**Lynn Eligible For Drouth Aid**

Lynn county has been designated a drouth area and eligible for emergency loans from the Farmers Home Administration.

Such designation was announced last Thursday in telegrams to The News and to Billy H. Stewart, local county supervisor, Farmers Home Administrator.

Effect of the move, approved by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman, is to make credit available to farmers for continued normal farming operations where such credit cannot be obtained through ordinary commercial banks, cooperative lending institutions, or other responsible sources.

The designation came as the result of recommendations from local agricultural leaders, groups and agencies under the provision that the Secretary may declare an emergency in an area of serious agricultural losses as the result of drouths, floods, storms and other calamities.

Any established farmer or rancher in the designated area is eligible if he is a citizen of the United States, is unable to obtain from other lenders the credit required to continue his normal operations, has reasonable prospects for success with the assistance of a loan, and possess the legal capacity to contract for the loan.

Further information and application forms may be secured at the Farmers Home Administration office, 1638 Ave. J, Tahoka, from Mr. Stewart.

## H. W. Pennington Dies Wednesday

Harris W. Pennington, 63, died Wednesday at 2:30 p. m. at his home at 1622 North First following a long illness as result of a stroke. He had been a resident of Lynn county 42 years.

Funeral services are set for 10:00 a. m. Friday in the First Methodist Church with his pastor, Rev. Aubrey White, officiating, assisted by Rev. James Eldred, pastor of First Baptist Church. Burial in Tahoka Cemetery will follow under direction of White Funeral Home.

Mr. Pennington was born in Clark county, Arkansas, on Oct. 18, 1896. He was married to Aitha Wilson on Oct. 26, 1901, at Hollywood, Ark.

The couple moved to Coleman county, Texas, in 1905, and farmed there until moving to Monroe (New Deal), Lubbock county, in November, 1917, lived there two years, moved southwest of Lubbock, and then moved to Lynn county in January, 1922, and farmed near Redwine until retiring in 1950, when they moved to Tahoka.

Mr. Pennington remained relatively active, looking after his rent houses and farm property, until his final illness.

He was a faithful attendant at his church, the Methodist, and he and his wife were habitually present unless prevented by illness. He leaves a great host of friends over the county.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Willis and Garland Pennington; two grandchildren, and five great grandchildren.

Rev. Blair was born in Buenos Aires, Argentina, is a graduate of Baylor and holds master of theology, master of sacred music, and master of religious education degrees from Southwestern Seminary. He pastored a church in North Worth, was on the Foreign Mission Board of Southern Baptist Convention, has been head of the music department of International Baptist Theological Seminary in Buenos Aires, and has been educational director, book editor, and music director of Baptist Spanish Publishing House in El Paso since 1951.

Tut Tarwater, Plainview, Lions District Governor of District 2T-2 will make his official visit to the Wilson Lions club on Thursday, Sept. 17, according to club president Leroy Scott.

The visit is more or less an annual inspection trip to the club by the district official who reports his findings to the Lions International headquarters in Chicago.

Tawwater was elected at the Lions annual district convention in Snyder in May of this year will serve until July 1st of 1965. He overlooks 60 Lions clubs in West Texas communities in a geographical area roughly the same as the 19th Congressional District.

The Plainview radio man had served on the district cabinet four times prior to his election to it's highest office. He has served as District Cabinet secretary, twice as Deputy Governor and as Membership Chairman. He was convention chairman of the 1958 Plainview convention.

He served as an area governor in the Toastmasters organization and was a state speech contest winner in this organization in 1953.

He is a Methodist and has taught a Bible class in his church for the past 8 years. He and his wife are the parents of two boys.

## Tahoka Car Drivers To Game Praised By Wilson Officer

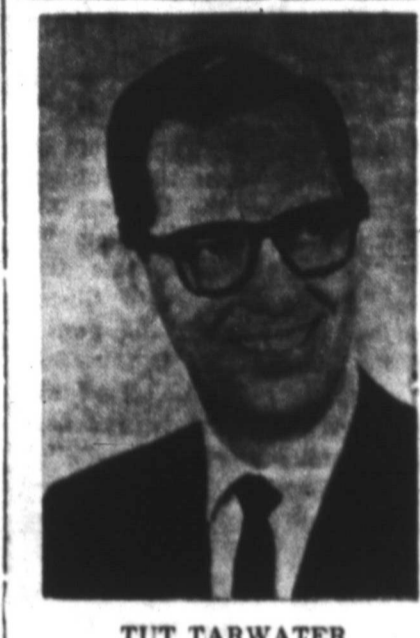
Tahoka fans driving to and from the football game at Lorenzo Friday night were highly complimented by O. D. Woody, deputy sheriff at Wilson.

## United Fund Meeting Monday

Tahoka United Fund committee members and workers will meet Monday night at 8:00 in the City-Legion building when a man from Lubbock United Fund will be on hand to speak, as will Bill Clark of the Boy Scout Area Council.

Tahoka's United Fund drive has been set for October with Binie White as campaign chairman. In place of separate drives, Tahoka will attempt one drive to finance Boy and Girl Scouts, Red Cross and the Salvation Army.

Dr. Gerald Wood is local United Fund chairman. Binie White is in charge of the drive, and John Wells is public relations chairman. Leighton Knox heads the prospects committee.

There are five solicitations committees, headed by Warren Embree, big gifts; Wayne Waters, business; Steve Thompson, professional; Pat Patterson, employees; and Harry L. Short, farmers.

Tahoka school enrollment was 1,056 through Wednesday, slightly below the number expected and also slightly below last year's enrollment at the same time. However, the enrollment is still above every past year except for the opening week last year.

The total of 1,056 students had enrolled up until Wednesday noon, which compares to 1,113 at the same time last year, Supt. Harold Reynolds reports.

There are 343 students in the first three grades at South Elementary, where J. B. Howell is the principal. Last year there were 472, but this year fourth grade classes have been moved to North Elementary.

In North Elementary, Principal L. F. Jacobs reports there are 262 students in three grades, compared to 259 last year.

Seventh grade has been moved to Junior High, the old high school building, and Principal Clifton Gardner reports 155 students in the two grades.

In high school, he reports a total of 227 students, compared to 230 at the same time last year.

At Dunbar School, Principal Frank Jernigan reports 69 students, a drop from 85 at the same time last year.

Enrollment by classes follows:

South Elementary: First grade, 132; second, 107; third, 104.

North Elementary: Fourth, 66; fifth, 92; sixth, 94.

Junior High: Seventh grade, 74; eighth, 79.

Senior High: Ninth grade, 66; tenth, 61; eleventh, 47; twelfth, 53.

Dunbar: First grade, 13; second, 7; third, 11; fourth, 11; fifth, 10; sixth, 7; seventh, 2; and eighth, 8.

## R. C. Wells Jr. Buried Tuesday

R. C. Wells Jr., 46, reared in Tahoka but living at 1911 67th street in Lubbock, died at 6:28 a. m. Sunday in Lubbock Methodist Hospital. He had been ill 18 months and in the hospital the past 18 days before his passing.

Funeral services were held Tuesday at 2:30 p. m. in First Baptist Church here with the pastor, Rev. T. James Eldred, officiating. Burial followed in Tahoka Cemetery under direction of White Funeral Home.

R. C. was born here Jan. 20, 1918, a member of one of the town's earliest families. He was a graduate of the local schools, a member of the Baptist Church and a long-time member of Tahoka Volunteer Firemen. He was a veteran of World War II.

Mr. Wells was married to Miss Marie McGhee in St. Louis on January 9, 1946.

For the past 14 years, R. C. had been with Pioneer Natural Gas Company, 11 years of this time in Lubbock.

Survivors include his wife, Marie; three brothers, James Wells of Midland, John Wells of Tahoka, and Glenn Wells of Fort Worth; and many other relatives in Tahoka and over the area.

Palbearers were Everton Nevill, Lawrence Harvick, W. C. Harvick Jr., George Claud Wells, W. P. Franks and Keith Martin. Honorary palbearers were members of Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department.

In lieu of flowers, a number of friends gave donations to the Cancer Society.

## County Gins Get First 1964 Cotton

Several county communities reported first bales of cotton this week.

R. M. Thomas had the first bale of 1964 cotton ginned in Tahoka last Friday by Fenton Bros. gin. Thomas also had the first bales at each of the Grassland gins.

First Lynn county bale this year was raised by Wayman Pierce of Draw and ginned at O'Donnell Co-op gin on August 24.

Thomas' bale ginned here Friday at Fenton's was from dryland cotton, and 2,400 pounds of seed cotton produced 630 pounds of lint and 980 pounds of seed, Jack Fenton told The News. Fenton said the gin was paying 90 cents per pound for the first bale.

Monday at 3:00 p. m., Don Spears had the first bale to be ginned at Wilson Co-op Gin, according to Mrs. Preston Buchanan, bookkeeper there. She said Don had 2,360 pounds of seed cotton which produced 652 pounds of lint and 1,100 pounds of seed.

Emil Raindl ginned the first bales Thursday and Friday of last week at New Home Co-op Gin and at New Home Gin, and ginned three more bales this week. He was paid 90 cents per pound for his first bales and ginning was free.

W. T. Knight ginned the first bale at Lakeview plant of New Home Co-op and likewise received 90 cents per pound and free ginning.

## Tahoka Opens Home Season Against Crosbyton Tonight

Tahoka Bulldogs open their home season tonight at 8:00 against the tough Crosbyton Chiefs, who will be looking for revenge against the local team.

Tahoka was the only team to defeat Crosbyton last year in a 7-6 battle, and the Bulldogs gained a 6-6 upset tie with the Chiefs two years ago. Last year the Chiefs won eight games, lost one, and tied state Class A champion finalist Petersburg 13-13.

Therefore, Coach Deane Wright, former Tahoka assistant coach, will doubtless be pulling out all the stops to defeat the Bulldogs.

Coach Gib Hough's boys dropped an 8-0 decision in the unexpected rugged Lorenzo Hornets last Friday. The Bulldogs were not satisfied with their performance and wanted to work out Saturday morning. They are working this week to correct mistakes, and realize they have quite a job to do if they stop Crosbyton.

Three boys have been lost by the Bulldog squad to injuries, at least for a few weeks, End Freddie Pierce, Quarterback Mitchell Williams, and Center Rott Patterson. Freddie has torn shoulder ligaments, Mitchell a broken collar bone, and Rott a bruised knee.

Expected to start for Crosbyton are: Jim Blagg, quarterback, 154 pound junior letterman; Jimmy Flournoy, 135 pound sophomore letterman, a speedy break-away runner who scored on two long runs against O'Donnell last week; Gaylon Wheelless, 187 pound full-back and junior letterman; and Ronnie Wheelless, 142 pound junior wingback letterman.

In the line will be: Eddie Jordan, 216 pound letterman, at center; Gene Richardson, 152 senior letterman, and Alton Trull, 154, junior up from "B" team, at guards; Roger Smith, 230, senior letterman tackle whom Wright calls his best football player, and Winston Baise, 180, senior letterman, at tackles; and Wynn Robinson, 185, sophomore letterman who also does the punting, and Randy Holman, 166, freshman, at ends.

Coach Hough will be playing a lot of boys, seeking to give as many juniors and sophomores playing experience as he feels he can.

For a home opening game, this could be one of the best matches of the season.

The bands and cheering sections will be on hand to boost the teams and add color to the occasion.

## Bulldogs Drop Opener 8-0 To Lorenzo Hornets

Tahoka Bulldogs were stung by the Lorenzo Hornets 8 to 0 Friday night at the Crosby county town, the first time the two teams had ever met. Lorenzo is in District 4-A, Tahoka is 5-A.

Fans and team members had hoped to start the season with a victory, but ran up against a rugged Lorenzo crew a little more determined to win—and win they did—although press reports had said Lorenzo had virtually nothing, which possibly caused the Tahoka boys to take the Hornets lightly.

Tahoka's boys, however, were the victims of fumbles, penalties in most inopportune times, and mistakes which they expect to correct in future games. On defense they looked great at times, as did Lorenzo also, and there were flashes of promise on offense.

Tahoka received the opening kickoff but fumbled and lost the ball on its own 38 yard line. Joe Reed and John Gestes moved the ball to a first-and-goal, including a 9-yard pass to Navarro, on the Tahoka 3. The Bulldogs put up a great goal-line defense in holding the Hornets to one yard in four plays as Danny Coburn stood out on defense.

Chapa, Coburn, Tomlinson and Williams moved out to the 34, but lacking inches for a first Davis punted. Lorenzo lost 8 in three plays and punted, but Tahoka was charged with roughing the kicker. In business again on its own 26, Tahoka drew a 15 yard holding penalty, and Harvick punted from the 13 to the Tahoka 40.

From here, Lorenzo moved in to score on a 9-yard pass, a 15-yarder to Gestes, and four running plays of 1, 4, 6 and 4 by Reed. Lorenzo was offside on the place kick, then Reed passed to Gestes

Coburn ran the kickoff from the 25 to the 50, then the Bulldogs bogged down on the Lorenzo 33.

During the third quarter, Tahoka held Lorenzo to one first down, a 24-yard pass to Gestes, failed to move itself and punted back to Lorenzo. The Hornets lost six yards on a fumble, Reed was nailed for a 9 yard loss, and here Cliff Thomas blocked Reed's attempted punt for another 11 yard loss back on the Lorenzo 19 yard line.

Tahoka now had its scoring chance, late in the third. Chapa made 4, Coburn 2, Chapa 5, and Tomlinson was tackled on the one-yard line. Coburn made nothing on the first try, and the ball was fumbled on the fourth-and-goal try, and Reed quick-kicked 48 yards.

Bulldogs were back in business, but a Renfro pass to Hamilton was nullified by a penalty. Harvick passed 10 yards to Howard, and the Bulldogs moved in to the 28, inches shy of a first down.

In spite of another 15 yard penalty, Tahoka held the Hornets, and moved out to Hornet territory on a 13-yard pass to Chapa, 11- and 9-yard passes to Howard, and bogged down on the Hornet 42.

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**WASHINGTON AND 'SMALL BUSINESS'**  
By C. WILSON HARDER

This fall in New York, eight men will go on trial for allegedly profiting to the extent of \$100,000 for bilking a few huge combines in the grocery product manufacturing field who issue coupons out of at least \$100,000.

These men are charged with collecting coupons, and selling them to food stores at a low rate. The grocers then sent the coupons in for redemption, regardless of whether or not they handled the products involved, and received the cash from the manufacturers.

Marvin Pollner, assistant U.S. attorney who secured the indictment from a grand jury says that of some \$10 billion worth of coupons issued by the big soap and food combines each year, at least \$100 million worth are illegally redeemed.

He also has expressed the view that perhaps the entire legality of present couponing methods should be looked into. While not having any effect on the guilt or innocence of the eight men to be tried, this observation brings focus on some most interesting collateral considerations.

Nobody but a few big combines can coupon to this vast extent. The purpose is twofold. One is to knock out local and regional competition. The other is to force stores to handle their brands whether they want to stock them or not.

The cost of all this, of course, is borne by the consumer, as the National Federation of Independent Business

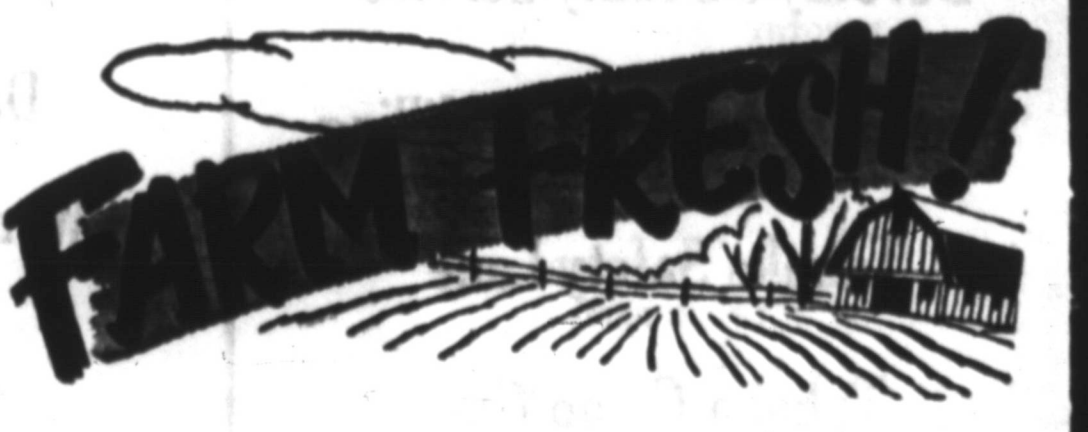

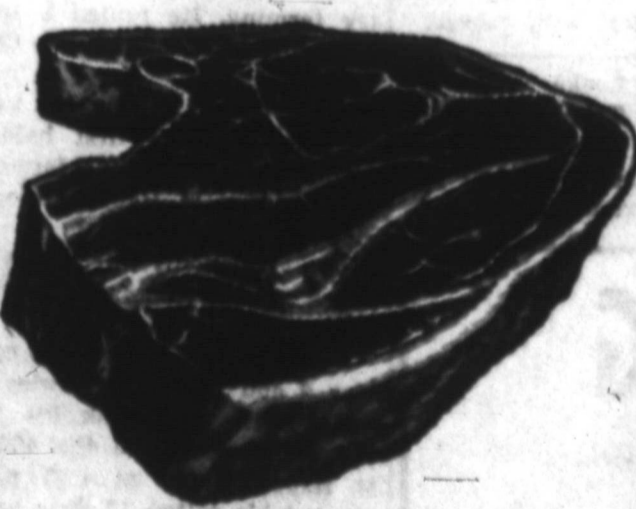
