## City Building Near Record

Building permits totaling \$456,450 had been issued by the City of Tahoka on Thursday, and with additional construction outside of City limits, brings building for the first four months of 1964 to almost a half-million dollars.

The project for elderly people, the permit let to the Housing Authority, the new Methodist Church and the new Masonic Hall account for \$292,350 of the total amount. New home construction amounts to about \$125,000.

## Tahoka Airport Fly-In Planned

A fly-in breakfast and dedication ceremonies for the improved Tahoka Airport, northwest of town in the Edwards-Childers Memorial Park, are being planned for Sunday morning, June 14, by the local Jaycees, according to W. H. McNeely.

City of Tahoka, with help from the County, recently paved the 3,000-foot east-west runway and improved the graveled 2,600-foot north-south runway.

The Jaycees are planning a free breakfast for fly-ins from 7:00 to 10:00 a. m., free transportation to church or town any time during the day.

Aviation enthusiasts from over a large area are being invited to fly in to the airport for the day, and there will be many activities of interest to the general public.

In addition to dedication ceremonies, there will be a sky-diving exhibition, aerobatics, exhibits of various planes, private and Air Force, including helicopters. There will be helicopter and plane rides, crop dusting demonstrations, and other activities of interest.

The Jaycees will offer prizes for the oldest pilot, youngest pilot, longest distance traveled, and every tenth plane to land.

In case of rain, the fly-in will be postponed until June 21.

Further details will be announced soon.

## Bill Ross Smith National Champ

Bill Ross Smith was high individual and member of Texas Tech's first place winning soil judging team in the National Collegiate Soil Judging contest held Saturday at the University of Wisconsin, Madison.

Bill, a graduate of Tahoka High School and son of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Smith of Tahoka, is a senior agronomy student in Tech. His wife, Donna, is also a senior majoring in home economics.

Other members of the Tech judging team were Joe Duncan of Roscoe, second; Larry Luckwood of Littlefield, sixth; and Kenneth Bland of Osona, alternate.

Dr. Allen, team coach, said the Tech team finished 40 points above the second place team, Purdue University. Michigan State was third, North Carolina State was fourth, and Kansas State was fifth.

To compete in the national contest, a team must have won either first or second in their regional contests. Tech won first in the regional contest at Oklahoma State University earlier.

## Strychnine Poison "Not For The Birds"

Poison grain for killing birds can no longer be sold by the county, but strychnine treated maize can still be sold for killing rodents only, County Judge Walter Mathis has been informed.

Some farmers have been buying the strychnine poison to kill sparrows, he says, but he has been informed this is illegal since it also kills protected birds such as doves and quail.

Farmers may secure another poison for killing sparrows on application to H. D. Ellard, Department of Interior, Box 1414, Lubbock.

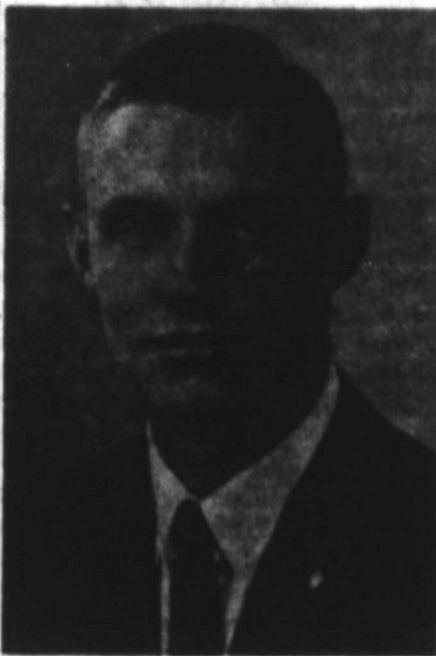
## MOTHER OF WHORTONS IS CRITICALLY ILL

# Home Demonstration Clubs Observe 40th Anniversary Next Thursday

Lynn county Home Demonstration Clubs will observe the 40th anniversary of institution of the work in this county at the monthly meeting of Council in Lyntegar conference room next Thursday, May 21, at 2:30 p. m.

Several charter members of local clubs will be honored at the meeting, according to Mrs. Billie Carr, county Home Demonstration agent. Mrs. Clyde Childress of Draw, chairman of the Council, will preside.

Two years ago, Mrs. Wilmer Smith of New Home wrote the following history of Home Demonstration work in Lynn county. Mrs. Smith currently is treasurer of the National Home Demonstration

Association and former Texas state president.

Through the efforts and promotion of such county citizens as Mrs. Lonnie Lumsden, the late Mr. Walter May, and others, H. D. club work was begun in Lynn County May 1, 1924 when Miss Millie M. Halsey (the late Mrs. E. I. Hill) came to Tahoka as the first agent.

Miss Halsey's major concern at this time was to help the women preserve the great variety of foods raised by each family at that time. The pressure cooker had just come into use, and for Lynn County homemakers, these became the "canning years," and the pressure cooker the marvel of the home. Supervising the canning of one beef in one day was just an average day for Miss Halsey, but the day she supervised the canning of three in one day was called one of her busier days. Neighbors met in the homes of three different members to assist with the canning, and Miss Halsey supervised all three operations by driving from one home to the other. A "hotel-type" cooker was owned by Mrs. W. C. Huffaker, Sr., however, most of the canning was done in a large family-type cooker such as the one owned by Mrs. A. R. Hensley at that time.

The four "charter clubs" organized when Miss Halsey began her work May 1, 1924, were the Draw, Midway, New Home and Wilson clubs. Reports are not available from all of the original clubs, but Mrs. Frank Lisemby, Sr. says that one of the first club meetings of the Midway club was held in her home, and Miss Halsey "gave a demonstration on the culling of hens." Among those present for the meeting were Mrs. J. R. Strain, Mrs. I. M. Draper, and Mrs. T. B. Cowan, Sr.

At New Home, the first club meeting was held in the home of Mrs. H. R. Minor, 1 1/2 miles southeast of New Home. "An all-day meeting was held, and Miss Halsey and the members canned an entire beef. To make the meeting even more outstanding, the school children came to the meeting for lunch." The first officers of this club were Mrs. J. B. Lowe, Mrs.



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## Cotton Program Set At Post

A cotton program covering all the phases of production will be held in Post, Friday, May 29, reports Syd Conner, County Agricultural Agent of Post. Conner says the meeting will begin at 8:00 p. m. in the District Courtroom in Post.

Don Rummel, Area Extension Entomologist, will discuss the cotton insect situation and control measures. He will spend much time talking about the boll weevil control program.

Bill Gunter, Area Extension Agonomist, will be on hand to give farmers and other interested persons the latest in cotton weed control recommendations. The third speaker will be Dr. Robert Berry, Area Plant Pathologist. Dr. Berry will discuss cotton diseases in detail.

Questions and answers will be a part of the program. Conner says all interested persons are invited to attend.

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this class has had far more than normal. Last year, there were 45 graduates, and that was far from the largest class.

Probably at no time in the history of Tahoka has there been as much new building underway as there is right now. Home building continues at a steady pace, but principal items include the new \$550,000 school building program, the new \$150,000 Methodist church, the \$150,000 homes for aged project, the new \$28,000 Masonic Hall, and the new McCord service station. Population of Tahoka has undoubtedly grown to about 3,400 in the last four years.

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### Carriers Making Livestock Survey

Rural patrons of the Tahoka post office should be on the look-out for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey. It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings.

Carriers assisting with the survey are: Eldon Carroll, Route 1; A. C. Weaver, Route 2; Dall Carroll, Route 3; Clyde Ashcraft, Route 4; Jess Gurley, Route 5.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cray D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets.

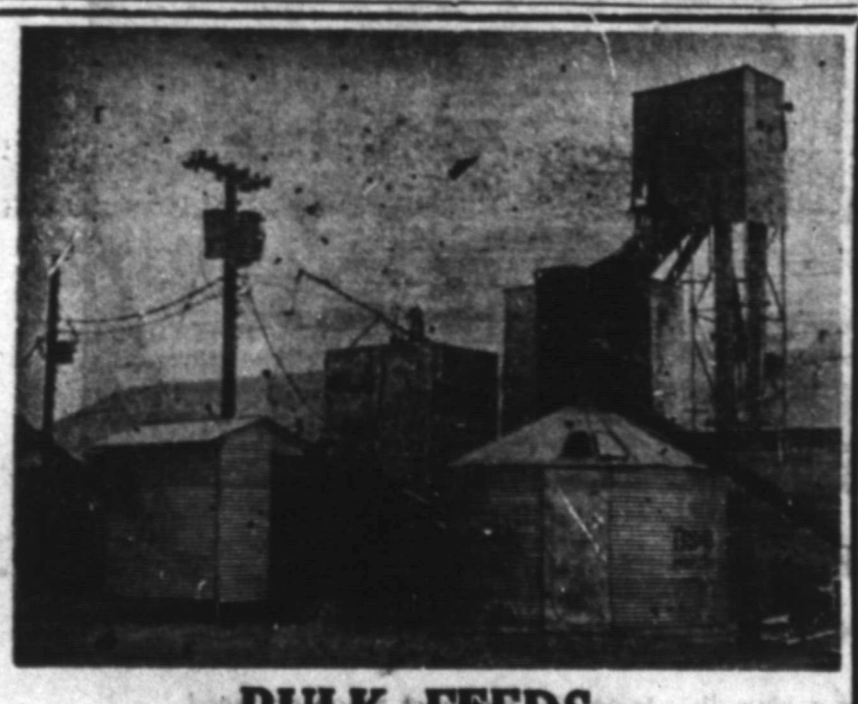

## Farm Bureau In Meeting Monday

Lynn County Farm Bureau will again sponsor expenses of firemen to the State Firemen's School at Texas A&M and high school students to the student seminar on Americanism at Sam Houston State College, board members voted at the monthly meeting Monday, according to T. B. Mason, president.

One man from each Fire Department, Tahoka, O'Donnell and Wilson, will be sent by the Farm Bureau to the Firemen's Training School at A&M July 19-24, with all expenses paid. This policy was started last year.

Four students, one from each of the four county high schools, will be sent to the seminar at Huntsville August 11-15. This program was also started last year. Those attending last year were Delbert McCleskey of Wilson, Eddie Jo Halford from New Home, Ronnie Wood from O'Donnell, and Dixie Ashcraft from Tahoka.

L. C. Unfred discussed the PIK certificate plan for cotton subsidy payments. After a complete review and discussion, the Lynn County Farm Bureau board voted to send letters to Federal authorities supporting the payment of the certificates to the last handler.

Mr. Mason says the Farm Bureau meeting room, complete with kitchenette, has been finished and is available to worthy organizations. The room will seat 30 to 40 people.

"Farm Bureau members and directors," Mr. Mason said, "have worked for five years on their own building, and we invite the public to visit and inspect our offices and this new meeting place and also to become a part of Farm Bureau."

### Long Distant Call Information Given

There's still some misunderstanding and confusion, or lack of information, regarding placing of long distance calls to rural patrons, local officials of Poka-Lambro Telephone Cooperative state.

One cause for the confusion has been use of old numbers, of which operators in General Telephone central office at Brownfield have no knowledge.

In making long distance calls to rural exchanges where the number desired is not known, the caller, for example, should request "Bill Jones, West Lakes, Texas," if on the Poka-Lambro line in that exchange out of Tahoka. If the exchange out of Tahoka is not known, the caller should inform the operator, who will usually make every effort to reach the party, especially in an emergency.

West Lakes, Texas, for example, is listed among telephone companies all over the nation, even in England, and this designation should get a call through to a party living in the West Point Exchange area.

"The old days are gone, unfortunately," a Poka-Lambro official told The News this week, "and a person always won't be able to call someone at the court house, or even a long distance operator, and get the party desired located. All the busy operators know are exchanges and numbers."

"Poka-Lambro deeply regrets that calls to old numbers or by persons not knowing exchange areas sometimes fail to get through, but we sincerely hope people will understand the situation."

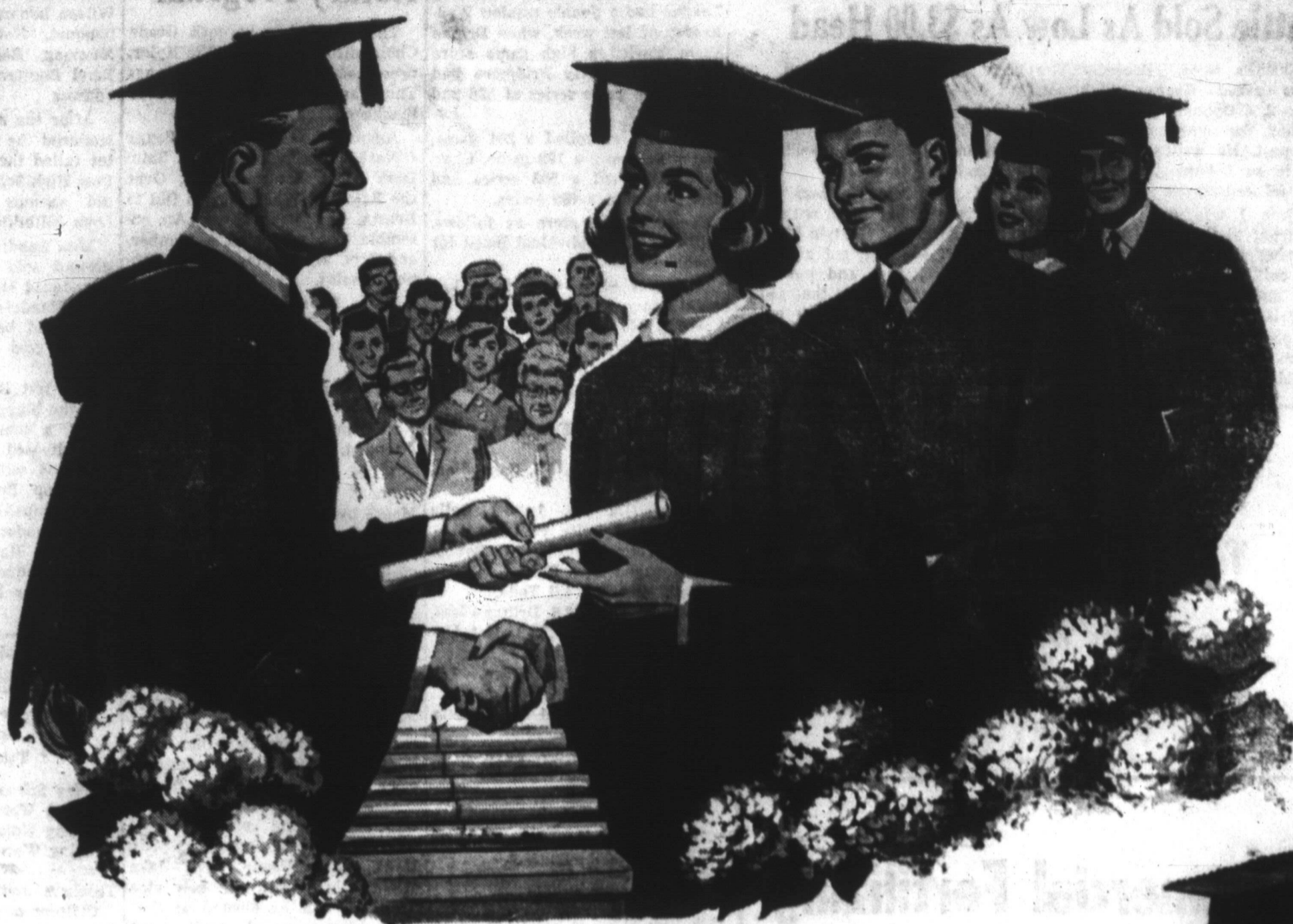

I grew up on that colt. I rode it two years bareback. Our nearest neighbor was a cow man, and I

grew up with his three boys. I was up there one morning when I was eight years old, and he said, "George, ain't you tired of riding bareback?" I said, "Mr. Waggoner, I sure am."

He said, "Come in here," so I went in the big barn with him, and he got a big oldstyle Mexican saddle off the peg, got a blanket and shook it out, and put them on my pony. You see, that saddle was so heavy I could not put it on without help.

When I was 15, I went to work for the Chance Bros. breaking horses. Also helped put up bunches of cattle for the XIT Ranch trail herds coming up from the south.

We had a few cattle of our own in about 1894. My dad had to raise some money, and cattle was the only thing you could sell, so we sold some for \$3.00 per head. That was all they would bring.

The Box-T Ranch (The News editor is not a good brand reader, and George's drawing of the brand may be something else) in the Panhandle bought a trail herd at that price.

The wages those days were 50 cents per day at home, or \$30.00 per month on the trail—and that was every brush popper's dream to get to go up the trail.

Good old days, but we liked it! —George Lightfoot.
