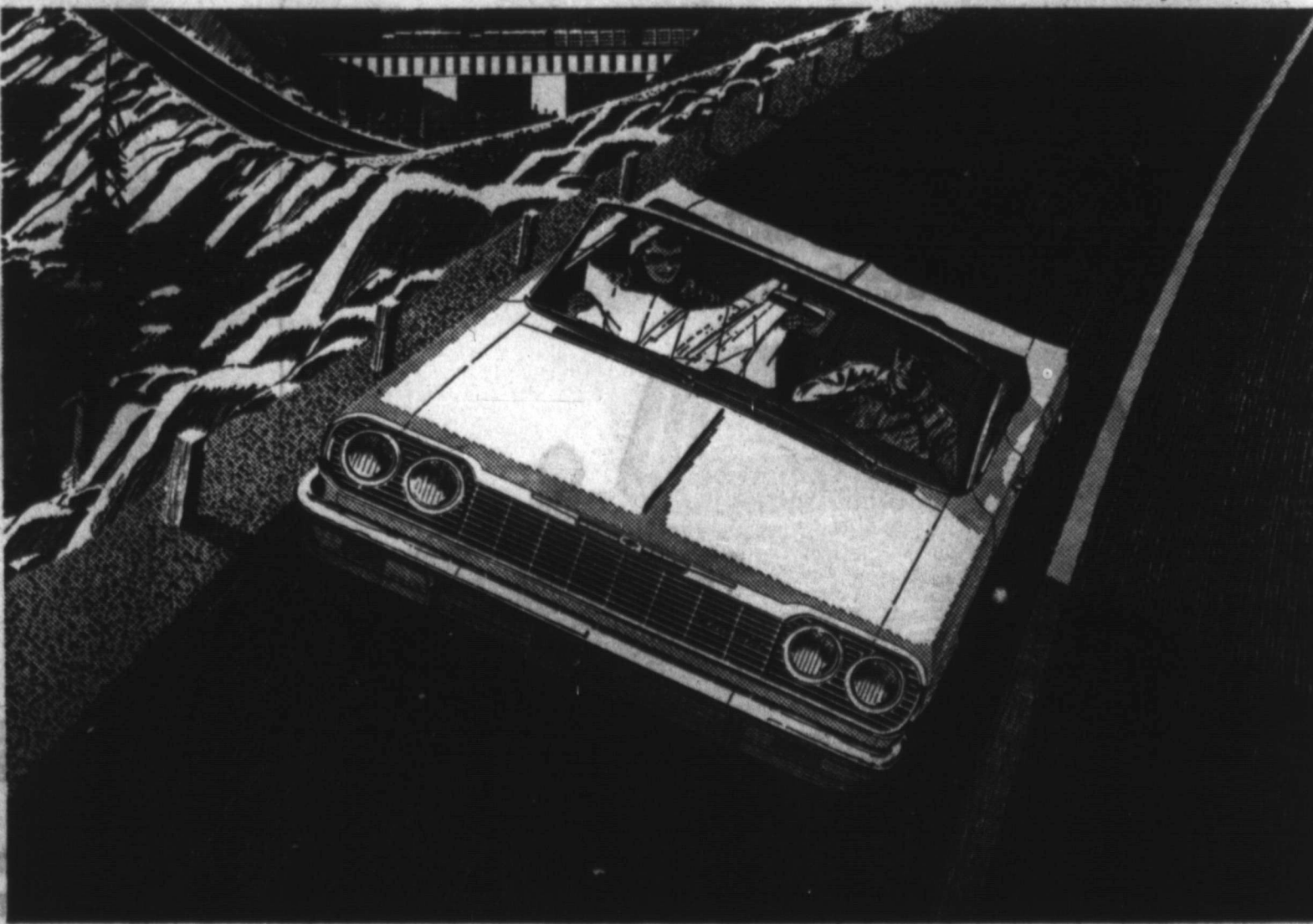
