Biggest shower of the day was east of O'Donnell, where up to two inches was reported. O'Don-



> Cooley Bill for 1966, if a producer elects to qualify for the program on the 100 acres producing 100 bales, he would gross \$12,675. This is 87 per cent of this year or No. 1 above. This 13 per cent reduction in income is the same as it would have been had the 29-cent loan been reduced by 3.75 cents per pound or in other words the 29-cent loan might have been reduced to 25.25 cents per pound.

> 3. If in 1966 the producer elects to qualify for the program and reduces the full 35 per cent, his gross income would be \$11,675, which is 80 per cent of this year, or No. 1. This reduction in income is the same as if the 29-cent loan had been reduced 5.80 cents, or a loan of 23.20 cents.

> Counting the South Plains crop at two million bales, the gross income to the farmer under No. 2 will be reduced by \$37,500,000. Under No. 3, the gross income to the producer will be reduced by \$58,000,000. The above figures are assuming that cotton will not sell above the loan, and no one can guarantee that it will.
