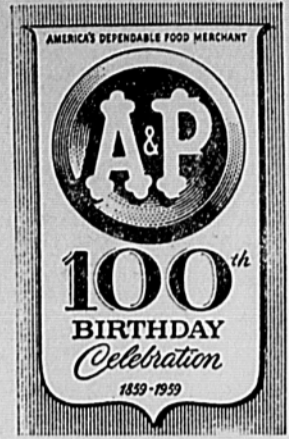

Soil and City Dwellers . . . .

People who live in the city, though they may never see a harvest, have a direct interest in the soil from which they receive the many products they use. The shelf or bin in the corner grocery is only a step from the soil in which the food is produced.

No one is far removed from the soil, its blessings and its demands, though he may dwell high in an apartment in a crowded city.

The contribution of the city family in soil and water conservation may come mainly in the support given to the national effort in soil and water conservation. City dwellers, who own agricultural land, have an obligation just as those who live on farm and ranches to use and to keep the land according to the Creator's design. It is for them to encourage good soil stewardship on the part of those they entrust with the land.

Persons who own no land can be a strong influence in behalf of the prudent use of our soil and water resources. As good citizens they owe it to their community and to their nation to inform themselves and to support sound soil and water conservation.

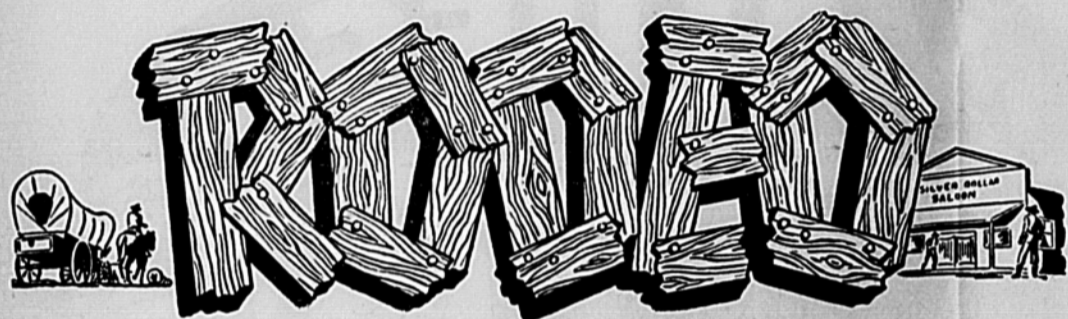
