'Back the Bulldogs' Special Day Sept. 3

Friday, Sept. 3rd, has been designated "Back the Bulldogs" day in Tahoka, and the Chamber of Commerce and member-merchants are sponsoring a special sales day. \$150.00 in prizes to be given away, this band concert, and pep rally down town.

Many C. of C. member stores will have registration blanks, and people are invited to register once at each of as many stores as they desire. Although most stores will have special prices in merchandise, no purchase of any kind is required to register for prizes. Everyone is eligible to register if 16 years of age and over, unless a C. of C. director or family member.

Registration is for one day only Friday, Sept. 3, from opening until 5:45 p. m., at which time each store owner will bring his box containing registration slips to the north side of the square, where three prizes will be given away at 6:00 p. m., Savings Bonds worth \$75.00, \$50.00, and \$25.00 respectively.

Clint Walker will be master of ceremonies for the presentation of prizes and a brief program.

Rains Change Crop Outlook

Crop situation in Lynn county has changed drastically for the better as a result of the unusually good August rains, farmers from over the area report.

Up until August 15, the prospect was becoming desperate when the slow to heavy rains covered most of the county sufficiently to revive suffering crops. Then, last week end further showers again fell. Tahoka receiving 67 inch on Saturday evening, followed by 01 Sunday.

Southwest of town, hail damaged a small area. Rainey Park, between the old Three Lakes community and West Point, had at least part of his crop completely hauled out. Some damage was also reported by nearby farms of Guy Bennett and Ross Smith.

Park reported a half inch of rain, and his neighbors reported an inch and more. Parts of Wells and Newmoore communities received light rainfall.

This week's rain in Tahoka brought the total in town to 3.14 inches, the most rain in August recorded here since 1954, when 3.26 inches fell in the month. August's rains here also brought the year's total back up to normal or a little better, a total of 13.13 inches having been received in Tahoka up to now.

August rains have caused most cotton to respond quickly and put on new fruit. Even badly burned cotton has been improved and will produce something. Guessers are now predicting 140,000 to 160,000 bales of cotton this year compared to the short crop of little more than 100,000 last year.

A lot of the dryland cotton is very fine. In fact, some farmers say they now have the best cotton they have ever had.

Also, much of the late maize will now produce a fair to good crop, adding further to the farm economy for the year.

As an old saying goes, "Old Lynn can promise less and make more than any county anywhere."

Farmers Co-op In Annual Session

Farmers Co-op members, families and friends attended the 36th annual membership meeting held Saturday at South Elementary school, enjoyed visiting, an Elmer Spores barbecue dinner, operation reports, and receiving door prizes.

Most of all 170 members, plus landlords and station customers enjoyed the 1,415 checks issued totaling \$88,990 as margins from the past year's operation.

President Cleve Littlepage said they thought this was an excellent report for a short crop year like 1964. However, the gin processed 9,899 bales of cotton and net margins averaged \$8.86 per bale ginned.

The cooperative has assets of \$701,684.47, and owe Houston Bank for Cooperatives \$75,000.

In the annual election of directors, Littlepage, Daniel Thomas, and Charlie Lichey were re-elected to the board. Other members are L. D. Howell, T. D. Dunlap, R. L. Warren, and Othel Meeks. C. W. Stevens is the manager.

City Will Spray For Mosquitoes Monday

Evon Wilson of the City of Tahoka announces that the City will be sprayed for mosquitoes Monday night, August 30, weather permitting.

Should it be raining Monday or a high wind blowing, the City will spray on the first night best suited for spraying.

High school students registered and received schedules, books and locker assignments on Wednesday of this week. All other students will enroll Monday morning.

An orientation conference was held Thursday morning, and faculty meetings begin this morning at 8:30 o'clock in the school cafeteria.

About 45 football boys started work-outs on Monday, August 16, and have been practicing under the new coaching staff twice daily since.

Opening day, Monday, August 30, buses will run their regular schedules and are due to arrive at the schools at 8:15 a. m. Teachers are to report for duty at the same time, 8:15 a. m. All students will be expected to be ready for a full schedule.

First grade students will register this first day, August 30, at 8:30 a. m., Principal J. B. Howell of South Elementary announces. The first three weeks of school, first grade students will be dismissed at 1:00 p. m. in order that the little ones will not have such a long day until they become adjusted to the school routine. Parents should pick up their first grade pupils at 1:00 p. m., but for those living in the country a bus room will be maintained for these children until time of the buses to run and will be supervised.

Eight school buses are being run again this year over the same routes as last year. Two new buses are going into service this year. Many minor improvements have been made on the school campus during the summer.

Most of the furnishings and cabinets in South Elementary have been repainted and other minor improvements made.

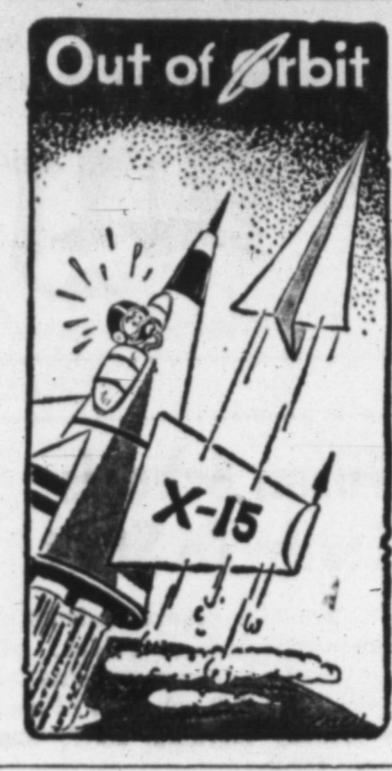

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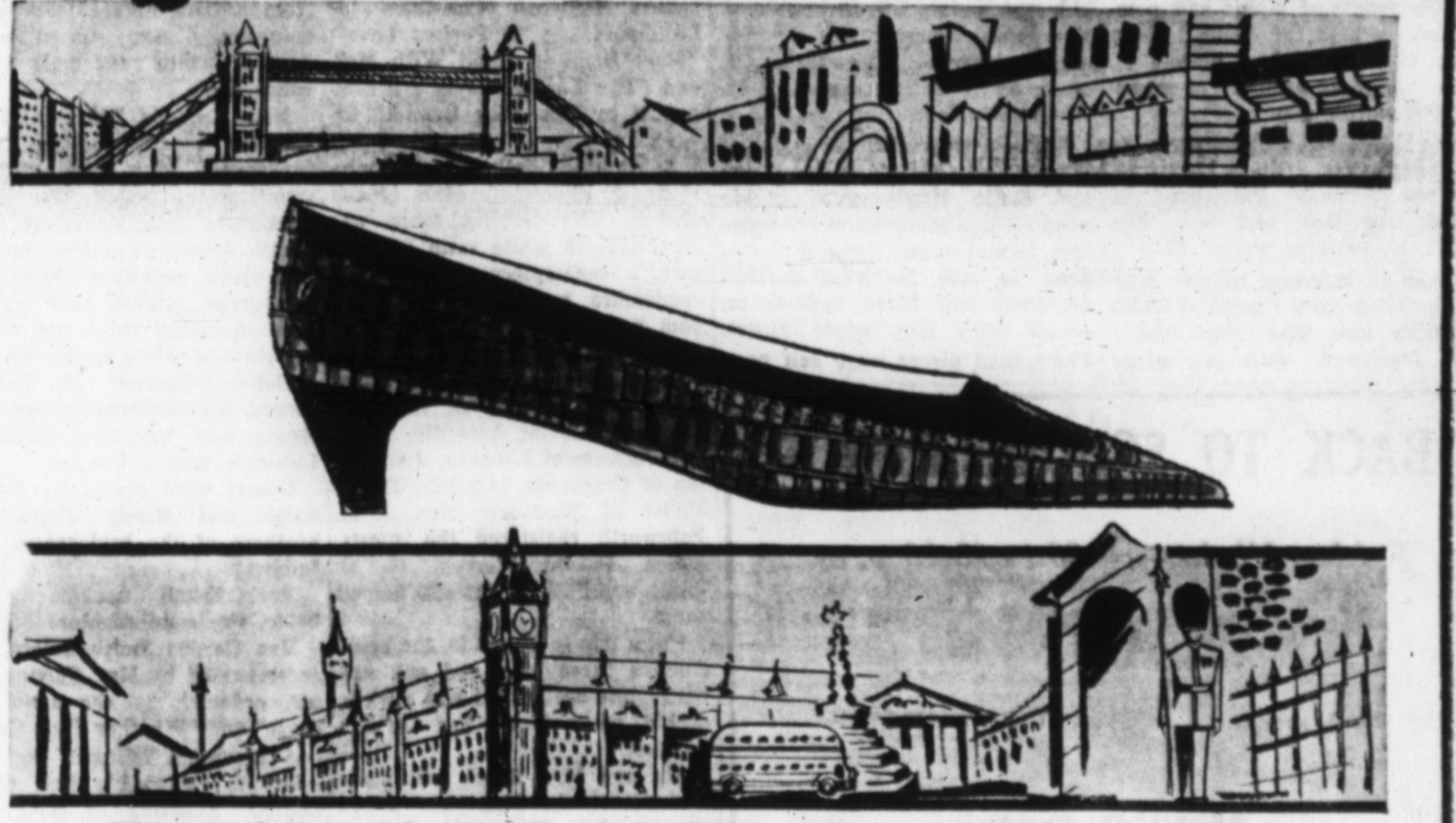

Rev. Stahly has been pastor of the church since June of this year.

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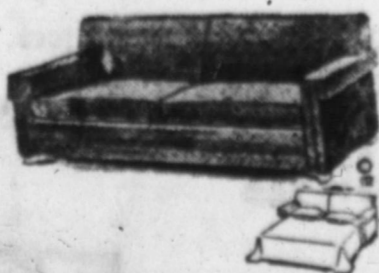

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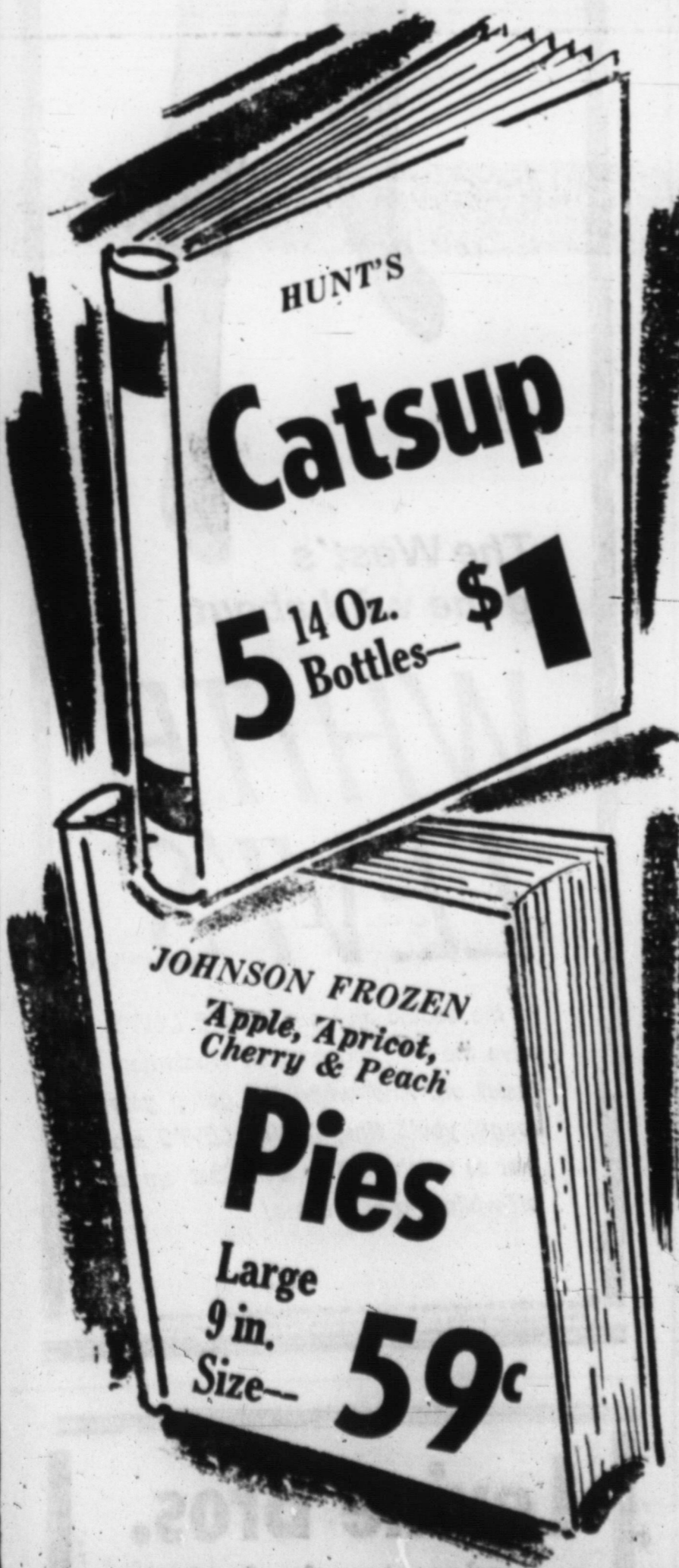

Farm Leader Discusses New Cotton Legislation

New cotton legislation and some of the possible effects on Plains farming was the subject of a discussion last Thursday at Tahoka Rotary Club when about thirty-five farmers from over the county were club guests. The speaker was John Seibert, area farm management specialist of the Extension Service.

Seibert repeatedly stated he was not expressing opinions either for or against the new farm proposals, but simply was presenting figures and statistics to illustrate probable effects.

Feed-grain portion of the Cooley Bill, H.R. 9811, he said are virtually the same as the one in effect, extended for four more years.

He called attention to the fact that new farm legislation calls for "projected" farm yield instead of "normal" farm yield, entirely different. Projected farm yield could be variable, he hinted, and also told how individual farm allotments can be based on the immediate past three-year individual farm production.

In discussing the cotton situation, he proposed-USDA statistics to show cotton carry-over has increased from 14.3 million in 1960 to 15 million bales in 1964.

U. S. consumption of cotton increased from 8.1 million bales in 1960 to about 9.1 million in 1964, an increase of a million bales. However, in the same period, our exports decreased from about 6.6 million bales in 1960 to less than 4 million in 1964, a loss of more than 2.6 million bales in world trade in five years. Thus the total going into trade dropped from 14.7 million bales to 13 million.

He then gave specific examples of what the Cooley provisions

would do to Plains cotton under the alternate plans, this explanation having been published in The News three or four weeks ago.

He pointed out the base price for cotton can not exceed 90 percent of world market price, and that Plains cotton will be priced at about 18 cents per pound, or about three cents under the base of 21 cents for 1-inch middling, depending on the market price.

Briefly, he presented figures where a farmer produced 625 pounds of cotton per acre. Planting 320 acres all to cotton and disregarding the program, the crop would bring \$36,000 at 18 cents per pound. With production costs at \$80 per acre, not including taxes, interest, land payments, depreciation on equipment, etc., expenses were figured at \$25,600, leaving a net return of \$10,400.

In the program there are three alternatives. With a 100-acre allotment, a farmer may reduce to 85 acres, 75, or 65 acres, and the farmer would qualify for a nine cent direct support price payment, which would bring the farmer, figuring cotton 30 cents and land retirement payments, respectively under the three plans, \$14,203, \$13,734, and \$13,265. But, production expense would be cut materially, and expenses, including \$5.00 per acre for working the 15, 25, or 35 acres of land retired, would run \$6,875, \$6,125, and \$5,375 at the same \$80 per acre production cost figure. This would leave "profits" of \$7,328, \$7,609, and \$7,890.

The figures are only theoretically, he emphasized, for comparison purposes and would vary for many different reasons.

Horace Rogers, program chairman, introduced the speaker. The day was arranged by the club's rural-urban committee of Leighton Knox, Winston Wharton and Harley Henderson.

Washington and "SMALL BUSINESS" BY C. WILSON HARDER

Recently Dominican playboy Rubirosa was killed in a car wreck. What is the connection between this happening and American small business? There is what might be called a reflex connection.

For one thing, among his many wives was the daughter of a former Dominican dictator. It eventually developed that a great deal of his fancy spending in international cafe society was financed by American foreign aid money sent his country to improve the lot of the people. Obviously, part of this money lavished on champagne and gifts for paramours was taken from small business.

But the effects of his madcap spending are even deeper than this. Before the U. S. giveaway programs were ever dreamed up, he achieved financial success marrying wealthy women.

Numbered among these wives were two of America's most publicized and wealthiest heiresses. Both of these ladies also engaged in a merry-go-round of changing nuptial vows.

The highly publicized flaunting of inherited wealth started taking place when men were selling apples on the streets, which created quite a contrast.

This sort of thing had to be ended, the lawmakers decided, with the result that still inheritance taxes were enacted.

However, they little realized in addition to clipping wings of future heiresses, they had also

Some remedy was enacted in 1958. After an eight year battle led by the National Federation of Independent Business, the law was changed to permit the tax to be paid over a period of 10 years, with interest.

But now for the past six years there has been a drive to get passed a simple law introduced by Rep. J. Arthur Younger of California. This would permit the principals of family, or closely held businesses, to anticipate the inheritance tax that will be charged and carry life insurance payable to the government.

As it stands now, life insurance payable to the estate can be taken out, but the proceeds merely add to the value of the estate, thus adding more tax. Rep. Younger's bill would permit insurance made out to government non-taxable.

This is a simple, logical plan, yet action is delayed. Action to correct an evil was taken very hastily. Yet further action needed to correct the greater evils created by the first act is prolonged. This recurring phenomena in American political life gives rise to the often voiced opinion that there should be a ten year moratorium on passing new laws so that there can be an understanding of present laws, and a wiping off of the books the bad laws.

The library now has 10,000 books. Through the summer months 140 to 160 people check out books weekly, and up to 7,000 a year are checked out.

Directors hope to extend the scope of book usage by securing greater interest over the entire county.
