Political Interest 'Perks Up' As '66 Election Approaches

Interest in local politics "perked up" this week as several candidates have announced for office and others have "the bee in their bonnet."

The Democratic Primary election will be on May 7, and candidates must file with the county clerk, county judge, county clerk, county school superintendent, county attorney, justices of the peace, and commissioners of Precincts 2 and 4.

County Judge W. M. Mathis has announced he will not ask re-election as county judge but will seek the office of district clerk since the present holder of this office, W. S. (Skip) Taylor, expects to retire next January.

V. F. Jones has announced he will offer for county judge.

C. W. Roberts announced last week as a candidate for re-election as county clerk, and L. K. (Heavy) Nelson is announcing this week for re-election as commissioner of Precinct 4.

Gus Sherrill is entering politics for the first time in his life as a candidate for commissioner of Precinct 2.

Gus Sherrill In Commission Race

Gus Sherrill of Draw announces he is a candidate for commissioner of Precinct 2, Lynn County, subject to action of the Democratic primaries.

Mr. Sherrill has lived in Lynn county most of his life, 45 years, coming here with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Sherrill Sr., from Rising Star, Eastland county. He married Mary V. Shook of O'Donnell in 1923, and the couple have three children.

Although he has farmed all his life, Mr. Sherrill is well acquainted with the precinct and the county and feels he knows many of the problems and needs.

He says he has no rash promises to make, political or otherwise. But, if elected, he says he will try to serve all areas of the precinct in a fair and just manner and to conduct the affairs of the precinct and the county to the very best of his ability in a business-like way.

He expects to contact all voters personally, and in the meantime asks everyone to give his candidacy serious consideration.

V. F. Jones Seeks Office As Judge

V. F. Jones, well known local business man, announces this week that he is a candidate for county judge to succeed Walter M. Mathis, who has announced for district clerk.

Mr. Jones came here in 1933 as county agent, and except for five years, has lived here ever since. He says he will make his formal statement next week.

Mathis Out For District Clerk

County Judge Walter M. Mathis this week announces he will not be a candidate for the office he now holds but is making application to the voters of Lynn County for the office of district clerk.

W. S. (Skip) Taylor, long-time district clerk, has stated he is retiring and will not seek the office again.

Mr. Mathis told The News he felt he had been county judge long enough and now is the time some one else should take over. But, he wishes to remain active and feels he is well qualified for the district clerk's work by reason of his experience as a bookkeeper, county clerk, and county judge.

"I am very appreciative of past favors from the people of our county," Mr. Mathis said. "I have enjoyed serving in office and am grateful for the confidence placed in me. Since I must make a living, I would like to serve you in this other capacity for which I feel I am thoroughly fitted.

"Heavy" Nelson Asks Re-election

L. K. (Heavy) Nelson of New Home announces that he is seeking re-election as County Commissioner, Precinct 4, Lynn County in the May Democratic Primary election.

Nelson has been a resident of Lynn county 43 years, and has lived in the New Home precinct 23 years.

In his statement, Nelson said, "I would like to thank the people of my precinct for the honor and privilege of serving you, and will sincerely appreciate any consideration given me for re-election to the office.

"If re-elected, I promise to give the duties my full time, as I have done in the past, try to profit from mistakes and thereby render better service in the future. I am ambitious to secure some more road improvements for our precinct and county, and shall work toward that end.

"Of great importance is the direction of the county's business affairs, and I will also try to continue a sane, sensible approach to these problems to the best interest of all citizens."

Mail for local delivery, including Tahoka rural routes, should be deposited in the post office and not in the outside mail box.

H. A. Roberts, 83, Is Heart Victim

H. A. Roberts, 83, a resident of the Grassland area for 50 years, died suddenly, probably of a heart attack, while sitting in his pickup in Post at about 4:00 p. m. Friday. He was the father of County Clerk C. W. Roberts and Mrs. Viola Greer of Tahoka.

Mr. Roberts had stopped at a place of business while a friend went inside. When the friend returned to the pickup, Mr. Roberts was slumped over dead.

Funeral services were held Sunday at 2:30 p. m. in First Baptist Church of Post with Rev. Kenneth Leach of Rome, Miss., Baptist pastor formerly of Grassland; Rev. Wendell Leach of Spade, former Grassland Methodist pastor; and Rev. Frank Jones of Lubbock, Baptist minister, officiating. Burial followed in the Grassland Cemetery.

Mr. Roberts was born December 28, 1882, in Roan, Tenn., migrated to Texas with his parents, and was married in Delta county, Texas, in 1903 to Miss Viola Gray. Mr. and Mrs. Roberts came to the Garza-Lynn area in September, 1915. She passed away on February 12, 1963.

Survivors include one son, C. W. Roberts of Tahoka; three daughters, Mrs. W. D. White of Post, Mrs. W. A. King of Grassland, and Mrs. Viola Greer of Tahoka; two brothers, A. S. Roberts and D. C. Roberts, both of Post; 13 grandchildren and 19 great grandchildren.

150,000 Bales Of Cotton Ginned In County To Date

Tax Collections Reach 77 Percent

State and county tax collections were lagging behind a year ago at the end of 1965 by 77 percent to 81 percent, according to George McCracken, county tax assessor and collector, probably because of the late harvest.

Through Dec. 31, 1965, he had collected \$201,020.73 or 77 percent of the roll, compared to \$213,222.37 at the end of December a year ago, or 81 percent.

Payments in December this year were \$30,438.69, compared to \$41,520.40 a year ago.

Taxes must be paid by January 31, after which date penalty, and interest must be assessed as required by state law.

However, poll tax payments at the end of December were slightly above those the previous year, 640 having been paid on Dec. 31, 1965, as compared to 599 a year ago.

Poll taxes are still required in Texas to vote in all but for Federal offices, president, congressmen, and senators.

Many taxpayers failed to pay their poll taxes when paying property taxes and are warned that statements were not sent out for poll taxes and these must be paid by January 31 as a prerequisite for voting.

Poll taxes are available at Mr. McCracken's office, New Home Co-op gin, Wilson Co-op Gin, Wilson School District office, and Moore Insurance Agency in O'Donnell.

Levi Noble Is Gunshot Victim

Levi Noble, 65, Post restaurant owner, reared in Lynn county the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Noble of West Point, died of a self-inflicted gunshot wound Tuesday night.

Funeral services were held Thursday at 10:00 a. m. in First Baptist Church of Post with the pastor, Rev. Joe Vernon, officiating. Burial followed in Terrace Cemetery.

Mr. Noble, who had operated Levi's Restaurant in Post since 1952, had been in ill health for some time and was threatened with the necessity of having a leg amputated.

Sheriff L. E. Claborn of Post, after talking with Mrs. Noble, said Levi had told his wife goodbye at the door of his home and headed toward his car to go to the restaurant at about 5:30 p. m. After a few moments, she heard a shot and found her husband lying on the ground beside the car, a bullet hole between his eyes.

The 38 calibre special pistol found beside his body was one he carried with him when opening and closing the cafe.

He was rushed to Garza Memorial Hospital first and then to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock, where he died about 20 minutes after arrival at 7:35 p. m.

Mr. Noble lived most of his life in Lynn county, at Tahoka, owned a drug store in Lubbock several years, and moved to Post 13 years ago.

He is survived by his wife, two sons, one daughter, and three grandchildren. Terry Noble of Tahoka and Robert Noble of Brownfield are his brothers.

Lynn county already ginned in the neighborhood of 150,000 bales. The News estimates following a survey of most of the gins this week. In addition, there was in excess of 5,000 bales weighed in but not yet ginned.

If these figures are correct, they would indicate that the crop will run far in excess of 160,000 bales and possibly past 170,000.

With a week of fair weather, however, the crop harvest will be complete except for scattered "scrapping."

Thursday morning Tahoka gins had handled a total of 30,227 bales and ginner reported another 1,100 bales weighed in.

Wilson and Wayside gins had ginned a total of 21,920 bales and had about 350 on the yards.

New Home and Lakeview gins reported a total of 26,551 and a total of 430 on the yards.

Petty was setting an all-time record, as are several other gins in the county, with 9,600 ginned and about 400 on the yard.

West Point had ginned 6,100 bales and had 800 on the yard to be ginned.

The new gin at New Lynn had ginned 1,840 and had some on the yard.

Draw had a total of 3,965 ginned and about 500 bales stacked up on the yard.

Grassland Co-op had ginned 6,100 hand had 254 bales on the yard. The News was unable to get a telephone connection with Producers Co-op at Grassland.

O'Donnell had ginned an estimated 24,600 bales, had more than 1,000 bales on the yard, and Weldon Martin of the Co-op Gin estimates the town's ginnings will run in excess of 35,000 bales. Ginning in the south part of the county is far behind most of the rest of the county.

The News had no direct reports from Wells and Newmore, but they are reported to have ginned about 7,200 and 4,500, respectively.

Also, there was no direct report from Gordon and Hackberry, about half of which is Lynn county cotton, but a farmer from the area estimated the Lynn county total from the two at 5,000 or more bales.

C. C. Ross Rites Here Tuesday

Crofford Charlie Ross was born Sept. 21, 1898, in Henderson county. He was married to Rena K. Dennis in 1922 in Conroe. The couple came to Lynn county 42 years ago from Montgomery county. Mr. Ross was a blacksmith and welder in Tahoka on his property now occupied by the new Higginbotham-Bartlett yard and the new US 87 right-of-way, until moving to Chula Vista in 1942.

Mrs. Ross died in 1963.

Survivors include two sons, Kenneth Ross of Chula Vista and Ervin Ross; his mother, Mrs. Sallie Ross of Colorado; one sister, Mrs. Harold of Conroe; and eight grandchildren.

Joyce, who is also of a pioneer family and has stood beside him all these years.

Charles Townes, acting postmaster, and assistant postmaster until Happy retired, who has worked under him since he was 19, also paid a very fitting and touching tribute to him. In fun, he presented his old boss a fishing stool.

Tahoka City Council came to the meeting in a body, and Mayor Meldon Leslie read resolutions passed by city officials honoring Mr. Smith.

Maurice Bray, master of ceremonies, also paid tribute to Happy and wife. There was hardly a dull mo-

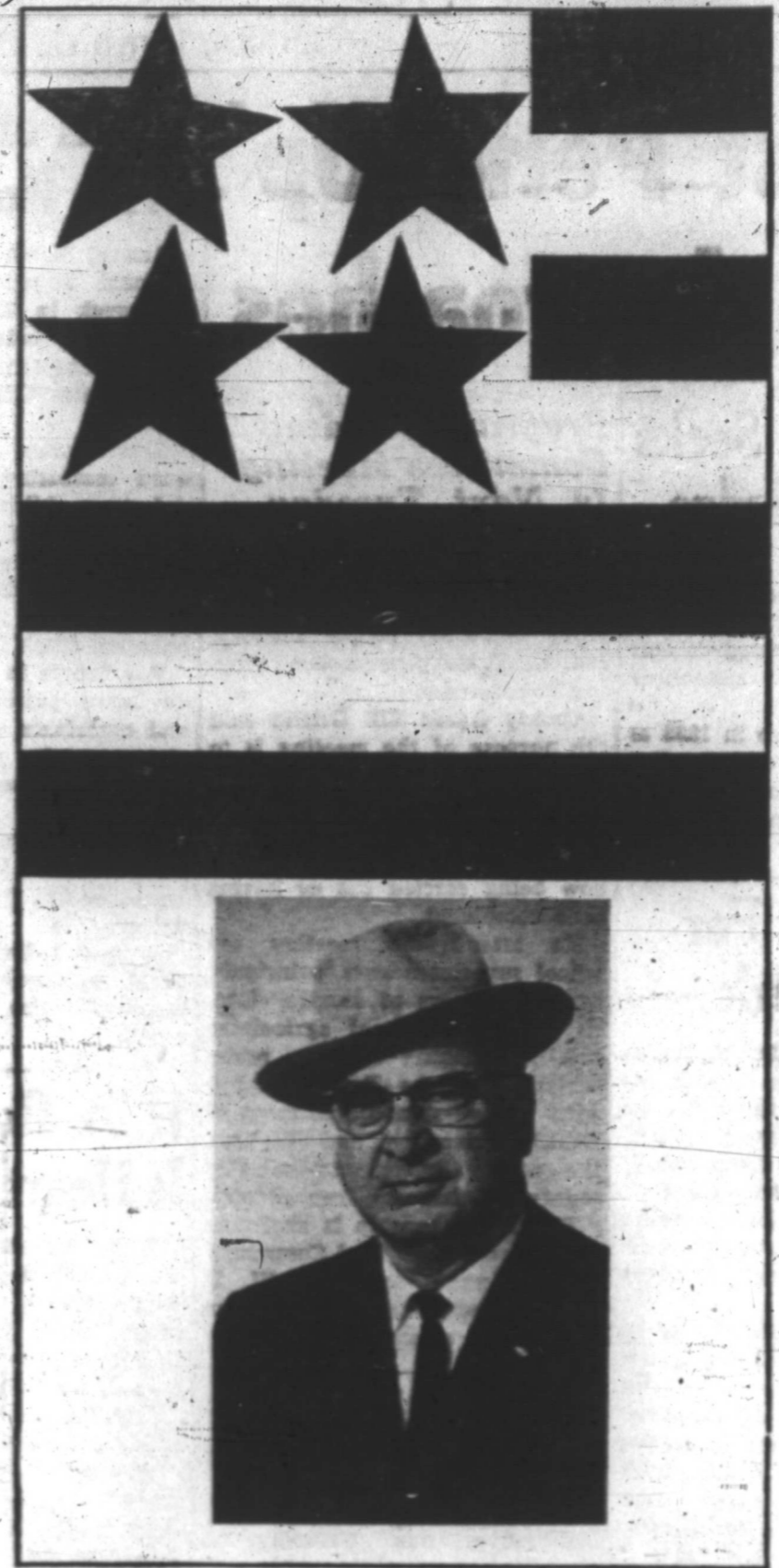

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Southwestern Public Service Plans \$19 Million Building Program For '66

A 1966 construction and improvement program which calls for the investment of an additional \$19,353,000 in new facilities throughout the company's service area was announced today by A. R. "Lon" Watson, president and general manager of Southwestern Public Service Company.

"Comparing our construction plans with a military operation, 1966 could be described as a year when we are going to strengthen and consolidate our position. In other words, this is a year when we are going to build into an already strong interconnected electric system new facilities which will provide even greater service dependability for our customers," Watson said.

New transmission lines, and related equipment, are the largest single investment in the 1966 program, with nearly \$7,500,000 of the total construction program designated for the construction and improvement of the electrical highways which bring the power from the generating stations to the areas served by the electric company.

A principal result of this new construction will be that the "backbone" transmission line, or principal electric artery linking the three largest generating stations will become a 230,000 volt line. Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo, Plant X, in Lamb County, and Cunningham Station, west of Hobbs, New Mexico are the three generating stations.

This means that early next year, it will be possible to move four times more power than we are able to now transmit between these three major plants.

"Let me emphasize that this conversion to 230,000 volts of the 'backbone', or main line is an addition to existing facilities, and means there will be one more way to move power throughout our system. In other words, there are other transmission routes, in addition to this new one, which can transport the power between all of our 11 generating stations and carry the load in the event of an emergency," Watson reported.

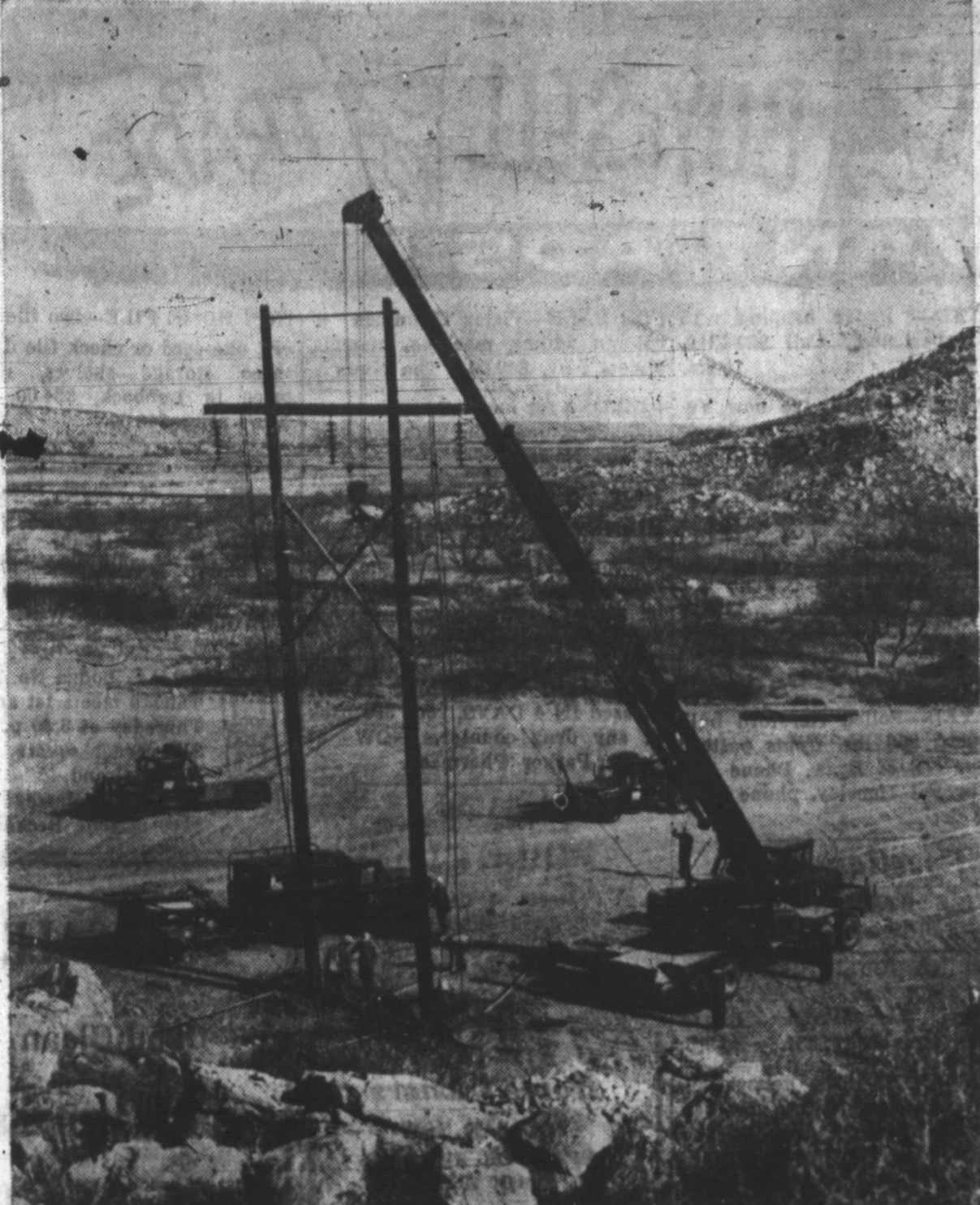
Watson went on to point out that the generation and transmission of electric power is controlled automatically insofar as the principal transmission lines are concerned, and that the changeover to an alternate route is accomplished instantaneously in most cases.

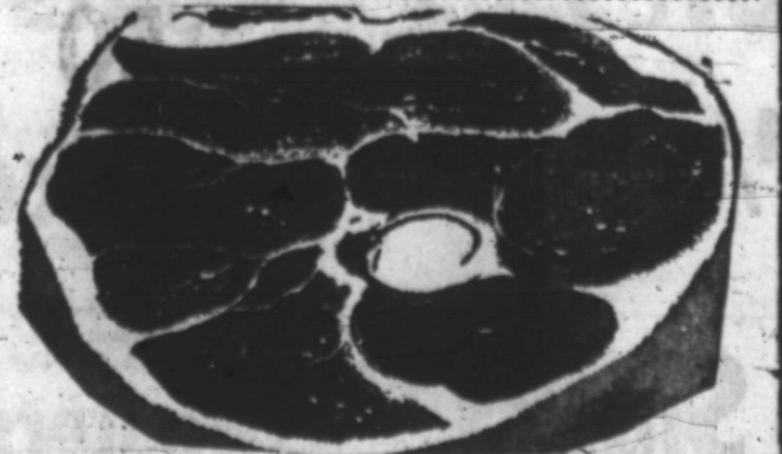

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Foreign Students Remember City

Speaker at Tahoka Rotary Club Thursday of last week was Mrs. A. M. "Neely" Bray, who brought the club up to date on the 11 foreign students the club has had as summer guests in as many years and also presented some observations of the value of the program.

Mrs. Bray has been one of the Rotary Anns who has helped entertain these students, visited some of them on her trip to Europe last year, and carries on correspondence with them.

The program is carried out by the local Rotary Club under direction of Harold Green, chairman, and the Experiment in International Living, a private non-profit organization financed largely by a wealthy American.

The 200 or more students who come to America each year from foreign lands are selected as outstanding graduates of their countries who have prospects of becoming leaders in their respective nations.

Mrs. Bray said she has learned from these students and from her own visit to Europe that the average foreigner distrusts, dislikes, and misunderstands the U. S. They gain their opinions from American movies and the abominable American tourist, who give the idea "all Americans think they are superior to peoples of other lands," that we are all rich, and that we are strictly materialistic.

Without exception, these students who come over here and spend a few weeks in Tahoka homes go back to their home land with a changed attitude and become defenders of "the American Way." She said America needs all the friends it can get in this modern world; and if these few students, leaders of tomorrow, are changed in their attitude, the program can not help but be of some benefit to others than just the local people who enjoy these foreign visitors.

Bernard DeBonne, from Paris, France, is now married, has two children, and the only visitor from Europe who cast his lot in the U. S. He is in large farm supervisory work in Indio, Calif.

Fred Marhart from Linz, Austria, is married, has two children, and is manager of an agricultural station near Linz.

Joe Tasioux from Belgium is married, has two children, and has a feed and grain business.

Tom Sallinen from Finland is also married and has two children.

Several members of the district have taken advantage of the Great Plains Conservation Program this fall, says Don Reed of the Soil Conservation Service.

Kenneth Eaker has completed parallel terraces under the program on two of his fields.

Mrs. Ora Miles and W. A. Jordan of the Wells area are in the process of completing parallel terraces at the present time.

Other members of the district that are participating in the Great Plains Conservation Program and are planning work this winter include Victor and Gilbert Steinhauer, Charles Brookshire, H. B. Brewer, L. C. Unfred, Joe Brooks, C. R. Burleson, and Harold Barrett.

At the present time there are 51 participants in the district taking advantage of the program,

says Reed. Your local county agent, SCS, ASC, or FHA representative or any member of the board of Soil Conservation District supervisors may help you get further information on the Great Plains Program.

Farmers entering the Great Plains Program are eligible to receive cost-share on parallel terraces at the rate of 70 per cent of the cost, not to exceed 10 cents per foot.

There are other practices also eligible for cost sharing under the program, says Reed.

He is survived by one son, Bryan J. Williams of Post.
