Weather Delays Harvest of Cotton

Cold, damp weather has again slowed cotton harvest, but this is enabling the gins to catch up and release trailers for further stripping operations as soon as weather permits.

Tahoka had ginned 22,115 bales up to mid-morning Thursday, an increase of nearly 4,400 bales in a week, and there were less than 500 bales on the yards.

Based on comparison with last week's county-wide ginning report, this would indicate that a total of 96,000 to 98,000 bales have been ginned in the county to date. Many farmers across the mid-section and northern half of the county are finishing up, while in the south half, particularly in the O'Donnell area, many have not yet pulled a boll. The News is informed. Many farmers in the south and other areas report there are still too many green bolls for harvest.

Damp weather late last week slowed harvest, and then Tuesday and Wednesday of this week mist, sleet, and light snow put a halt to cotton stripping. Thursday dawned cloudy and damp but warmer. During the wet spell, low temperature was 28 degrees Wednesday morning.

O'Donnell School Head Is Leaving

Charlie White, superintendent of the O'Donnell schools the past two and a half years, has resigned to accept a similar position as head of the Petersburg schools at mid-term in January.

Mr. White will succeed "Pete" Wilson, husband of the former Jimmie Lou Thomas of Grassland, who has resigned to enter the business field.

Dick Franklin, president of the O'Donnell school board, announced applications for the head job should be sent to him. These will be screened and then applicants will be interviewed by the board by appointment.

During White's administration at O'Donnell, a number of plant improvements have been made, and the school has been successfully integrated.

White began his teaching career as coach at Hermleigh, went from there to New Deal, and was in the Plainview system a number of years before coming to O'Donnell as superintendent. He served successively at Plainview as assistant football and track coach at high school, was assistant high school principal, then served eight years as principal of Coronado Junior High.

Miss Cherri Lee Norman, Texas Queen who is a student in Baylor University, is representing the state at the annual American Farm Bureau convention in Chicago this Monday through Thursday.

Dulin is chairman of the Young People's Committee of Lynn County Farm Bureau, and next year is scheduled to represent Area II as a member of the state committee for young people in Farm Bureau.

Miss Norman won the queen contest at the recent state convention in Dallas, and as a prize received a \$500.00 check to defray expenses to represent Texas at the national meeting.

Enrollment 1134 In Local Schools

Reynolds on enrollment, progress of textbook committees were the principal items of business, other than routine matters, at the regular school board meeting Thursday night of last week.

Supt. Reynolds reported enrollment of that date holding up at 1124, with 420 students in South Elementary, 308 in North Elementary, 166 in Junior High, 230 in High School, and 10 in Special School.

New adoptions for textbooks in the following areas are to be made this year: Reading (basic and supplementary), grades 1-3; geography, 3; elementary Spanish, 3-6; agriculture, 7-8; trigonometry, physical education, chemistry, economics, related math II, and Spanish IV, all in high school; and English composition, 9-12.

Donald Young Is Shock Victim

Donald Wayne Young, 24, of Tahoka was killed Friday morning, Dec. 10, in an accident when he came in contact with a high voltage line while working about a mile north of Brownfield.

A lineman for Lyntegar REA in Tahoka, Young was dead on arrival at a Brownfield hospital at 11:00 a. m.

Funeral services were held at 3:00 p. m. Sunday in the First Baptist Church in Post with Rev. C. B. Hogue of Odessa and Rev. Jimmy Turner of Tahoka officiating. Burial was in Terrace Cemetery in Post under direction of White Funeral Home in Tahoka and Mason Funeral Home in Post. The body lay in state at White Funeral Home until 2:30 p. m. Saturday and was then transferred to Post.

Donald Wayne Young was born in the Gordon community in Lynn County. He attended the Close City schools and was a graduate of Post High School. Young attended West Texas State College in Canyon and San Angelo Junior College.

He was married to Miss Judy Stovall in February, 1963 and moved to Tahoka. He had been employed by Lyntegar since that time. He was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife of Tahoka; one son, Todd, of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Young of route 3, Post; one brother, Tommy Young of route 1, Post; his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. L. P. Baker of Post and Mr. and Mrs. Hubbard Young of Wilson. He was a nephew of Mrs. W. H. (Dub) Kenley of Tahoka.

Kenneth Scott, a Texas Tech student, is still under treatment in Tahoka Hospital for rheumatic fever. He was admitted Dec. 6.

Mrs. F. A. Wyatt is a medical patient in Tahoka Hospital, having been admitted last Friday.

The eight named to the All-District band will go to Big Spring to compete for All-Region Band, then to area and finally for All-State.

Band Director Gary Hall said it sometimes takes a student 100 hours of practicing to prepare for such a contest.

S. A. Cummings Rites Thursday

S. A. Cummings, 80-year-old resident of Wilson community for 45 years and one of the county's prominent citizens, died at 9:40 p. m. Tuesday in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. He had been a patient there since Nov. 28.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p. m. Thursday in the First Baptist Church of Wilson with Rev. H. F. Scott of Seagraves, a former Wilson pastor, and Rev. Jack Clack, present pastor, officiating. Burial was in Green Memorial Park at Wilson under direction of White Funeral Home.

Mr. Cummings was born June 2, 1885, in Coryell county. He was married to the former Miss Mell Brown on Oct. 23, 1910, in Hamilton county. They came to Lynn county from Hamilton county in 1920, and settled on the farm south of Wilson where their home still remains. Mrs. Cummings was a farmer and was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include his wife of Wilson; one son, Earl Cummings of Wilson; and one granddaughter, Kathy Cummings, a student in Texas Tech.

Tax Collections Drop Off Some

State and county tax payments have been unusually good, although very slightly behind last year, according to George McCracken, county tax assessor and collector. About 65 percent of the roll has already been collected.

December is the last month during which a discount will be given. Three percent discount was allowed for payment of taxes in October, two percent for November, and one percent for December. Taxes become delinquent after Jan. 31.

Total collections through November have been \$170,582.04, compared to \$171,701.97 for the same period last year. By early payment, taxpayers received discounts totaling \$5,157.08. Payments dropped off considerably in November, however, only \$11,246.94 being paid during the month of the \$170,582.00 total.

Broken down, a total of \$27,174.73 has been paid in state taxes, \$137,718.26 in county taxes, \$1,062.81 in Water District taxes for a total of \$175,739.12 before discounts.

Immunization Is Set For Saturday

A second immunization clinic will be held in Tahoka Saturday, Dec. 18, from 2:00 until 5:00 p. m. in the Lyntegar directors room under sponsorship of Tahoka Junior Chamber of Commerce, which provides funds to finance the project.

The first clinic was held last month when most school children received immunizations.

The second clinic this Saturday is primarily for indigents and migrants, but anyone may take advantage of the service.

Shots will be given by registered nurses under the direction of the State Health Department for polio, diphtheria-whooping cough, tetanus, and small pox.

Citizens Advised To Pay Poll Taxes For Vote In 1966

In spite of this next year being election year, poll tax payments are very light, even lower than last year, an "off" year for elections, states George McCracken, county tax assessor and collector. Only 358 people had secured poll tax receipts through November, compared to 391 last year, he says.

Some people have been holding off thinking a poll tax may not be required to vote next year. This is not true in Texas state, district and local elections, and at this time applies only to federal offices such as congressman, senators and president and vice-president.

Even if the Texas poll tax requirement were to be voted by court decision, this is not likely to come before next January 31, McCracken says. To be sure of a vote, every citizen to which the over- and under-age exemptions apply should have a poll tax receipt if he expects to vote.

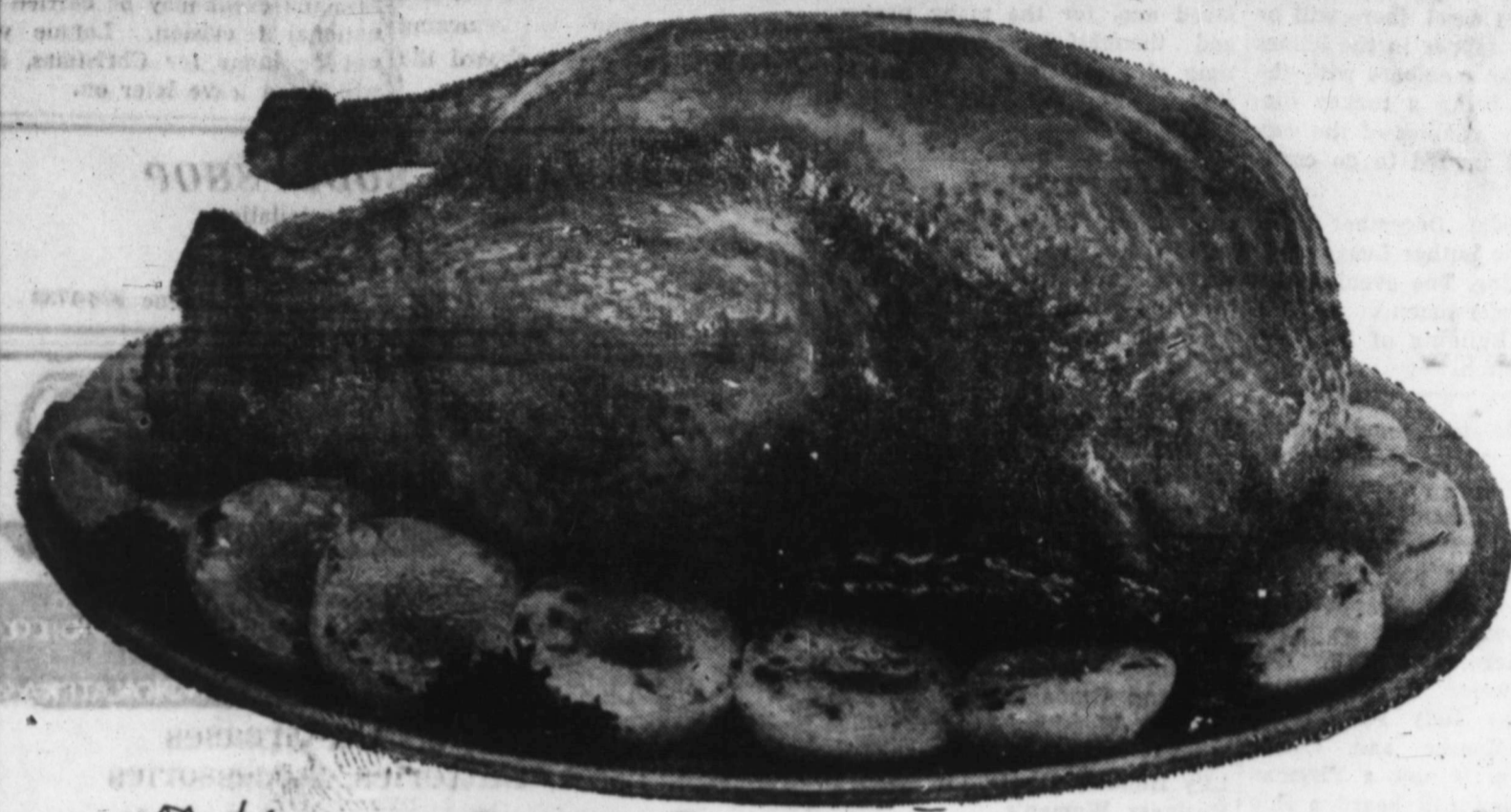

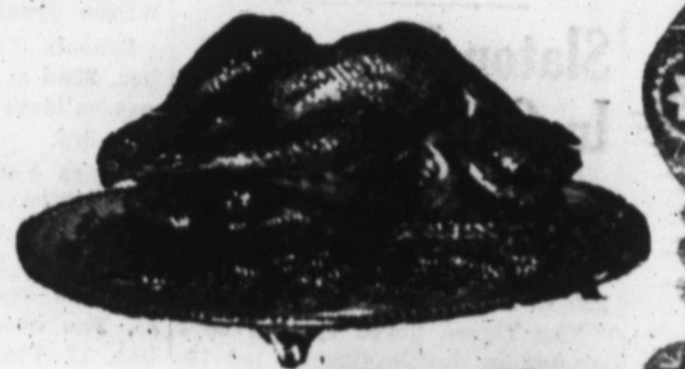

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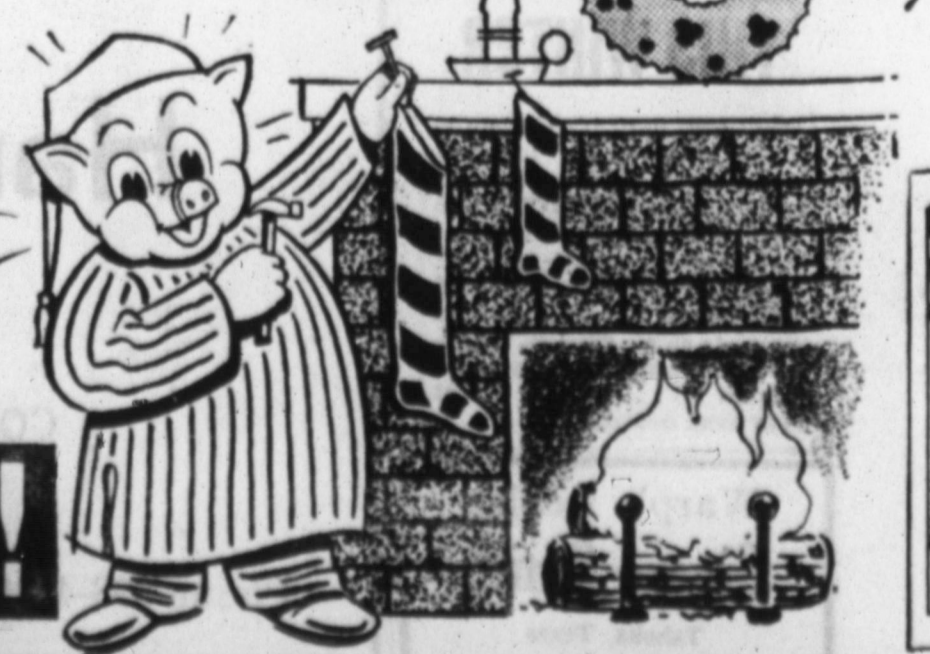

Land Bank To Plug Agriculture

As a service to farmers and ranchers, the Federal Land Bank Association of Tahoka will join in a national program of public information keyed to the 50th Anniversary of the Federal Land Bank System.

The Tahoka Association, along with some 700 other associations and twelve Federal Land Banks, will carry out the program to make all Americans aware of the importance of agriculture.

Ross Smith, the local Association manager, stated that large segments of the country's population, as well as city dwellers, factory workers and the like, are not aware of the vital part which agricultural people take in adding to the basic strength of the nation.

With agriculture moving into a "challenging new era of development for rural America and of production for the world-wide battle against hunger," it becomes increasingly necessary that the true, complete story of agricultural progress and potentials be told, he said.

Mr. Smith noted that numerous meetings, commemorative activities and special anniversary events will get under way in the coming months, leading up to the nationwide 50th Anniversary on 1967. The twelve Federal Land Banks were established in 1917 under the Farm Loan Act.

The 50th Anniversary comes at a timely opportunity, Mr. Smith commented, to translate the accomplishments of agriculture into terms of interest for all people everywhere. He said the Federal Land Bank Association of Tahoka welcomes the chance to take part in this effort.

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Medicare Program Will Be In Operation In '66

People 65 years of age and older will become eligible for Medicare this next year, beginning in July, but the sign-up period for benefits is now—extending to March 31, 1966.

Basic coverage is automatic, but supplementary coverage, if desired by the person, must be signed-up for at a premium of \$3.00 per month.

Below are some of the highlights of the program furnished The News by County Agent Bill Griffin and the local Committee on Aging. For further information, see the Social Security representative at the Lynn County court house on the first and third Monday mornings at 9:30 o'clock.

Basic Coverage
Hospital Care: Full coverage after the first \$40 for up to 60 days in each period of illness; coverage for up to 30 additional days, for which patient pays \$10 a day. Psychiatric care is included for up to 60 days in each period of illness, with a lifetime limit of 190 days.

Nursing Home Care: Post-hospital care for 20 days in each period of illness at no cost to patient, plus 80 additional days.

Home Nursing Care: Up to 100 visits by nurses or technicians in each period of illness at no cost to patient.

Outpatient Service: 80% of hospital diagnostic service costs after the first \$20 for each diagnostic study period of up to 20 days.

Supplementary Coverage
Voluntary insurance to be financed by individual monthly premiums of \$3 and Federal funds; individual pays first \$50 of his total annual costs and 20% of the costs of all services totaling more than \$50.

Physicians Care: Physicians and surgeons' (including certain dental surgeons) fees.

Home Nursing Care: Up to 100 nursing visits each year in addition to those allowed under the basic plan, without any requirement for prior hospitalization.

Other Health Services and Supplies: Coverage includes costs of X-rays and other diagnostic tests, radiological treatments, casts, splints, artificial limbs and ambulance service.

A period of illness, as defined by the bill, normally starts with the first day of hospitalization. A new spell of illness then cannot begin until a person has had no hospitalization nor extended care in any facility for 60 consecutive days.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 13 accidents on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of November, according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for six persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$6,736.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county from January through November of 1965 shows a total of 67 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were two persons killed and 38 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$31,499.00.

"If you think drinking and driving is not such a big problem as we picture it—you are wrong," the Sergeant stated. "Drinking drivers are involved in more than half the fatal Christmastime accidents, a higher percentage than the one-out-of-three proportion during the rest of the year. The problem is not only the heavy drinker but also the social drinker and even the person who only had a few at the office party or on the way home from work. Just a little alcohol takes a shortcut toward a driving accident by reducing judgment, self-control and driving reactions. The best solution is not to drive at all after drinking."

The Patrol Supervisor offered these suggestions to emphasize holiday traffic safety: restrain impatience, haste, inconsiderateness and preoccupation that may creep into the holiday attitudes. Know the safe winter driving techniques and use them. Obey the regulations and signs. And when you are the pedestrian, don't take chances with the traffic by jaywalking, rushing, obscuring vision with packages, or failing to allow extra alertness for dusk and hazardous weather conditions.

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J. N. Freeman Is Back From War Zone In Viet Nam

J. N. Freeman landed in Norfolk, Va. Monday morning, arriving there from Viet Nam aboard the USS Independence, and called his mother here in Tahoka at 8:00 a. m.

He is the son of Mrs. Clealis Freeman and the late J. O. Freeman, a graduate of Tahoka High School and is married to the former Miss Gracie Griffith of Plains.

The USS Independence, on which J. N. is assigned in the U. S. Navy, completed five months and 8,033 combat missions to North Viet Nam.

The aircraft carrier also figured in the news after a jet fighter's fuel tank split as it took off the flight deck, injuring 15 men Sunday before arriving in Norfolk. J. N. was not injured, his mother said.

Also appearing in recent news has been the harassment campaign carried on against wives and families of servicemen living in Norfolk by anonymous telephone calls criticizing the war in Viet Nam and the USS Independence for having taken part, and threatening those who greeted the ship.

New Job Corps Explained Here

Job Corps training for young women was aired before Tahoka Rotary Club Thursday noon by Mrs. A. W. Voight of Lubbock, director of the Job Corps Screening Center in that city for this area.

Her talk dealt mostly with the need for some kind of job training for a large segment of young women 16 to 21 years of age. The problem is, she said, shall we help these kids learn something to do, or shall we go on helping them through welfare and other means.

Most of the applicants screened are school drop-outs, from underprivileged homes, from families on welfare, or from families who exist on day labor.

Most have worked little at anything, have no skills and know how to do very little, and don't even know how to apply for a job. They have no way of securing a job, and some are street-walkers. They are defeatists. They want you to do something for them.

Five training centers have been set up, including those at St. Petersburg, Omaha, and Los Angeles. Here, the girls are housed and trained from 10 weeks to two years, depending on how long the girl will stay, for the program is largely voluntary.

All girls are taught basic driving and typing, followed up by health, homemaking, child care, and, of course, some vocation to which the girl may seem to have a talent to follow.

While in training, \$50.00 per month is put in the bank for them, and they are given \$13.00 per month for spending money. When their course is completed and they leave, they can have the deposit put up for them while in training. They are furnished necessities and board and room while in training.

Mrs. Voight said she had screened 97 girls for Job Corps training, all but three had been

Editor, The News:
I was late getting a copy of your July 2nd paper. It was sent by someone to my sister in Washington, D.C., and she sent it to another sister in Richmond, Virginia, so I was about five months late getting it. I am passing it on to two sisters here.

It was the best write-up of an Old-Settlers Reunion that I have ever read.

My wife and I were there for the 1948 reunion.

I was interested in the interview of James W. Parker, mail hack driver.

My father was postmaster there from 1905 to 1911, and I worked in the P. O. part time. I knew all of the hack drivers, but the only ones whose names I remember were C. M. Rector and Belton Howell on the Gail run and Jesse Joplin on the Lubbock run. I re-

The News lost—a long-time friend last week end. Mrs. A. R. Kimbrell, 90, has gone to the Better Land. She and her husband, who passed away in 1963, had read The News ever since settling east of present O'Donnell in 1907. She once told us that back in the early days they missed their paper one week and drove all the way to Tahoka in a wagon to get that one issue. There were no rural routes then and no postoffice at O'Donnell, but someone would usually ride to town horseback or by buggy or hack and bring the mail back. Only a very, very few of the original settlers are left.

From Texas Outlook, the teachers' magazine:

My father was the second postmaster in Tahoka. Mrs. Fannie Henderson was the first.

The last school I went to was a 2-room house. J. B. Walker and Miss Minnie Chambers were the teachers. Thurman Wells, Lela Brigham, Mary Howell, Maude King and Kay Gilmore were in my class.

J. B. Walker was one of the best teachers Texas ever produced. When you came out of J. B. Walker's "college" you did not know much about football but you had an education.

I came to Kingsville in 1911 and went to work for Missouri Pacific Railway in 1912, and retired in 1955 as locomotive engineer with 43 years service.

Board Announces Policy On Use of School Facilities By Non-School Groups Of Area

The Board of Education and the administration of the Tahoka Public Schools are pleased to make school facilities available to responsible groups within the school district for educational recreational purposes when the facilities are not in use by the schools. In order for these facilities to be enjoyed by the citizens of the school district and in order that business-like procedures may be followed the following is requested:

1. Organizations wishing to use school facilities please make arrangements with the administrator under whose direction the particular facility is placed.
2. There will be a custodial fee of \$10.00 per day or night for the use of each facility, except the small gymnasium at North Elementary school for which there will be a fee of \$5.00. For those wishing to use the small gym it is requested that arrangements be

made, well in advance, with L. F. Jacobs. Since this facility gets much use during the winter and spring months, those wishing its use are requested to pay the \$5.00 custodial fee in advance. Checks should be made to North Elementary School Activity fund. The custodial fee will be paid to one of the Tahoka ISD maintenance personnel, who will be on duty to lock and unlock the building, turn off all lights and see to the cleaning of the facility after its use. The small gym is to be used for local volleyball teams and will be available, by arrangements, from 7:00 p. m. to 10:00 p. m. Monday through Saturday.

The custodial fee for each facility will be paid to the maintenance personnel who will be on duty while the facility is in use by non-school groups. Checks should be made to the Activity fund of the school where the facility is located.

3. When the cafeteria kitchen is used for cooking purposes by non-school groups a lady from the cafeteria staff will be on duty to supervise the use of equipment. There will be a \$10.00 fee for this person in addition to the \$10.00 custodial fee for the cafeteria.

Non-school groups will be responsible for any damage to facilities while in their use. These procedures are requested in order that facilities may be utilized and enjoyed by the community while being properly maintained with a minimum amount of trouble to those using them.

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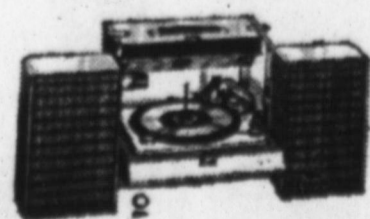
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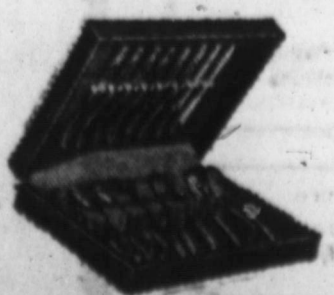
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
