The six events will be pony bronc riding, steer riding, ribbon roping, barrel racing, pole bending and goat tying.



He predicts that the "K4442" system will be used as a basis for the realignment. The system would reach downward to include kindergarten and go upward to add two years of junior collegeall under the public school sys-

"The provision of kindergarten education at age 4-51/2 and the addition of two years beyond high come a reality in the 1970's," Dr. Wallace says. The 13th and 14th year at the junior college level will aid the nation's economy by providing academic, vocational and technical programs for capable students who have been unable to attend four year colleges and universities.


"It is also clear," Wallace com ments, "that many public school districts too small and too limited in resources to provide an ade quate program at reasonable cost will be eliminated.

"The original justification for a five-to-six hour school day for three-quarters of a calendar year no longer exists," Dr. Wallace says. He explains that while a seven-to-eight hour school day for 11 months will increase the nation's investment in schools, the result will be more economical both in terms of educational outcomes and greater use of facilities and personnel.
