West Point Club Party Saturday

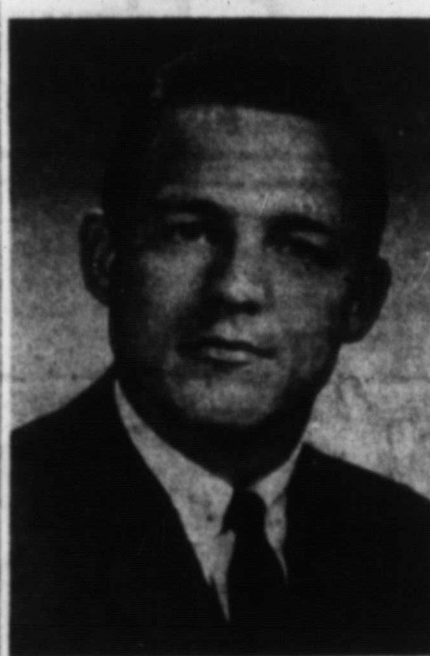
West Point community's annual Christmas "42" party will be held Saturday night, beginning at 7:30, at the Tahoka Community Center.

Lynn county cotton ginnings Thursday morning totaled approximately 76,000 bales, and there were close to 4,000 bales on the gin yards to be ginned. The News estimated after contacting most of the gins and hearing indirectly from six others. Ginnings and other observers estimate the crop about half harvested.

Tahoka had ginned 17,724 bales and had about 1100 bales on the gin yards to be ginned. This represented an increase of 4,200 over the same time last week.

New Home and Lakeview gins had a total of 16,691 ginned, about 800 bales on the yards, and the crop was estimated to be more than half ginned.

Wilson also estimated more than half ginned with about 14,000 bales in addition to some on the yards.

Petty Gin reported 3,964 bales ginned, 300 on the yard, and "not near half through."

West Point, where cotton was late and ginning was off to a late start, 2,030 bales had been ginned and there were 600 bales on the yard.

Grassland had 4,797 bales ginned and "not near half through."

Draw was also off to a late start and had only about 1,800 ginned.

O'Donnell had 9,000 bales ginned, according to a close estimate, and one ginner said he doubted if much more than one-fourth of the crop was out and many farmers have not even started. The same is true at Wells, where about 2,800 had been ginned, and at Newmore, where an estimated 1,500 bales had been ginned.

Ganning has also been light at New Lynn and Gordon, also at the Hackberry county-line gin.

Thursday morning was damp, causing a slow-up of harvesting, but the weather may enable most gins to catch up or gain on the backlog.

Many observers are now estimating the crop will go to 160,000 bales or more.

Due to variance in weather and crops conditions, some farmers are already through, some have not yet started gathering cotton, many are reporting almost fantastic yields, and spots in the county have a short crop, especially in some sections of the east and the south.

John Vinson Burdett Sr., 66-year old resident of O'Donnell, died at his home a mile east of that city at 11:30 p. m. Saturday.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Monday in the First Baptist Church of O'Donnell with Rev. Calvin Partain of Friona and formerly of O'Donnell, and Rev. Bill Burton, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Lamesa Memorial Park.

Mr. Burdett was born in Grayson county and moved to Borden county in 1920 from Baylor county. He had lived in O'Donnell since 1948 and had been a member of the Baptist Church for 50 years.

Survivors include his wife, Ethel; one son, J. V. Burdett r. of Lamesa; four brothers, George and Bob, both of O'Donnell, and Ralph and Toke, both of Lubbock; and two grandchildren.

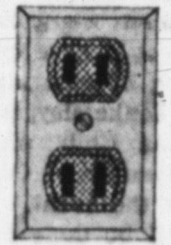

D. Terry of Abilene celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary.

Mrs. Terry is the former Miss Ima Baldrige, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Baldrige, who came to this county in 1901 and were long considered among the leading citizens in the development of this area. Mr. Terry's folks were pioneers of the northern part of the county.

H. D. Terry and Ima Baldrige were married on Dec. 12, 1915, at the Baldrige ranch home, northeast of O'Donnell, with County Judge Joe Stokes performing the ceremony.

For several years, he was a barber at the Ira Doak shop along with Sumner Clayton, C. L. Dickson, Cody Bragg, Claude Conway, and others.

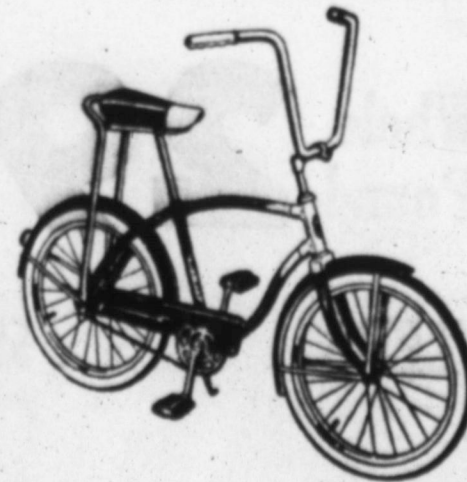

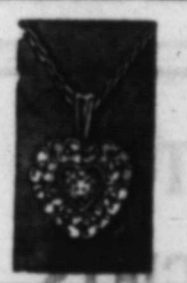

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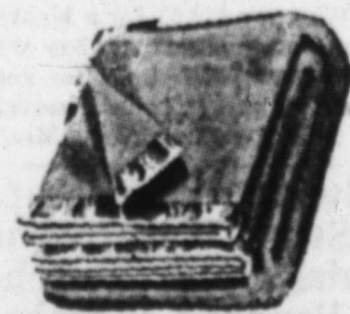

Tahoka Boys And New Home Girls Win Trophies In County Championship Play

Crosbyton Chiefs won the championship title in the Tahoka Basketball Tournament here last Saturday night, winning 67-43 over the Tahoka Bulldogs. Stanton girls won a nip and tuck battle with New Home, finally edging out a 57-56 victory.

The Bulldogs and New Home girls were winners of the second place trophies.

Slaton took third place in the boys division taking out O'Donnell 80-39. Crosbyton girls downed Wilson 37-9 for third.

Consolation winners were the Stanton boys who overpowered New Home 79-46, and the Slaton Tigerettes, who defeated Tahoka 43-32.

Tahoka boys and New Home girls won the county championship titles, both for the second year. The travelling trophies, presented by the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce, become permanent property of teams winning three years in a row.

Tahoka defeated O'Donnell 55-45 for the county title, while New Home girls beat Wilson 46-40.

Finals

Crosbyton took an early 11-8 lead in the championship finals over the Bulldogs, who held their own until about the middle of the second stanza, when the score stood at 17-16 in the winners' favor.

The Chiefs' scorers got busy and widened the margin to 34-17 by the half.

The Bulldogs could never seem to get underway and trailed 52-31 at the end of the third. At one time in the fourth stanza Crosbyton led by 30 points, but Tahoka narrowed it some before the game ended 67-43.

Jim Blagg scored 19 points, Phil Morris 16 and Lance Morris 13 for the winners. Tahoka's Mitchell Williams made 18 and Doyle Schneider 10.

The lead changed hands almost every time the ball was thrown toward the basket in the girls championship game, when Stanton retained its tournament title by winning over New Home by one point, 57-56.

In one of the best games of the tournament, New Home took an 18-15 first quarter lead, but Stanton held a 32-28 halftime margin. New Home again held the lead 44-43 at the end of the third.

Janette Tate poured in 33 points for Stanton, but was topped by Elsie Henry's 38 for New Home. Linda Franklin added 13 for the winners, while Susan Hancock made 10 for the losers.

Third Place

Playing for third place, Slaton went wild on the basket downing O'Donnell 80-39 after leading 18-5, 35-18, and 62-27 at the end of the first three periods.

Jack Mason made 21 for the Tigers while Orin Smith made 18 and Richard Washington 17. O'Donnell's Bud White made 12.

Crosbyton girls outscored Wilson 37-9 for third place after quarter period scores stood at 9-2, 18-4 and 24-8.

Susan Perkins and Bette Ellison were responsible for 14 and 13 points, respectively, for the winners. Carolyn Schneider and Gini Gatzki made four each for Wilson.

Consolation

Stanton took a 79-46 victory over New Home to win the consolation trophy in the boys division. Period scores saw Stanton in front 18-11, 32-27 and 56-33.

All-Tournament Teams Selected

Small individual trophies were presented boys and girls named to this year's all-tournament team, announced at the conclusion of the event.

Named to the boys' mythical team were Lance Morris of Crosbyton, Allen Springer of Stanton, Jack Mason of Slaton, Bud White of O'Donnell and Mitchell Williams of Tahoka.

Girls all-tournament team was composed of Elsie Henry of New Home, Janette Tate of Stanton, Bette Ellison of Crosbyton, Linda Hale of Tahoka, Nancy Lucero of Slaton, and Beth Biggs of Stanton.

Dink Polson paced the winners with 20 points, while others scoring in double figures were Allen Springer with 15, Buddy Shanks 12 and David Hicks 10. Kenneth McClung led the New Home team with 17.

Slaton outscored Tahoka 43-32 for the girls consolation title although the game was close until the last quarter. Tahoka led 10-7 the first quarter but trailed 22-17 and 31-28 the next two.

The Lockney Beacon says:

It was the intention of Congress, in writing the farm bill, that the longstanding rules concerning skip-row cotton were to remain unchanged and that acreage allotments for cotton planting were to be used on the actual acreage planted to cotton and that skip rows in dryland farming were not to be counted. But after Congress had adjourned, it seems that the Secretary of Agriculture took it upon himself to set up some rules on this skip-row business against the wishes of Congress and here is what he came up with for both feed and cotton: (40 inch rows).

- 2 in, 1 out, 85 2/3 percent charged.
- 2 in, 2 out, 65 percent charged.
- 2 in, 4 out, 33 1/3 percent charged.
- 4 in, 4 out, 50 percent charged.
- 4 in, 2 out, 76 2/3 percent charged.

Starting with the first payday of next year, the social security on both employer and employees will be increased from the present 3.625 per cent of taxable payrolls to 4.2 per cent. 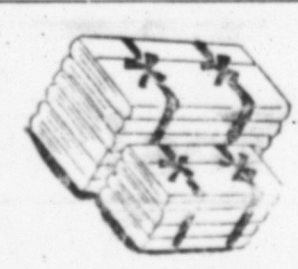

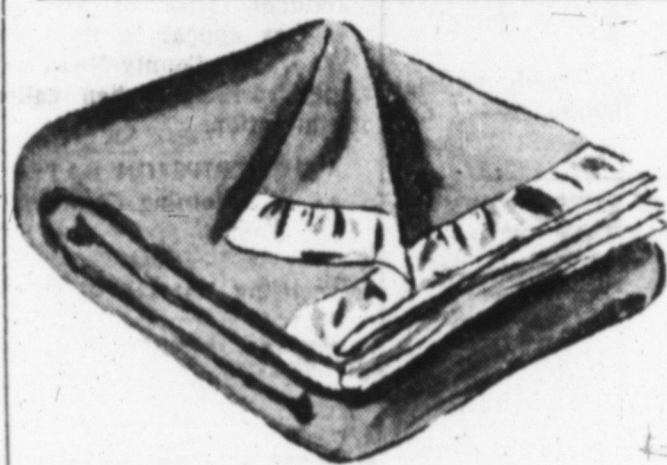
